FEB 8, 1901

Indiana University competes in its first-ever basketball game. The Hoosiers travel to Irvington and lose to Butler, 20-17.

MARCH 8, 1901

Indiana won its first-ever basketball game in the school's fourth outing of the season. IU defeated visiting Wabash, 26-17.

WINTER 1901

Over 50 people show up for open tryouts to become a member of IU's second-ever basketball team. The Hoosiers post a .500 record in only their second season of competition.

MARCH 12, 1904

A crowd of 550 watches as Purdue defeats IU, 22-21, to claim the State Championship in West Lafayette.

FEB. 10, 1906

A crowd of over 1,000 watches as host Purdue nips IU, 27-25.

FEB. 27, 1906

New Albany YMCA 18, IU 17. From the Indiana Daily Student: "...Everybody unites in agreeing that the work of the official who reigned with a tyrannic hand was the vilest and most unfair ever per-

petrated. On three different occasions fouls were called on Woody just as he had thrown the ball in the basket for a field goal, and no possible motive for the umpires verdicts could be found except his desire to give the visitors the short end of it. Despite the handicap, the Crimson athletes showed wonderful tenacity and were in the van at many stages."

SPRING, 1921

Everett Dean becomes Indiana's first basketball All-American and is a first team All-Western Conference pick.

NOV. 21, 1922

Head coach George Levis announces he will resign his position effective Dec. 1 to accept a position at Showers' Furniture Factory.

DEC. 6, 1922

Les Mann, who served as coach of the freshman team, is named head basketball coach and, upon the announcement, he "formally declared a secret practice for this afternoon."

JAN. 13, 1923

Indiana defeats Purdue 31-26 to snap an eight-game losing streak to the Boilers, coached by Ward "Piggy" Lambert. The team was greeted by an overflowing crowd at the train station when it arrived in Bloomington at 3:45 a.m.

OCT. 15, 1924

Everett Dean, a 1921 IU graduate, returns to Bloomington as head coach of the Indiana basketball team.

DEC. 18, 1924

Indiana defeats Kentucky in Lexington, 20-18. It marked the first time the two schools played to start a long-time rivalry.

FEB. 29, 1926

Junior utility man Bob Entire sinks his 129th consecutive free throw en route to making 258 of 262.

MARCH 9, 1926

Indiana defeats Wisconsin, 35-20, to earn a share of the Western Conference Championship. It was the Hoosiers' first-ever conference championship in basketball, which Everett Dean won in only his second season as coach.

MARCH 2, 1936

Before a crowd of over 7,000, Indiana defeats Ohio State in its last game of the season to clinch a share of the Western Conference Championship.

SPRING, 1938

Everett Dean resigns to become head coach at Stanford University and Ernie Andres is named All-American.

SUMMER, 1938

Branch McCracken, a 1930 IU graduate, returns to Bloomington and is named men's basketball coach. In his inaugural season, the Hoosiers post a 17-3 record, the second-most wins ever in a single season.

MARCH 6, 1940

Although Indiana finishes second to Purdue in the Western Conference standings, a committee made up of Tony Hinkle (Butler), Bill Chandler (Marquette), George Keogan (Notre Dame) and K. L. Wilson (Northwestern)

extend an invitation to IU to be the Midwestern representative in the NCAA Tournament.

MARCH 30, 1940

Indiana defeats Kansas, 60-42, for the first-ever NCAA Championship in the program's history. IU finishes the season 20-3.

SPRING, 1943

Lt. Branch McCracken takes a leave of absence to serve in World War II and is replaced by Harry C. Good, who brings a 190-52 record from Indiana Central College where he coached for the past 15 years. Good is coach for three years and has seasons of 7-15, 10-11 and 18-3 before McCracken returns for the 1947 season.

DEC. 2, 1948

An all-time record crowd of 7,631 are on hand for the return of "Big Mac," Branch McCracken, and watch the "Merry Macs" defeat Wabash, 69-46.

FALL, 1948

Indiana's Bill Garrett makes the final cut and is the first black athlete to play basketball at Indiana.

JAN. 20, 1953

Indiana connects on a Big Ten record 42 of 54 free throws en route to defeating Purdue, 88-75.

FEB. 3, 1953

The "Hurryin' Hoosiers" set yet another scoring record, this time cracking the century mark for the first time in history in a 105-70 win over Butler.

MARCH 1, 1953

Indiana defeats host Illinois, 91-79, to win its first undisputed Big Ten Championship.

MARCH 2, 1953

For the first time ever, Indiana becomes the unanimous No. 1 team in the country when the Hoosiers top the Associated Press, United Press and International News Service polls. Ed Krause, athletic

director at Notre Dame, sends a telegram to McCracken: "Congratulations on being the Number One team in the nation. We all voted for you. However, remember, Notre Dame is still Number One in Indiana."

MARCH 15, 1953

Don Schlundt scores 41 points as IU defeats Notre Dame in Chicago Stadium to earn a trip to the Final Four. The 41 points sets single-game records for Schlundt, IU, the Big Ten and Chicago Stadium.

MARCH 19, 1953

A free throw by Bob Leonard with 27 seconds to go gives Indiana a 69-68 win over Kansas and its second NCAA Championship.

SPRING, 1953

Don Schlundt is the overwhelming choice to receive the Silver Basketball Award as the most valuable player in the Big Ten and is named All-American. Branch McCracken is consensus Coach of the Year.

MARCH 6, 1954

Indiana defeats Illinois to earn a second consecutive Big Ten Championship.

MARCH 5, 1955

In his final game as a Hoosier, Don Schlundt sets Big Ten marks by scoring 47 points and connecting on 25-30 free throws in an 84-66 win over Ohio State.

SPRING, 1957

Archie Dees runs away in the balloting for the Big Ten Most Valuable Player as he has more than three times the number of points than the second-place athlete received. He is also selected as an All-American.

MARCH 8, 1958

Indiana wins at Michigan State, 75-72, to repeat as Big Ten Champions.

SPRING, 1958

Archie Dees becomes the first player in history to be named Big Ten MVP twice

and is selected as an All-American.

FEB. 2, 1959

The Hoosiers set the school record for most points in a game as they defeat Ohio State on the road, 122-92.

FEB. 29, 1960

In the final game played in the old IU Fieldhouse, Walt Bellamy scores 24 points as Indiana hands Ohio State its lone defeat in Big Ten play with a 99-83 win.

SUMMER 1960

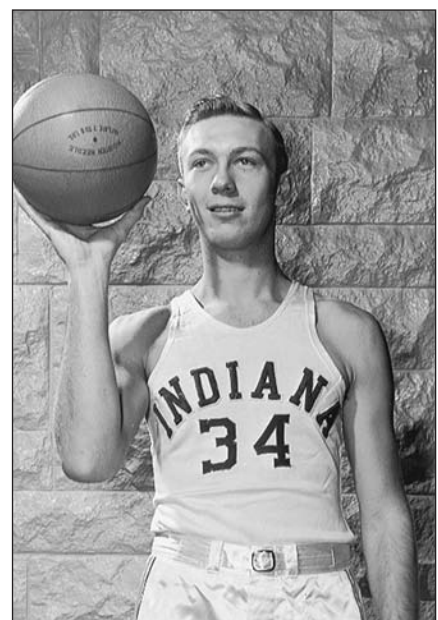
Branch McCracken is inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame for his contributions to the game as a player. He becomes one of only eight players to be included in the Hall at the time. Walt Bellamy is selected to play on the U.S. Olympic team and wins a Gold Medal in Rome.

DEC. 3, 1960

The Hoosiers open the new IU Fieldhouse in front of 9,236 fans with an 80-53 victory over Indiana State.

MARCH 11, 1961

Walt Bellamy scores 28 points and grabs a Big Ten record 33 rebounds in an 82-67 victory over Michigan. The Hoosiers

also set a Big Ten record by grabbing 95 boards as a team. Both rebounding marks are still conference records.

JAN. 2, 1962

IU ties its own school and Big Ten record when the Hoosiers score 122 points in a 122-95 victory over Notre Dame at Fort Wayne. The point total is still an Indiana record.

JAN. 27, 1962

With two seconds remaining in overtime, Jimmy Rayl sinks a 20-foot shot to give host IU a 105-104 victory over Minnesota. Rayl set two school and conference marks in the game: most points in a single game with 56 and most field goals with 20.

FEB. 23, 1963

Jimmy Rayl ties his own Big Ten record when he scores 56 points in a 113-94 home victory over Michigan State. "The Splendid Splinter" still holds the school record.

MARCH 8, 1965

Indiana defeats Wisconsin, 92-73, in Branch McCracken's last game as coach of the Hoosiers. McCracken retires with a 364-174 record in 24 years at IU and a 457-215 career mark spanning 32 seasons. His teams won two

NCAA Championships, three Big Ten titles and a share of a fourth and placed either first or second in 12 of his 24 seasons. McCracken was replaced by long-time assistant Lou Watson.

SUMMER, 1966

Former IU coach Everett Dean is inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame.

FEB. 23, 1971

Steve Downing becomes the only player in Indiana history to register a triple-double as he has 28 points, 17 rebounds and 10 blocks in an 88-79 victory over Michigan.

MARCH 27, 1971

Athletic Director Bill Orwig announces that the search committee has chosen Bob Knight to become the next basketball coach and the fifth in the last 46 years at Indiana University. Knight is the first basketball coach since Leslie Mann was hired in 1923 who did not play at Indiana.

SUMMER, 1971

W.R. Clifford Wells is inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame.

DEC. 1, 1971

The Hoosiers play their first-ever game in Assembly Hall, defeating Ball State, 84-77. Steve Downing grabs 26 rebounds, a mark which is still an arena record.

MARCH 10, 1973

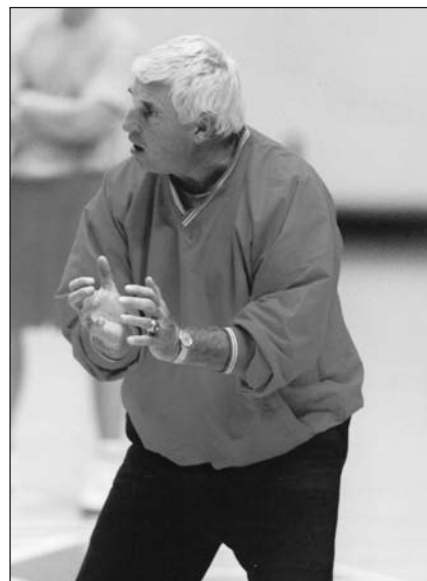
Indiana defeats Purdue, 77-72, to clinch the Big Ten Championship in only Knight's second season as coach.

MARCH 17, 1973

IU defeats Kentucky, 72-65, to advance to the Final Four, its first under Knight and third in school history.

SPRING, 1973

Steve Downing becomes IU's first Big Ten MVP since Archie Dees in 1958 and is selected as an All-American. Bob Knight is the Big Ten Coach of the Year.

MARCH 11, 1974

Michigan defeats Indiana, 75-67, in a playoff game in Champaign, Ill., for the Big Ten Championship. The Wolverines are awarded the automatic bid and the Hoosiers accept an invitation to participate in the Collegiate Commissioners' Association tournament.

MARCH 18, 1974

The Hoosiers defeat USC, 85-60, to win the first-ever CCA Championship.

MARCH 8, 1975

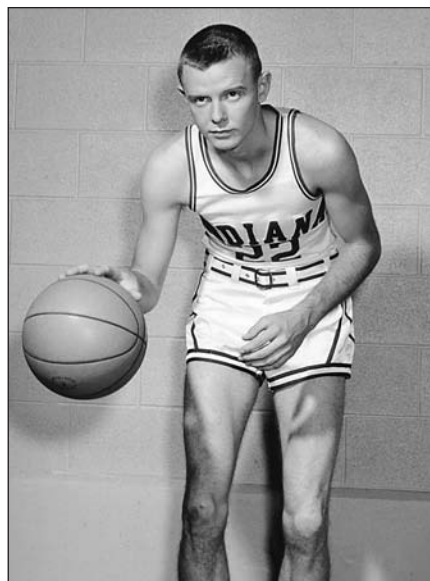
In front of 17,912, the largest crowd ever in Assembly Hall, the Hoosiers defeat Michigan State, 94-79, to win a third consecutive Big Ten Championship and finish the regular season with a perfect 29-0 record.

MARCH 20, 1975

Indiana defeats Oregon State, 81-71, for its 34th consecutive victory dating back to March 15, 1974. The streak is still the longest of any Big Ten school.

NOV. 29, 1975

Indiana rips defending champion UCLA, 84-64, in the Tip-Off Classic at St. Louis, Mo. to begin a season in which the Hoosiers would finish with a perfect record and a National Championship.

MARCH 6, 1976

The Hoosiers defeat Ohio State, 96-67, to clinch their fourth consecutive Big Ten Championship and their second consecutive with a perfect 18-0 record. Indiana set a Big Ten record by winning 37 consecutive Big Ten games, dating back to the 1974 season. The closest any team has come to that mark since has been 19.

MARCH 29, 1976

Indiana defeats Michigan, 86-68, to win the NCAA Championship. The Hoosiers finish the season 32-0, the last team to go undefeated and win the National Crown.

SUMMER 1976

Scott May and Quinn Buckner spearhead the U.S.A. men's basketball team to an Olympic Gold Medal in Montreal.

SUMMER 1979

Isiah Thomas, Ray Tolbert and Mike Woodson play for Bob Knight in the Pan Am Games and the team wins the Gold Medal.

MARCH 2, 1980

Indiana holds off Ohio State to win, 76-73, in overtime and clinch the Big Ten Championship in the season finale.

SUMMER 1980

Isiah Thomas is selected to the Olympic Team.

JAN. 10, 1981

Ted Kitchel makes all 18 of his free throw attempts in a 78-61 win over Illinois, setting a school and Big Ten record.

MARCH 30, 1981

Isiah Thomas scores 23 points to lead the Hoosiers to a 63-50 victory over North Carolina and the NCAA Championship in front of 18,276 fans in the Philadelphia Spectrum. Thomas, who led the Hoosiers in scoring, also led the team with single-season records of 197 assists and 74 steals.

MARCH 12, 1983

Indiana wins the final three games of the season, culminated by an 81-60 win over Ohio State, to win a third Big Ten Championship in four seasons.

SUMMER 1984

Bob Knight and Steve Alford help the US capture a gold medal in the Olympic Games in Los Angeles. Uwe Blab is a member of the West German team.

MARCH 7, 1985

Steve Alford connects on four of five free throws and finishes the conference season with a .935 (58-62) percentage from the charity stripe, which is still a Big Ten record.

MARCH 7, 1987

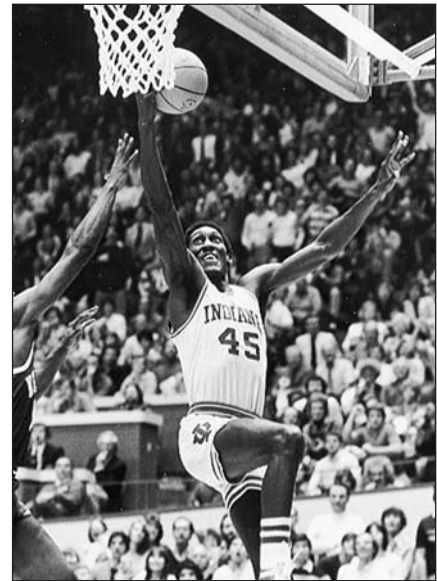
The Hoosiers defeat Ohio State, 90-81, in the season's final game to claim a share of the Big Ten Championship.

MARCH 14, 1987

Keith Smart dishes out a school-record 15 assists in a 107-90 victory over Auburn.

MARCH 30, 1987

Keith Smart hits a jumper from the left side with time running out to give IU a 74-73 win over Syracuse. The Hoosiers are crowned national champions in front of a crowd of 64,959 in the New Orleans Superdome. Steve Alford sets an NCAA

Championship record, hitting seven three-point field goals in the game. Alford graduates as IU's career leader in three-point field goals made with 107.

SPRING 1987

Steve Alford is named Big Ten MVP and is a consensus All-American. Bob Knight is named Naismith Coach of the Year. Indiana leads the nation in three-point field goal percentage, shooting .508 from behind the arc, a mark that is still an NCAA record.

SPRING 1988

Jay Edwards is selected as the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and sets an NCAA record for best three-point field goal percentage by a freshman with a .536 percentage from behind the arc.

SPRING 1989

Jay Edwards is selected as an All-American and Bob Knight is selected as National Coach of the Year. Indiana leads the nation in three-point field goal percentage, shooting .473 from behind the arc. It is the second time in three years IU leads the nation in this category.

MAY 1991

Bob Knight is inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame.

APRIL 4, 1992

Indiana makes its seventh appearance in the Final Four as it takes on defending national champion Duke at the Metrodome in Minneapolis.

NOV. 27, 1992

Calbert Cheaney scores 36 points to lead Indiana to a 78-74 win over Seton Hall as the Hoosiers win the Preseason NIT in front of 14,338 in New York's Madison Square Garden.

FEB. 21, 1993

Greg Graham makes 26 of 28 free throws to set school and conference records for most free throws made in a game.

MARCH 4, 1993

Calbert Cheaney sinks a baseline jumper to become IU's and the Big Ten's all-time career scoring leader. Cheaney scores 35 points in a 98-69 win over Northwestern and finished his career with 2,613 points.

MARCH 10, 1993

Indiana, led by Greg Graham's 32 points, defeat Michigan State, 99-68, to win (at the time) an unprecedented 19th Big Ten Championship, 11th under Bob Knight.

MARCH 25, 1993

Calbert Cheaney scores 32 points to lead Indiana to an 82-69 win over Louisville. In

the process, Cheaney sets a school record for most points in a single season, finishing the year with 785, eclipsing the mark of 752 set by Scott May in 1976.

SPRING 1993

Calbert Cheaney is selected as the Big Ten MVP and is also the consensus Collegiate Player of the Year.

SUMMER 1993

Walt Bellamy is inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame.

SUMMER 1995

In celebration of the Big Ten Centennial, Bob Knight is selected as the Conference's all-time coach and the 1975-76 team is picked as the best in league history.

MARCH 5, 1997

Bob Knight wins his 700th career game in a 70-66 victory over Wisconsin. He becomes the youngest coach in NCAA history to reach that milestone.

DEC. 18, 1999

Bob Knight wins his 750th career game in a 99-80 victory over Wyoming.

JAN. 8, 2000

Indiana sets a school record with 14 blocked shots en route to an 85-78 victory over Penn State.

SEPT. 10, 2000

IU President Myles Brand announces that head coach Bob Knight has been terminated after leading the Hoosiers from 1972-2000. He posted a school-best mark of 661-240 and won three NCAA Championships.

SEPT. 12, 2000

Director of Athletics Clarence Doninger names Mike Davis Indiana's 25th head men's basketball coach. He is the first African-American head coach in Indiana University athletics history.

DEC. 2, 2000

Indiana hits a school-record 15 three-pointers en route to an 85-63 victory over Southern Illinois.

JAN. 7, 2001

Kirk Haston hits a three-pointer at the buzzer as the Hoosiers defeat No. 1 ranked Michigan State. It marked the first-ever win over a No. 1 team at Assembly Hall.

FEB. 24, 2001

The Hoosiers miss just 14 shots shooting 70.2 percent from the floor to defeat Wisconsin 85-55.

MARCH 5, 2001

Jared Jeffries is named the Big Ten's Freshman of the Year. Kirk Haston is named to the All-Big Ten first team while Jeffries earns second-team honors.

MARCH 10, 2001

Indiana knocks off Illinois to advance to its first-ever Big Ten Tournament Championship game.

MARCH 21, 2001

Mike Davis is named the Hoosiers' permanent head coach.

JUNE 2001

Nearly 100 former Hoosier players come back to Bloomington to celebrate 100 years of Indiana Basketball. The All-Century team, as selected by the fans, is honored.

JAN. 27, 2002

The Hoosiers set a new school and Big Ten record by connecting on 17 three-pointers en route to an 88-57 victory over Illinois.

MARCH 2, 2002

Indiana closes out the conference season with a 79-67 win over Northwestern. The victory earned the Hoosiers a share of their 20th league title.

MARCH 5, 2002

Indiana's Jared Jeffries is named Big Ten Player of the Year by the media and coaches and Dane Fife is named Co-Defensive Player of the Year. Jeffries also earns first team All-Big Ten honors and Tom Coverdale is named to the second team.

MARCH 16, 2002

The Hoosiers defeat UNC-Wilmington, 76-67, and advance to the Sweet Sixteen for the first time since 1994.

MARCH 21, 2002

Indiana overcomes a 17-point deficit to defeat No. 1 Duke, 74-73, in the NCAA South Regional semifinals.

MARCH 23, 2002

Indiana sets a new NCAA school record by hitting 15 three-pointers in their 81-69 win over Kent State. The victory earns

the Hoosiers their first trip to the Final Four since 1992.

MARCH 30, 2002

The Hoosiers post a 73-64 victory over No. 3-ranked Oklahoma to advance to the NCAA Championship game.

JUNE 26, 2002

Hoosier sophomore Jared Jeffries is selected 11th overall in the first round of the NBA draft by the Washington Wizards. He is the 18th first round selection in school history and the first "lottery pick" since Calbert Cheaney was selected sixth overall by Washington in 1993.

NOVEMBER 25-27, 2002

Indiana opens the 2002-03 season with three straight victories en route to the EA Sports Maui Invitational championship at Lahaina Civic Center. The Hoosiers upended Massachusetts (84-71), No. 20 Gonzaga (76-75) and Virginia (70-63) as Bracey Wright becomes the first freshman since North Carolina's Joseph Forte (1998) to win tournament MVP honors.

DECEMBER 3, 2002

In a rematch of the national championship game held eight months earlier, Indiana knocks off Maryland, 80-74 in overtime. The game highlights the ACC-Big Ten Challenge, as the Hoosiers over-

came a 14-point deficit. Senior guard Tom Coverdale turned in one of the finest single-game efforts in school history, finishing with 30 points (5-of-10 from the three-point line and 9-of-10 from the free throw line), six rebounds, five assists, four steals and just one turnover in 43 minutes.

MARCH 16, 2003

Indiana extends the nation's second-longest active NCAA Tournament appearance streak to 18 straight years when the Hoosiers are paired against coach Mike Davis' alma mater, Alabama, in the first round of the Midwest Region. IU defeated the Crimson Tide, 67-62 on March 21 at The Fleet Center in Boston.

ALL-TIME HEAD COACHES

MEN'S BASKETBALL

J.H.HORNE 1901

1-4 (.250) OVERALL, 0-2 (.000) BIG TEN

J.H. Horne was the first coach in Indiana history and coached the Hoosiers in 1901. He led the squad to a 1-4 overall record with an 0-2 record in the Big Ten Conference.

PHELPSDARBY 1902

4-4 (.500) OVERALL, 0-2 (.000) BIG TEN

Phelps Darby coached the Hoosiers in 1902. Darby, who also served as the center on the team, led the team to a .500 record (4-4) and a 0-2 record in the Big Ten Conference.

WILLISCOVAL 1903-04

13-8 (.619) OVERALL, 0-4 (.000) BIG TEN

Not only serving as head coach but also as a reserve guard was highly-touted football player Willis Coval. Coval led the Hoosiers to their first pair of winning seasons. The team went 8-4 in 1903 and 5-4 in 1904 under his guidance. The Big Ten Conference slump continued for Indiana after Coval's teams went a combined 0-4 in conference play.

ZORA G.CLEVINGER 1905-06

12-21 (.364) OVERALL, 3-3 (.500) BIG TEN



The Hoosiers' third coach was Indiana football All-American Zora G. Clevenger who served the squad in 1905 and 1906. Clevenger led the Hoosiers to a 12-21 record, but guided the team to its first Big Ten Conference victory and .500 conference season at 3-3. Clevenger later served as the athletic director at Indiana University and is a 1982 inductee into the IU Athletic Hall of Fame.

JAMESSHeldon 1907

9-5 (.643) OVERALL

James Sheldon spent one season as the head coach of the Hoosiers and led them to a 9-5 record.

EDCOOK 1908

9-6 (.600) OVERALL, 2-4 (.333) BIG TEN

Ed Cook led the Hoosiers in 1908. Under his guidance, the Hoosiers finished 9-6 overall and 2-4 in the Big Ten Conference.

ROBERTHARRIS 1909

5-9 (.357) OVERALL, 2-6 (.250) BIG TEN

Robert Harris coached the Hoosiers in 1909 and led them to a 5-9 season. The Big Ten Conference slump took hold again as for the second consecutive year Indiana finished under .500, going 2-6.

JOHNGEORGEN 1910

5-8 (.385) OVERALL, 3-7 (.300) BIG TEN

John Georgen coached the Hoosiers in 1910 and led them to a 5-8 season including a 3-7 season in the Big Ten Conference.

OSCARRACKLE 1911

11-5 (.688) OVERALL, 5-5 (.500) BIG TEN

Oscar Rackle led the Hoosiers to its first .500 season in the Big Ten Conference since 1906 in 1911. Rackle coached the Hoosiers to an 11-5 overall record and finished the season 5-5 in the Big Ten.

JAMESKASE 1912

6-11 (.353) OVERALL, 1-9 (.100) BIG TEN

James Kase coached the Hoosiers in 1912. He led Indiana to a 6-11 season and a 1-9 Big Ten Conference record.

ARTHURPOWELL 1913

5-11 (.312) OVERALL, 0-10 (.000) BIG TEN

Arthur Powell led Indiana to an overall record of 5-11 and for the first time in its history IU finished the Big Ten regular season winless, going 0-10.

ARTHURBERNDT 1914-15

6-21 (.222) OVERALL, 2-20 (.091) BIG TEN

Indiana Hall of Famer Arthur Berndt coached the Hoosiers in 1914 and 1915. He finished his two-year tenure with a mark of 6-21.

ALLANWILLISFORD 1916

6-7 (.462) OVERALL, 3-5 (.375) BIG TEN

Allan Willisford led the Hoosiers in 1916 and finished the year with a 6-7 overall record. He also coached Indiana to a 3-5 Big Ten Conference record.

G.S.LOWMAN 1917

13-6 (.684) OVERALL, 3-5 (.375) BIG TEN

G.S. Lowman coached Indiana in 1917 leading the team to a 13-6 overall record. In the Big Ten Conference, Lowman finished his coaching career with a 3-5 record.

DANA M.EVANS 1918-19

20-11 (.645) OVERALL, 7-9 (.438) BIG TEN

Dana M. Evans led the Hoosiers in 1918 and 1919. He coached them to a 20-11 overall record and a Big Ten mark of 7-9.

EWALD O.STIEHM 1920

13-8 (.619) OVERALL, 6-4 (.600) BIG TEN

Ewald O. Stiehm coached Indiana in 1920. He led them to a 13-8 overall record including a Big Ten Conference record of 6-4.

GEORGE W.LEWIS 1921-22

25-16 (.610) OVERALL, 9-12 (.429) BIG TEN

George W. Lewis spent two seasons with the Hoosiers, 1921 and 1922. He led the squad to a 25-16 overall record and a 9-12 mark in the Big Ten Conference.

LESLIEMANN 1923-24

19-13 (.594) OVERALL, 12-12 (.500) BIG TEN

Leslie Mann coached the Hoosiers for two seasons in 1923 and 1924. The squad, under Mann's guidance, finished 19-13 in those two years with a .500 Big Ten Conference record of 12-12.

EVERETTDEAN 1925-38

162-93 (.635) OVERALL, 96-72 (.571) BIG TEN



From being the first All-American basketball player at Indiana University to receiving the Big Ten medal for academic and athletic excellence, Everett Dean was the choice to lead the Hoosiers through the Roaring 20s. Dean led the Hoosiers to their first-ever Big Ten Conference co-championship which they clinched in a 15-point victory over Wisconsin to end the 1926 season. He led the squad to two more Big Ten titles and had an impressive overall career record of 162-93 with a Big Ten mark of 96-72 which was by far the most successful coaching career in Indiana basketball history at the time. Dean's era officially kicked off the tradition of Hoosier basketball at Indiana University that continues today. Dean was inducted into the Indiana University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.



2005-06 MEN'S BASKETBALL

BRANCH MCCrackEN 1939-43, 47-65 364-174 (.677) OVERALL, 210-116 (.644) BIG TEN



While Dean's era dug the foundation for college basketball at Indiana, Branch McCracken's two stints as Indiana University Head Basketball Coach were the concrete needed to

solidify that foundation. McCracken spent 24 years at the helm of the "Hurryin' Hoosiers" and brought two National Championships, four Big Ten Championships and IU's first four 20-win seasons to Bloomington. The first national title came in 1940 when the Hoosiers finished 20-3 overall and 9-3 in the Big Ten. NCAA Championship number two came in the 1952-53 season when the squad racked up a then-school-record 23 wins to only three losses, an unprecedented 17-1 Big Ten record and IU's first outright Big Ten Championship. McCracken led the squad to a 364-174 overall record and a 210-116 Big Ten record. His 450 career wins places him 76th on the NCAA's all-time victories list and 86th on the all-time winningest coaches list. McCracken served as a lieutenant in the U.S. Army in World War II from 1944-46. The legendary coach was elected to the Indiana University Athletic Hall of Fame in 1982.

HARRY C. GOOD 1944-46 35-29 (.547) OVERALL, 14-22 (.389) BIG TEN

Harry C. Good coached the Hoosiers for three seasons from 1944-1946 while Branch McCracken served as a lieutenant in the U.S. Army. He led Indiana to a 35-29 overall mark and a Big Ten Conference mark of 14-22.

LOU WATSON 1966-71 62-60 (.508) OVERALL, 31-39 (.443) BIG TEN

Lou Watson spent six seasons with the Hoosiers. From 1966-1971 he coached the Hoosiers to a 62-60 overall record and a 31-39 Big Ten Conference mark. Watson, in 1970, coached an IU legend who only spent one season as a Hoosier. George McGinnis led the Big Ten in scoring (29.9 ppg) and rebounding (14.5 rpg). His 29.9 points per game average is still the highest single-season average in the history of Indiana basketball.

JERRY OLIVER 1970 7-17 (.292) OVERALL, 3-11 (.214) BIG TEN

Jerry Oliver spent one season as the acting head coach of Indiana basketball. He was named acting head coach after head coach Lou Watson had surgery to remove cancer from his back. Oliver led the Hoosiers to a 7-17 overall mark including a 3-11 record in the Big Ten Conference.

BOB KNIGHT 1972-2000 661-240 (.734) OVERALL, 353-151 (.700) BIG TEN



From the plaid jacket to the famed red sweater, the name Bob Knight became synonymous with Indiana University basketball and in his 29 seasons no one could deny him that distinction. "The General" led the Hoosiers to three national championships, 11 Big Ten championships and one National Invitation Tournament title. The greatest accomplishment in the Bob Knight era was the 1975-76 National Championship run where the Hoosiers began the year as the Associated Press' preseason number one team and carried that ranking all the way through the season to Knight's first and the school's third NCAA Championship. That squad was

also the last team to finish the season perfect with a 32-0 overall record and an 18-0 Big Ten mark. Knight's second title came during the 1980-81 season when Isiah Thomas led the squad to the NCAA title over the North Carolina Tar Heels. The squad's final championship of the Knight era came in the 1986-87 season when Keith Smart hit the game-winning shot to defeat Syracuse in the national title game. Knight's career saw numerous achievements by both the coach himself and his players. He was awarded with National Coach-of-the-Year honors on four occasions in 1975, 76, 87 and 1989. He ranks sixth on the all-time coaches list for victories and is the 30th winningest coach of all-time. Under Knight's leadership, Calbert Cheaney became the all-time leading scorer in Big Ten history. He also coached nine Big Ten MVPs and had a total of 27 All-Americans play in Assembly Hall. Knight had an overall Indiana record of 661-240 and a Big Ten Conference mark of 353-151.

OLD ASSEMBLY HALL

Indiana University basketball has in its 100-year existence gone full circle. Today, the 17,000 -plus capacity Assembly Hall is a mecca for sporting arenas, just as old Assembly Hall was in its day considered a large home.

The original Assembly Hall was not a sporting arena, it was a small one-story structure with a wooden frame. The building, located near the Indiana Memorial Union, was built in 1895 and had a price tag of \$12,000. When full the building could seat 600 people for a basketball game, and it also was the practice site for the team and the gymnasium for physical education classes.

IU's first-ever game was on February 8, 1901 against Butler. The game was described by the Indianapolis News as a "fast" and "hard-fought" game which had Butler on top 20-17. The first game at Assembly Hall came 20 days later against Butler. In another tight game, Butler pulled it out 24-20 and left IU 0-2.

Opponents were rare and basketball was still enduring growing pains, but the 1901 total of two games doubled in 1902 and another was added in 1903. It was a time when basketball was just taking hold, but when it did, the growth was accompanied by the need for a new building.

The final game at the original Assembly Hall was against Rose Poly on January 5, 1917 and it was the fifth-straight victory for IU and it came in dominating fashion, 35-9.

The building also attracted former Presidents William Howard Taft and Teddy Roosevelt and also multi-time presidential candidate William Jennings Bryan.

The doors to Assembly Hall, which boasted an overall record of 61-43, officially closed in 1938 when it was demolished, but the tradition carried on and only grew stronger.

MEN'S GYMNASIUM

What is now an upstairs recreational gymnasium in the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation building is the Men's Gymnasium. This facility housed the Indiana Hoosiers from 1916-1928 and was brought into existence amid controversy.

With the original Assembly Hall falling into disrepair, students and faculty alike marched for a new gymnasium for the athletes. Alumni and University personnel also lobbied for its abandonment by the athletic program. The people's wishes were granted in 1914 and with a capacity of 2,000 and a cost of \$200,000, the Men's Gymnasium's era began in 1916.

The first game at the gymnasium was on January 19, 1917 against Iowa. The Hoosiers pulled out one of the lowest scoring games in history, 12-7.

The building was the home court of consistent teams coached by the likes of Dana M. Evans and Everett Dean. Dean led his squad to the first two Big Ten Championships in the history of IU basketball as the head coach. He led the final team to play in the building to the program's first unbeaten home season at Men's Gymnasium (11-0).

As a player, Dean called the Men's Gymnasium home and was named as Indiana University's first All-American in 1921 while playing in that facility.

The team's consistent success led to the growth of the fan base supporting the squad. The capacity of 2,000 was no longer sufficient, so the program had to be moved into another facility.

The time had come because the growth was so substantial.

OLD FIELDHOUSE

Indiana's third home, after outgrowing the Men's Gymnasium, was the Old IU Fieldhouse and it was built on East 7th Street with a price tag of \$350,000. The dedication game was on December 13, 1928 when IU defeated Eastern Champion Pennsylvania, 34-26. The facility had a portable hardwood floor and a lighting system consisting of 47 electric lamps suspended from the ceiling. Seven floodlights, three above the floor and two pointing directly at the hoops, made it easier for the players to see during the game. It was not one of the luxurious buildings of today, but head coach Everett Dean and the Hoosiers made due with what they were given.

The Old Fieldhouse was where Indiana Head Coach Everett Dean led the Hoosiers into what is now a well-documented tradition. Dean coached the 1936 team to an undefeated home record (9-0) and a share of the Big Ten Conference crown.

The Old Fieldhouse saw six perfect seasons including a 24-game unbeaten home winning streak from 1938-1941. It was the home to the Hurryin' Hoosiers under head coach Branch McCracken. It was also the home to McCracken as a player and in 1930, he was named an All-American.

The fieldhouse was the home court for the 1940 NCAA National Champions and it was the place where IU attained its first 20-win season going 20-3 including a 9-0 mark at the Fieldhouse. It was also the home to the 1953 NCAA National Champion "Hurryin Hoosiers" that went 20-4 overall and an unprecedented 11-0 in the Fieldhouse.

Indiana squads endured only three coaches and amassed an amazing 234-74 overall record in the Old Fieldhouse's era. Besides the two national titles, it was the home of five Big Ten Conference Championships, 20 All-Americans, 17 All-Big Ten First Team selections and three Big Ten Most Valuable Players.

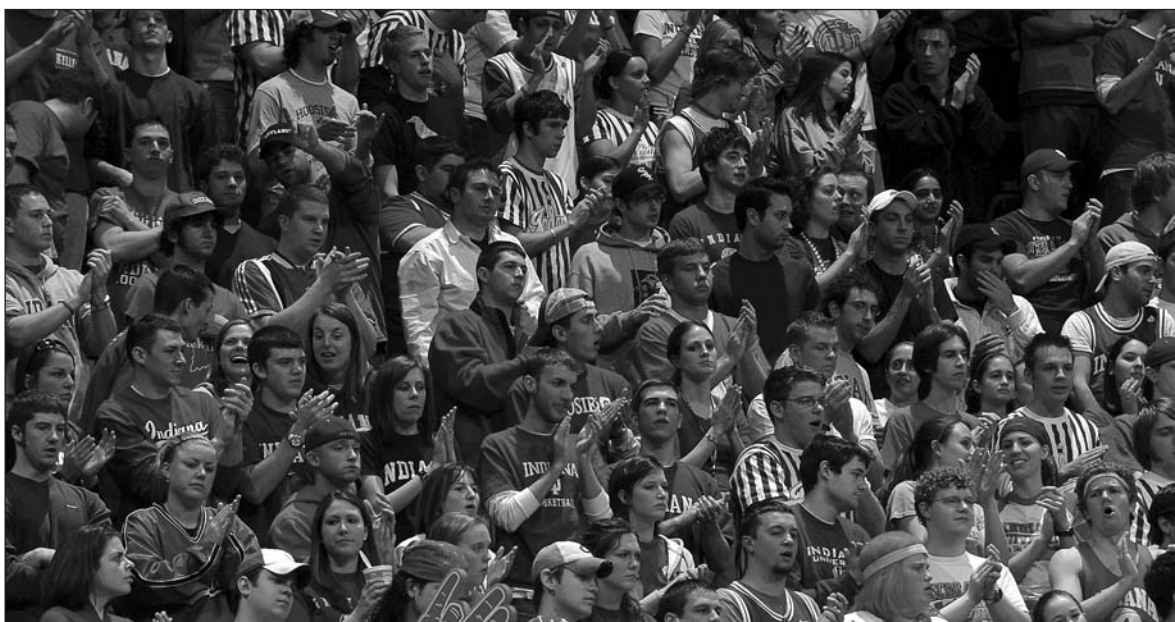
Today the Fieldhouse is named the Ora Wildemuth Intramural Center and it houses one of the most well-known facilities in the country. The HPER building's famed basketball courts are now residing where the tradition of Indiana University basketball began.

New Fieldhouse

Indiana's home from the 1960-61 season until the opening of Assembly Hall is a building that served as a temporary home while Assembly Hall was being built. Its name today is Gladstein Fieldhouse adjacent to Assembly Hall.

Gladstein Fieldhouse was the fourth

home of the Hoosiers and, although it was only expected to last a few seasons, it lasted 11 years. In the 11 years at Gladstein Fieldhouse, Indiana had only two losing seasons and consistency was the name of the game for the Hoosiers.

The building still exists and it plays host to the Indiana University Indoor Track and Field squad and is utilized during graduation ceremonies. The facility has played host to four Men's Big Ten Indoor Track and Field Championships and three Women's Indoor Big Ten Championships. It is a building that is well-utilized throughout the athletic season.

The Hoosiers, under Branch McCracken for the first five years, went a combined 44-15 in those years. In the opening game at the Fieldhouse, Indiana defeated Butler 80-53 in front of 9,236 screaming Hoosier fans.

Players like Walt Bellamy, Tom and Dick Van Arsdale and Jimmy Rayl competed at the Fieldhouse. The Fieldhouse was the home arena for five All-Americans, six All-Big Ten First Team selections, three Academic All-Americans and three Academic All-Big Ten selections.

The tradition of Indiana University basketball was not altered in any way by the temporary move to the Fieldhouse, but the tradition began to climb when the Hoosiers moved into Assembly Hall.

Assembly Hall (Current)

The 2005-06 season marks the 35th anniversary for the building that is the definition of tradition -- Assembly Hall. The Indiana Hoosiers, in the building's 30-plus-year existence, have averaged 11.8 wins to just 1.9 losses annually.

The last unbeaten team in NCAA basketball, three NCAA Championships and 11 Big Ten Conference championship-winning teams have graced Branch McCracken Memorial Court (named after the legendary IU coach). It has been the home to seven perfect seasons including a 56-game winning streak from 1991-1995 and it is the home of the shot that gave Calbert Cheaney the title of Big Ten career scoring leader.

Assembly Hall has played host to the pre- and postseason National Invitational Tournament on six occasions, including last season, and the 1981 NCAA Midwest Regional Championship won by the Isiah Thomas-led Indiana Hoosiers. The building was also the home arena of the 1984

Olympic gold medal-winning basketball team coached by Bob Knight.

The cavernous structure was completed in 1970 and is an impressive sight. It has 15,200 fully-cushioned, theatre-style seats located on concourse and upper balcony levels and another 2,057 can fit into the bleachers located on all four sides at court level. The north and south loge areas give disabled fans an opportunity to have a pristine vantage point for Hoosier games.

The building has a suspension roof made up of 4,500 concrete slabs each six feet long, three inches thick and 30 inches wide. Each slab weighs 500 pounds giving the roof a total weight of 1,350 tons or 2,700,000 pounds. The building holds more than 30,000 yards of concrete, six million pounds of reinforcing steel and almost 1.5 million pounds of structural steel.

Assembly Hall has played host to memorable moments such as Kirk Haston's game-winning three-point shot to knock off No. 1 Michigan State, 59-58, which marked the first time in Assembly Hall history that the Hoosiers upset a No. 1 team at the Hall.

Another memorable victory over Michigan State was the backdrop for the Hoosiers' 400th victory in the facility. IU defeated the Spartans, 78-74, in overtime on

Feb. 27, 2005.

During the 2005 summer months, a \$1.99-million scoreboard-video board was installed in Assembly Hall. The state-of-the art scoreboard-video board includes four video screens, four video/scoring/statistics screens, one center-hung ProAd ring, five ProTable scorer's table units, four auxiliary portal scoreboards, as well as three-sided shot clocks and a new game timing system.

The tradition can be felt the instant you walk into Assembly Hall and if you have been there before you can hear Indiana, Our Indiana and Go IU! Fight! Fight! Fight! resonate off the walls and throughout the building long after you leave.
