

ABOUT BUCKNELL UNIVERSITY



Bucknell University, ranked among the top national liberal arts colleges in the nation, is a privately owned, co-educational institution with an enrollment of approximately 3,550 students and a faculty of some 270 teachers, of which over 97 percent hold doctoral degrees.

The 100th college chartered in the United States, Bucknell was founded by Philadelphia Baptists in 1846 as the University at Lewisburg. The first class of seven men graduated in 1851 with the first woman receiving her degree in 1885. In 1886, the institution was renamed Bucknell University in honor of William Bucknell, a former trustee and benefactor.

A comprehensive university, Bucknell allows students to choose from many academic options, including 52 majors and 72 minors. In learning from and collaborating with experienced faculty, students will have access to state-of-the-art



resources within the library, laboratory, computer center, multi-media room, and recreational facility.

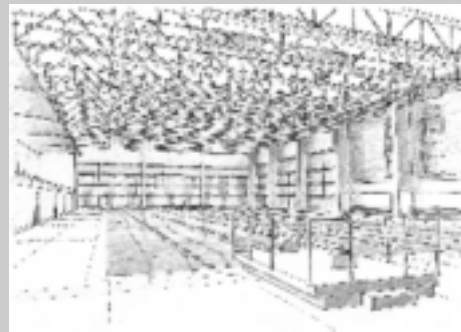
Enrolling at Bucknell allows one to acquire global connections through the International Focus Semester Program, Semester of Studying Abroad Program, and interaction with students and faculty from various countries and continents. Through the University's commitment to diversity, students of all ethnic, racial, geographical, intellectual, and political backgrounds converge on one campus to foster a community of acceptance and exploration in diversity. As a member of the Bucknell and Lewisburg communities, students are able to find their own niche while learning the importance of values.

The University's physical plant, located on a 400-acre campus overlooking the Susquehanna River, includes more than 80 buildings. Recent additions include a \$1 million computer center constructed as a wing of Dana Engineering Building; an \$8.2 million addition to the Ellen Clarke Bertrand Library; the \$9.7 million Weis Performing Arts Center; and the \$10.9 million Robert L. Rooke Chemistry Building and adjoining biology building.

In addition, construction of the Sigfried Weis Music Building was completed in the summer of 2001 in time for its doors to open for the fall semester. The new \$7 million music instruction building is one facet of *The Bucknell Campaign*, the most ambitious in Bucknell's 154-year history.

And finally, a new residence hall facility opened in 2001 and houses 300 students within "neighborhoods" — a contemporary design intended to promote a sense of community.

Bucknell is easily accessible, located on U.S. Route 15 approximately 60 miles north of Harrisburg and 25 miles south of Williamsport. The campus is seven miles south of Interstate 80 on Route 15.



CONSTRUCTION ON RECREATION & ATHLETICS CENTER NEARING COMPLETION

On April 24, 1999, Bucknell University announced a pledge of \$11 million from Kenneth G. and Elaine Langone for the purposes of a new recreation and athletics center.

Kenneth Langone '57, a former trustee for 15 years, stated, "It's been a glorious 46 years for us to be part of this wonderful institution. Elaine and I are particularly blessed. We have lived the American dream, and it's a privilege to share it."

Elaine Langone added, "Bucknell has been an important part of our lives for many years. It is truly a pleasure to do this."

The new recreation and athletics center will include a state-of-the-art, 50-meter-by-25-yard Olympic class pool, a 15,000 square-foot student fitness center with an instructional strength and conditioning area and a 4,000-seat arena with expansion capability of 800 additional seats. Also included in the project are a new athletic Hall of Fame and display of Bucknell's Medal of Honor recipients, training and therapy suite, classrooms and modern offices for coaches and staff. The 60-year-old Davis Gym and Freas-Rooke Pool will be renovated as auxiliary gyms.

The natatorium and fitness center are slated to open in September 2002, with the arena to debut in January 2003, in time for the men's and women's basketball teams' Patriot League schedule.

"Bucknell will at last have a facility that our students and athletics program deserve," said John Hardt, director of athletics and recreation. "The center will greatly enhance the recruiting of top-caliber athletes and students to campus."

Athletic facilities already on campus include Gerhard Fieldhouse with an indoor track, racquetball and squash courts, and indoor volleyball, tennis and basketball courts; the recently-renovated 13,100-seat Christy Mathewson-Memorial Stadium featuring state-of-the-art FieldTurf; the 18-hole Bucknell University Golf Club; 10 outdoor tennis courts; lighted field hockey, lacrosse and soccer fields, and numerous playing fields for other varsity, intramural and recreational sports.

The Patriot League, which was founded on the principles of admitting athletes who are academically representative of their class, is in its second decade of academic and athletic achievement. Participation in athletics at Patriot League institutions is viewed as an important component of a well-rounded education.



The Patriot League began as a successful Division I-AA football conference in 1986. Full League members include American, Army, Bucknell, Colgate, Holy Cross, Lafayette, Lehigh and Navy. Associate members include Fairfield (field hockey), Fordham (football), Georgetown (football), Hobart (men's lacrosse), Towson (football), Ursinus (field hockey) and Villanova (women's lacrosse).

These member institutions are among the oldest and most prestigious in the nation. Alumni from Patriot League colleges and universities have played a leadership role in the shaping of our country.

In the classroom, the League's full-member institutions, individually and collectively, consistently rank among the top Division I programs in the NCAA Graduation Rates Report. In the most recent report on NCAA Graduation Rates, the Patriot League ranked first among all Division I conferences in student-athlete graduation rates and second in overall student graduation rates.

League members have also distinguished themselves on the field of play. Patriot League sponsors championship competition in 22 sports (11 for men; 11 for women). Championship teams from 13 sports are guaranteed advancement into the NCAA Championships or CCA play-in championships: baseball, men's and women's basketball, field hockey, football, men's golf, men's lacrosse, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis and volleyball.

In its first 11 seasons, 122 teams have been selected for post-season play in the NCAA, ECAC or National Invitational tournaments. The League also boasts 55 student-athletes who have qualified for NCAA Championships, the pinnacle of collegiate individual competition. A total of 155 Patriot League student-athletes have earned All-America honors.

During the past three academic years, 53 of the Patriot League's 66 Scholar-Athletes of the Year also received All-League status for their exemplary athletic performance. Additionally, 19 of the Scholar-Athletes honored were named Players of the Year or Performers of the Meet in their respective sport.

Through 2001, 91 Patriot League student-athletes have been recognized as Verizon Academic All-Americans, while nearly 7,000 more have qualified for the League's Academic Honor Roll by accumulating a 3.2 grade-point average and earning a varsity letter. Twenty student-athletes representing seven institutions have received NCAA Postgraduate Scholarships. Additionally, Patriot League student-athletes have earned two Fulbright Scholarships, a Luce Foundation Scholarship, a Marshall Scholarship, two NACDA/Disney Scholarships and three National Football Foundation Scholarships among their many accomplishments.

BUCKNELL CAPTURES NINTH PRESIDENTS' CUP IN TWELVE YEARS!

The Presidents' Cup was created in 1991 to signify overall excellence in the 22 sports sponsored by the Patriot League, and Bucknell has captured the trophy nine out of the 12 years it's been in existence.



Bucknell captured its fifth straight President's Cup trophy in 2001-2002 by compiling 112 points to hold off a late charge from runner-up Army, which finished with 103.5 points. Bucknell also won the women's championship trophy for the fifth consecutive year and eighth year overall. The Bison women earned a league-record 60.5 points with championships in cross country, soccer, basketball and indoor and outdoor track and field, while claiming a second-place finish in swimming and diving.

In the Men's President's Cup running, Army nosed out the Bison by just 1.5 points. The Black Knights, who are the only program to win an overall Presidents' Cup other than Bucknell, won three spring titles to edge past Bucknell with 53.0 points.

Overall, Army finished second behind Bucknell with 103.5 points, Lehigh third with 91.5, American fourth with 87.5, Colgate fifth with 77.5, Lafayette sixth with 71.5, Navy seventh with 63.5 and Holy Cross last with 61.5 points.

On the women's side, Army came in second, followed by American, Lehigh, Lafayette, Colgate, Navy and Holy Cross. For the men's championship, following Army and Bucknell were Lehigh, American, Colgate, Lafayette, Navy and Holy Cross.

LEADERS ON THE FIELD AND IN THE CLASSROOM

Bucknell filled five of the 22 Patriot League Scholar-Athlete spots among league-sponsored sports in 2001-02, second only to American, who placed seven on the list. Bucknell also led the league in the number of members on the 2001-02 Patriot League Honor Roll, which cites student-athletes with a GPA of 3.20 or better during the semester coinciding with his/her sport. BU placed 277 student-athletes on the 2001-02 honor roll. Twenty-six swimming and diving athletes made the honor roll in the spring:

Did You Know?

Bucknell University is third in the nation (to Nebraska and Notre Dame) for total number of national Academic All-American selections. One hundred and four Bison student-athletes have received national Academic All-America recognition since 1970.

BISON EXCEL IN THE WATER AND IN THE CLASSROOM

In the 2001-2002 season, both the Bucknell University men's and women's swimming & diving teams were named Academic All-Americans by the Collegiate Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA). For a team to qualify as a CSCAA Academic All-American, it must have a grade point average of at least 2.80 for the semester. Out of all the women's teams that qualified as Academic All-Americans, the Bison women's team posted the 19th-highest grade point average with a fall semester GPA of 3.26 to garner "superior" Academic All-America status. Bucknell's men's team finished 23rd with a 2.89 GPA for "commendable" distinction. CSCAA Academic All-Americans are broken into three categories: commendable (2.80-2.99), excellent (3.00-3.24) and superior (3.25 and above).

All-Patriot League status is awarded to the winner of each individual event and the next highest point scorers who did not win an individual event. Six members of the Bucknell swimming and diving team represented the Bison on the 36-member (18 men and 18 women) all-league squad.

WEAVER CAPTURES VERIZON ACADEMIC HONORS

Abby Weaver, a senior on last season's Bucknell women's swimming team, was named to the 2002 Verizon District 2 Academic All-America At-Large Second Team, as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

To be eligible for the team, the student-athlete must be at least a sophomore, a starter or key reserve, and maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.2 or higher.

As a captain of the women's swimming and diving team, Weaver swam her way into the record books with a fabulous four-year career at Bucknell. She graduated with one school record and ranked among the University's all-time top-10 in eight other events.

Weaver played a major role in the Bison finishing second at the Patriot League Championship in her junior and senior seasons. The freestyle/IM competitor swam in six events and came away with a pair of medals and one school record at the 2002 championship meet. She was part of Bucknell's 400-medley relay team that set a new school record and earned the silver with a time of 3:54.53. Weaver also swam on the 200-free relay team that won the bronze and recorded the second-fastest time in Bucknell history at 1:37.00. In addition, she placed fourth in the 50-free (24.72), sixth in the 100-free (53.39) and 10th in the 100-fly (1:00.47).

Out of the pool, Weaver was an outstanding student who maintained a 3.85 grade-point average as a mathematics major. She was named as the 2000-01 Patriot League Women's Swimming & Diving Scholar-Athlete of the Year. At the Bucknell Senior Athletic Awards Banquet, Weaver was the female recipient of the Alvin F. Jackson Jr. Memorial Scholar-Athlete award, presented to one male and one female senior athlete for outstanding academic and athletic achievement, and future promise as Bucknell alumni. She was also an active member of Bucknell's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, and as a senior was the winner of her team's Robert A. Latour award, which recognizes a swimmer demonstrating "leadership, sportsmanship and dedication."

Bucknell's men's and women's swimming & diving teams have qualified for the Team Academic All-American award given by the Collegiate Swimming Coaches Association for the last 15 years.



"YOU AIN'T SEEN NOTHING YET"

The Bucknell swimming and diving teams adopted the motto "you ain't seen nothing yet" for the 2001-2002 season. The sentiment behind this was simple — make this year the best possible. Looking back, it is clear that this motto was fitting.

For their first meet of the year, the teams traveled to the United States Military Academy on Oct. 27. A victory on the women's side marked the first time since 1984 that the Bucknell women had defeated Army. Freshman Jamie Flick broke a school record in the 200 breaststroke, a mark she would continually improve throughout the season. Fellow freshman Jackie Feintheil won the 200 fly, the 500 free and the 1,000 free. The Bison men's team, despite a strong performance by junior co-captain Chris Feintheil, was unable to come away with a victory against the 2000-01 Patriot League champion Army team.

The season's home opener was the following weekend against Drexel. With an enthusiastic home crowd behind them, the men's and women's teams swept the visiting Dragons. Women's senior co-captain Abby Weaver, freshman Ashley Aiken and sophomore diver Sarah Petcavage each had two individual victories. On the men's side, senior co-captain Chris Neary and sophomore Michael Harrigan both contributed two first place finishes which helped to secure the 176-123 victory.

On Nov. 10, the Bison teams made the short trip across Rt. 45 to face some of its toughest competition of the season at the Penn State Invitational. In attendance was nationally ranked Penn State, Big East power Villanova and nationally ranked Division II West Chester. Over the course of three sessions, the Bucknell women's team finished fourth, while the men's team finished third, ahead of Villanova. An outstanding individual performance by Flick led to a new school record in the women's 100 breaststroke. Freshman diver Adam Freeman placed

first on the 1-meter and junior Stelios Saffos had an exceptional meet, with third-place finishes in the 100 and 200 breaststroke.

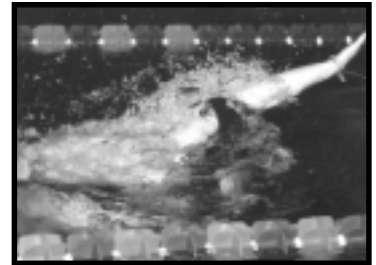
The following weekend, Bucknell competed at the United States Naval Academy. The women competed in a tri-meet with Navy and American University, while the men had a head-to-head battle with American. On the women's side, Petcavage notched victories in the 1-meter and 3-meter diving events. The women had solid outings from junior Darby Golino, Feintheil and Flick against Navy, but the team was unable to pull out a win. The men's team also swam well against American, but they were unable to turn strong individual performances into a team victory. Sophomore standout Pete Garvin won both the 50 and 100 freestyle events, while Harrigan took the 200 butterfly and Freeman won both diving events.

The Bison traveled to the Princeton Invitational following a well-deserved Thanksgiving break to face nationally ranked Princeton, along with Rider and Drexel. The women's 400-yard medley relay team consisting of Golino, Flick, Aiken and Weaver finished first, to help secure the women's second-place team finish behind Princeton. The men's team had many top-notch performances over the course of the double session meet leading to its third-place finish behind Princeton and Drexel. Sophomore Matt Hallowell notched season-best performances in the 200 IM and 200 breaststroke. Petcavage set a new Bucknell record in the 3-meter for 11 dives, breaking the old record held by Kathy Karpuk since 1974.

Prior to the start of the second semester, the Bison traveled to Florida for their annual training trip. For 12 days, the team trained at

the Coral Springs Aquatic Center and competed in the Florida Atlantic Invitational against Nebraska, Pennsylvania, SUNY Binghamton and Florida Atlantic.

A bronzed and fit Bison team returned to campus to begin their second semester and face a string of Patriot League rivals. First up was Lafayette, which both the women and the men defeated by wide margins. The women dominated by winning 14 of 16 events. Flick set a pair of new pool records in the 100 and 200 breaststrokes and sophomore Jen Cancro won the 200 freestyle and contributed in the 500 free and the 400 freestyle relay. The men's squad won 10 of 16 events, including 1-2-3 sweeps of the 1000 freestyle, 100 backstroke, 100 breaststroke, 200 backstroke, 200 breaststroke and 500 freestyle. Sophomore Jack Sheehan took first in the 100 and 200 backstroke and the 200 IM.

Jan. 19 marked the final swimming and diving meet ever to be held in Freas-Rooke Pool. The Bison hosted Colgate and came away with team victories on both sides in front of a large home crowd of alumni, family and friends. Leading the way for the women was Jackie Feintheil, who set a new pool and school record in the 1000 freestyle and won the 200 butterfly. The women's team won an impressive seven individual races, and the 400 medley relay time ranked in the all-time top 10. Petcavage set a new Bucknell record in the 1-meter (6 optional) diving meet. Junior Adam Yerkes placed first in the 200 freestyle and took second in the 200 backstroke. In total, the Bison men won 11 of 13 events, including both relays.

The Bison closed out their regular season action with a trip to Bethlehem, Pa., to face Lehigh. The women's side came out with a team victory behind solid efforts by Golino, Flick, Petcavage and sophomore swimmer Meghan Freese. Despite strong showings by Garvin, Saffos and Harrigan, the men's team was defeated.

Overall, the women's team finished the regular season with a 5-2 dual meet record and the men's team concluded with a 3-3 dual meet record. With the regular season complete, the teams spent the next two and a half weeks preparing for their championship run.

The Patriot League Championships were held at Navy on Feb. 14-16. After three days of fierce competition in 40 events, the women finished second and the men fourth. The women's team scored a total of 632 points, just 31 shy of first-place Navy. The men's team recorded 474 points.

Head coach Jerry Foley was named Women's Swimming Coach of the Year, and six members of the Bucknell Swimming and Diving team were named to the All-Patriot League team. Daniela Faas, Meg Freese, Darby Golino and Jen Cancro received this honor on the women's side, while Stephen Schwanhausser and Jack Sheehan represented the Bison men.

Nine women and four men elected to conclude their 2001-02 season by competing in the ECAC Open Championships at Pitt and Delaware. The women finished eighth out of a field of 37, while the men ranked 15th out of 36 teams. Several school records were broken by the men and the women in both swimming and diving. Adam Freeman's 451.23 points on the 3-meter and 289.45 on the 1-meter set new records. Freeman won the 1-meter competition and was named to the All-ECAC team for his efforts.

All told, the Bucknell men's and women's swimming and diving teams set 17 school records during the 2001-02 season. Forty-nine individual women's performances rank in the all-time top 10, while the men notched 19 top-10 outings. At the conclusion of the year, CollegeSwimming.com released their final mid-major rankings, which saw the Bison women ranked 15th while the men finished 17th.



"WHAT WE'VE BEEN WAITING FOR"

The Bucknell men's and women's swimming and diving teams enter the 2002-03 season with much anticipation. Both squads will compete this year in a new state-of-the-art 50-meter-by-25-yard Olympic class pool, and they have their sights set on winning the Patriot League crown.

The women return all but two members of last year's second-place squad. Leading the Bison women will be senior co-captains Becky Dolan and Darby Golino, who combine for 12 individual and relay top-10 times. Dolan was a member of the Bucknell record-breaking 800 freestyle relay team and she finished 9th at the league championship in the 100 fly. Golino holds the top time in the 100 back and 200 IM while also being part of the 200 and 400 medley relay teams that set new records last season.

Other seniors on the women's side are Lauren Mosler, Stephanie Nickse and Alyson Steckbeck. Mosler's name appears on three Bucknell top-10 lists as an individual (4th in the 200 breast, 2nd in the 100 fly, and 9th in the 200 IM) as well as three different 200-medley relay teams. Nickse holds top-10 times in the 100 back and 200 fly. Steckbeck holds a top-10 spot in the 200 back and as a member of the 200 free relay team.

Representing the junior class are eight swimmers and a pair of divers. Lynne Ashenfelter, Jennifer Cancro, Daniela Faas, Meghan Freese, Andrea Kern, Meredith Miller, Jill Nonemaker and Krisztina Poda represent the swimmers, while Sarah Petcavage and Monica Smith compete on the board.

The swimmers have steadily improved in their three years at Bucknell. They hold among them an impressive 15 top-10 individual times,

and they represent nine different relay top-10s. Of this class, Faas holds the most individual top-10s with five, including the school record in the 1000 and 1650 freestyle events. Cancro holds the top time in the 500 free and four other top-10 times, three of which are the No. 2 spot (200, 1000, and 1650 free). On the diving side, Petcavage and Smith combine for three top performances, including Petcavage's record-setting scores on the 1-meter and 3-meter boards.

The large sophomore class includes Ashley Aiken, Jamie Flick, Jackie Feintheil, Robin Gibson, Lauren Kmec, Tricia Rado, Leslie Rice, Allison Robl, Bernadette Schmidinger, Laurie Seeley and Jessica Hansley. This heavily talented class had a stellar rookie season, earning 12 individual top-10s and 12 team top-10s. Flick holds the school record in the 100 and 200 breast while Feintheil holds five top-10 times.

Newcomers to the women's side are Lectie Altman, Melissa Capparell, Jamie Finkelman, Victoria Fritz, Mary Krakowski, Ainsley Maloney, Amanda Nogie, Lauren Reed, Lisa Rockwell, Vanessa Scaringi and Erica Wild.

The Bison men's squad remains relatively intact, losing only one member of last year's squad to graduation. Seniors Chris Feintheil, Geoff Konopka and Stephen Schwanhausser will serve as tri-captains. Feintheil ranks eighth all-time in the 200 back, while Konopka holds top-10 times in the 100 (6th) and 200 (2nd) breast. Schwanhausser, whose father Roger was a standout swimmer for the Bison and will enter the Bucknell Athletics Hall of Fame this fall, had three top-10s, including school records in both the 100 and 200 breast events.

Other seniors for the Orange and Blue are Gonzalo Diaz, Michael Guskey, Kurt McCoy, Stelios Saffos and Adam Yerkes. Together, they combine for nine individual Bucknell top-10 performances and six team top-10s. Saffos now ranks third all-time in the 100 breast and fifth in the 200 breast, while Guskey was a member of five relay teams to break into the top-10, including a Bucknell record in the 200 medley relay set in 2000.

Juniors Peter Garvin, Matt Hollowell, Michael Harrigan, Adam Puff, Jack Sheehan and Michael Willats are coming off an impressive sophomore season. Among them are nine individual and seven team top-10 marks. Sheehan holds five of those nine standout individual times, including the top spot in the 400 IM.

Swimmers Tom Bitting, John Hoffman, Andrew Steiner and Jake Thieman, along with divers Steven Evans and Adam Freeman represent the sophomore class. Freeman had an impressive rookie season, grabbing the No. 1 spot in Bucknell history in both the 1-meter (6 optionals) and 3-meter (11 dives) categories, while cracking the top 10 in the 1-meter (6 dives) and 3-meter (6 dives) events.
