BRANDON TAKES OVER FALCONS

Gregg Brandon is the 16th head coach in the history of the BGSU football program. He replaced Urban Meyer, who left BGSU to become the head coach at the University of Utah. Brandon has more than 22 years of coaching experience at the Division I level, including the last two years at BGSU where he has served as assistant head coach and directed the Falcons' record-setting offensive attack. For his efforts at BGSU, *The Sporting News* selected him as the top coordinator in the Mid-American Conference. Also returning from last year's coaching staff are assistant head coach-defense Tim Beckman, and defensive staff members Mike Ward (defensive tackles) and John Bowers (defensive ends/special teams). Former Falcon Greg Studrawa was promoted to offensive coordinator and will coach the entire offensive line and former graduate assistant Zach Azzanni will oversee the development of the wide receivers. Joining the staff at BGSU this year are running backs coach Dennis Springer (Ball State), quarterbacks coach Mick McCall (Wyoming), tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator Troy Rothenbuhler (Arkansas State) and defensive backs coach Steven Wilks (East Tennessee State).

BANGIN' WITH THE BCS

Since the 2001 season, the Falcons are 5-0 against BCS conference affiliated schools, including a 3-0 record on the road. Twenty-two current Falcons have been part of this success, including 11 who have started during the last two years.

BRINGS BACK MEMORIES

The Falcons' last win over a nationally-ranked opponent came on September 16, 1972 when Don Nehlen's Falcons upset #18 Purdue, 17-14, in West Lafayette. Don Taylor's 29-yard field goal for BGSU was the lone score in the game in the second half and provided the margin of victory. That game stands as the only other meeting between the two schools.

MORE BIG TEN

BGSU has played at Purdue (1972), Michigan State (1981), Minnesota (1986), Ohio State (1992 and 1997), Wisconsin (1992), Penn State (1998), Michigan (2000) and Northwestern (2001). With a game at Ohio State on September 20, the Falcons will have two Big Ten opponents on its schedule for the first time since 1992.

NATIONALLY RANKED

The Falcons spent five weeks in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll last season and were ranked as high as 16th by the coaches and 20th by AP in early November. The last time BGSU faced a nationally ranked squad was in the 2000 season opener at #4 Michigan.

AGAINST THE BIG TEN

The Falcons are 2-7 (all on the road) against the Big Ten but are coming off a 43-42 win at Northwestern in 2001.

HARRIS A CANDIDATE FOR JOHNNY UNITAS GOLDEN ARM AWARD

Twenty-six outstanding senior quarterbacks, including Bowling Green State University's **Josh Harris**, have been selected as candidates for the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, presented annually to the nation's top senior collegiate quarterback by the Frank Camp Chapter of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation. Included among the elite list of candidates for the award are: Tate Bennett (Weber State), Casey Clausen (Tennessee), Ryan Dinwiddie (Boise State), Jason Fife (Oregon), Ryan Flanagan (Cal-Davis), Adam Hall (San Diego State), Harris (Bowling Green), Robert Kent (Jackson State), Asad Abdul Khaliq (Minnesota), Craig Krenzel (Ohio State), Chris Lewis (Stanford), Jared Lorenzen (Kentucky), J.P. Losman (Tulane), Ell Manning (Mississippi), Scott McBrien (Maryland), Luke McKown (Louisiana Tech), Jon Navarre (Michigan), Cody Pickett (Washington), Scott Rislov (San Jose State), Philip Rivers (North Carolina State), Ell Robertson (Kansas State), Rod Rutherford (Pittsburgh), Matt Schaub (Virginia), Ryan Schneider (Central Florida), Jim Sorgl (Wisconsin), and Bradlee Van Pelt (Colorado State). Additional candidates could be added at a later date if their performance dictates such inclusion. The nation's top senior quarterback is selected for the award from a list compiled by a select committee of football experts from across the United State. The committee will choose five finalists plus any ties announce the list on Oct. 22. The 2003 recipient will be announced Dec. 4, with the award presentation to be made in Louisville on December 12 at the Galt House East Hotel Grand Ballroom. The prestigious award bears the name of who many refer to as the finest quarterback to ever play the game of football. Established in 1987, the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award has previously honored 14 outstanding young men. USC quarterback Carson Palmer won the award last year. Other past recipients include Don McPherson (Syracuse, 1987), Rodney Peete (USC, 1988), Tony Rice (Notre Dame, 1989), Craig Erickson (Miami, Fla., 1990), Casey Weldon (Florida St.,1991)Gino Torretta (Miami, Fla., 1992), Charlie Ward (Florida St., 1993), Jay Barker (Alabama, 1994), Tommie Frazier (Nebraska, 1995), Danny Wuerffel (Florida, 1996), Payton Manning (Tennessee, 1997), Cade McNown (UCLA, 1998), Chris Redman (Louisville, 1999), Chris Weinke (Florida State, 2000), and David Carr (Fresno State, 2001). In addition to honoring a player with the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, the Frank Camp Chapter of the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Educational Foundation has presented more than \$475,000 in scholarships to deserving scholar athletes from area high schools. The organization was formerly associated with the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. The Transamerica Insurance and Investment Group, a leading provider of innovative business and personal financial services, is a major corporate sponsor for the award and organization as is Jillian's, a dining and entertainment megaplex established in 1988. Insight Communications, the eighth-largest cable operator in the United States serving Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois and Ohio, is an active sponsor and will televise the event. The namesake of the award has a storied history which earned him the recognition of being the greatest quarterback to ever play in the NFL. An 18-year veteran of the NFL, Unitas played his collegiate career at the University of Louisville (1951-54), passing for 3,007 yards and 27 touchdowns. Unitas, who wore number 19 as a professional, had his No. 16 collegiate uniform retired at Louisville, the lone number retired by the Cardinals. He began his 18-year pro career with the Baltimore Colts in 1956 and played there until joining the San Diego Chargers for his final season. His career passing figures are mind boggling. He completed 2,830 of 5,186 passes for 40,239 yards and 290 touchdowns during his 18-year NFL career. Among his many records is one that may stand forever, throwing a touchdown pass in 47 consecutive games. Unitas was recently selected as the top quarterback of all-time by the Pro Football Hall of Fame 36-member selection committee. In commemorating the NFL's 25th, 50th, and 75th anniversaries, he was also honored as the greatest quarterback of all time. A Pro Bowl participant 10 times and a three-time Most Valuable Player honoree, Unitas was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame in 1979. In turn of the century listings, Unitas as featured among Sports Illustrated's top ten athletes, Time's ten most influential athletes and in ESPN's series on the 50 greatest athletes of the century.

FALCON TRADITION

The Falcons, who enter their 52nd season as a Mid-American Conference member, rank second in MAC history in both conference wins (212) and championships (10). The Falcons' .610 winning percentage ranks third all-time. **BGSU has finished either first or second in the MAC standings in 22 of their previous 51 seasons in the league.**

DEFENDING THEIR TURF

The Falcons have won eight games in a row at home since the end of the 2001 season. In those, wins, BGSU has averaged 53.9 points per game in front of the home fans. In addition, senior quarterback **Josh Harris** is 9-0 as a starter at Doyt Perry Stadium.

OPENING AT HOME

The Falcons opened their season at home in back-to-back years for the first time since BGSU played its season opener at Perry Stadium three consecutive years from 1990-92. Since 1970, BGSU is 9-1 when it opens its season at home, losing only to Louisiana Tech, 28-21 in 1995.

**EASTERN KENTUCKY POST-GAME NOTES**

* The game marked the collegiate head-coaching debuts for both BGSU's **Gregg Brandon** and EKU's Danny Hope.

* Seven players made their first career starts for the Brown and Orange, including five on defense ... first-time defensive starters included DE **Devon Parks**, LB **Ted Piepkow**, NG **Mike Thaler**, DT **Monty Cooley** and LB **Daniel Sayles** ... on offense, OL **Rob Warren** and OL **Andy Grubb** started for the first time in their respective BGSU careers.

* BGSU won its eighth consecutive home game, dating to the 2001 season ... in those eight home games, the Falcons have scored a total of 432 points, an average of 54.0 points per game.

* Sophomore RB **P.J. Pope** rushed 13 times for a total of 48 yards and a career-high three touchdowns ... his only other multi-TD game came last year vs. Ball State, when he scored twice on rushes.

* Senior QB **Josh Harris** completed 18 of his 26 attempts through the air for 265 yards and a pair of touchdowns ... redshirt freshman QB **Omar Jacobs** also saw extensive action, and was 8-of-11 for 157 yards and a TD in his first collegiate appearance.

* Jacobs ran for 20 yards on his first collegiate play, coming midway through the second quarter ... on his first-ever drive, Jacobs led the Falcons 37 yards in four plays for a touchdown.

* The Falcons' jerseys featured the players' last names on the back, for the first time since the 2000 season.

* Fifth-year senior **Rick Mauer** had a career-high three sacks for a total of 21 yards in losses, and also forced a fumble.

* Junior WR **James Hawkins** had a total of seven receptions for a career-high 128 yards ... Hawkins' 100-yard game was the second of his career ... he had 112 receiving yards in last year's win over Missouri.

* Redshirt sophomore **Charles Sharon** had a career-long 28-yard punt return ... on the night, he had three returns for 41 yards.

* Junior WR **Cole Magner** had a career-high six catches for a total of 71 yards ... he was one of three Falcons to catch a TD pass in the win, joining Sharon and redshirt sophomore WR **Derrick Lett**.

* Lett hauled in a career-long 66-yard TD pass from Jacobs in the fourth quarter ... it was his third career reception, and marked the first TD of his collegiate career ... that play also was the first scoring pass for Jacobs as a Falcon.

* Redshirt freshman RB **Raishaun Stover**, in his first collegiate action, had seven carries for 45 yards and his first career TD.

* Brandon becomes the eighth consecutive BGSU head coach to win his debut, following Urban Meyer (20-13 at Missouri, 2001), Gary Blackney (17-6 vs. Eastern Michigan, 1991), Moe Ankney (21-16 vs. Ohio, 1986), Denny Stolz (17-6 at Grand Valley State, 1977), Don Nehlen (62-8 vs. Ball State, 1968), Bob Gibson (21-0 vs. Cal St. Los Angeles, 1965) and the legendary Doyt Perry (40-0 vs. Defiance, 1955) ... the last time a BGSU head coach did not win his opening game came in 1941, when Robert H. Whittaker's Falcon team tied Wooster, 14-14, in 1941 ... Harry Ockerman was the last head coach to lose his BG debut, a 12-0 setback to Capital in 1935.

* Shaun Suisham set a school record by connecting on all nine PATs... he breaks his own mark of eight (Toledo, 2001) that he shared with Brian Leaver (Navy/Ball State, 1994), Al Silva (Ball State, 1968) and Jim Perry (Temple, 1966)... his nine attempts ties the single-game mark that Silva set in 1968 in the Ball State game... he needs just six PATs made and attempted to break Leaver's school record of 115 extra points made in 118 tries from 1991-94.

* The Falcons converted on their first 11 third down opportunities.

GO WEST

The 2003 season marks the Falcons' second as a member of the Mid-American Conference's West Division. BGSU was moved to the West after spending five seasons in the East Division. The move was a result of the MAC admitting the University of Central Florida (UCF) in 2002 as a football-only member and placing the Golden Knights in the East Division.

NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS

Since 2001, the Falcons have scored 10 times on non-offensive TDs. Seven times the defense has scored, while three times, BGSU has scored on special teams.

CAMPBELL AND HICKS ON NFL ROSTERS

When the NFL season begins this weekend, two standouts from BGSU's 2001 team will suit up. **Khary Campbell** will begin his second year as a linebacker with the New York Jets, while defensive tackle **Brandon Hicks** made the Indianapolis Colts after spending all of last season on the team's practice squad.

Bowling Green State University Director of Athletics Paul Krebs tabbed Gregg Brandon to become the 16th head coach in the history of the BGSU football program on December 19, 2002.

Brandon has more than 22 years of coaching experience at the Division I level, including the last two years at BGSU where he has served as assistant head coach and directed the Falcons' record-setting offensive attack. For his efforts at BGSU, *The Sporting News* selected him as the

top coordinator in the Mid-American Conference.

Under his guidance, the Falcons finished third in the nation in scoring (40.8), eighth in total offense (448.9) and 15th in rushing (219.1). In addition, the Falcons toppled 17 school records and seven MAC records and saw quarterback Josh Harris set a league mark with 41 TDs responsible for. Under his direction, Brandon saw wide receiver Robert Redd earn first-team All-MAC honors for two straight seasons. **In addition, BGSU had the top red zone efficiency in the nation (96.8) converting on 61 of 63 opportunities inside the opponents' 20-yard line.**

In his first season at BGSU, the Falcon offense showed tremendous improvement, accumulating 124.46 more yards per game and 14.48 more points per game than the 2000 squad. Among MAC schools, the Falcons improved from 13th to fourth in total offense and from 11th to third in scoring offense under his leadership.

BGSU set five school records on offense that year including total offensive plays in a game (100 vs. Kent State), individual receiving yards in a game (215, Redd vs. Marshall), individual total offense in a game (498, Harris vs. Northwestern), rushing yards by a quarterback in a game (148, Harris vs. Ohio), and individual receptions in a season (72, Redd).

Brandon joined the Falcons after spending two seasons at Colorado under Gary Barnett, where he coached the receivers and kickoff return units both years and was the team's passing-game coordinator in 2000 and recruiting coordinator in 1999.

Brandon, 47, played football for Barnett at Air Academy High School in Colorado Springs, and stayed in close touch with him throughout the years. When Barnett was hired as head coach at Northwestern in 1992, Brandon joined the Wildcat staff as receivers coach. He was also Northwestern's recruiting coordinator for his last two seasons there (1997-98). In his seven seasons at Northwestern, Brandon assembled an extremely talented group of receivers, including D'Wayne Bates, the second all-time leading receiver in Big Ten history. Bates was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award and an All-America candidate.

Brandon played collegiately as both a defensive back and wide receiver at Mesa State (1974) and Northern Colorado (1975-77). He graduated from UNC in 1978 with a bachelors degree in education, and began his coaching career that fall as head football coach at Ellicott (Colo.) High School. He spent three seasons there (1978-80) before joining the college ranks at Weber State (under former Washington State coach Mike Price), where he would coach the next six seasons (1981-86). He coached the tight ends and special teams in his first four seasons, the linebackers in his fifth year

and the receivers and tight ends during his final year in Ogden. He was then named receivers coach at Wyoming, where he would work the next four years (1987-90).

During his tenure with head coach Paul Roach, the Cowboys posted a 35-15 record, including a 16-0 run in Western Athletic Conference play in 1987 and 1988, and played in three bowls ('87 and '88 Holiday and '90 Copper). In 1991, he returned to Utah where he coached the linebackers for one season (1991) at Utah State. Brandon, born Feb. 29, 1956, in Tucson, Ariz., is married to the former Robyn Mitchell. They are the parents of two sons, Nicholas (19), a sophomore at Purdue, and Timothy (11).

THE TOTAL STUDENT-ATHLETE

Harris carries a 3.09 grade point average while majoring in interpersonal communication... he was the lone MAC football player to be invited to participate in the 2002 NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference. He is a three-time MAC Scholar Athlete of the Week selection.

A WINNER AND A LEADER

During the last three years, BGSU is 14-3 in games he has started... he guided the Falcons to an 11-game winning streak over two seasons and helped BGSU earn its highest ever national ranking (#16, ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll)... he also is the first quarterback in MAC history to have a 4-0 record against BCS conference affiliated teams.

WHAT YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT JOSH

He directed the nation's most balanced offensive attack in 2002 as the Falcons were the only school in the country to average more than 215 yards per game on the ground (219) and through the air (229.8). In 2002, BGSU was first nationally in red-zone efficiency (96.8%), third in scoring (40.8) and ninth nationally in total offense (448.9).

He is the nation's top returning point producer after finishing second in the nation in points responsible for at 20.83 points per game... his 41 TDs responsible for (20 rushing, 19 passing and two receiving) broke Chad Pennington's 1997 MAC record of 40 TDs scored by passing or rushing.

He is the nation's leading returning scorer having averaged 11.17 points per game and finished third in the country in that category last season... his 134 points scored in 2002 is the most ever scored by a quarterback in MAC history.

He finished 15th in the nation in total offense in 2002 (263.5 yards per game).

WHAT OTHERS SAID ABOUT HARRIS AND BGSU

"Josh Harris is such a dangerous threat that it is almost impossible to contain a player like that," said Central Michigan Coach Mike DeBord after Harris sealed the Falcons' 45-35 victory.

"Give that quarterback credit. We have faced some pretty good quarterbacks and this guy is as good as I've seen," said Ohio Coach Brian Knorr after playing Florida, Pittsburgh and Bowling Green at the start of the 2002 season.

"That's probably the best execution I've seen in a long, long time. Every big play they tried, not every one but certainly most of them, they hit on. Momentum-wise, we didn't do anything to stop them," said Missouri Coach Gary Pinkel following the Falcons' 51-28 victory in 2002.

"He reminds me of Michael Vick," said Toledo linebacker Tom Ward. "He can run very well and cut back and forth. Once you get him out of the pocket and scrambling, boom, he hits someone deep for a big play, or he takes off running and leaves you frustrated."





Harris' Memorable Performances

At Miami, 2000

In just his second career game, Harris was inserted as the starting tailback for the injury-depleted Falcons and rushed for 103 yards on 18 carries.

At Ohio, 2001

In his first game as the permanent starter for the Falcons, Harris set a school quarterback record by rushing for 148 yards to lead BGSU to a 17-0 win on the road in 2001. The victory gave BGSU its sixth win of the campaign snapping a six-year streak of losing seasons.

At Northwestern, 2001

The following week, Harris earned ESPN.com National Player of the Week honors and became the second BGSU quarterback to pass for more than 400 yards when he completed 30 of 47 passes for 402 yards and three TDs at Northwestern. He also rushed for 96 yards and two TDs in the Falcons 43-42 win and caught a 14-yard TD pass. He was the only player in 2001 to run for a TD, pass for a TD, and catch a TD pass in the same game.

Toledo, 2001

In the season finale, Harris rushed for 117 yards and two TDs and threw for 268 yards and 4 TDs as the Falcons defeated Toledo, 56-21. He completed 17 of 28 passes.

Missouri, 2002

Harris threw for 311 yards and rushed for 66 yards and two TDs to lead the Falcons to a 51-28 win over Mizzou. He started the scoring onslaught for BGSU by going the distance on a 34-yard screen pass from teammate Cole Magner.

at Kansas, 2002

Harris rushed for 98 yards and two TDs and caught a 15-yard TD pass as the Falcons won its second straight against a Big XII opponent, 39-16.

Ohio, 2002

In front of a Homecoming gathering, Harris threw for 292 yards and four TDs and rushed for 75 yards and two scores as BGSU trounced the Bobcats, 72-21.

At Central Michigan, 2002

Harris spoils the Chippewas Homecoming in a 45-35 Falcon win by rushing for 138 yards and a career-high three TDs. His 23-yard TD run with 2:22 remaining, elevated BGSU into the national rankings for the first time since 1985.

Western Michigan, 2002

In their first test as a nationally-ranked team, Harris, despite suffering a sprained knee in the game, rallies the Falcons from a 14-point deficit for a 48-45 overtime win over Western Michigan. He rushed for 96 yards, including a five-yard game-winning TD score in OT. He also completed 20 of 39 passes for 254 yards and three TDs.



Harris Up For Davey O'Brien Award

The Davey O'Brien Foundation has included BGSU quarterback Josh Harris on the watch list for the 2003 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, given annually to the nation's top college quarterback.

The O'Brien Award is the oldest and most prestigious award in the country for college quarterbacks and is named in honor of the late Davey O'Brien, the All-American and Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback for Texas Christian University who led the Horned Frogs to the 1938 national championship.

Semifinalists will be announced in early November and narrowed to three finalists later in that month by the O'Brien National Advisory Committee. The committee is comprised of nationally known sportswriters, commentators and other members of the media. The winner of the 2003 O'Brien Award will be announced Dec. 11 on the ESPN College Football Awards Show from Orlando, Fla. The winner will be honored at the 27th annual O'Brien Awards Dinner in February 2004, at The Fort Worth Club in Fort Worth, Texas.

HIGH-FLYING, HIGH-SCORING

With its 63-point effort against Eastern Michigan, the Falcons established a new league record for most points scored in a season at 466 and finished with 490 overall. That broke the old mark of 453 set by Marshall in 1997. With three TDs against Toledo, BGSU also set a new MAC single season standard of 65 TDs scored, breaking the old mark of 64 set by Marshall in 1997. However, with post-season statistics now counting, those records were later toppled by Toledo, which played two more games than BGSU.

WELL COACHED

Give offensive coordinator **Greg Studrawa** credit for molding together an offensive line that had to replace three starters and helped BGSU to a five yards per carry rushing average against EKU. Junior **Scott Mruczkowski**, who started the last 23 games at left guard for the Falcons moved to the center position. Senior **Robert Haley** (RT) and junior **Andy Grubb** (RG) were originally defensive linemen and sophomore **Jonathan Culp** (LT) began his career at tight end. Senior reserve **Jimmy Williams** also began his career on defense.

SUISHAM NAMED TO GROZA WATCH LIST

Junior **Shaun Suisham** has been named to the 2003 Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award Preseason Watch List. The Watch List is comprised of the top 30 preliminary candidates for the 12th annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award, presented by the FedEx Orange Bowl. The award will be given out during a ceremony on Tuesday, December 9, 2003, at the West Palm Beach Marriott at CityPlace in West Palm Beach, FL. The kickers on the Lou Groza Award Watch List were chosen based on statistics from the 2002 season and preseason expectations. However, all Division I-A kickers are eligible for consideration for the award. A panel of over 300 experts votes on the award, including Division I-A head coaches, sports writers and sportscasters, conference representatives, professional kickers and all previous Groza Award finalists. The 20 semi-finalists for the Lou Groza Award will be announced on Monday, November 3, followed with the naming of the three finalists two weeks later, on Monday, November 17. The award, now in its 12th year, is named for NFL Hall-of-Fame kicker Lou Groza, who played 21 seasons with the Cleveland Browns. Groza won four NFL championships with Cleveland and was named NFL Player of the Year in 1954. Nicknamed "The Toe," Groza was one of the first people to truly make kicking an art form, and he helped usher in to football the idea that a player could be used exclusively for kicking.

"I think it happens every year somewhere during camp- A kid walks-on and is a dynamic player," said BGSU Coach Gregg Brandon. "You have to understand that he was a kid we were recruiting and he got hurt. He had the opportunity to go to some Division II schools but Coach Beckman stayed on him and got him to walk-on because he wanted to go to school here.

POWELL IN A SNAP

Another area player, senior Gavin Powell, is currently listed as the top long snapper. "He's been more consistent and that is what you need from your long snapper," added Brandon. Powell is a 2000 graduate of Defiance High School.

BLEACHERS ARE REMOVED

The bleachers located in the south end zone of Perry Stadium are being taken down and will not be replaced. The area will now feature the Falcon Club tent, a Falcon Fanatic Store, and inflatable games for kids. The actual capacity of Doyt Perry Stadium will now be 28,599, a reduction of 2,000 from last year.

FALCONS ADD OKLAHOMA

The BGSU football program will now open the 2004 season at Oklahoma on September 4. The game with the Sooners replaces a road game at Auburn, originally scheduled for that September 25. It will be the third time in four years that BGSU will play on the road against a Big 12 school. The Falcons won games at Missouri (2001) and Kansas (2002).
