PRESEASON STORYLINES

◆ Georgetown will be challenged to replace five seniors, including three seniors who accounted for more than 40 percent of the team's minutes played and 45 percent of the team's points.

◆ Three starters returns in forward Jeff Green, center Roy Hibbert and guard Jonathan Wallace.

◆ Green and Hibbert earned second team All-BIG EAST honors last year and are two of only three from either the league's first or second teams last year (22 players) to return this season.

◆ GU welcomes four newcomers to the program: junior Patrick Ewing, Jr., as well as freshmen Vernon Macklin, Jeremiah Rivers and DaJuan Summers.

◆ Head Coach John Thompson III begins his third year at Georgetown. His 42-23 record is the all-time best start to a GU coaching career after two years at the school.

2006-07 PREVIEW

In the last two years, the Georgetown University men's basketball has reached the Quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament and the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAA Tournament.

For many programs this level of success would be seen as "mission accomplished". In a short two years the Hoyas find themselves back among College Basketball's elite with a solid standing among the top 25. Fans, alumnae, boosters, coaches and critics all acknowledge the success the program is enjoying and for some that might be enough.

Third-year Head Coach **John Thompson III**, however, knows that there are an infinite number of "small steps" still to be taken on the path to the goal.

"There is always another step," 2006 BCA Coach of the Year Thompson said, "we need to always be focused on the next small improvement we can make. I'll leave it to others to make large judgments about how far we've come or our place in history. I just want to make sure that we do the next little thing to make the program more successful."

This is not to say that the 2005-06 season, where Georgetown went 23-10, beat the No. 1 team in the country in one of the most exciting college basketball games of the year, advanced to the semifinals of the BIG EAST Conference Tournament and lost to the eventual national champion by four points in the Sweet Sixteen was not fulfilling to Thompson, his staff and his student-athletes. It just means that the focus for the program is always on the steps to improvement.

For the 2006-07 squad, this will mean replacing five graduates: two starters; the first player off the bench, a strong presence in the paint and a practice player as well as an average of 31 points per game. A daunting task for some, however Coach Thompson welcomes back three starters and 10 players overall from last year's team, and introduces a recruiting class of four players who should see significant playing time this season.

FRONTCOURT

The strength of the 2006-07 squad should rest in the frontcourt, where Thompson welcomes back junior forward **Jeff Green** and junior center **Roy Hibbert**, who both earned second team All-BIG EAST Honors.

Green, a do-it-all forward, led the team in scoring (11.9 points per game) and assists (3.27 per game) last year, and was second on the team in rebounding, averaging 6.5 boards per game. He connected on 44.5 percent of his field goals and was also a threat from behind the arc, connecting on 29 three-pointers. Green, who earned first team All-District honors from the National Association of Basketball Coaches, led the Hoyas in scoring eight times and in rebounding on 11 occasions.

Hibbert, meanwhile, began to show signs that he can be one of the toughest big men in the country. He was second on the team in scoring with 11.6 points per game and led the team in rebounding, grabbing 6.9 per game, which ranked among the top-20 in the BIG EAST. Hibbert, who recorded seven double-doubles on the season, was a force in the NCAA Tournament, averaging 15.7 points and 10.0 rebounds while connecting on 62.5 percent (20-of-32) of his field goals.

The remaining starting spot could be taken by sophomores **Marc Egerson** or **Octavius Spann**, or junior transfer **Patrick Ewing, Jr.** Egerson, a 6-9, 225-pound forward, saw action in 21 games last season, averaging 1.6 points and 1.7 rebounds per game. Spann, meanwhile, saw action in six games, averaging 1.8 points and 1.5 rebounds. Ewing, Jr., the son of NBA great and Georgetown legend Patrick Ewing, sat out last season after transferring from Indiana. In two years at Indiana, the 6-8 forward averaged 3.7 points and 3.4 rebounds in 57 games.

They will be pushed by a pair of freshmen, **Vernon Macklin** and **DaJuan Summers**. Macklin, a 6-9, 191-pound forward out of Hargrave Military Academy, averaged 22.4 points and 12.2 rebounds last year, earning McDonald's All-American honors in the process. Macklin also earned All-American honors from Parade Magazine and was a member of the United States Under-19 national team. Summers, a 6-8, 225-pound forward from Baltimore, was a two-time County Player of the Year at McDonough High School. He averaged 20.0 points, 9.0 rebounds, 2.7 assists and 2.5 blocks per game, leading McDonough to a 17-12 record last year. Rated among the top-10 small forwards in the country, Summers finished his high school career with 1,502 points.



2006-07 PREVIEW

BACKCOURT

Junior **Jonathan Wallace** will return and play at a guard spot for Georgetown for the third-straight year.

Wallace, a 6-1, 188-pound guard, has started all 65 games since coming to the Hilltop. Last year, he was sixth on the team in scoring (7.9 points per game) and second in assists (3.21 per game). A smart and steady player, Wallace ranked among the best in the BIG EAST in assist/turnover ration, handing out 106 assists while committing only 47 turnovers.

The remaining backcourt will include **Tyler Crawford**, **Jessie Sapp** and **Josh Thornton**. All three saw limited playing time behind Wallace and graduate **Ashanti Cook**, but all three understand Coach Thompson "small steps" plan and will look to demonstrate that they are doing the little things to improve their games. Sapp played in 30 contests last season and set a career high with 7 rebounds vs Marquette in the BIG EAST Tournament. Crawford saw action in 21 contests last season while Thornton played in 4.

Returning backcourt players will be challenged by newcomer **Jeremiah Rivers**. Rivers, the son of Boston Celtics Head Coach Doc Rivers, was a first team All-Metro selection by the *Orlando Sentinel* last year, averaging 13.6 points, 5.7 rebounds and 5.2 assists per game at Winter Park High School.

"Tournament bids and honors are great, but we can't allow ourselves the luxury of being complacent" said Coach Thompson. "We always have to focus on the next small step- the next thing we need to improve."

JOHN R. THOMPSON III ■ HEAD COACH
THIRD SEASON AS HEAD COACH □ PRINCETON '88 □ 110-65 OVERALL



On April 20, 2004, Georgetown University President John J. DeGioia named John Thompson III the 17th head coach of the university's men's basketball program.

The program Thompson took over was in need of work as the glory days of his Hall of Fame father's "Hoya Paranoia" teams had long passed. Undaunted by the 13-15 record of the preceding year, (the Hoyas' first losing season since 1973), John III immediately set out to adapt, adopt and improve.

"We need to take small steps, to move ahead by gradual increments in order to achieve our goal," Thompson said. "We can always improve, no matter how much we accomplish, so that is the method we pursue – to always find and take the next small step."

The 2004-05 season demonstrated the wisdom of Thompson's approach. After beating Penn State at home and Clemson in Hawaii, the Hoyas opened BIG EAST play at nationally ranked Pittsburgh. An inspired team got their new coach the road win, making him one of only three coaches in BIG EAST history to defeat a nationally ranked team in the conference opener. The Hoyas went on to ruin Villanova's 25th anniversary celebration of their National Championship as they beat the Wildcats by the same score by which the 'Cats won in 1985 (66-64).

Individually, conference honors included Co-Rookie of the Year (Jeff Green), Third Team All-BIG EAST (Brandon Bowman) and Honorable Mention All BIG EAST (Jeff Green) and Thompson was a finalist for the Naismith Coach of the Year award. As a team, the Hoyas compiled a record of 19-13, were invited to postseason play and advanced to the NIT Quarterfinals.

Last season the "small steps" approach paid even larger dividends. The Hoyas opened the 2005-06 campaign winning three of four games on the road, including a victory at Oregon which broke the Ducks' 35-game home win streak over non-conference opponents. The Hoyas also won the Sun Bowl Tournament, defeating Colgate and UTEP on the road. One of the high points of the season came when Georgetown upset the No. 1-ranked Duke Blue Devils, 87-84, at the Verizon Center. The win was the Hoyas first over a No. 1 ranked team since 1985. The team then continued its winning ways to build a seven-game win streak which included victories against USF, Duke, Notre Dame (2OT), Cincinnati, DePaul, Pittsburgh (ranked No. 9) and St. John's.

Finishing the regular season 19-8, 10-6 in BIG EAST play, the Hoyas went on to defeat Notre Dame and Marquette before falling by a single point to eventual champion Syracuse in the BIG EAST Tournament Semifinals. Receiving their first NCAA Tournament bid since 2001, the Hoyas advanced to the Sweet 16, beating the University of Northern Iowa and Ohio State before falling to eventual champion Florida. The 2005-06 Hoyas compiled an overall record of 23-10, going 11-2 at home, 7-6 away and 5-2 at neutral sites. Following the season, Coach Thompson was named Coach of the Year by the Black Coaches Association.

Prior to coaching at Georgetown, Thompson guided Princeton to three Ivy League championships, two NCAA tournaments and an NIT appearance over his four years as head coach. He amassed a 68-42 record as Princeton's head coach after serving as an assistant coach at Princeton from 1995-2000. As assistant coach he helped lead the team to a Top 10 national ranking and five consecutive postseason appearances.

Thompson Career Highlights

As a Coach...

- Finalist for the 2005 Naismith Coach of the Year award
- Has a record of 110-65 in his sixth year as a head coach (224-97 overall in 10 seasons of coaching)
- Earned postseason invitations nine of those ten years
- Has won two league championships and reached the postseason four times in his first five years as a head coach
- Guided Princeton into the second round of two of his four NCAA tournament appearances
- Coached three All-Americans, three league Players of the Year, and three league Rookies of the Year
- Won 17 games and defeated No. 16 Pitt en route to an NIT bid in his first year as Georgetown's head coach
- Led Princeton to the 2001 Ivy League title and the NCAA Tournament in his first season as a head coach
- In five seasons as an assistant coach at Princeton, won three Ivy League championships and made five consecutive postseason appearances
- Helped coach Princeton to a Top 10 national ranking in 1997-98 and Top 25 rankings in back-to-back years
- Was part of one of the most memorable wins in NCAA tournament history — Princeton's 43-41 victory over defending champ UCLA in 1996

Princeton not only made the postseason eight of nine years during Thompson's tenure, but he helped recruit and coach three All-Americans, three Ivy League Players of the Year, two Ivy League Rookies of the Year, and 12 first team All-Ivy League players.

Thompson also played basketball as an undergraduate for Princeton while majoring in politics. As a forward, he ranks third on Princeton's all-time assist leader list with 358. A extremely focus player, he had 103 assists and just 34 turnovers as a senior. He was co-captain of the 1988 team and shared the B.F. Bunn trophy that year as one of the Tigers' Most Valuable Players.

Thompson, 39, grew up in Washington, D.C., where he graduated from Gonzaga College High School. As a high school senior he was named first-team All-Metro by *The Washington Post*. He is the son of former Georgetown University head coach and basketball Hall of Famer John Thompson, Jr.

Thompson's wife Monica is also a Princeton grad (Class of '89). They have three children: Morgan, age 7; John Wallace, age 4; and Matthew age 2.

The 2005-2006 season was certainly a memorable one, filled with milestones for the program and second year Head Coach John Thompson III.

The Hoyas opened the program with 4 of their first five games on the road. After beating Navy and James Madison the Hoyas next victory ended Oregon's 35 game home win streak vs non-conference opponents. The Hoyas then visited the Fighting Illini, and although the team fell before 16,000 Assembly Hall fans, they came away with a 21 point performance by Jeff Green while limiting Illinois to a season low 32.3 % shooting from the field. Georgetown ended its pre-conference schedule with a pair of victories in El Paso, Texas where they beat Colgate and UTEP for the Sun Bowl Championship. Road tested and with a record of 8-2 the Hoyas were set for BIG EAST play.

Georgetown defeated both Providence at home and St. John's on the road by double digits to open BIG EAST play. Bowman and Hibbert were standouts in the first win while Darrel Owens stepped up in the second. The Hoyas then dropped a pair of 7 point road losses to the #16 Mountaineers of West Virginia and the #4 ranked Huskies of Connecticut. The Hoyas bounced back to beat USF at home on January 17.

In a break from conference play the Hoyas next opponent was the #1 ranked Duke Blue Devils. The sold-out crowd of 20,035 at the MCI center and the national television audience witnessed Georgetown's first victory over a #1 ranked team since February 27, 1985 as the Hoyas won an 87-84 decision. Five Hoyas scored in double figures as the previously undefeated Blue Devils could not answer Georgetown's versatility. The Hoyas led by 14 at intermission and maintained their lead through all of the second half. ACC Player of the Year JJ Redick's 41 points amounted to exactly two ties and 25 seconds of Duke lead in the first half. The win catapulted the Hoyas into the national rankings.

Notre Dame then fell in double OT, Cincinnati lost by 19, DePaul was beaten by 20 and then the 17th ranked Hoyas hosted the #9 ranked Pittsburgh Panthers. Jeff Green put up a career high 22 points as he led the team to overcome a 7 point halftime deficit and helped establish a 10 point lead with 38 seconds remaining. In the closing seconds a pair of free throws by Darrel Owens gave the Hoyas the win in regulation.

The remainder of the regular season included another victory over St. John's, and home wins over Rutgers and Syracuse. The Hoyas fell to #9 ranked West Virginia, #4 ranked Villanova, and on the road to Marquette and USF. Georgetown was seed 5 in the BIG EAST Tournament and defeated Notre Dame and Marquette before falling to eventual champion Syracuse.

Georgetown returned to NCAA tournament play for the first time since 2001 when they played the University of Northern Iowa at Dayton. Georgetown won a 54-49 decision as Roy Hibbert led all scorers with 17 points and all rebounders with 9 boards. The win set up a match with Ohio State whose campus was only an hour away from the Dayton venue. Despite a loud partisan crowd the Hoyas won by 18, 70-52. Four Hoyas scored in double figures, led by Roy Hibbert's 20 point 14 rebound double-double as the Hoyas outrebounded the Buckeyes 37-24 and outshot them 46.6% to 40.4%. The victory advanced the Hoyas to the Minneapolis regional.

The Hoyas ended the season with a 4 point loss to the eventual National Champion Florida Gators. Again Georgetown had 4 players in double figures and more than twice as many assists as their opponents but a surge in the final 28 seconds gave the Gators the victory.

Georgetown finished the season 23-10, ranked 16th in the country, having defeated an unbeaten Duke team and made the NCAA Sweet 16. Coach John Thompson III was named the Black Coaches Association's Coach of the Year.



Georgetown Defeat Navy 72-49 in Road Opener

Hibbert Leads Hoyas Past JMU, 73-66

Georgetown sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** scored a career-high 20 points to lead four players in double figures as the Hoyas cruised to a 72-49 win over Navy in front of 4,104 fans at Alumni Hall in the season opener for both schools on Friday night.

Hibbert connected on 8-of-11 shots from the field - career highs for shots made and attempted - and grabbed a team-high seven rebounds to lead the Hoyas. Sophomore forward **Jeff Green** scored 13 points and had seven rebounds; senior guard **Ashanti Cook** added 12 points and senior guard **Darrel Owens** chipped in with 10 points and four rebounds off the bench.

Georgetown led by 17 points at the half (35-18), but the Midshipmen narrowed the gap to 12 points, 36-24, on a pair of free throws from Greg Sprink with 17:28 left to play. The Hoyas, however, outscored Navy 18-6 over the next 5:07 and opened a 24-point lead at 54-30 on a layup by Cook with 12:21 left to play. Back-to-back layups from Hibbert and Cook started the run and six different players scored during the spurt.

Georgetown's biggest lead - 28 points - was matched twice, on a free throw from Cook with 8:10 remaining (63-35) and on a Green jumper (65-37) with 7:16 left to play.

The Hoyas had taken a 17-point halftime lead, 35-18, connecting on 48.3 percent of their field goals in the first half (14-of-29). Hibbert paced the way, hitting 5-of-7 shots from the field, for 12 points. Georgetown scored the first seven points of the game - a dunk from Hibbert followed by a natural three-point play and a jumper from senior forward **Brandon Bowman** - and limited the Midshipmen to only four points over the first 10 minutes of the game, opening up a 16-4 lead.

The win was the fifth in the last six season openers for the Hoyas, who improved to 82-16 all-time in last season-opening games. Second-year Head Coach John Thompson III is now 3-3 all-time in season openers.

Georgetown sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** topped his career-high in points for the second-straight game, scoring 23 points to lead the Hoyas to a 73-66 win over James Madison in front of 5,566 at the Convocation Center in Harrisonburg, Virginia on November 21..

Hibbert, who was named the BIG EAST Conference Player of the Week earlier in the day as a result of his 20-point performance in the team's season opener at Navy last week, connected on 7-of-8 of his shots from the field, and a career-best 9-of-9 shots from the free throw line to post a game-high 23 in only 17 minutes, leading the Hoyas (2-0) to their second-straight win.

Georgetown led by 10 points (42-32) at halftime, but James Madison cut into it and narrowed the gap to two points. The Hoyas had a tremendous performance in the second half from senior **Darrel Owens**, who scored all 10 of his points in the latter stanza, when the Hoyas increased the lead to 11 at one point.

In the second half, Owens took a pass to where he was at the top of the key and drained a three-pointer as the shot clock wound down, increasing the Hoyas' lead to eight points, 54-46. Later, after the Dukes had again pulled back within six points, Owens drained a three from the left of the circle, increasing the margin to 64-55 and giving the Blue & Gray some breathing room.

The Hoyas had jumped out to a quick lead paced by a dominant performance from Hibbert, who scored the team's first 15 points and the visitors led by eight points, 15-7. The Dukes, in their first game of the season and with a partisan crowd behind them, went on a mini 5-0 run late in the first frame and cut a nine-point Georgetown lead (32-23) to six points (34-28) toward the end of the first half.

Vanderbilt's Tops Georgetown, 68-61

Vanderbilt connected on nearly 60 percent of its field goals in the second half and fought back from a seven-point halftime deficit to beat Georgetown, 68-61, in front of 7,526 fans in a non-league game on Saturday at the MCI Center.

The Commodores trailed by seven points at the break, 36-29, and tied the game at 39-all early in the second stanza before going on a 23-12 run over a span of 11:24. A layup from center Ted Skuchas with 3:42 increased the Commodores' lead to 64-54. The Hoyas would pull to within six points on a fast-break layup from senior guard Darrel Owens, but could not get any closer.

Paced by a strong first half, led by sophomore Jeff Green and senior Brandon Bowman, the Hoyas raced out to an early lead, connecting on 57.7 percent of their first half shots (15-of-26). Vanderbilt scored the first 10 points of the second half, tying the game at 39-all on a free throw from Shan Foster with 15:35 to play. The team's traded baskets, with a Foster dunk giving the visitors a 41-39 lead and a three-pointer from freshman Marc Egerson giving it back to Georgetown, 42-41. That would be the last Hoya lead as Vanderbilt got points from five different players during the decisive run.

Georgetown jumped out to an early lead in the game, with back-to-back three-pointers from Green and sophomore Jonathan Wallace giving the hosts a 6-0 lead. Hot shooting and intense defense – the Hoyas forced eight turnovers and blocked three shots – saw the lead grow to as many as 13 points during the first frame. The Commodores managed to cut the lead to two points, 15-13, but an 18-7 spurt – capped by a Green fast-break dunk – pushed the lead up to 33-20 with 4:18 to play.

Green led four scorers in doubles figures for the Hoyas, tallying 14 points and nine rebounds, while Wallace added 11 points, Bowman chipped in 12 points and nine boards and Owens added 10 points and five assists.

Senior guard Ashanti Cook scored a career-high 25 points and Georgetown used a staunch defensive effort in one of the toughest arenas to play in the country, leading the Hoyas to an impressive 71-57 win over Oregon in front of 9,087 at McArthur Court in Eugene, Oregon. The Hoyas' win ended an Oregon 35-game win streak over non-conference opponents, dating back to 1999.

Georgetown led by five points, 28-23, at halftime and took command in the first two minutes of the second half, scoring seven straight points to open a 35-23 lead. Senior Darrel Owen hit a three-pointer, sophomore center Roy Hibbert followed with a layup and Cook hit a pair of free throws, increasing the margin to 12 points. Back-to-back baskets from Maik Hairston (three-pointer) and Aaron Brooks (layup), but Georgetown responded with consecutive layups from Hibbert and senior forward Brandon Bowman before a jumper from Cook with 15:06 left in the game gave the Hoyas their biggest lead, 41-28.

Oregon would get no closer than nine points the rest of the way, as the Hoyas held the Ducks to only 57 points, 34 points lower than their season average. The Ducks had broken out to an early eight-point lead in the first half, 12-4, as Bryce Taylor scored seven points during an 8-0 run capped by a three-pointer with 13:06 to play. In what would be a sign for the remainder of the game, however, the Hoya defense clamped down. Georgetown scored nine-straight points - seven of them from Cook - over the next 5:35 and took the lead back, 13-12, on a jumper from the senior guard with 7:31 to play.

The Hoyas would maintain that lead over the final seven minutes of the half. The host Ducks pulled to within two points, 25-23, and forced a turnover with just under four seconds left and had a chance to tie the game going into intermission. Green had other chances, stealing the inbound pass at mid-court and racing in for a basket and an eventual three-point play that gave the visitors at 28-23 lead at the half. Georgetown outscored the Ducks 24-11 in the last 13 minutes of the first half.

Cook's scored his career-high 25 points by setting a personal best in field goals made (8) and tying his career mark for three-pointers in a game (4). He led three players in double figures, as Hibbert added 16 points and a game-high 10 rebounds and Bowman chipped in 13 points.

Green's 21 Points Lead Hoyas in 58-48 Loss

Illinois scored the first 10 points of the game and withstood a late challenge from Georgetown as the 10th-ranked Fighting Illini posted a 58-48 win over the Hoyas in front of 16,000 at Assembly Hall on December 8. The loss drops the Hoyas to 3-2 overall, while Illinois improves to 9-0 with the win.

Illinois led by 15 points at the half, but the Hoyas scored the first four points of the half and pulled to within 11 points, 31-20, after a three-pointer from sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** with 17:40 left to play. Three-straight baskets from sophomore forward **Jeff Green** pulled the Hoyas to within nine points, 33-24, with 14:27 left in the game.

The Hoyas again pulled to within nine points on a dunk from senior guard **Darrel Owens**, 42-33, but a three-pointer from Illinois freshman guard **Jamar Smith** increased the margin to 12 points.

Georgetown pulled to within eight points, 52-44, on a three-pointer from senior guard **Ashanti Cook** with 1:10 to play, but could not get any closer as the Illini, who were shooting under 60 percent from the free throw line entering the game, hit their final eight free throws for the 10-point win. The Hoyas outscored the Fighting Illini 35-30 in the second half and connected on 50.0 percent of their shots (14-of-28) in the second stanza.

The Fighting Illini scored the first 10 points of the game – including back-to-back three-pointers from Rich McBride – and took a 10-0 lead on a basket from James Augustine with 15:14 left to play. After missing their first six shots of the game, the Hoyas got on the board with a layup from sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** with 14:39 left in the first half.

The Hoyas cut the lead to five points, 12-7, on a jumper from Cook, but Illinois used a 13-2 run over a 6:58 span, taking a 25-9 lead on a Brown three-pointer. Illinois' biggest lead was 17 points (28-11) and the hosts took a 28-13 advantage at the half.

Georgetown limited the Fighting Illini to a season-low 32.3 percent shooting from the field (20-of-62), including a 9-of-25 performance in the second half. The Hoyas shot 38.0 percent from the field (19-of-50), while Illinois held a 44-31 advantage on the boards.

Bowman Scores 16, GU Cruises Past Fairfield

Senior forward Brandon Bowman scored a season-high 16 points and Georgetown connected on a season-high 12 three-pointers, leading the Hoyas to a 76-51 non-conference win in front of 6,518 fans at the MCI Center on December 11.

The Hoyas scored eight of the game's first 10 points and then used a 10-0 spurt over a 2:18 span midway through the first half to take a 29-10 lead. The run started with a Bowman three-pointer, giving GU a 22-10 lead at 8:33, and was finished on a trey by senior guard Darrel Owens with 6:15 left to play. A three-pointer from senior guard Ashanti Cook with 10 seconds left in the half gave the Hoyas a 39-20 advantage going in to the second half.

Georgetown connected on 53.6 percent of its first half field goals (15-of-28), including 40.0 percent from outside the arc. They hit six three-pointers, tying the team's season high for treys by halftime.

The Hoyas outscored the Stags 17-6 over the first 6:27 of the second half, with five different players scoring, and took a 55-26 lead on an Owens layup. The lead grew to as many as 30 points – 65-35 – on a pair of free throws from freshman forward Octavius "Tay" Spann.

All 15 players on the Hoya roster appeared during the game and 13 different players scored.

The 25-point margin of victory is the biggest margin of victory this season and the highest for a Georgetown team since beating The Citadel, 69-34 (35 points), on November 26, 2004. The team's 20 assists were a season-high and the most since the team had 21 last season against Howard on December 30, 2004. Georgetown also finished the game with a season-high 12 three-pointers, the most for the team since hitting 14 in the NIT last year against South Carolina.

Hibbert's Double-Double Leads GU Past Stetson

Sophomore forward Roy Hibbert scored a game-high 17 points, Georgetown opened up a 25-point lead at the half and the Hoya men's basketball team cruised to a 70-50 win over Stetson in front of 2,146 fans at McDonough Arena on Dec. 17.

The Hoyas scored the first 15 points of the game, led by the sophomore tandem of Hibbert and guard Jonathan Wallace, who combined for all of the team's points. Wallace swished a three to start the game, and Hibbert followed with back-to-back layups to make it seven-straight points. Wallace then hit a pair of free throws and his second trey before a Hibbert layup with 15:22 left in the first half gave the Hoyas a 15-0 lead.

The Hatters scored their first points of the game at the 15:03 mark, when Will Holloman hit a jumper and free throw for a three-point play. The Hoyas, however, outscored Stetson 15-7 over the next 5:07, taking a 30-10 lead on a layup by senior forward Amadou Kilkenny-Diaw.

Georgetown connected on 55.6 percent of its first half field goals and 92.3 percent of its free throws (12-of-13), during which Hibbert extended his streak to 25-straight free throws.

The Hoyas continued to control the tempo of the game as the second half started, outscoring the Hatters, 17-10, over the first 9:02, taking the biggest lead of the game, 62-30 (32 points) on a three-pointer from freshman Marc Egerson. The Hatters would chip into the lead late in the game, cutting the Georgetown lead to 16 points, 64-48, on a basket by Chief Kickingstallionsims with 3:16 to play.

Hibbert finished with 17 points and a game-high 10 rebounds, his second double-double of the season and the fourth of his career, connecting on 5-of-9 shots from the field and 7-of-9 shots from the free throw line. Hibbert's streak of 25-straight free throws ended in the second half.

Four in Doubles as Hoyas Beat Savannah State

Sophomore center Roy Hibbert recorded his second-straight double-double, scoring 16 points and grabbing 11 rebounds to lead four players in double figures as Georgetown won its third-straight game, beating Savannah State, 78-49, in front of 4,875 fans at the MCI Center on December 21.

Georgetown scored the first five points of the game on a three-pointer from sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace and a layup from Hibbert, but the Tigers clawed back and were down by only three points, 12-9, after a basket from Javon Randolph with 12:42 to play in the half. A layup from Christopher Linton with 8:37 to play made it a seven-point game, 21-14, but Georgetown outscored 18-6 over the remainder of the period, taking a 41-22 lead at the break.

Hibbert was too much for the Tigers in the first half, however. The 7-2, 283-pound sophomore scored 15 of his points in the first 20 minutes, connecting on 4-of-7 shots from the field and 7-of-10 from the free throw line as the Hoyas jumped out to the early lead. It was his second-straight double-double, third this season and the fifth of his career.

Leading by 19 points at the half, the Hoyas pushed the lead into the 20s early in the second half and maintained that for the majority of the game. A fast-break dunk from senior guard Darrel Owens gave the Hoyas a 56-28 lead with 12:44 to play. Less than a minute later, Owens canned a three to make it a 59-30 game with 12:14 left in the game.

In the final quarter of the game, the lead grew into the 30s, first on a Wallace jumper with 10:39 left to play, giving the Hoyas a 61-30 lead. Georgetown took its biggest lead, 65-30 (35 points), on a pair of free throws from freshman forward Octavius (Tay) Spann. The Hoyas took advantage of a big height difference, out-scoring the under-sized Tigers 44-18, and took advantage of 18 Savannah State turnovers, scoring 31 points off turnovers.

Hibbert Scores 18, GU Tops Colgate, 61-45

Sophomore center Roy Hibbert scored a game-high 18 points and Georgetown outscored Colgate 23-8 over the final 11:03 en route to a 61-45 win over the Raiders in first round action of the Sun Bowl Tournament in El Paso, Texas on December 27.

After leading by two points at halftime, 25-23, sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace hit back-to-back three-pointers to start the second half, extending the Hoya lead to eight points, 31-23, with 17:36 left to play. Twice in the next minutes, however, Colgate pulled to within one point. A layup from Peter Minchella at 12:26 made it a 36-35 Georgetown lead, and a basket from Kyle Roemer pulled the Raiders to within 38-37 with 11:03 remaining in the game.

That was as close as Colgate would get. Georgetown scored the next 12 points over a 3:51 span, taking a 50-37 lead after a layup from senior Brandon Bowman. Bowman started the run with a three-pointer with 10:48 to play and 35 seconds later, Wallace found sophomore guard Tyler Crawford alone on the wing for another three. Hibbert added a jumper and two free throws during the run. Georgetown's biggest lead, 61-43, came on a Hibbert dunk with 2:07 to play in the game.

The Hoyas had jumped out to an early 6-0 lead, with Hibbert hitting two shots and Bowman adding another in the first three minutes of the game. The lead grew to 10 points, 16-6, on a three-pointer from senior guard Ashanti Cook with 11:28 to play in the first half before Colgate used a trio of three-pointers, the last from Jon Foss, to pull within three-points, 18-15, with 9:17 to play in the opening frame. Another Colgate three, this one from Dan Gentile, tied the game at 21-all, but a Hibbert basket with 21 seconds left in the half gave the Hoyas a 25-23 lead at the break.

Hibbert connected on all of his shots - 8-of-8 from the field and 2-of-2 from the free throw line - to score a game-high 18 points to go with five rebounds and three blocked shots. Bowman finished with 10 points, five rebounds and three assists in a balanced Georgetown lineup. Wallace scored nine points - hitting all three of his three-point attempts - handed out five assists and had three rebounds; Cook added eight points and three rebounds; senior Darrel Owens added six points and four assists; sophomore forward Jeff Green added five points and five assists; and Crawford finished with five points.

Owens Keys GU Win in Sun Bowl Championship

Senior Darrel Owens scored a season-high 21 points and Georgetown tied a season-high with 12 three-pointers en route to a 76-64 win over the University of Texas-El Paso, capturing the Sun Bowl Tournament Championship on December 28 at the Don Haskins Center in Texas. Owens, who was named the Tournament's Most Valuable Player, was joined on the All-Tournament team by senior Brandon Bowman.

Georgetown has opened a four-point lead midway through the first half, but the Miners, playing in front of a home crowd of 11,010 fans, pulled to within a point on two occasions, the last when John Tofi hit a layup with 6:30 left in the first half to make it a 20-19 game. Like Tuesday night's win over Colgate, however, the Hoyas scored 12-straight points, this time taking a 32-19 lead.

The Hoyas used the long distance shot to open the lead, with a trey from sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace starting the run. Owens, who has been a spark off the bench for Georgetown, took care of the rest. He hit three-straight three-pointers and Georgetown outscored UTEP 12-0 over a 4:35 span.

Georgetown led by 13 points, 36-23, at halftime after Bowman hit a jumper with three seconds left in the half.

In the second half, Tofi's layup with 16:57 to play pulled UTEP to within eight points, 38-30, but Owens responded again, hitting the fourth of his five three-pointers, to give Georgetown a 41-30 lead with 16:36 left to play. Another three - this one from senior Ashanti Cook - and a basket from senior Amadou Kilkenny-Diaw gave the Hoyas a 46-30 lead with 14:27 left to play.

The Miners would again pull to within eight points, 56-48, on a basket from Edgar Moreno, but the Hoyas scored six-straight points - two apiece from Bowman, Owens and Cook - and the lead grew to 14 points, 62-48, with 3:39 to play. Georgetown connected on 12-of-17 free throws in the final three minutes to seal the win.

Owens missed only one of his 11 shots on the night - connecting on 6-of-6 from the field, 5-of-5 from three-point land and 4-of-5 from the free throw line - for a game-high 21 points to go with three assists and two steals. He led five players in double figures as Bowman added 15 points, nine rebounds and six assists and Wallace added 13 points, four rebounds and four assists.

Bowman, Hibbert Lead GU Past PC, 72-62

Senior forward Brandon Bowman and sophomore center Roy Hibbert each recorded double-doubles, and Georgetown hit 19 second half free throws en route to a 72-62 win over Providence in front of 6,985 fans in the BIG EAST Conference opener for both teams at the MCI Center on January 5.

Trailing by six points at the half, 30-24, the Hoyas scored the first 12 points on the second half – including nine-straight from senior guard Ashanti Cook – to take a 36-30 lead they would not relinquish. Sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace started the second half with a three-pointer, and Cook followed with a fast-break layup at 18:19, a three-pointer at 16:40, another fast-break layup at 16:20 and then a layup with 14:36 as the Hoyas took command.

The lead grew to as many as 10 points, 44-34, on a free throw from Hibbert with 11:53 to play in the game. A three-pointer from Providence senior guard Donnie McGrath (17 points) pulled the Friars to within four points, 47-43, with 8:50 to play, but the Hoyas took advantage of the charity stripe in the final nine minutes. Providence committed 14 second half fouls and Georgetown converted on 17-of-19 shots in the final 8:50 en route to the win. The Hoyas biggest lead of the game, 72-59, came on a fast-break dunk from Bowman with 15 seconds left in the game.

After a neck-and-neck game through the first 10 minutes, the Friar took a nine-point lead with a mini-run. The Hoyas led by one point, 13-12, after Hibbert hit a pair of free throws. Herbert Hill tied the game with one of two free throws, but the Friars out-scored Georgetown 8-0 over a 3:31 span, taking a 21-13 lead on a layup by Sharaud Curry with 7:11 to play in the half.

Georgetown, however, responded with its own 8-0 run – this one over a span of 1:47 – and cut a 23-14 lead to 23-22 on three-straight jumpers, a two-pointer from Bowman and back-to-back three pointers from Wallace and freshman guard Jessie Sapp. The Friars responded with three-straight baskets – a three from McGrath and baskets from Weyinmi Efejuku and Hanke – as the visitors took a 30-24 lead at the break.

Owens Leads Long Distance Attack Past SJU

Georgetown University senior guard Darrel Owens hit a season-high six three-pointers and the Hoyas used a key 16-0 run midway through the second half en route to a 79-65 win over St. John's in front of 5,812 people on Sunday night at Madison Square Garden.

St. John's had fought back from a nine-point halftime deficit (43-34) and trailed by only one point (55-54) before the Hoyas scored 16-straight points over a 7:12 to span, taking a 71-54 lead.

A driving layup by sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace and another one from freshman guard Jessie Sapp increased the Hoya lead to 59-54. Owens proceeded to score 10 of the next 12 points – a pair of layups and back-to-back three-pointers – as Georgetown widened the gap to 17 points. The team's biggest lead – 19 points – was matched on two occasions, first on a layup from sophomore forward Jeff Green with 3:00 to play, and then on a layup from Wallace with 1:53 left in the game.

The first half had been closely contested six lead changes and four ties over the first 17 minutes of play. Trailing 26-24 after a three-pointer from freshman Anthony Mason, Jr., the Hoyas took control of the final four minutes of the first half, connecting on five shots long distance. Senior forward Brandon Bowman started a 19-8 run over the final 3:58 with a three that gave the Hoyas a 27-26 lead. St. John's freshman Ricky Torres responded with a layup to give the Red Storm a 28-27 lead, but Owens hit two-straight treys and Bowman added another as the lead grew to 36-30.

A driving layup from senior forward Amadou Kilkenny-Diaw increased the lead to 38-30 and after a pair of Bowman free throws, freshman forward Marc Egerson canned a three with 3.2 seconds on the clock to give Georgetown a 43-34 lead.

The Red Storm would come out strong in the second half, outscoring Georgetown 10-1 over the first 3:01 to tie the game at 44-all. There were two more ties over the next five minutes and a three-pointer from Owens with 11:58 to play gave Georgetown a 55-52 lead, jump-starting the decisive run that followed.

No. 16 West Virginia Tops Georgetown, 68-61

West Virginia senior center Kevin Pittsnogle scored a game-high 23 points and the 16th-ranked Mountaineers used a decisive run midway through the second half en route to a 68-61 win over Georgetown in front of 12,116 at the WVU Coliseum on January 11.

The Mountaineers broke a 33-all tie with a three-pointer from senior guard J.D. Collins and outscored Georgetown 22-10 over a 9:23 span to take command of the game. West Virginia connected on five shots from long distance during that span, capped by a Young three-pointer that gave the hosts a 55-43 lead with 5:18 to play. The Hoyas fought back and pulled to within six points on two occasions, first on a dunk by sophomore forward Jeff Green with 1:06 to play and then on a jumper from senior forward Brandon Bowman with 45 seconds left in the game. West Virginia, however, hit 11 of 16 free throws in the final 2:37, including six in the last minute, to hang on for the win.

Georgetown had led by two points, 23-21, at halftime, but the Mountaineers, who scored the last nine points of the first half, scored the first four points of the second half on layups from Young to take a 25-23 lead.

The Hoyas had jumped out to a double-digit lead in the first half and withstood a late run from the Mountaineers to hold a 23-21 lead at halftime. Georgetown used a pair of runs during the first 20 minutes – the first a 10-2 spurt and later scored seven-straight points – to forge the early advantage. Trailing 6-5 in the fourth minute of the game, Georgetown used a 10-2 run over 2:58 – with sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace scoring five points and hitting a three – to take a 16-7 lead. A layup from Mike Gansey and a three-pointer from Patrick Beilein cut the lead to 16-12, but scored seven unanswered points over 2:50 – a three from Wallace and baskets from Hibbert and Green – to take their biggest lead, 23-12, with 5:17 to play in the half. The Mountaineers got three baskets from Pittsnogle in the final three-plus minutes and narrowed the gap to two points, 23-21, at the break.

Fourth-ranked Connecticut connected on 60 percent of its field goals, used a 12-4 run midway through the second half to open an 11-point lead and withstood late rallies from Georgetown en route to a 74-67 win over the Hoyas in front of 16,294 fans at the Hartford Civic Center on January 14.

Trailing by nine points at halftime, 33-24, the Hoyas caught fire in the second half. The Huskies maintained the nine-point lead through the first four minutes of the second half, taking a 39-30 advantage on a pair of Rudy Gay free throws. Georgetown scored six-straight points in 52 seconds to cut the lead to three points, 39-33. The lead was still five points, 63-58, when Hoya sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** connected on a three-pointer with 2:49 to play in the game and the Hoyas were able to pull within four points, 67-63, when senior guard **Ashanti Cook** buried a trey from the corner with 1:19 to play. Connecticut, however, hit 10-of-11 free throws in the final three minutes en route to the win.

In the first half, Connecticut scored the first four points of the game, but the Hoyas scored 10 of the next 14 points and held a 10-8 lead after a natural three-point play from Green. Owens Leads GU, Hoyas Top South Florida

Senior guard **Darrel Owens** scored 20 points, including a pair of free throws with 2.6 seconds left, to lift Georgetown to a 50-47 win over South Florida in a BIG EAST Conference men's basketball game in front of 5,071 fans at the MCI Center on January 17.

Leading by one point at halftime, the Hoyas were up 34-33 midway through the second half when they used a 10-5 run over a 6:59 span to take a 44-38 lead on a three-pointer from senior guard **Ashanti Cook** with 5:22 to play. The lead was 46-40 after a pair of Cook free throws with 4:21 to play when the Bulls scored five-straight points – consecutive baskets from Melvin Buckley and James Holmes and a free throw from Holmes – to narrow the gap to 46-45 with 1:40 left in the game.

Senior forward **Brandon Bowman** hit a basket to give the Hoyas a three-point lead, but South Florida's McHugh Mattis followed a miss from Collin Dennis and cut the lead to one point, 48-47 with less than a minute to play. The Hoyas turned the ball over and South Florida had a chance to take the lead, but Solomon Jones missed a jumper from the baseline and Owens corralled the rebound, was fouled and hit both shots to ice the 50-47 win.

After a sluggish start to the first half – the teams were shooting a combined 28 percent from the floor in the first nine minutes of action – the Bulls maintained the early lead. Taking advantage of the poor shooting from the Hoyas, a three-pointer from Melvin Buckley gave South Florida a 7-1 lead. Georgetown began to heat up and took its first lead of the game, 10-9 with 10:56 to play, on a three-pointer from Owens.

The game was tied at 10-all when the Hoyas scored six-straight points over a 1:04 span and surged to a 16-10 lead on a layup from freshman guard **Jessie Sapp**. A three-pointer from Owens, three of his 10 first half points, gave Georgetown a 21-17 lead and it was 23-19 on an Owens layup with 1:47 to play in the half. James Holmes hit a layup and one of two free throws in the final minute, making it 23-23 Georgetown at the break.

Owens finished with 20 points, five rebounds and three steals, while Cook added 12 points and three assists for the Hoyas. Jones finished with 11 points and 12 rebounds to lead the Bulls, while Holmes added 13 points and Melvin Buckley chipped in 12 and five rebounds.

Down Goes Duke as Bowman Leads GU to Win

Georgetown senior **Brandon Bowman** scored 23 points to lead five players in double figures as the Hoyas upset No. 1-ranked Duke in front of a sold out crowd of 20,035 at the MCI Center on Saturday afternoon. It was the first win for a Georgetown team over a team ranked No. 1 in the country since beating St. John's on February 27, 1985.

The Hoyas hit four of six free throws in the final 39 seconds and forced a turnover from Duke freshman guard Greg Paulus with four seconds left to seal the win. Georgetown led by 14 points at halftime and maintained that lead through the first eight minutes of the second half. Duke narrowed the gap to eight points, 66-58, on a layup from J.J. Redick – who scored a game-high 41 points – with 8:58 to play in the game. The Hoyas bumped the lead back up to nine points, 68-59, on a pair of free throws by sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** and the lead was again nine points, 70-61, after senior guard **Ashanti Cook** hit a pair of free throws with 6:15 to play.

Redick hit a three and a jumper, Jamal Boykin had a putback and Shelden Williams added a layup in a 34 second stretch to pull the Blue Devils within two points, 74-42, with 4:05 to play. However, the Hoyas forced two turnovers and got a layup from Wallace and a fast-break dunk from senior guard **Darrel Owens** as the lead grew back to six points, 78-72, with 2:09 to play. Sophomore forward **Jeff Green** hit one of two free throws with 1:44 to play to make it seven points, 79-72.

A dunk by Bowman with 1:15 to play gave the Hoyas an eight-point lead, 82-74, and the lead was at seven points (85-78) after Bowman hit two free throws. Sean Dockery hit a fast break layup and Paulus got a steal and a layup to pull within three points, 85-82, with 22 seconds to play, but Bowman and Wallace hit one of two from the line before forcing the final turnover as Georgetown hung on for the thrilling win.

The Hoyas, behind a sold-out crowd of more than 20,000, had the crowd rocking after hitting the first two baskets of the game, a tip-in from sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** and a layup from Bowman. The game was tied at 8-all when the Hoyas scored eight-straight points over a 2:43 span – seven of them from Bowman – and took an 18-8 lead with 11:52 to play in the first half. Duke went on its own run, outscoring Georgetown 14-4 over a 4:01 span, and tied it on a three from Redick with 7:51 to play before the break. The Hoyas, who hit 66.7 percent of their first half shots (16-of-24), broke a 23-all tie with a Wallace layup and outscored the Blue Devils, 19-5, over the remainder and took a 42-28 lead into the locker room. Owens scored seven and Wallace chipped in four during the run.

Georgetown Outlasts ND in Double OT, 85-82

Sophomore center Roy Hibbert hit a basket with just over a minute left in the second overtime period and No. 21 Georgetown held off a last second attempt to tie the game, posting an 85-82 win over Notre Dame at the Joyce Convocation Center on January 24.

It was the first time the Hoyas had played a double overtime game since losing, 93-92, at Notre Dame on February 1, 2003. The win was the team's first overtime victory on the road since beating Miami, 87-80, during the 2003-04 season. The win was also the 100th career victory for Georgetown Head Coach John Thompson III, who improves to 100-59 all-time, including a 32-17 mark with the Hoyas.

Hibbert hit a jumper with 1:10 to play in the second overtime frame, giving the Hoyas an 85-81 lead. Notre Dame's Rob Kurz hit one of two free throws with 56 seconds left, but sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace missed a jumper with 26 seconds left and Notre Dame had a chance to send the game into a third overtime. Kurz and Irish freshman Kyle McAlarney each missed three-point attempts in the waning moments and freshman forward Marc Egerson grabbed the defensive board, giving Georgetown the thrilling win.

The Hoyas appeared to have sealed the win with 11 seconds remaining in regulation when senior forward Brandon Bowman hit a pair of free throws to give the visitors a 69-65 lead. Notre Dame's Colin Falls, however, hit a three-pointer, was fouled in the process, hit a free throw with 1.8 seconds left and tied the game.

Senior swingman Darrel Owens hit a free throw and Hibbert canned a jumper as Georgetown took a 72-69 lead two minutes into the first overtime period. Senior guard Ashanti Cook hit a layup to make it a 74-71 game, but Chris Quinn responded with a three to tie it. Baskets from Hibbert and Notre Dame's Rick Cornett closed out the scoring and sent the game to a second period tied at 76-all.

The second half started with Georgetown maintaining an eight-point lead (36-28). The lead was at seven points after a layup from Cook, but the Fighting Irish would use a 15-8 run over a 5:44 span to tie the game at 50-all on a jumper from senior guard Chris Quinn. The game was neck-and-neck from that point, with the Hoyas never trailing. A jumper from Quinn cut the Georgetown lead to three points, 59-56, but Bowman hit back-to-back baskets and increased the lead to seven points, 63-56, with 3:14 to play. The Hoyas hit 6-of-8 free throws in the final two minutes, but Falls hit the three and got fouled, sending the game to the first extra session.

Green Leads Hoyas Past Cincinnati, 76-57

Sophomore forward Jeff Green scored 20 points, grabbed seven rebounds and had five assists as the 21st-ranked Hoyas opened up a 16-point halftime lead en route to a 76-57 win over Cincinnati in front of 12,016 fans at the MCI Center on January 28.

It was the fourth-straight win, and the 13th in the last 15 games, for Georgetown, which improves to 14-4 overall and 5-2 in league play. Cincinnati falls to 14-7 overall and 3-4 in the BIG EAST.

Georgetown led by three points (7-4) early in the first half and used a 13-2 run over a 6:08 span to open an 18-6 lead on a three-pointer from senior guard Ashanti Cook at 11:49.

The Bearcats pulled to within nine points, 18-9, on a trey from Chadd Moore, but the Hoyas outscored Cincinnati 10-2 over the next 3:16 - with Green scoring seven points during that span - to take a 28-11 lead on a Green three-pointer with 8:16 to play in the first half. Georgetown's biggest lead of the first half - 36-18 - came on a layup from senior forward Brandon Bowman with one minute left.

Leading by 16 points (36-20) at the break, the Hoyas extended it to 21 points on a three-pointer by Green at the 18:20 mark. The team's biggest lead - 27 points, 62-35 - came on a three-pointer from freshman guard Jessie Sapp with 10:13 to play in the game.

The 19-point margin of victory is the largest for a Georgetown team against a BIG EAST opponent since beating Rutgers by 19 points, 88-69, in the regular season finale in 2001-02.

Big First Half Leads GU Past DePaul, 64-44

Georgetown opened up a double-digit lead in the first four minutes of the game and used a key 9-0 run midway through the second half as the 17th-ranked Hoyas beat DePaul, 64-44, in a BIG EAST Conference men's basketball game at Allstate Arena in Chicago on January 31. Sophomore center Roy Hibbert scored a game-high 17 points and led three players in double figures as the Hoyas held an opponent to less than 50 points for the fifth time this season. It was the fifth-straight win, and the 14th in the last 16 games for Georgetown, ranked No. 17 by the Associated Press and No. 22 in the ESPN/USA Today poll, as they improved to 15-4 overall and 6-2 in BIG EAST play.

The Hoyas led by 18 points, 36-18, at halftime, but DePaul scored six of the first eight points in the second half and pulled to within 12 points, 36-24, on a three-point play from Sammy Mejia. The lead was 13 points, 45-32, after Marcus Heard scored on a layup with 11:33 to play, but Georgetown scored nine-straight points over a 2:36 span, taking a 54-32 lead. Senior swingman Darrel Owens started the run with a three-pointer with 10:55 to play and sophomore forward Jeff Green capped the spurt with a dunk at the 8:57 mark, two of his four points in the spurt. DePaul got no closer than 16 points the rest of the way.

DePaul scored the first basket of the game – a jumper from Cliff Clinkscales – but the Hoyas proceeded to score the next 18 points over a 5:31 span, taking an 18-2 lead. Sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace hit back-to-back three-pointers to put GU on the board and Hibbert scored six of his game-high 17 points during the run.

Georgetown limited DePaul to two field goals over the first 10 minutes of the game, and extended its lead to 19 points, 23-4, on a three-pointer from senior guard Ashanti Cook with 10:55 to play in the frame. The Blue Demons started to warm up in the latter stages of the first half. They cut the Georgetown lead to 13 points, 31-18, on a dunk from Karron Clarke, but senior forward Brandon Bowman sank a three-pointer as time wound down, giving the Hoyas a 36-18 lead at the break.

Hoyas Come Back to Beat Pittsburgh, 61-58

Sophomore forward Jeff Green scored a game-high 22 points and No. 17 Georgetown held off a furious rally from ninth-ranked Pittsburgh to hang on for a 61-58 BIG EAST Conference win on February 5 in front of 13,284 at the MCI Center.

Coupled with Georgetown's win over then-No. 1 Duke on January 21, it gives the team two wins over top-10 ranked teams this season. It is the first time the Hoyas have beaten two top-10 teams in one season since 1995-96, when Georgetown beat Villanova twice, first when the Wildcats were ranked sixth in the regular season finale, and then a week later, when they were ranked ninth in the BIG EAST Tournament.

Georgetown, who trailed by seven points at the half, forced the game's third tie when senior forward Brandon Bowman made a fast-break layup with 11:14 to play in the game. The Hoyas then outscored the Panthers 14-2 over the next 9:27, taking a 59-49 lead on a pair of Bowman free throws with 38 seconds to play. That wasn't the end, however, as Pitt guard Carl Krauser hit a free throw, made a steal and connected on a three-pointer to pull the Panthers to within six points (59-53) with 26 seconds left. Ronald Ramon followed with a three with 16 seconds left to cut the lead to three points (59-56) and LeVance Fields' layup with six seconds left cut the lead to one point. The Hoyas, who missed the front end of free throws twice in the final 25 seconds, got a pair free throws from senior swingman Darrel Owens to increase the lead to 61-58. Ramon missed a three-pointer at the buzzer that would have sent the game to overtime.

Pittsburgh led by seven points (35-28) at the break, but Georgetown chipped away, pulling to within two points twice. A fast break layup from sophomore guard Jonathan Wallace made it 40-38 with 14:23 to play, but Pittsburgh got a jumper from Fields and three-straight free throws from Krauser to open a 45-38 lead. The Hoyas scored seven-straight points – a layup from Green, a three from Wallace and a Bowman layup – to tie the game, setting up the decisive run. The Hoyas, behind a boisterous crowd, jumped out to a quick lead, scoring the first six points of the game, with Hibbert hitting three-straight jumpers. The Panthers climbed back into the game and tied it for the first time at 13-all on a dunk by Sam Young with 12:10 to play in the frame. The lead changed three times before the Hoyas tied the game at 18-all on a jumper from Green with 9:17 left in the half. That's when Pittsburgh scored 15-straight points over a 5:45 span – with seven points from Gray – to take a 33-18 lead with 4:13 to play.

Bowman, Hibbert Lead GU Past SJU, 64-41

Senior forward **Brandon Bowman** scored 16 points and sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** added 14 points and eight rebounds, leading No. 15 Georgetown to a 64-41 win over St. John's in front of 9,739 fans at the MCI Center on February 9.

It was the seventh-straight win for the Hoyas, who improve to 17-4 overall and 8-2 in the BIG EAST. St. John's falls to 10-11 overall and 3-7 in league play. The win gives Georgetown a season series sweep of the Red Storm for the first time since the 1996-97 school year.

Georgetown led by 12 points at halftime (30-18) and outscored St. John's 18-2 over the first 7:41 of the second half, with Hibbert scoring five and Bowman adding four, to take a commanding 48-20 lead with 12:19 to play. The Red Storm got no closer than 26 points and opened up its biggest lead, 32 points (60-38) on a Green free throw with 7:42 to play.

The Hoyas jumped out to a quick lead, scoring the game's first six points, with Bowman hitting a pair of shots and Hibbert adding a pair of free throws. St. John's was held without a basket for the first four minutes, scoring their first basket on a layup by Aaron Spears with 15:54 to play. Georgetown responded by scoring eight-straight points over a 4:21 span, taking a 14-2 lead on a Bowman dunk with 11:33 to play.

Georgetown extended the lead to 16 points, 24-8, on a Bowman jumper with 6:57 left in the half and took its biggest lead of the half on a pair of Cook free throws with 4:32 to play, giving the Hoyas a 28-10 lead. Georgetown led by 12 points, 30-18, at halftime.

Bowman connected on 7-of-9 shots from the field for 16 points, while Hibbert added 14 points and eight boards. Georgetown hit 45.8 percent of its shots (22-of-48), including 33.3 percent from three-point land (6-of-18) and 73.7 percent from the line (14-of-19). The Red Storm shot 32.7 percent from the floor (16-of-49), 40.0 percent from three-point land (4-of-10) and 45.5 from the line (5-of-11).

No. 9 WVU Tops No. 15 Georgetown, 69-56

West Virginia fought back from an eight-point halftime deficit and limited Georgetown to 19 second half points as the ninth-ranked Mountaineers posted a 69-56 win over No. 15 Georgetown in front of 16,263 fans at the MCI Center on Feb. 12.

West Virginia scored the first eight points of the second half and tied the game at 37-all on a layup from Mike Gansey. Like the first half, the teams battled back and forth – there were six lead changes in a five-minute span in the second half – and Georgetown took a 47-46 lead on a three-pointer from sophomore forward **Jeff Green**. The Mountaineers, however, went on an 8-0 run over a 3:15 span, taking a 54-47 lead on a layup from Darris Nichols with 8:01 to play.

The Hoyas pulled to within a basket after Green made a fast-break dunk to cut the lead to 54-51 with 6:09 to play, but could not get any closer. West Virginia scored eight-straight points – six from senior Kevin Pittsnoggle, who scored a game-high 25 points – and opened a 62-51 lead with less than a minute to play. The Mountaineers connected on seven of eight free throws in the waning moments.

The first half saw both teams go on runs, with the Mountaineers taking a seven-point lead (20-13) near the midpoint and the Hoyas turning the tables to take an 11-point lead (33-22) in the waning minutes.

There were three lead changes and two ties in the first five minutes of the game. WVU broke a 7-all tie with a 13-6 run over a 4:32 span, taking a 20-13 lead on a Gansey three-pointer. The Hoyas, however, went on a tear, out-scoring West Virginia 20-2 over an 8:05 span to take a 33-22 lead on a fast-break dunk from senior swingman **Darrel Owens**. Georgetown hit four three-pointers during the span and senior forward **Brandon Bowman** led the way with nine points. The Hoyas led by nine points, 37-29, at halftime.

Green scored 21 points and grabbed 11 rebounds to lead the Hoyas, while Bowman finished with 15 points and 11 rebounds.

Pittsnoggle scored 25 to lead three West Virginia players in double figures. Gansey added 13 points and 10 boards, Johannes Herber had 13 points.

Marquette Tops Georgetown, 57-51

Marquette freshman guard Dominic James assisted on the go-ahead shot and added a basket of his own with less than a minute to play as the host Golden Eagles beat No. 17 Georgetown, 57-51, in a BIG EAST men's basketball game at the Bradley Center on Thursday night.

The Hoyas trailed by nine points with less than eight minutes left to play, but fought back to take their first lead since midway through the first half when senior guard Ashanti Cook (Inglewood, Calif./Westchester) hit a three with 4:00 on the clock.

The Hoyas missed a chance to extend the lead and James, who scored 16 points, assisted on a three-pointer from Joe Chapman, giving Marquette a 51-49 lead with 2:33 to play. Senior Brandon Bowman missed a jumper that would have tied the game and James responded with a basket with 48 seconds left, increasing the Golden Eagles' lead to 53-49. Marquette hit four three throws in the final 20 seconds to seal the win.

After trailing by five points (29-24) at the half, the Hoyas were facing a nine-point deficit, 44-35, when Ousmane Barro hit a layup with 7:57 to play. Barro missed the ensuing free throw, but the Hoyas responded with seven-straight points, keying a 14-4 over a 3:57 span, capped on Cook's three that gave Georgetown the lead. Sophomore center Roy Hibbert started the run with a three-point play and, after a basket by Bowman, came back with back-to-back jumpers. A Bowman layup cut the lead to 48-46 and Cook hit his three from the top of the key, giving the Hoyas the advantage before Chapman's three.

The Hoyas jumped out to an early lead after the opening tip, scoring the game's first six points on baskets from Bowman, Hibbert and Cook. Marquette pulled to within 8-7 on a three-pointer from Novak, but Georgetown used an 18-9 run over an 8:16 span to take a 21-15 lead on a layup by freshman guard Jessie Sapp. The Golden Eagles, however, outscored the Hoyas 14-1 over a seven minute span to take a 29-22 lead just before halftime. A basket from Hibbert in the waning seconds ended an eight-minute drought without a field goal and cut Marquette's lead to 29-24 at the break.

Villanova Hands GU Third-Straight Loss, 75-65

Senior guard Randy Foye scored a game-high 22 points and fourth-ranked Villanova outscored No. 17 Georgetown 16-6 over the final five minutes en route to a 75-65 win over the Hoyas in front of 6,500 fans at the Pavilion on February 16. It was the third-straight loss for Georgetown, as they fall to 17-7 overall and 8-5 in the BIG EAST. Villanova improves to 21-2 overall and 11-1 in league play.

Villanova had opened up a 10-point lead midway through the second half, but Georgetown used a 10-2 run to pull within two points, 59-57, on a layup from sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** with 5:37 to play. Kyle Lowry converted a three-point play with 4:49 left to play and after the teams traded baskets, Allan Ray connected on a three with 3:21 to play that gave Villanova a 67-59 lead.

A three-pointer from senior guard **Ashanti Cook** pulled the Hoyas to within five points, 67-62, but Ray hit one of two free throws and then drained a three to make it 71-62 with 1:55 to play. Hibbert hit a layup to pull within seven points with 1:34 to play, but a layup by Foye, who scored 14 second half points, with just under a minute to play sealed the win for the Wildcats.

Georgetown had trailed by only two points, 30-28, at halftime, and took a 38-37 lead on a three-pointer from sophomore forward **Jeff Green**. The Wildcats went on a 16-5 run over a 5:31 span and took a 53-43 lead on a dunk by Will Sheridan with 10:28 to play. The Hoyas, however, pulled back into it. Trailing 57-47 with 8:07 to play, they went on a 10-2 run over a 2:30 span to pull within two points on Hibbert's layup.

The Hoyas came out strong in the opening minutes of the game, with Cook and Green hitting jumpers and senior **Brandon Bowman** adding a three to take a 7-3 lead. Villanova scored 12-straight points over a 3:34 span – keyed by three-pointers from Ray and Kyle Lowry – and took a 15-7 lead on a Foye dunk. Georgetown quickly got back into it, as Green and sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** each hit three-pointers to make it 15-13. The Wildcats got three's from Foye and Mike Nardi to extend the lead to 21-14, but a long distance shot from Cook and a layup from freshman guard **Jessie Sapp** hit a layup to make it a four-point game with 10:27 left before intermission. A three-point play from Hibbert with under five minutes left and one of two free throws with 10 seconds remaining pulled the Hoyas to within two points, 30-28, at the break, as Georgetown held the Wildcats scoreless for the final 4:57.

Hibbert's Career-Night Leads GU Past RU, 66-50

Sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** scored a career-high 25 points to lead three players in double figures and No. 23 Georgetown connected on more than half of its field goals en route to a 66-50 win over Rutgers in front of 11,236 fans at the MCI Center on February 22.

Hibbert connected on 10-of-13 shots from the field, scoring 13 points in the first half as the Hoyas opened up a 14-point lead (34-20). Georgetown extended its lead to as many as 18 points in the second half, taking a 49-13 lead on a three-pointer from senior guard **Darrel Owens** with 11:41 to play.

Rutgers outscored Georgetown 11-2 run over a 7:04 span and cut the Hoya lead to 11 points, 53-42, on a three-pointer from guard Quincy Douby – who scored a game-high 29 points. The Hoyas, however, extended the lead back to 14 points, 56-42, when Hibbert hit a layup and was fouled for a conventional three-point play.

Georgetown matched its biggest lead of the game with 1:27 to play when sophomore forward **Jeff Green** hit a pair of free throws.

Thanks to the play of Hibbert, who connected on 6-of-8 shots from the field, the Hoyas jumped out to a 34-20 lead at halftime. Georgetown dominated in the paint, out-scoring the Scarlet Knights 22-4, and holding a 23-10 advantage in rebounding at the break.

Rutgers trailed by only two points, 11-9, after Douby hit a jumper with 12:40 to play and were down only three points, 17-14, after a three-pointer from the BIG EAST's leading scorer. The Hoyas scored seven-straight points over a 3:04 span – a dunk by Green, a layup from freshman guard **Jessie Sapp** and a three-pointer from sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** – to take a 24-14 lead.

Hibbert scored 25 points and grabbed eight rebounds, while Owens added 11 points, five assists and four rebounds and Wallace added 10 points, a career-high six rebounds and six assists. Green finished with nine points, six rebounds and five assists.

Sophomore forward **Jeff Green** scored 18 points to lead four players in double figures and No. 23 Georgetown used a pair of second half runs to top Syracuse, 68-53, in front of 18,879 fans on Senior Day at the MCI Center.

Syracuse had trailed by as many as eight points in the second half, but pulled to within four points, 48-44. The Hoyas, however, used its second 10-2 run over a 2:58 span to take a 58-46 lead with 8:09 remaining. Senior **Darrel Owens** scored seven points during the run, capping it with a three-pointer with 8:09 to play. Syracuse would get no closer than nine points and the Hoyas took their biggest lead of the game, 68-53, on a pair of free throws from sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** with 1:51 to play.

Georgetown had led by three points at the break, but a three-pointer from Syracuse freshman guard Eric Devendorf tied the game in the openings seconds of the final stanza. The Hoyas went on a 10-2 run over a 4:09 span – with Wallace scoring five points and Green adding four points – take a 43-35 lead with 15:34 to play.

Syracuse again climbed back and pulled to within three points, 45-42, on a layup from Devendorf. Syracuse trailed by only four points, 48-44, when Matt Gorman made a layup with 11:07 to play, but the Hoyas went on another 10-2 run.

Syracuse jumped out to an early 6-2 lead, with Demetris Nichols hitting a layup and a three-pointer, but the Hoyas fought back to tie the game on a Green layup. The Hoyas led by one point, 16-15, after SU guard Josh Wright hit a fast-break layup, but scored six-straight points over a span of 3:02 to take a 22-15 lead on a pair of Green free throws.

Back-to-back three-pointers Devendorf cut the lead to one point, 22-21, with 4:59 in the half and a pair of free throws from Darryl Watkins tied the game at 27-all with 2:38 to play. Freshman guard **Jessie Sapp** hit a three-pointer and Hibbert converted a layup and a free throw for a three-point play, giving GU a three-point lead at the break.

USF Tops No. 20 Georgetown, 63-56

South Florida senior Solomon Jones scored 23 points and the host Bulls connected on 57 percent of its field goals en route to a 63-56 win over 20th-ranked Georgetown at the SunCoast Dome in Tampa, Florida on March 4.

Georgetown led by one point, 31-30, at the break, but the Bulls scored seven of the first nine points in the second half, taking a 37-33 lead. The Hoyas would bounce back and tied the game at 37-all on a layup from senior forward **Brandon Bowman**.

The second half was close throughout, with six ties and seven lead changes. Georgetown took its last lead, 42-41, when sophomore forward **Jeff Green** hit one of two free throws with 11:43 to play. One of two free throws from Bowman with 7:48 to play tied the game at 44-all, but McHugh Mattis hit a three-pointer to give South Florida a 47-44 lead they would not relinquish.

Two free throws from Green with just under six minutes to play pulled Georgetown within one point, 49-48, but South Florida got two free throws from Jones and a dunk to extend the lead to five points, 53-48.

South Florida came out strong and took a 10-point lead, 21-11, on a three-pointer from Melvin Buckley midway through the stanza. Georgetown, however, responded and outscored the Bulls 20-9 over the final 12 minutes of the half, including a 10-0 spurt in the last three minutes. Senior guard Darrel Owens scored six points during that run.

Bowman and senior guard **Ashanti Cook** scored 11 points apiece to lead the Hoyas, while Green and sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** each scored 10 points.

The Hoyas connected on 50.0 percent of their shots (17-of-34) and 74.1 percent of their free throws (20-of-27). South Florida finished the game shooting 57.5 percent (23-of-40), including 6-of-11 from outside the arc (54.5) percent.

Bowman Leads Georgetown Past ND, 67-63

Senior forward **Brandon Bowman** scored 17 of his game-high 25 points in the second half and fifth-seeded Georgetown advanced to the second round of the BIG EAST Tournament with a 67-63 win over 12th-seeded Notre Dame during first round play of the BIG EAST Tournament at Madison Square Garden on March 8.

The game was tied at 55-all with under five minutes to play when Georgetown sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** hit a three-pointer to give the Hoyas the lead for good. GU led by four points, 64-60, after a layup from senior guard **Ashanti Cook**, but a three-point play from Torin Francis pulled ND to within a point. Bowman, however, put back a missed shot to give the Hoyas a 66-63 lead and sophomore forward **Jeff Green** hit a free throw with less than 10 seconds remaining to seal the win.

The Hoyas trailed by three points at the break (30-27), but scored the first eight points over a span of 4:19 to take a 35-30 lead on a layup from sophomore center **Roy Hibbert**. A pair of free throws from Green started the run, Bowman hit a jumper in the lane and Hibbert hit two shots during the run.

Notre Dame, however, came right back, when junior forward Colin Falls hit a trio of three-pointers to give the Irish a 41-40 lead with 13:44 to play. Georgetown responded with an 8-3 run over a 3:49 span, taking a 48-44 lead on a layup from Bowman. Again relying on the three-pointer – the Irish hit eight in the second half alone – the Irish made another surge. Rob Kurz hit a pair and Russell Carter added one, as well as a pair of free throws to tie the game at 55-all with 4:59 to play.

Notre Dame jumped out to an early lead, taking advantage of the Hoyas, who struggled from the field in the opening minutes of the game. The Fighting Irish scored the first 11 points of the game – six coming on three-point field goals from Falls and Chris Quinn – as Georgetown hit one of its first 15 shots from the field. A three-pointer from Wallace got the Hoyas on the board with 13:37 to play, but Falls responded with another three, giving ND a 14-3 lead.

The Hoyas began to climb back into the game as they attacked the Irish in the post and got hot from the field. Bowman and Green each hit pull-up jumpers and then a pair of three-pointers – one from senior **Darrel Owens** and one from Bowman – pulled the Hoyas to within four points, 22-18. Those baskets came in the midst of a 14-6 run over a 4:54 span that saw the Hoyas turn an 18-10 deficit into a 24-all tie on a three-pointer from Cook with 2:56 to play in the half.

Bowman's Free Throws Lift Georgetown, 62-59

Georgetown senior forward **Brandon Bowman** connected on all seven of his free throw attempts – including four in the final 20 seconds to lead the fifth-seeded Hoyas past fourth-seeded Marquette, 62-59, in a BIG EAST Tournament Quarterfinal game at Madison Square Garden on March 9.

The Hoyas led by eight points, 58-50, with 33 seconds left, but Marquette got baskets from Dominic James and Jerel McNeal, a pair of free throws from Wesley Matthews and forced two Georgetown turnovers to pull within two points, 58-56 with 14 seconds left. Bowman hit a pair of free throws with 10 seconds left to increase the lead to 60-56, but Steve Novak came back and hit one of six three-pointers he made, pulling Marquette to within a point, 60-59, with seven seconds left. Bowman, who finished with 14 points, was fouled and calmly sank both free throws with 5.1 seconds left to give the Hoyas a 62-59 lead.

Georgetown appeared to have the game sewn up with less than four minutes remaining. The Golden Eagles pulled to within a point, 49-48, on a three-pointer from Steve Novak, but the Hoyas scored seven-straight points to take a 55-48 lead on a dunk by Bowman with 50.7 seconds remaining.

The Hoyas took their first lead of the game on the opening possession of the second half, with Cook scoring on a driving layup. Marquette took the lead back after James and McNeal hit consecutive shots, giving the Golden Eagles a 29-26 lead.

Georgetown started to take control after the first five minutes of the second half. Trailing 29-26, senior guard **Darrel Owens** scored on a backdoor layup and that was followed by senior guard **Ashanti Cook** hitting a layup and a three to give GU a 33-29 lead.

A putback from Bowman extended the Hoya lead to five points, 37-32. Both teams were shooting the bonus with 10 minutes left in the game and the teams exchanged free throws over a three-plus minute span. The Hoyas maintained a five-point lead, 45-40, after sophomore guard **Jonathan Wallace** hit a pair of shots from the charity stripe, but Marquette quickly climbed back into the game as Novak hit a pair of three-pointers to pull the Golden Eagles to within a point, 49-48, with 4:40 to play in the game.

Syracuse Tops Georgetown, 58-57

Syracuse came back from a 15-point halftime deficit and senior guard Gerry McNamara hit four three-pointers in the second half, leading the Orange to an upset 58-57 win over Georgetown at Madison Square Garden on March 10.

Georgetown led by four points, 57-53, with less than minute to play, but McNamara hit a three-pointer to cut the margin to one point. After forcing a turnover on the Hoya end of the floor, McNamara fed Eric Devendorf for a driving layup, giving Syracuse a 58-57 lead with 9.1 seconds left. Georgetown had a shot for the win, but turned the ball over and fouled Syracuse twice before the clock ran out.

The Hoyas led 36-21 at the break, but the Orangemen scored the first seven points of the second half, pulling to within eight points, 36-28, on a Darryl Watkins slam. The Hoyas pushed the lead back up to 12 points, 44-32, on a driving layup from senior forward **Brandon Bowman**, but the Orange went on a 17-5 run over a 5:25 span, tying the game at 49-all on a Matt Gorman three with 7:18 to play. McNamara, who played all 20 minutes in the second half, connected on two three-pointers during the run.

Georgetown immediately took the lead back, with sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** converting a three-point play for a 52-49 lead. The teams traded baskets and the Hoyas took a 57-53 lead with 2:15 to play when Hibbert hit one of two free throws. The Hoyas, who hit 10 free throws in the final minute during a 62-59 win over Marquette in the quarterfinals, hit only one of five during a two-minute span and maintained the 57-53 lead when McNamara hit a three with 48 seconds left.

The Hoyas had jumped out a 15-point lead at the half thanks in part to hot shooting from the outside. Georgetown connected on 59.1 percent (13-of-22) of its first half shots, including 53.8 percent (7-of-13) from outside the arc as they took a 36-21 lead. The Hoyas' seven three-pointers were the second-most in a half this season. A three-pointer from sophomore **Jonathan Wallace** and a steal and layup from senior **Ashanti Cook** gave the Hoyas a quick 5-0 lead, the first time they had scored the opening baskets during the tournament. Syracuse pulled to within one, 5-4, but the Hoyas reeled off seven-straight points – a reverse from Wallace, a three from Bowman and a Cook layup – to take a 12-4 lead.

Hoyas over UNI, 54-49, in NCAA First Round

The Georgetown University men's basketball team overcame a fourpoint halftime deficit to defeat No. 10 seed Northern Iowa, 54-49, on March 17 in front of a sellout crowd of 12,945 at the University of Dayton Arena.

Sophomore **Roy Hibbert** dominated in the post, scoring a game-high 17 points on 8-for-10 shooting from the field and nine rebounds. Senior **Ashanti Cook** added 14 points, including the final six points of the game to seal the win over the final 20.5 seconds.

This was the seventh time this season that the Hoyas have held their opponent under 50 points, as Georgetown's second half defense allowed only 19 points and forced the Panthers into 6-for-24 (25%) shooting from the field and 2-for-12 (16.7%) from behind the arc.

Trailing 30-26 at the intermission, Hibbert scored the first four points of the second half to tie the game at 30. The two schools would match points, until a layup by Grant Stout with 14:28 would give Northern Iowa their final lead of the game at 34-32. After a fast break dunk by senior **Brandon Bowman** tied the game, freshman **Jessie Sapp** drilled a three-pointer with 12:43 in the game to give the Hoyas their first lead since 12:35 were remaining in the opening stanza.

Northern Iowa would get within one with 9:16 remaining, but that would be as close as the Panthers would get. Cook began his torrid finish with a trey at 7:43 to end a more than four minute scoreless drought and put the Hoyas ahead 46-42. The streaky scoring continued, but Cook answered with a foul line jumper with just over five minutes left to give Georgetown their biggest lead of the game at 48-42.

John Little brought the Panthers within one possession (48-45) with 2:14 to go, drilling a three and ending a stretch in which UNI was held scoreless for 7:02 and without a field goal for 9:27. Hibbert continued his dominance down low, dropping in a layup on the next Hoya possession to get it back to a two-possession game.

Seven points in the final 21 seconds by Ben Jacobson would not be enough, as Cook drilled four free throws and capped the scoring off with a dunk to seal the Hoya victory.

Hoyas Beat OSU, 70-52; Advance to Sweet 16

Sophomore center **Roy Hibbert** recorded his seventh double-double of the season with 20 points and 14 rebounds, lifting seventh-seeded Georgetown to a 70-52 win over No. 2 seed Ohio State in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The Hoyas, who improve to 23-9 overall, advance to the Sweet Sixteen of the NCAAs for the first time since 2001 and for the 10th time in program history.

Hibbert's 20 points led four players in double figures, as sophomore forward **Jeff Green** added 19 points, eight rebounds and six assists; senior guard **Ashanti Cook** chipped in 17 points, five rebounds and five assists; senior swingman **Darrel Owens** tallied 14 points and two rebounds and three steals.

The Hoyas led by 13 points at the half, 38-25, and Ohio State scored the first four points of the second half to pull within nine points, but each time the Buckeyes cut into the lead, Georgetown responded, quieting the partisan crowd of 12,945, an hour away from Ohio State's campus.

After baskets from Matt Sylvester and Jamar Butler cut Georgetown's lead to 38-29 a minute into the second half, Cook extended the lead back to 12 points after a layup and a three-pointer, increasing the margin to 43-31 with 16.41 to play. The Hoyas maintained an eight to 10-point lead through the next 10 times and led 54-43 on a Hibbert layup with 6:48 to play. Ohio State senior forward Terence Dials scored the next five points for Ohio State - a layup and a three-point play - to pull the Buckeyes within six points, 54-48, with 5:12 to play.

Georgetown, however, sealed the game with a 16-4 run over the final five minutes, with Hibbert scoring four points and Green adding three points during the run. The Hoyas hit five-straight free throws and were 7-of-9 in the final five minutes. The Hoyas took their biggest lead of the game, 70-52, on a dunk from Owens with less than a second left in the game.

The Hoyas jumped out to a 13-point lead at the half thanks to the play of Hibbert and Cook.

The Hoyas had 18 assists on 27 field goals, the 10th time this season with at least 18 helpers. Georgetown committed only eight turnovers, the ninth time this season with less than 10 and the second-lowest mark this season.

Hoya Runs Ends in Minneapolis; Georgetown Edged by Florida in Closing Minutes, 57-53

A three-point play by Corey Brewer with 27.5 seconds remaining in the game led the Florida Gators to a 57-53 win over the Georgetown men's basketball team in the NCAA Tournament regional semifinals on Friday night in front of 22,293 fans at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

The Hoyas season ends with a 23-10 record, having returned to the NCAA Tournament and the Sweet 16 for the first time since the 2000-01 season.

With Georgetown up 53-52 entering the final minute to play in regulation, Brewer grabbed an offensive rebound after a long defensive stop by the Hoyas. With three Georgetown defenders grabbing for the ball, Brewer forced up an acrobat shot that found its way in and would complete the three point play on the line, as he also drew a foul call on the play.

With less than 10 seconds left, senior **Darrel Owens** would gain separation from his defender and have an open look from behind the arc, but his shot would sail off the back of the rim and fall into the hands of Florida's Al Horford. Horford, who was fouled on the rebound, who hit both free throws to seal the win for the Gators.

Florida opened the second half with eight-straight points, taking their biggest lead of the game at 36-30. A free throw by sophomore **Jeff Green** and a three-pointer by classmate **Jonathan Wallace** brought the Hoyas within two just before the first media timeout. After matching layups, Joakim Noah converted a three-point play to widen the gap to 41-36 with just under 14 minutes on the clock.

An 8-1 Georgetown run over the next 7:01, capped off by a backdoor dunk by senior **Brandon Bowman** would give the Hoyas their first lead since halftime. The Gators responded with four unanswered points on a dunk by Noah and two free throws by Taurean Green to take back the lead at 46-44 with 6:16 left. Seconds later, a highlight reel layup by sophomore **Roy Hibbert** brought the crowd to their feet and the score even at 46.

The game would remain tied until Taurean Green would drill a trey at 4:47 to put the Gators back in control. Owens matched Green's three, less than a minute and a half later to tie the game at 49, going into the final media timeout. A Bowman layup with 2:41 left would briefly put the Hoyas back up, but 21 seconds later, Lee Humphrey sunk a three from the wing to give Florida a 52-51 lead.

Senior **Ashanti Cook** gave Georgetown their last lead and their last points with a foul line jumper with 1:49 on the clock, setting up Brewer's heroics.

The Hoyas opened up their biggest lead of the game at 21-12 with 8:40 remaining, behind 10 early points by Cook. However, Florida answered with eight unanswered points over the next 1:46 to cut the Georgetown lead to one. After a basket by Jeff Green, the Gators ran off four points, and on a putback by Al Horford, took a 24-23 lead with 5:50 in the half. A three-pointer by Green gave the Hoyas back the lead, but Florida answered again with a breakaway dunk by Corey Brewer and a short jumper by Chris Richard to take their biggest lead of the half at 28-26 with just over four minutes on the clock. The fact that the Gators were held scoreless over the final 4:04 of the first stanza, coupled with two free throws by Green and a turnaround in the paint by Hibbert with 27 seconds, gave Georgetown its 30-28 lead at intermission.

Georgetown placed four starters in double figures, led by 15 from Green, who also added six boards and four assists. Cook and Bowman each closed out their Georgetown careers with double-digit night, scoring 12 and 10 points, respectively. Bowman, also added a team-best seven rebounds, a feat matched by Hibbert, who rounded out the Hoyas double figures with 10. Georgetown matched a season-low, hitting only 23.8 percent (5-for-21) from behind the arc, while also struggling overall from the field at 38.9 percent (21-for-54).

Joakim Noah had a double-double to lead the Gators, who advance to face Villanova on Sunday, with 15 points and 10 rebounds. Taurean Green had 13 points, including three treys, while Al Horford chipped in 12.
