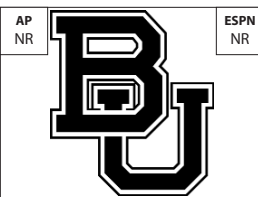

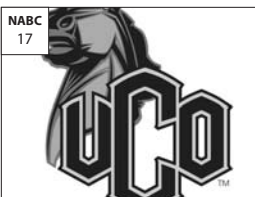

GAME NIGHT STORY LINES

- Baylor will host defending Lone Star Conference champion Central Oklahoma in an exhibition game Thursday at the Ferrell Center. Tip-off is scheduled for 7 p.m. CST.
- Baylor leads the all-time series 5-2, but the schools have not played during the regular season since the 1938-39 season.
- Baylor is 3-1 in exhibition play under seventh-year head coach **Scott Drew**.
- Thursday's contest marks the fourth consecutive season that Baylor has played an exhibition game against a Lone Star Conference school.
- Last season, the Bears defeated preseason LSC South Division favorite Tarleton State 76-44. Baylor lost to Tarleton State in its 2007-08 exhibition game after defeating Texas A&M-Commerce in its 2006-07 exhibition.
- Baylor will play 24 regular season games on television in 2009-10, including nine on the ESPN family of networks. Last season, the Bears played a school-record 34 televised game as well as 18 on the ESPN family of networks.
- Seventh-year Baylor head coach **Scott Drew** enters the 2009-10 season with 81 wins to his credit at the helm of the Bears men's basketball program. Drew currently ranks sixth all-time at Baylor and trails former head coach **Gene Iba (98)** by 17 for fifth place.
- Junior forward/center **Ekpe Udoh**, who transferred from Michigan in June 2008, will suit up for the Bears in 2009-10 after sitting out the 2008-09 season to satisfy NCAA transfer rules. When Udoh steps onto the floor for Baylor's exhibition game Thursday, it will be his first game in 601 days.
- Baylor was picked 10th — garnering 33 votes — in the 2009-10 Big 12 Preseason Coaches Poll in October. Baylor was picked ahead of Nebraska (11th) and Colorado (12th). Last season, Baylor was picked tied for third — the Bears' highest preseason prediction in Big 12 history.
- Baylor's 45 wins in the last two seasons (21 in 2007-08, 24 in 2008-09) under head coach **Scott Drew** are more than the Bears' combined win total in his first four seasons (36).
- Entering the 2009-10 season, Baylor has nine underclassmen, which ranks third in the Big 12 (11, Nebraska; 10, Kansas; 9, Baylor and Oklahoma) and 20th among NCAA Division I schools. The Bears possess only four upperclassmen, fewest in the Big 12 and ranks ninth nationally.
- Baylor opens the 2009-10 regular season Friday, Nov. 13 against the Norfolk State Spartans at the Ferrell Center for a 7 p.m. CST tip.

SERIES HISTORY

- Baylor leads the all-time series 5-2, but the schools have not played during the regular season since the 1938-39 season.
- Baylor has won the last three meetings, including a 56-54 neutral-site victory Dec. 31, 1936, in Oklahoma City.
- Baylor's lone losses in the series occurred during the 1935-36 season.
- The Bears have never played UCO in Edmond, Okla. (Six series meetings in Waco).

EXHIBITION HISTORY UNDER DREW

- Baylor is 3-1 in exhibition play under seventh-year head coach **Scott Drew**.
- Thursday's contest marks the fourth consecutive season that Baylor has played an exhibition game against a Lone Star Conference school.
- Last season, the Bears defeated preseason LSC South Division favorite Tarleton State 76-44. Baylor lost to Tarleton State in its 2007-08 exhibition game after defeating Texas A&M-Commerce in its 2006-07 exhibition.
- In Drew's first season, Baylor defeated a pair of traveling exhibition teams (Raiders Select and World HoopStars).

CENTRAL OKLAHOMA PICKED TO WIN LONE STAR CONFERENCE NORTH DIVISION

- After claiming its second straight North Division crown in 2009, Central Oklahoma is the preseason favorite to repeat as the Lone Star Conference North Division champion. UCO earned 18 of 20 first-place votes to finish with 138 total points in the balloting of LSC coaches, sports information directors and various media representatives.
- UCO returns seven letterwinners from last year's 24-6 team that made its second consecutive NCAA Division II South Central regional appearance. The Bronchos are led by senior guard **Eric Cazenave**, who averaged 11.8 points and 3.7 rebounds last season.
- Central Oklahoma will open the 2009-10 season ranked No. 17 according to the NABC Division II Preseason Poll.
- UCO, which has won 111 games over the last five seasons and is 52-12 in the last two seasons, is the only Lone Star Conference team in the preseason poll.

LAST EXHIBITION GAME (NOV. 8, 2008 VS. TARLETON STATE)

- Baylor used a 15-0 run midway through the first half en route to a 76-44 victory over Tarleton State in its lone exhibition game.
- Sophomore **LaceDarius Dunn** picked up right where he left off with a team-high 18 points and seven rebounds.
- Senior **Kevin Rogers** came up two rebounds short of a double-double, after recording 15 points and 8 boards. Senior **Henry Dugat** tallied 12 points and senior **Curtis Jerrells** chipped in six points, seven rebounds and four assists.
- The Bears took a 15-12 lead at the 11-minute mark and went on a 15-0 run for the next six minutes to jump to a 30-12 advantage.
- Behind 41.4 percent shooting in the first half, Baylor stretched its lead to 36-18 going into the break.
- Baylor shot 44.1 percent (26-of-59) for the game and held Tarleton State to 31.9 percent (15-of-47). The Bears' fast break defense was in mid-season form, holding the Texans to two points, while the Baylor offense tallied 14 points in the open court.
- The Bears forced 23 Tarleton State turnovers, which they converted into 24 points. Senior Eric Williams posted a double-double for the Texans with 11 points and 10 rebounds, while junior Jeremiah Wilson added 10.

LAST TIME OUT (APRIL 2, 2009 VS. PENN STATE — NIT CHAMPIONSHIP GAME)

- Baylor's historic run through the 2009 postseason did not have a storybook ending as the Bears, making their first trip to New York City since the 1950 Final Four, lost 69-63 to Penn State in the NIT championship game.
- **LaceDarius Dunn** scored 18 points to lead Baylor, which hadn't won a postseason game since 1950 before its run to the NIT final. **Curtis Jerrells** added 14 points, while **Tweety Carter** and **Kevin Rogers** each chipped in 10.
- Baylor held a four-point halftime lead (29-25), but a 16-5 Penn State run midway through the second half gave the Nittany Lions a nine-point lead.

UP NEXT (SEASON OPENER VS. NORFOLK STATE)

- Baylor opens the 2009-10 season when it welcomes the Norfolk State Spartans to the Ferrell Center Friday, Nov. 13, for a 7 p.m. tip.
- Norfolk State, which advanced to the 2009 Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference tournament finals for the first time in school history, is led by MEAC Preseason Player of the Year **Michael DeLoach**. DeLoach led the MEAC in scoring last season with 21.5 points per game, ranking 15th nationally.
- Norfolk State is the first of two MEAC opponents on Baylor's 2009-10 schedule. In January, the Bears will host reigning MEAC champion Morgan State (also the Bears), which is led by back-to-back MEAC Coach of the Year **Todd Bozeman**.

BAYLOR VS. THE MEAC

- The Nov. 13 season opener will be the first meeting between Baylor and Norfolk State.
- Norfolk State will be only the sixth Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference school that Baylor has played — and the first of two this season.
- Baylor is 6-0 all-time vs. members of the MEAC — 2-0 vs. North Carolina A&T and 1-0 vs. Coppin State, Delaware State, Florida A&M and Maryland-Eastern Shore.
- Baylor will face defending MEAC champion Morgan State at the Ferrell Center Jan. 6.

PERFECTION ON THE LINE

- Baylor is a perfect 40-0 against members of the Mid-Eastern Athletic (MEAC), America East and Southwestern Athletic (SWAC) Conferences. Baylor opens the 2009-10 season against Norfolk State (MEAC), Hartford (America East) and Southern (SWAC).
- Baylor is 33-0 all-time vs. SWAC schools, 6-0 vs. MEAC schools and 1-0 vs. America East schools (1-0 vs. Hartford).
- After Norfolk State and Southern, one more opponent remains for Baylor from both the MEAC (Morgan State) and SWAC (Jackson State).
- Baylor is 2-0 vs. the Big South, 4-0 vs. the Horizon League and 2-0 vs. the Northeast Conference.

BAYLOR IN THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER

- Baylor is 68-31 all-time in the month of November (regular season only).
- Baylor is 19-5 under head coach Scott Drew.

SEASON-OPENING HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

- When Baylor squares off in its season opener Nov. 13 against Norfolk State, it will mark the first game to be played on that date in the program's 104-year history. Prior to this season's opener, the earliest season opener during the modern era in Baylor recorded history is Nov. 11, which occurred twice — 2006 (90-65 win over Angelo State) and 2007 (100-75 win over Jackson State).
- The earliest game played in program history occurred during the school's first season of organized basketball in 1906-07 when Baylor defeated Cowden Hall, 18-11, Oct. 12, 1906. The Bears later defeated Waco YMCA, 43-18, Nov. 6, 1906.

BEARS OPEN REGULAR SEASON WITH THREE GAMES IN FOUR-DAY STRETCH

- Beginning with Baylor's season opener Nov. 13 vs. Norfolk State, the Bears will play three home games over a rigorous four-day stretch. For the second season in a row, Baylor will host Hartford (Sun., Nov. 15) at the Ferrell Center, followed by Southern on Mon., Nov. 16. The Southern game was originally scheduled for Dec. 22, but was moved last month.
- Baylor's first four games fall in a 10-day window for the second consecutive season. Last season, the Bears opened the regular season with four wins in a 10-day stretch before participating at the 76 Classic in Anaheim, Calif.

BAYLOR BECOMING A HOUSEHOLD NAME

- Baylor will play 24 regular season games on television in 2009-10, including nine on the ESPN family of networks. Last season, the Bears played a school-record 34 televised games as well as 18 on the ESPN family of networks.
- Baylor is 19-17 in nationally televised games since 1997-98.
- Baylor is 16-15 in nationally televised games under head coach Scott Drew.
- Baylor is 16-16 on the ESPN family of networks.
- Baylor is 13-14 on the ESPN family of networks in the Drew era.
- Baylor is 43-74 on regional and national television in the Drew era.
- For the second consecutive season, all 16 of Baylor's Big 12 Conference games will be televised.

THE CENTURY MARK

- Seventh-year Baylor head coach **Scott Drew** enters the 2009-10 season with 81 wins to his credit at the helm of the Bears men's basketball program. Drew currently ranks sixth all-time at Baylor and trails former head coach **Gene Iba (98)** by 17 for fifth place.
- Drew is 19 wins shy of reaching 100 victories as Baylor head coach. If he reaches the century mark, he would become only the fifth coach in Baylor history with 100 or more career wins, joining **Bill Henderson (201)**, **Ralph Wolf (151)**, **Bill Meneffee (149)** and **Jim Haller (104)**.
- Drew notched his 100th career win with Baylor's 74-72 NIT semifinal victory at Auburn in March 2009.

'THE NIGHTMARE' TO MAKE BAYLOR DEBUT VS. UCO

- Junior forward/center **Ekpe Udoh**, who transferred from Michigan in June 2008, will suit up for the Bears in 2009-10 after sitting out the 2008-09 season to satisfy NCAA transfer rules. When Udoh steps onto the floor for Baylor's exhibition game Thursday, it will be his first game in 601 days.
- Udoh will wear No. 13 this season because his middle name is 'Friday' and he was dubbed 'The Nightmare' by teammate **Quincy Acy** (whose nickname is 'The Cookie Monster').
- As a sophomore at Michigan in 2007-08, Udoh broke Chris Webber's sophomore blocked shots record (92). Udoh finished his career at Michigan fourth all-time with 159 blocked shots.

BAYLOR PICKED 10TH IN BIG 12 PRESEASON COACHES POLL

- A season after surpassing its highest preseason prediction in Big 12 history (tied for third with Kansas in 2008-09), Baylor was picked 10th, garnering 33 votes. Baylor was picked ahead of Nebraska (11th) and Colorado (12th).
- Baylor, which finished ninth last season with a 5-11 league record, was tabbed No. 7 in 2006-07 and No. 9 in 2007-08.

DUNN LOOKING TO MAKE SECOND SERIOUS RUN AT 3-POINT CONSECUTIVE GAMES STREAK

- Junior **LaceDarius Dunn**, who posted the second-longest streak in school history with 28 consecutive games with at least one 3-point field goal made, enters the 2009-10 season with a streak of 12 consecutive games — dating back to Feb. 28, 2009, vs. Colorado.
- Tweety Carter** enters the season with a streak of seven consecutive games.
- Last season, Carter's streak of 18 consecutive games was snapped in Baylor's 65-49 win over Nebraska on March 11, 2009. It currently stands at the sixth-longest streak in school history.

- Baylor has made at least one 3-point field goal in 551 consecutive games — the second-longest active streak in the Big 12 (Texas).
- Baylor has connected from 3-point range in every game since Feb. 21, 1990, in a win vs. Texas Tech.

CAREER POINTS FOR TWEETY CARTER

- Senior point guard **Tweety Carter** needs 42 points to become the 24th player — and sixth under head coach **Scott Drew** — in school history to score 1,000 career points.
- Carter would join teammate **LaceDarius Dunn** and former teammates **Aaron Bruce**, **Curtis Jerrells**, **Henry Dugat** and **Kevin Rogers**.

LACE CLOSING IN ON CAREER 3-POINT RECORD

- Junior **LaceDarius Dunn** set a Baylor single-season record in 2008-09 when he drained 109 3-point field goals. Dunn enters the 2009-10 season sixth all-time with 183 career 3-point FG made. He needs 85 triples to become BU's new career leader (**Aundre Branch, 267**).
- If Dunn breaks Branch's record, the Monroe, La., native will own or share all three major 3-point field goal records at Baylor — single-game (nine at Kansas State, 2009), single-season (109 in 2008-09) and career.

PROGRAM TURNAROUND

- Baylor's 45 wins in the last two seasons (21 in 2007-08, 24 in 2008-09) under head coach **Scott Drew** are more than the Bears' combined win total in his first four seasons (36). The 45 wins are the largest two-season win total in program history, surpassing Baylor's combined 41 wins in 1986-87 (18) and 1987-88 (23).

UNDERCLASSMEN DOMINATE 2009-10 ROSTER

- Entering the 2009-10 season, Baylor has nine underclassmen, which ranks third in the Big 12 (11, Nebraska; 10, Kansas; 9, Baylor and Oklahoma) and 20th among NCAA Division I schools. The Bears possess only four upperclassmen, which leads the Big 12 and ranks ninth nationally.

- The 2009-10 marks Baylor's 22nd season at the 10,284-seat Ferrell Center. The Bears have posted a .604 winning percentage, accumulating 195 victories on their home court.
- Baylor needs five home victories to break the 200-win plateau.
- BU won a school record-tying 14 games at the Ferrell in 2008-09.

BAYLOR TO PLAY AT THE 2009 OLD SPICE CLASSIC

- For the second consecutive season, Baylor will spend its Thanksgiving week at an ESPN-owned preseason tournament as the Bears will play at the 2009 Old Spice Classic in Lake Buena Vista, Fla. Baylor will face the Alabama Crimson Tide on Thursday, Nov. 26, in game three of the 2009 Old Spice Classic on ESPN2. Tip-off is slated for 5:30 p.m. CT.
- The fourth annual Old Spice Classic, which will be held Thanksgiving weekend at the Milk House at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex at the Walt Disney World Resort near Orlando, will include 12 games in three days and will be broadcast on ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPNU. The 2009 Old Spice Classic features eight schools, including six that reached the postseason in 2008-09. The Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) will once again serve as the event's sponsoring conference.
- Baylor is one of two teams in the tournament that earned a 2009 National Invitation Tournament bid, along with Creighton of the Missouri Valley Conference. Florida State, Marquette, Michigan and Xavier earned NCAA Tournament berths in 2009.
- Tickets to the 2009 Old Spice Classic are on sale now, at www.ticketmaster.com, or by phone at (407) 839-3900. Fans can purchase official travel packages, which include game tickets and official team hotel accommodations, by going to www.AnthonyTravel.com.

DELAYED TV HOME DEBUT

- Last season, Baylor hosted Centenary Nov. 18 on ESPN as part of the network's *College Hoops Tip-Off Marathon*, marking the earliest televised home game in school history.
- This season, Baylor will not have a home game televised until its non-conference contest with UT Arlington Dec. 20 on FOX Sports Southwest. That game will be the latest TV home debut under head coach **Scott Drew** since the 2005-06 home opener vs. Oklahoma State Jan. 14, 2006 (**NOTE:** Baylor did not play a non-conference game that season due to NCAA sanctions).

FIRST TIME FOES VISIT WACO

- For the second consecutive season, Baylor will play three first-time opponents when the Bears welcome Norfolk State (Nov. 13), Morgan State (Jan. 6) and UMass (Jan. 23) to the Ferrell Center.
- Depending upon the outcome of the Old Spice Classic, Baylor could play up to two more first-time opponents in Orlando — Iona, Michigan or Xavier.
- Last season, Baylor hosted three first-time opponents, defeating all three — Paul Quinn, Hartford and Portland State.

LACEDARIUS DUNN: SCORING MACHINE

- Last season, **LaceDarius Dunn** became the second sophomore in school history (**Terry Teagle**) to reach the 1,000-point plateau. Teagle scored 1,028 points in his first 55 career games (Lace scored 1,035 in 70 games).
- Dunn is the fourth player in school history to need two seasons to score 1,000 points, joining **Vinnie Johnson (1,231)**, **William Chatmon (1,104)** and Teagle (1,028).
- Dunn's 614 points in 2008-09 were the seventh-most single-season points scored in school history.

BAYLOR'S 1,000-POINT CLUB TO WELCOME ONE MORE IN 2009-10

- Through the program's first 100 seasons of basketball, Baylor had 18 1,000-point scorers. In the last three seasons alone, the Bears have welcomed five 1,000-point scorers (**Aaron Bruce**, **Curtis Jerrells**, **Henry Dugat**, **Kevin Rogers** and **LaceDarius Dunn**) — three during the 2008-09 season.
- Senior **Tweety Carter** will become the sixth 1,000-point scorer under Drew during the early portion of 2009-10. Carter, who currently has 958 points, needs 42 more to reach the 1,000-point plateau.
- Carter will be the last Baylor player to score 1,000 career points for a while. The nearest active Baylor player to scoring 1,000 points is senior **Josh Lomers**, who has 342 (Transfer **Ekpe Udoh** scored 367 points in two seasons at Michigan).

TOP 20 RECRUITING CLASS

- Seven newcomers will don the green and gold for the first time this season, including five signees that comprise the nation's No. 17-rated recruiting class, according to [Rivals.com](#), and No. 21-rated recruiting class according to [ESPN.com](#) — **Givon Crump**, **Nolan Dennis**, **Cory Jefferson**, **Dragan Sekelja** and **A.J. Walton**.

CARTER ON PACE TO SHATTER CAREER WINS MARK

- Last season, Baylor greets **Curtis Jerrells**, **Henry Dugat** and **Kevin Rogers** finished their careers as the winningest class in school history with 64 wins (**Mamadou Diene** finished with 53).
- Entering the 2009-10 season, senior **Tweety Carter** has a chance to shatter the trio's career wins mark. Carter ranks eighth all-time with 57 victories, eight shy of breaking the mark. Teammate **Josh Lomers** has 54 wins to his credit.

BAYLOR'S CAJUN CONNECTION

- Louisiana natives **Tweety Carter (Reserve, La.)** and **LaceDarius Dunn (Monroe, La.)** have combined for 1,993 points as Baylor Bears. Carter and Dunn have twice as many points as the rest of Baylor's five players with Division I experience combined — 995 points between **Ekpe Udoh (367)**, **Josh Lomers (342)**, **Quincy Acy (185)**, **Anthony Jones (61)** and **Fred Ellis (40)**.

THREE-PEAT?

- Last season, Baylor posted back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time and back-to-back postseason appearances for only the second time in school history (1987 NIT and 1988 NCAA).
- The 2009-10 Bears are looking to post the program's first back-to-back-to-back 20-win seasons and back-to-back-to-back postseason appearances.
- Baylor's previous best postseason stretches occurred under **Bill Henderson** and **Gene Iba**. Baylor advanced to three NCAA Tournaments and two Final Fours from 1946-50; Iba guided the Bears to an NCAA Tournament and two NIT appearances from 1987-90).

BIG 12/PAC-10 HARDWOOD SERIES REMATCH

- After splitting their Big 12/Pac-10 Hardwood Series with Washington State, the Baylor Bears will travel to Tempe, Ariz., to face the Arizona State Sun Devils. At the 76 Classic in Anaheim, Calif., last season, Baylor upset No. 14 Arizona State, 87-78. The series rematch will take place Thurs., Dec. 3, at 9:30 p.m. CST on FSN.
- Arizona State will travel to Waco in 2010-11.

BAYLOR VS. TOP 25 IN DREW ERA

- Since the 1996-97 season, Baylor is 11-70 vs. nationally ranked opponents, including 4-38 in the Drew Era.
- Baylor went 2-6 vs. Top 25 teams in 2008-09 — the most wins vs. ranked opponents since 2007-08 (two).
- Baylor snapped a 29-game losing streak to Top 25 teams with a thrilling 116-110 five-overtime win over then-No. 16 Texas A&M on Jan. 23, 2008. The Bears then lost three straight games against ranked teams before beating No. 24 Kansas State on Feb. 23, 2008.

PREVIOUS TWO NIT RUNNERS-UP CLASH IN 2010

- When Baylor and UMass meet for the first time in Jan. 2010, it will be the clash of the previous two National Invitation Tournament (NIT) runners-up. The Minutemen, under the guidance of current Oklahoma State head coach **Travis Ford**, lost to Ohio State in the NIT finals, finishing with a 25-11 overall record.

HOW PAST NIT FINALISTS HAVE FARED NEXT SEASON

- Since 1997 (the first season of the Big 12), 11 of 24 NIT finalists have advanced to the NCAA Tournament the following season. Four returned to the NIT the following season, including South Carolina which won back-to-back NIT titles in 2005 and 2006.
- Three of the last four NIT runners-up returned to the postseason the following season.

HOME, SWEET HOME

- For the 11th time in the Ferrell Center's 22-year history, Baylor will play at least 16 home games during the 2009-10 season. Baylor also has played at least 16 home games in 10 of the last 11 seasons (Baylor played only eight home games during 2005-06 season due to NCAA sanctions that did not allow the Bears to play a non-conference schedule.).
- Last season, Baylor played a Ferrell Center-record 19 home games, finishing with a 14-5 record at home.

INTERNATIONAL PIPELINE

- With the addition of **Dragan Sekelja**, Baylor has had at least one foreign player on its roster in each of the last six seasons under Drew. Sekelja is the first European (Croatia) to play for the Bears since **Jari Vanttaja (Finland)** in 2005-06 and 2006-07.
- Other foreign Bears under Drew include **Aaron Bruce (Australia, 2005-08)**, **Mamadou Diene (Senegal, 2005-09)** and **Djibril "Penny" Thiam (Senegal, 2007-08)**.
- Sekleja is also the first Bear to wear No. 14 since Bruce, who finished his career with 1,330 points.

'THE COOKIE MONSTER' SETS IMPRESSIVE BAYLOR AND BIG 12 RECORD AS A FRESHMAN

- Quincy Acy** made his first 20 college field goals, setting Baylor and Big 12 records with 20 consecutive field goals made.
- Acy started the season 24-of-25 from the floor through the first six games.

AN ELITE 30-SOMETHING COMPANY

- Baylor was one of only three Division I schools to have three different players record 30-point games last season against Division I opponents. Only **Virginia Tech (Malcolm Delaney, A.D. Vassallo, Jeff Allen)** and **VMI (Keith Gabriel, Chavis Holmes, Travis Holmes, Austin Kenon)** equaled that feat. VMI was the only school to have four players score 30 or more. Baylor was the only Big 12 school to have three different players score 30 or more points in a game in 2008-09 — **Curtis Jerrells** (31 vs. Oklahoma State, Jan. 17), **LaceDarius Dunn** (33 at Kansas State, Jan. 21) and **Tweety Carter** (30 at Oklahoma State, Feb. 21).

RANKED WITH THE BEST

- During the 2007-08 season, Baylor returned to the AP Top 25 for the first time in nearly 40 seasons. In 2008-09, Baylor was ranked in the AP Top 25 for a school-record seven consecutive weeks. The Bears peaked at No. 19, one spot short of its highest ranking (No. 18 in 1969).
- In 2008-09, the Bears also were ranked simultaneously in the AP and ESPN/USA Today Top 25 polls for the first time in school history. Baylor spent six weeks in the ESPN/USA Today Top 25 Poll.

ONE SHY OF NCAA HISTORY

- During its historic postseason in 2008-09, Baylor shattered the school record for most games played with 39 (the previous mark was 34).
- Baylor played the second-most games in a Division I season since 1948. Only Duke (1986), UNLV (1990), Kentucky (1997), Florida (2007), Kansas (2008) and Memphis (2008) played more — all with 40.

AN APRIL FIRST

- Baylor's appearance in the 2009 NIT championship game vs. Penn State was the first game played in the month of April in school history.

BAYLOR BASKETBALL ON THE RADIO

- Baylor Bears basketball is aired live via the Baylor-ISP SportsNetwork on flagship station 1660AM ESPN Radio (KRZI) in Waco and worldwide on Sirius XM Radio channel 161. All games are broadcast by the "Voice of the Bears" **John Morris** and former Baylor basketball standout **Pat Nunley**, in his 28th season as analyst.
