BIG TEN PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

OFFENSE:

Tyrell Sutton, Northwestern

FR, RB, Akron, Ohio/Archbishop Hoban

Sutton becomes the first freshman in school history to earn Big Ten Player of the Week honors after setting career highs in every category with 214 rushing yards on 30 carries (7.1 avg.) and four touchdowns, including the game-clinching score with 62 seconds left against Northern Illinois. The true freshman surpassed the century mark for a second straight game after breaking loose for 104 yards in the season opener. His four rushing scores equaled a school record set by four other players, most recently when Jason Wright tallied four touchdowns against Illinois in 2003. Sutton also hauled in two passes for 16 yards against NIU to rack up 230 all-purpose yards. He is currently tied for the Big Ten lead with six touchdowns through two games while rating second in the league with 159.0 yards per contest.

DEFENSE:

A.J. Hawk, Ohio State

SR, LB, Centerville, Ohio/Centerville

In a narrow loss to No. 2 Texas, Hawk spearheaded the Buckeyes defensive attack with a game-high 12 tackles, including seven solo stops, three tackles for loss (including two sacks), one interception, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. The two-time Preseason Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year picked off his seventh career pass in the second quarter and returned it 24 yards to set up an OSU field goal to take a 13-10 lead. On the next Longhorns' possession, Hawk recovered a fumble to set up another field goal and a 16-10 advantage. The senior linebacker's three tackles for loss set Texas back 12 yards, including 10 yards lost on his two sacks. This marks the second weekly accolade for Hawk, as he was also honored on Sept. 29, 2003.

CO-SPECIAL TEAMS:

Marquice Cole, Northwestern

JR, PR, Hazelcrest, Ill./Hillcrest

Cole returned two punts for 101 yards (50.5 avg.), including an 81-yard scoring sprint in the second quarter to give the Wildcats a 17-14 lead. The junior defensive back's 81-yard touchdown marked the fourth-longest return in school history and the longest punt return since Sam Simmons went 87 yards for a score against Texas Christian in 1999. Cole also starred on the defensive side of the ball, racking up eight tackles, a 23-yard interception return and covering the intended receiver on the final play of the game when Northern Illinois attempted a two-point conversion while trailing 38-37 with two seconds to play. This is Cole's first weekly honor.

Brandon Williams, Wisconsin

SR, KR/PR, St. Louis, Mo./Hazelwood East

Williams compiled 143 return yards against Temple, running back the visitor's only kickoff of the game 38 yards and tallying four punt returns for 105 yards (26.3 avg.) and a 66-yard touchdown. The senior wideout, who already ranks fourth in the Big Ten in both kickoff returns (86) and yardage (1,856) for a career, recorded his first career touchdown on a punt return and his first score of any kind since the 2003 campaign when he reached the end zone on a reception against Penn State. This is the first weekly honor for Williams.

NOTING THE BIG TEN

Big Ten Boasts Eight Unbeaten Teams: Through two weeks of non-conference play, eight Big Ten programs maintain unblemished records with Illinois, Indiana, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Penn State and Wisconsin producing 2-0 marks while Purdue is 1-0 after opening the season last weekend. With eight unbeaten programs and a non-conference record of 18-3 (.857), the Big Ten is off to its best start in the last decade. The league has boasted seven teams with perfect records entering week three on four occasions in the last 10 years (2002, 2000, 1999 and 1996) and the best non-conference start over that time span was a record of 18-5 (.782) in 1999. Those perfect marks will be tested in the third weekend of non-conference play as five of the eight unbeaten teams will be on the road and three of those games will feature nationally-ranked opponents.

A Familiar Sight for 2-0 Teams: Starting the year with two victories is nothing new for the seven Big Ten programs boasting 2-0 records. Illinois, Indiana, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Penn State and Wisconsin have all opened at 2-0 at least once since the 2001 campaign. The Illini and Wildcats both picked up two season-opening victories for the first time since 2001, when Illinois opened at 3-0 and went on to claim the Big Ten title and NU also started out with three triumphs. The Nittany Lions' last 2-0 record occurred in 2002 when the team started 3-0 and went on to win nine games. The Spartans boast a 2-0 mark for the first time since 2003 and are aiming for their first 3-0 record since the 2000 campaign. The Hoosiers, Gophers and Badgers all opened with at least two victories last season. Indiana started out 3-0 in 2004 and has produced back-to-back 2-0 starts for the first time since the 1993 and 1994 campaigns. Minnesota has opened at 2-0 in each of the last four seasons under Glen Mason, including a 5-0 opening stretch last season. Wisconsin has also started out 2-0 in four straight years under Barry Alvarez with the team sprinting out to a 9-0 record in 2004.

Big Ten Road Show: After playing only three road games in the first two weeks of the season, Big Ten teams will be the visitor in five of the 11 outings during the final full weekend of non-conference play. This challenging slate includes four bowl teams from a year ago and squads from the ACC and Pac-10. Illinois will head out west to battle California, a school that took part in the Holiday Bowl last season. Michigan State will be challenged at Notre Dame, which played in the Insight bowl following the 2004 campaign. Northwestern will travel to Arizona State to face a Sun Devils squad that defeated Purdue in the Sun Bowl last season. The Boilermakers will also be in the state of Arizona squaring off against the Wildcats on Saturday. Wisconsin's first road trip of the season will feature a match-up against North Carolina, which played in the Continental Tire Bowl last season. The Badgers' non-conference slate features three bowl teams from a year ago, including their season-opening triumph over Bowling Green (GMAC Bowl) and a game at Hawaii (Hawaii Bowl) on Nov. 25.

Explosive Offenses: The Big Ten has featured impressive offensive outbursts in the first two weeks of the season with all 11 teams tallying at least 30 points in one game, including eight contests last weekend alone. In the second weekend of non-conference play, Wisconsin led the way with 65 points against Temple, the second-highest output in the modern era in school annals. In other scoring explosions last weekend, Minnesota broke the 50-point barrier, Illinois, Michigan State, Penn State and Purdue shattered the 40-point barrier while Indiana and Northwestern surpassed the 35-point plateau. The Badgers currently rank second nationally (and first among all teams with two games played) with an astounding 60.5 points per contest. The Spartans, who have produced 49 and 42 points in their first two games and

IND WR **James Hardy:** Career-high eight receptions for 122 yards (15.3 avg.) and a TD against Nicholls State, including four catches for 61 yards on the game-clinching drive, capped by a seven-yard scoring reception with 47 seconds left; He becomes the first receiver in school history to debut with consecutive 100-yard receiving games (107 yards at Central Michigan) and the first IU receiver to accomplish the feat in back-to-back games since Courtney Roby in 2002.

IOWA RB **Albert Young:** 18 carries for a career-high 140 yards (7.8 avg.) at Iowa State.

MSU QB **Drew Stanton:** 21 of 26 (80.8 percent) for 301 yards and a career-high tying three TDs against Hawaii for his third career 300-yard passing effort.

MINN RB **Laurence Maroney:** 26 carries for 135 yards (5.2 avg.) and two TDs against Colorado State.

OSU WR **Santonio Holmes:** Four receptions for 73 yards (18.3 avg.) and a TD while adding three kickoff returns for 109 yards (36.3 avg.) against Texas.

PSU QB **Michael Robinson:** 11 of 17 (64.7 percent) for 220 yards and a career-best three TDs and 10 carries for a team-high 62 yards (6.2 avg.) and another TD in win over Cincinnati; His 282 yards of total offense are the second-highest of his career and his 59-yard scoring strike was the longest for PSU since 2003.

PUR RB **Jerod Void:** 10 carries for a 101 yards (10.1 avg.) and a 46-yard scoring run against Akron to post his fourth career 100-yard game.

WIS TE **Owen Daniels:** Career highs in receptions (six), yards (88) and TDs (3) vs. Temple to rank second on the school's single-game list for receiving scores.

DEFENSE:

ILL LB **Remond Willis:** Eight tackles (four solo), 1.5 TFLs (-4 yards) and a 27-yard interception return as defense held San Jose State to 15 rushing yards.

IOWA LBs **Chad Greenway** and **Abdul Hodge:** Both players posted a game-high 13 tackles (10 solo for Hodge; five solo for Greenway) at Iowa State.

MICH CB **Grant Mason:** 16 tackles (13 solo) and a PBU against Notre Dame, while returning two kickoffs for 42 yards.

MSU BANDIT **Sir Darean Adams:** Career-high 12 tackles (10 solo) and two TFLs (-14 yards), including a 10-yard sack, against Hawaii.

MINN LB **Mike Sherels:** Five tackles (four solo), two fumble recoveries, one TFL (-1 yard) and a 31-yard interception return against Colorado State.

PSU LB **Tim Shaw:** Career-high 10 tackles (eight solo), one sack (-6 yards) and two PBUs as Cincinnati was held to only 31 rushing yards.

PUR LB **George Hall:** Team-high nine tackles (three solo), 1.5 tackles for loss (-5 yards), including a half sack (-4 yards), and two pass breakups vs. Akron.

WIS DE **Kurt Ware:** Two tackles (one solo), two sacks (-12 yards) and a forced fumble in a shutout of Temple.

SPECIAL TEAMS:

ILL K **Jason Reda:** Four-of-four (26, 33, 21, 45) on field goals (the most by an Illini kicker since 1999), including a career-long 45-yarder.

MINN S **Dominique Barber:** Blocked a third quarter punt against Colorado State which was recovered for a touchdown by Alex Daniels.

OSU K **Josh Huston:** Five-of-six (45, 36, 25, 44, 26) on field goals, including a career-long 45-yarder, to equal a school record for most field goals in a game.

PUR S **Bernard Pollard:** Blocked a first quarter punt against Akron which was picked up by Kory Sheet and returned 13 yards for a touchdown.

rank 13th nationally in scoring, appear second in the country in total offense (and first among all teams with multiple games) with 592 yards per outing. The Big Ten features six teams among the top 21 in the national rankings in both scoring and total offense -- Wisconsin (2nd with 60.5 ppg, 11th with 498 ypg), Purdue (7th with 49.0 ppg, 116th with 478.0 ypg), Minnesota (18th with 48.5 ppg, 6th with 540.5 ypg), Michigan State (13th with 45.5 ppg, 2nd with 592 ypg), Northwestern (119th with 38.0 ppg, 7th with 526.0 ypg) and Illinois (121st with 36.5 ppg, 21st with 464.5 ypg).

Big Ten Among National Leaders: Through two weeks of play, the Big Ten features multiple players among the top 10 in the national statistical rankings, highlighted by three of the top six in rushing yards. Minnesota's **Laurence Maroney** (2nd at 168 ypg), Northwestern's **Tyrell Sutton** (4th at 159 ypg) and Wisconsin's **Brian Calhoun** (6th at 150 ypg) all appear among the top six running backs in the country, while Sutton and Calhoun are also tied for the national lead in scoring with six touchdowns a piece. In the passing game, Michigan State's **Drew Stanton** is ranked fourth in the country with a 195.9 pass efficiency rating and seventh with 330.5 yards of total offense per contest. On special teams, two players rate among the top seven in punt returns in NU's **Marquice Cole** (6th at 25.7 yards per return) and Wisconsin's **Brandon Williams** (7th at 24.8 yards per return) while Ohio State's **Santonio Holmes** is tied for sixth with 36.3 yards per kickoff return. Fellow-Buckeye **Josh Huston** is second in the country with 3.5 field goals per game.

Second Trophy Game of 2005: In a conference with 15 traditional trophy games, the second one on the line in 2005 will be the Megaphone Trophy when Michigan State travels to Notre Dame. The first trophy game of 2005 occurred last weekend as Iowa State reclaimed the Cy-Hawk Trophy with a win over Iowa.

Gophers Streaking in Non-Conference Play: Minnesota extended its non-conference winning streak to 18 games with a victory over Colorado State. The Gophers have not lost to a non-league foe in more than three seasons, including bowl wins in 2002, 2003 and 2004, as their last non-Big Ten loss came on August 30, 2001.

Century Club Crashers: With a victory over Cincinnati on Saturday, Penn State's **Joe Paterno** moved one step closer to joining an exclusive group of Big Ten coaches with 100 wins at a single school. The Nittany Lions mentor improved his record to 98-49 in his 13th year since Penn State began conference play in 1993. Michigan's **Lloyd Carr** is also within striking distance of the century mark with a record of 96-30 and would become the third Wolverine on the list along with Bo Schembechler and Fielding Yost. The Big Ten currently boasts 10 head coaches in the century club, including current Wisconsin mentor **Barry Alvarez**, who picked up his 110th victory on Saturday against Temple to claim sole possession of ninth place, just one victory behind Ohio State's John Cooper (111-43-4). Tiller and Hooppner Hit Coaching Landmarks: Purdue's **Joe Tiller** and Indiana's **Terry Hooppner** both reached coaching milestones on Saturday. Tiller spent his 100th game on the Boilermakers' sideline on Saturday against Akron. Entering his ninth year in West Lafayette and 15th season as a head coach overall, he improved his record to 63-37 at Purdue and 102-67-1 in all games as a head coach. Tiller becomes just the second coach in school history to rack up 100 games along with the program's all-time victory leader, Jack Mollenkopf (84-39-9 from 1956-69). Hooppner picked up his 50th victory as a head coach on Saturday against Nicholls State. The IU mentor is now 50-25 in his seventh year as a head coach. Three other coaches are nearing significant landmarks. Minnesota mentor **Glen Mason** is also nearing the century mark in Minneapolis, as he coached the Gophers for the 98th time on Saturday against Colorado State. Among other coaches, Ohio State's **Jim Tressel** is nearing the 250-game mark for his career as a head coach (247 games currently) while Michigan State's **John L. Smith** is approaching the 200-plateau for his coaching career (197 games currently).

Basanez Invades Big Ten Top 10: Northwestern's **Brett Basanez** broke into the top 10 in two Big Ten career categories last weekend after completing 21 of 32 passes for 220 yards while adding 55 yards on 10 rushing attempts in a victory over Northern Illinois. The senior quarterback boosted his career numbers to 647 completions to pass Wisconsin's Darrell Bevell (646 from 1992-95) for 10th place and 1,452 career offen-

sive plays to rise to ninth overall and surpass fellow Wildcat Mike Greenfield (1,415 from 1984-87) and Illinois' Jack Trudeau (1,418 from 1981-85). Basanez, who also set the school records for career passing yards, completions and total offense last week, also climbed to eighth all-time with 1,156 passing attempts to surpass Michigan State's Jeff Smoker (1,150 from 2000-03). Basanez needs 105 passing yards and 468 yards of total offense to crack the Big Ten's all-time top 10 in those categories. A complete list of current Big Ten players on or nearing the league's top 10 appears below.

Big Ten on TV: The third week of Big Ten football will be well-covered with eight of the 11 contests scheduled to be televised, including all six home outings. The 2005 campaign will feature the most televised contests in conference history for an 11-game season, with 68 of 70 home football games appearing on television. That total includes all 44 intraconference and 24 interconference games televised by either ABC Sports, ESPN, ESPN2, ESPN Plus, ESPNU, ESPN Classic or ESPN360. Six interconference road games will also be televised bringing to 74 the number of Big Ten football games that will appear on television. The league website (www.bigten.org) features up-to-date television information, including clearances for ABC Sports and ESPN Plus regional and local games.

Instant Replay -- Year Two: The Big Ten has entered the second year of its college football instant replay program in 2005. All 44 conference games will utilize this system and visiting teams during non-conference contests have approved the usage of instant replay for all 25 televised home games (no TV

scheduled for San Jose State at Illinois and Nicholls State at Indiana on September 10). In addition, other leagues will also implement their own instant replay system after the NCAA approved the Big Ten's proposal to allow all NCAA conferences and independent institutions to experiment with the use of video replay for the 2005 season.
