MEMPHIS-USF SERIES HISTORY

Memphis and USF have a bit of history as the Tigers and the Bulls battled each other in four consecutive years from 2001-04. The series record is tied, 2-2, with Memphis winning the first and last meetings of the series.

The Tigers opened the series in 2001 with a 17-9 win at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium, and in 2004, Memphis defeated USF in Tampa, 31-15. USF claimed victories in the 2002 (31-28) game in Tampa and the 2003 (21-16) contest in Memphis.

The Bulls were members of Conference USA from 2003-04 before joining the BIG EAST for the 2005 football season.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

UM 31, USF 15 (2004, Tampa): In the final regular season game of his remarkable collegiate career, DeAngelo Williams rushed for a school single-game record 263 yards on 28 carries. Williams had runs of 72, 51 and 44 yards in the contest. The 72-yard scamper set up a Stephen Gostkowski FG, and the 51 and 44 runs were TD scores. The Tigers led 16-0 at the intermission and were never threatened in the second half.

USF 21, UM 16 (2003, Memphis): The Tigers turned the ball over seven times, and the Bulls took advantage en route to the 21-16 victory. After a kickoff return of 96 yards for a TD, J.R. Reed returned a fumble recovery 45 yards for another score. In the final period, Reed intercepted a Danny Wimprine pass to set up USF's third TD of the game. Wimprine threw for 271 yards, but also had four interceptions. Derron Parquet, subbing for the injured DeAngelo Williams, rushed for a career-high 164 yards.

USF 31, UM 28 (2002, Tampa): The Bulls exploded for 28 points in the second quarter, but then had to hold off a Tiger second-half rally for the win. USF QB Marquel Blackwell had a hand in all four second-quarter TD, passing for three scores and running for another. Blackwell finished the game with 246 passing yards. Tiger QB Danny Wimprine answered with 314 yards via the air and two TD. In the game, Wimprine became the first Tiger QB pass for, run for and catch a TD in a game. The USF defense held Memphis to 48 rushing yards.

UM 17, USF 9 (2001, Memphis): The Tigers jumped out to a 17-0 lead in the first quarter and then held on for the win. Memphis scored its first TD just a minute into the contest when Travis Anglin hit Sugar Sanders from three yards out. Four minutes later, a Ryan White FG made it a 10-0 Tiger lead. Before the first period ended, Dante Brown increased the lead to 17-0 with a one-yard TD run. Bull QB Marquel Blackwell tried to lead USF back and was 25-of-61 passing for 276 yards. Blackwell also had three interceptions.

TOMMY WEST

Head Coach • 8th Year • 47-50, 82-85
9th Year at Memphis



Tommy West came to Memphis in 2000 as the defensive coordinator and a year later became the Tigers' 21st head football coach. In just eight seasons at the helm of the program, West has guided the U of M to five bowl game appearances in the last six years, and is one of just two coaches in Tiger football history to win seven or more games a season in four years. West is also one of just four coaches in school history to secure four winning seasons while guiding a Tiger program for at least five seasons.

The Gainesville, Ga., native was hired as the Tigers' head coach on November 30, 2000, and continues to work towards the team goal of a C-USA championship.

Under West's guidance, the Tigers won five of their last six games in 2003 en route to an 8-4 record and snapped a 32-year bowl drought. The Tigers went on to defeat North Texas in the New Orleans Bowl and ended the year at 9-4. West was named the Coach of the Year by the Tennessee Sports Writers Association.

The 2004 Tigers opened the season at 5-1 and rolled off three straight wins at the end of the year to earn their second straight bowl invitation. Despite the loss to Bowling Green in the GMAC Bowl, the Tigers ended the year at 8-4, which was good for second in Conference USA. The eight wins also marked the first time since 1962 and 1963 that the Tigers had amassed eight wins in consecutive seasons. In 2004, West's Tigers also made history ranking 25th in the *Associated Press* poll following their victory over Ole Miss. It was the first time ever that Memphis had been ranked by the national entity.

In 2005, West and his staff did an amazing job in getting the Tigers to their third straight bowl game despite numerous injuries that threatened to derail the team's post-season streak. Memphis finished the year with a 7-5 record and a victory over Akron in the Motor City Bowl, and was one of just 29 schools in the nation playing its third straight bowl game that year.

Despite a rough beginning in 2006, the Tigers did show marked improvement by year's end. This was evident in the latter weeks of the season when Memphis narrowly lost to UCF, 26-24, and then a week later stunned eventual league champion Houston with a solid effort, forcing the Cougars into overtime and ultimately losing by a field goal. By the last game of the season, the Tigers were confident and handed UTEP a 38-19 loss at the Sun Bowl.

West led his 2007 squad to a 7-6 overall record and a 6-2 showing in C-USA as the Tigers entered the New Orleans Bowl on a three-game winning streak. The six victories in Conference USA action were the most ever for a Tiger team since Memphis began playing in the league in 1996. In addition, the Tigers won all three games against C-USA West Division foes and finished the season tied for second in the East Division with East Carolina.

The 2008 Tigers opened with a 0-3 record, but fought hard to win six of the last nine games of the season despite injuries to three quarterbacks. Memphis evened the record to .500 and earned bowl eligibility with a commanding 45-6 victory over Tulane in the final home game for 25 Tiger seniors.

Memphis heads into the magicJack St. Petersburg Bowl ranked in the top 25 nationally in rushing of offense, total offense, fewest turnovers, sack denial and third down conversions. In addition, the Tigers hold the distinction for being one of the top 10 programs in the country in least fumbles lost (6th), time of possession (3rd), offensive first downs (10th) and first down defense (10th).

West and his wife, Lindsay, have one son, Turner, who is a sophomore receiver for the Tigers this season.

TIGERS DIG WAY OUT OF EARLY HOLE

The Tigers found themselves in uncharted territory early in the 2008 season when they opened with three straight losses for the first time ever under head coach Tommy West. And while most counted the Tigers down and out, this squad refused to sit back and accept a losing season. Memphis rolled off consecutive wins over Nicholls State, Arkansas State and UAB to even the record at 3-3 at the halfway point. The Tigers then dropped a 35-28 decision to previous C-USA rival Louisville just before the East Carolina game that forced the Tiger coaching staff to become creative offensively. Memphis lost the services of quarterbacks Arkelon Hall (thumb) and Will Hudgens (knee) in the first quarter on the road at ECU. Walk-on junior Brett Toney was pressed into service and the U of M fell to 3-5 with the loss to the Pirates.

Toney started the Southern Miss and SMU games, which the Tigers won and again evened their record at 5-5. Having two open dates in a four-week period allowed for Hall to return to the lineup for the final two games of the season at home versus UCF and Tulane. With bowl hopes and a potential share in the C-USA East Division title on the line, costly mistakes against UCF left the Tigers with one more chance for post-season hopes on Senior Day versus Tulane. The squad came out with something to prove and earned the sixth win for bowl eligibility with a commanding 45-6 win over the Green Wave.

TIGERS IN GOOD COMPANY

The Tigers are competing in the postseason for the fifth time in the last six years, and can count themselves among the 36 teams nationally who will have played in at least five bowl games in the six-year span. Also included in that group from Conference USA are Houston (5), Southern Miss (6) and Tulsa (5).

The Tigers snapped a 32-year bowl drought, one of the nation's longest at the time, with an invitation to the New Orleans Bowl in 2003 after ending the regular season with an 8-4 record. Memphis traveled to the Big Easy and defeated North Texas, 27-17. Memphis has also appeared in the 2004 GMAC Bowl, the 2005 Motor City Bowl and the 2007 New Orleans Bowl in the last six years.

HOME SWEET DOME

Three of Memphis' six previous bowl contests have been played in indoor facilities. Memphis won two of those contests - the 2003 New Orleans Bowl, which was played in the Louisiana Superdome and the 2005 Motor City Bowl, which was hosted at Ford Field. The Tigers lost in the Superdome last season in the 2007 New Orleans Bowl.

ONLY TWO CAN SAY IT...

Memphis is among 12 teams that started the season with a 0-3 record this year. Of those 12 teams, only the Tigers and Rutgers are playing in bowl games. Rutgers enters the PapaJohns.com Bowl with a 7-5 record, and Memphis heads into the magicJack St. Petersburg Bowl with a 6-6 record. No other teams that started 0-3 had more than five wins this year, and seven of those teams finished with three or fewer victories.

MY "TWO" SONS

Two Tiger coaches have sons playing this season. Head coach Tommy West's son, Turner, is a sophomore receiver; while offensive line coach Rick Mallory's son, Adam, is a backup quarterback. Turner has played in four games this year. Adam is a former high school quarterback who joined the Tigers in November as a walk-on after Memphis lost three quarterbacks in a two-week period to injuries. He played locally at Houston HS before transferring to O'Dea High in Seattle to finish his prep career.

He served a two-year church mission to Mexico, and he and his wife, Lindsey, have a 17-month-old daughter, Delaney. They are expecting their second child later this month.

STEELE EARNS C-USA NEWCOMER OF THE YEAR HONORS

Junior running back Curtis Steele was named the Conference USA Newcomer of the Year. Steele leads the Tigers in rushing with 1,175 yards and seven touchdowns on 206 carries. He logged his sixth 100-yard rushing game with his 135-yard effort versus Tulane. Steele ranks fourth all-time in single-season yardage and is the first Tiger to rush for over 1,000 yards since DeAngelo Williams did so in 2005. The Franklin, Tenn., native is averaging 97.92 rushing yards in 12 games and has averaged 112.2 yards in his last nine contests.

FOUR TIGERS PICK UP LEAGUE ACCOLADES

Four Tigers earned All-C-USA honors, as selected by the 12 head football coaches. Senior offensive lineman Brandon Pearce and senior defensive lineman Clinton McDonald were both named to the first team, while junior running back Curtis Steele earned second-team accolades. Freshman offensive lineman Ronald Leary was the team's lone representative on the All-Freshman team. In addition, eight Tigers received at least one vote to earn honorable mention recognition. Philip Beliles, Maurice Jones and Carlos Singleton were selected on the offense, while Greg Jackson, D.A. Griffin and Alton Starr were named on the defensive side. Brent Sutherland and Keenan Bratcher also earned honorable mention on special teams.

TIGER SUCCESS IN THE TAMPA-ST. PETERSBURG AREA

There have been few visits to the Tampa-St. Petersburg area for the Memphis football program, but the Tigers have been rather successful when playing there. Memphis has an overall record of 3-1 when playing in Tampa-St. Pete.

The Tigers are 1-1 versus USF when playing in Tampa-St. Pete. Memphis visited the Bulls in the 2002 and 2004 seasons. Prior to the recent meetings with USF, Memphis faced the University of Tampa in Tampa in the 1949 and 1964 campaigns. The Tigers won both encounters.

ON THIS DATE

The Tigers will play their first-ever Dec. 20 game in the program's history when Memphis meets USF in the magicJack St. Petersburg Bowl. In recent years, Memphis played on Dec. 16, Dec. 21, Dec. 22 and Dec. 26.

TIGERS IN DECEMBER GAMES

The Memphis Tigers are 4-4 in games played in December, which include bowl games in 1971 and 2003-05 and 2007; and regular-season contests in 1918, 1950 and 1972. Memphis has never played on Dec. 20th, and the latest they have played in school history was Dec. 26 in the Motor City Bowl.

TIGER ALL-AMERICANS FROM FLORIDA

The Tigers have had four All-Americans from the state of Florida, including 1992 Lou Groza Award winner Joe Allison (American HS in Miami) and current New Orleans Saints defensive back Mike McKenzie (Norland HS in Miami). Others include linebacker Danton Barto who coached in the AFL and former Tiger strength coach Dean Lotz. Barto hailed from Niceville, while Lotz called Titusville home.

MEMPHIS 4-2 ALL-TIME IN BOWLS

The Memphis Tigers have played in six bowl games, dating back to the 1956 Burley Bowl that was held in Johnson City, Tenn. Memphis is 4-2 all-time, and 2-2 since Tommy West led Memphis to victory in the 2003 New Orleans Bowl. The chart below shows the Tigers' bowl results:

A SEVENTH WIN WOULD MAKE HISTORY

The Tigers are 6-6 entering the bowl game, and while a win would secure Memphis' fifth bowl title in school history, it would also set another historical milestone.

The win would give Tommy West his fifth season of seven or more wins in the last six years. No other coach in school history has won seven or more games five times in a six-year period of time. Only one coach, Billy J. Murphy (1958-71), has won seven or more games six times, but that was during a 10-year period of time (1960-69). Murphy strung together three eight-win seasons in 1960-62 and had nine wins in 1963 before recording just five wins in the next two seasons.

PERMANENT CAPTAINS

As is tradition under head coach Tommy West, prior to the regular-season finale versus Tulane, the Tigers voted on their permanent captains. Seniors Clinton McDonald and Brandon Pearce were selected as the leaders by their teammates. McDonald is a two-time selection as he was the first junior under West's tutelage to be selected as a captain.

TIGERS ON TV

With the magicJack St. Petersburg Bowl being carried by ESPN2, the Tigers will have had eight of their 13 games televised this season.

Memphis has had seven regular-season games televised in 2008, including the Friday night meeting with Louisville that was also carried by ESPN and included the same broadcast crew as the one that will call the Tigers bowl match-up

THE TIGERS ON ESPN

In the last five years (2004-08), Memphis has appeared on ESPN 13 times, including this season's Oct. 10 meeting with Louisville. Last year, Memphis defeated Marshall and lost to Florida Atlantic in the New Orleans Bowl.

Memphis had three games broadcast by ESPN in 2006 (Ole Miss, Tennessee & Southern Miss). In 2005, Memphis appeared on ESPN three times, including the opening meeting against Ole Miss on ESPN, the mid-season contest with UAB on ESPN2, and the Motor City Bowl on ESPN.

During the 2004 season, the Tigers played Louisville (Nov. 4), Southern Miss (Nov. 12) and USF (Nov. 27) on ESPN, and closed out the season in the GMAC Bowl.

The Tigers have played on ESPN 18 times dating back to a 34-3 loss to Georgia in 1982. Memphis has won six ESPN games -- the 27-17 victory in the 2003 New Orleans Bowl; a 44-34 win over Ole Miss, also in 2003; a 30-26 win over USM and a 31-15 victory over USF in 2004; the 38-31 victory in the 2005 Motor City Bowl; and the 24-21 emotionally-charged win over Marshall last season.

MEMPHIS VS NON-LEAGUE FOES UNDER WEST

So far this season, the Tigers have defeated Nicholls State and Arkansas State and dropped decisions to both Ole Miss and Louisville to bring their non-league record to 16-18 in the Tommy West era. Included in that non-conference mark is a perfect 8-0 record against NCAA Division I-AA foes with the 31-10 win over Nicholls State on Sept. 20. In addition, of the 18 non-league losses, 11 of them are to SEC opponents.

In the five years (1996-2000) prior to West taking over the program, the Tigers' non-conference record was 8-17.

THERE'S A FIRST TIME FOR EVERYTHING

For the first time in the program's history, Memphis will play a postseason game in the state of Florida. In their previous bowl trips, the Tigers' destinations (by state) were Tennessee, California, Louisiana, Michigan and Alabama.

MEMPHIS VERSUS THE BIG EAST

The Tigers have an all-time record of 39-36 against members of the BIG EAST Conference, but Memphis played all three foes — Cincinnati, Louisville and USF — when they were members of the Metro Conference and Conference USA.

The Dec. 20 magicJack St. Petersburg Bowl game versus USF is Memphis' second against a BIG EAST Conference foe after that league's realignment in 2005. It is also the Tigers' second BIG EAST opponent this season, as they played Louisville earlier this year. Memphis dropped a 35-28 decision to the Cardinals on Oct. 10 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

The Tigers lead the Cincinnati series 18-12, while Louisville holds a narrow 22-19 series advantage. Memphis and USF split their four meetings (2-2).

NOT THE FIRST TIME

The Dec. 20 St. Petersburg Bowl encounter between Memphis and USF won't be the first time the two will meet as non-league foes. The two

teams faced each other for the first time in the 2001 campaign, and at the time, Memphis was a member of Conference USA and USF played as an independent.

The Bulls joined C-USA in 2003, and USF and Memphis met two times from 2003-04 as league foes.

CLOSING OUT THE SEASON

This late-season meeting between Memphis and USF is becoming old hat for both programs. The Dec. 20 magicJack St. Petersburg Bowl encounter will be the final game of the 2008 campaign for both teams.

However, the two programs have played regular season finales in 2003 (21-16 USF win in Memphis) and 2004 (31-15 Memphis win in Tampa). While it wasn't a season finale or regular season finale, Memphis and USF played another late-season encounter in 2002. The Bulls won 31-28 in that Nov. 9, 2002, game.

MEMPHIS VS FLORIDA TEAMS

The Memphis Tigers are 15-20-1 against schools from the Sunshine State. The longest series was against Florida State, with the Seminoles holding the 10-7-1 series advantage despite Memphis rolling off six consecutive wins during the 1970s. The Tigers snapped the nation's longest home winning streak by defeating the Emmitt Smith-led Florida Gators in the Swamp, 17-11, in 1988. The series with Florida is currently tied at 1-1. The Tigers are 2-2 against USF; 1-4 vs UCF; 0-1 against Florida Atlantic; 1-2 vs Miami and were 3-0 over the University of Tampa.

FLORIDA TIGERS

The Memphis roster has 10 players that call the Sunshine State home. Lavaris Edwards (Miami), Maurice Holloway (Sanford), Kindly Jacques (Fort Lauderdale), Steven Joachim (Miami), Curtis Johnson (Miami), Charlie Jones (Miami), Clay Lee (Orlando), Joel McLeod (Miramar), Bryan Wright (Miami) and Vinny Zaccario (Tampa) are from the state of Florida.

McCleod prepped at Everglades High School in Miramar as did USF wide receiver Jeffrey Wilson. Wright played his prep football at Northwestern High in Miami, the same school that sent USF freshman linebacker Quavon Taylor.

TIGERS PICK UP ANOTHER WINNING YEAR VERSUS C-USA WEST

Prior to the 2005 campaign, Conference USA set up two divisions — East and West — for football competition. Each team plays all opponents within its division and three foes from the other division.

In its first two years (2005 and 2006), Memphis played Houston, Tulsa and UTEP from the C-USA West Division. The past two seasons (2007 and 2008), the Tigers played Rice, SMU and Tulane.

With the commanding win over Tulane on Nov. 29, the Tigers claimed a third winning record versus C-USA West foes. Memphis went 2-1 against the C-USA West in 2005, 1-2 in 2006 and 3-0 in 2007. The Tigers are 2-1 this season with wins over Tulane and SMU, and a loss to Rice.

Memphis' overall record versus the C-USA West is 8-4 since the league went to the two-division format in 2005. Going back to the end of the 2006 campaign, Memphis has won six of its last seven against the C-USA West.

TIGER SUCCESS IN NOVEMBER

Since the 2003 campaign, head coach Tommy West has had his Tigers playing winning football in the month of November.

Memphis has a 14-9 record in the month of November since 2003. In the 2003, 2004 and 2007 campaigns, the Tigers posted 3-1 records in those stretch runs.

Memphis closed this November at 2-1 with the 45-6 win over Tulane. The Tigers also defeated SMU in Dallas on Nov. 8, and lost to UCF on Nov. 22 at the Liberty Bowl, 28-21.

TIGERS LOSE LEGEND

Following the win over Tulane on Nov. 29, Tiger football staff members were informed that Murray Armstrong, who had served in many capacities with Tiger Athletics for the last 46 years, had lost his four-year battle with cancer.

During his tenure at the U of M, Armstrong worked under eight presidents, four athletic directors, nine head coaches and worked along side 126 of the 146 total football assistant coaches in the University's history. He began his career assigned as an assistant coach with the freshman team in 1962 and through the next 46 years served in such capacities as head freshman coach, special teams coach, defensive end coach, dorm director and most recently facilities coordinator of the Murphy Athletic Complex.

Armstrong has received numerous awards and honors including being recognized by the Memphis Chapter of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame in 1998 for his outstanding contribution to the University of Memphis. He was inducted into the

games, and scored 143 points to its opponent's 120 points. For a comparison of the first seven games (3-4 record) to the final five games (3-2 record), take these numbers for instance:

- In the first seven games of the season, Memphis averaged 283 yards passing and 182 yards rushing per game. In the final five games, the Tigers averaged just 147 yards passing, but an impressive 239 yards rushing.

- In the first seven games, Tiger receivers averaged nearly 21 receptions per game. In the final five, just a mere 11 receptions per game were caught by Tiger receivers.

- In the first seven, Memphis logged 86 first downs via the pass. And, in the final five, only 36 first downs were the result of a pass completion.

- In the first seven games, Memphis totaled 14 passing TDs and 10 rushing TDs. In the last five meetings, the U of M has registered 5 passing TDs and 14 TDs from the run.

FASTEST TO 2,000 YARDS

Junior receiver Duke Calhoun made a 54-yard touchdown catch in the UCF game on Nov. 22, and in doing so, became only the third Tiger in school history to log 2,000 career yards receiving.

Calhoun, who enters the bowl game with 2,019 yards, also became the fastest Tiger receiver to 2,000 yards as he was playing in his 35th career game against the Knights. Earnest Gray tallied his 2,000th yard in the 10th game of his senior season (1978), and the 43rd game of his career. Damien Dodson recorded his 2,000th yard in the ninth game of his senior season (1999); the 39th game of his career.

PROTECT THE BALL

The key to the ground game is protecting the ball, which is one thing U of M running backs have been consistent with over the years. Last season, Tiger backs carried the ball 332 times and only put the ball on the ground twice. Of the four fumbles the Tigers gave up in 2007, only two were by backs. The 2007 Tigers finished the season tied for third nationally in fumbles lost. LSU and San Jose State led the nation in least fumbles lost with just three.

Curtis Steele fumbled the ball versus Louisville for the first, and only, lost fumble by a back this season. The play was reviewed as it appeared Steele was down prior to the ball popping out, but the call on the field stood. The Cardinals tossed an interception on the very next play.

From 2004-2008, Memphis backs have only accounted for seven total fumbles lost in 1,765 carries. T.J. Pitts logged three lost fumbles in 2006, but two of those were on kick returns.

Through 12 games (912 total offensive plays) in 2008, the Tigers have only lost five fumbles (only one by a RB), and two of those were in the loss to Louisville. Quarterback Arkelon Hall has coughed up the ball three times this season (Marshall, Louisville & UCF), and two of those have proven to be costly. With 12 minutes remaining in the Louisville game, Hall was sacked and lost control of the ball, and UL's Johnny Patrick returned the recovery 21 yards for a touchdown. The Tigers lost the game, 35-28. And, in the last game versus UCF, Hall fumbled at the Memphis 29 and Derrick Hallman made the return for a TD to give the Knights the 14-0 advantage. QB Brett Toney lost a fumble in Memphis' game versus USM.

Heading into the bowl game, Memphis ranks in a tie for 6th nationally with six other teams in fumbles lost with just five.

PATTERSON IS TWO-TIME ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN

Senior defensive back Brandon Patterson was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America football team for the second straight season as announced by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Patterson has been named as a second-team All-American in both 2007 and 2008, and becomes the only Tiger football player to earn such a distinction twice in his career. Last year, Patterson was the first football Academic All-American since 1992.

A native of Germantown, Tenn., Patterson graduated from the U of M in August 2007 with a bachelor's degree in finance, and currently holds a 3.7 grade point average in graduate school. He is on target to earn his master's degree in finance this month. In 2007, Patterson was also named to the C-USA All-Academic Football team.

Patterson, Brandon Pearce and Matt Reagan had all been named to the CoSIDA first team for District 4 and had their names placed on the national ballot for Academic All-America consideration. District 4 includes universities in Alabama, Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio and Tennessee.

STEELE RUSHES FOR 1,000+ IN 2008

Junior Curtis Steele became only the fourth Tiger in school history to rush for over 1,000 yards in a single season in the Tigers' game versus SMU. In that contest, Steele rushed for 123 yards to bring his season total to 1,002 yards.

Steele is the first Tiger to achieve 1,000-plus yards since DeAngelo Williams in 2005. Williams logged three straight 1000-yard seasons (2003-05); Gerard Arnold logged 1,059 yards in 1998; and Dave Casinelli tallied 1,016 yards in 1963.

Steele left the SMU game in the third quarter with a pulled hamstring and missed a majority of practices the following two weeks. He was

questionable for the UCF game, but ultimately started the game. Against the Knights (2nd in C-USA in rush defense), Steele totaled just 38 yards, including a two-yard TD run, on 15 carries.

Steele gave the ground game a much-needed boost against Tulane in the regular-season finale, logging his sixth 100-yard game with 135 yards and a touchdown on 23 carries.

The powerful back enters the bowl with 1,175 yards, which ranks fourth all-time in single-season yardage. The top three spots are all held by Williams. Steele's six games of 100-plus yards also ranks tied for fourth in a single season.

STREAKING TIGER

With only 12 pass attempts being tossed in the Tulane game, it took junior Duke Calhoun until the third quarter to log his only catch in the game -- a nine-yard reception. That catch was key as it extended Calhoun's receiving streak to 36 games. He has caught a pass in each of his 36 career games played. He missed the UCF game last season with a knee injury.

The 36-game streak is a school record, as Calhoun surpassed Russell Copeland, who lettered for the Tigers from 1989-92 and tallied 27 straight games with a catch. **Heading into the bowl game, Calhoun ranks tied for 11th nationally in active**

receiving streaks. The current leader is Rice's Jarrett Dillard with 48 consecutive games with a reception.

Junior Carlos Singleton etched his name in the Tiger record book as No. 2 all-time behind Calhoun with his 28-game streak that was snapped against East Carolina when Memphis lost two quarterbacks to injury in the first quarter.

WHAT ARE THE CHANCES?

In 2005, Memphis lost the services of two quarterbacks by the third game of the season. In Memphis' opening drive versus Ole Miss in the season opener, starting QB Patrick Byrne broke his leg and missed the rest of the season. Two games later against Tulsa, Will Hudgens broke his leg and was lost for the season. The Tigers were forced to go with quarterback-turned receiver Maurice Avery and ultimately won five of the last seven games of the season, including the Motor City Bowl.

Fast forward to 2008, and the Tigers were again facing a quarterback crisis, only this time two were lost in the same game, and another was lost a week later. Against East Carolina, starter Arkelon Hall suffered a fracture in his thumb on the very first play of the game. He continued for five more plays but called to the sidelines for a replacement.

Will Hudgens came into the ECU game and handled seven snaps before he left the game with a knee injury after making a three-yard run. MRI tests the following Monday showed he tore his MCL and ACL. He had surgery in November, and will work with the athletic training staff on his rehabilitation.

Coach Tommy West inserted junior QB Brett Toney into the lineup and Toney ultimately finished the ECU game with 11 of 15 passing for 65 yards. Toney came to Memphis as a walk-on candidate in 2005 and lettered last season as the holder with the PAT and field goal units. He had not taken a snap for the Tigers up until this point. He was replaced in the fourth quarter by true freshman Tyler Bass, who was originally expected to redshirt this season. Bass had two carries for six yards before tossing an interception. He completed his first collegiate pass to Earnest Williams for a loss of six yards.

A week later against Southern Miss, Toney and Bass alternated series and led Memphis to a 14-0 advantage after the Tigers' first two drives. Bass showed why the coaches were so excited to have signed him late this summer. He scored a touchdown on a run on Memphis' second series and later tossed a three-yard TD pass to Carlos Singleton. Bass unfortunately suffered the same fate as Hudgens as he left the game in the third quarter with a knee injury. An MRI showed Bass had torn his ACL and he too had surgery in November to repair the damage.

Hall missed the USM and SMU games, but bye weeks in two of the last four weeks prior to the UCF game gave him an opportunity to return to the field. Hall wore a glove to help him grip the ball and finished the UCF game with 183 yards and a touchdown on 15-of-35 passing. He tossed an interception late in the fourth quarter in the 28-21 loss to the Knights. Hall was back on the field in the regular-season finale and helped Memphis earn bowl eligibility, completing 10 of 12 passes for 109 yards.

TONY HANDLES FIRST COLLEGIATE SNAPS

Junior Brett Toney was called into action during the Tigers' second series against East Carolina after Arkelon Hall left with a fracture in his thumb and Will Hudgens injured his knee.

Toney's first collegiate pass completion was a 24-yard toss to Earnest Williams in the second

quarter. Toney finished the game 11-of-15 for 65 yards.

Toney made his first start a week later and helped the Tigers to a 36-30 win over Southern Miss. He completed 8-of-16 passes for 125 yards and one touchdown.

The Tigers are 2-0 with Toney as the primary passer with wins over USM and SMU. Against the Mustangs, Toney tossed two TD passes to Steven Black (4 yds) and Carlos Singleton (18 yds) and ended the day with 130 yards on 9-of-19 passing. He tossed one interception in the third quarter.

MCDONALD MISSES FIRST GAME

Defensive leader Clinton McDonald had played in 44 straight games for the Tigers until being sidelined for the East Carolina game with an ankle injury he suffered against Louisville. McDonald, who was on the Lombardi Award watch list earlier this year, returned to the field against Southern Miss for a couple of plays. McDonald did not dress out for the SMU game, but returned to the field in the loss at home to UCF. He started on the defensive front versus UCF and Tulane, and logged four total tackles in the final two games.

TIGERS NEED LEAD AT THE HALF AND IN 4TH

Under Coach West, the Tigers are 34-12 when leading at the half, and 42-5 when leading at the start of the fourth quarter. In fact, in the last six years (2003-08 included), Memphis is 29-7 when leading at the half, and an impressive 34-4 when leading at the end of the third quarter.

The Tigers saw a 21-13 lead at the start of the fourth quarter against Rice slip away as the Owls outscored Memphis, 29-14, in the final period. Rice picked up two touchdowns, one off an interception return, in the final 1:15 remaining on the game clock to garner the 42-35 victory.

The other three losses that Memphis has suffered in the last six years when leading at the start of the fourth quarter were the 35-32 loss to Arkansas State in 2007, the 35-20 loss to East Carolina in 2006 and the 20-16 loss to Tennessee in 2005.

Against UT, Memphis entered the fourth quarter with a slight 16-14 lead but UT dropped two field goals on the Tigers for the win. Early in the 2006 season against ECU, Memphis was leading 20-14 at the start of the fourth quarter and allowed ECU 21 points for the 35-20 loss.

Against ASU in '07, the Tigers let go of a 31-6 lead when the Indians scored 15 points in the third quarter and 14 in the final stanza to gain the 35-31 advantage.

TIGERS LOOKING FOR 30 POINTS

The number 30 seems to be key for the Tigers under Tommy West. Since 2001, Memphis has an impressive 32-8 record when it scores 30 or more points in a game.

This season, Memphis is 5-1 when scoring at least 30 points. The Tigers lost to Rice despite scoring 35 points, and scored 31 in a win over Nicholls State; 33 in a win over UAB; 36 in the victory over USM; 31 in the road victory at SMU; and dropped a season-high 45 on the Tulane Green Wave.

On the other hand, the Tigers have a 9-33 mark when they allow the opponents 30 or more points. Memphis is currently 2-4 this season. The Tigers allowed 41 points and 42 points in back-to-back losses to Ole Miss and Rice, and gave up 35 points (21 of which were on miscues) to the Louisville Cardinals. A week later, East Carolina scored 23 points in the second half, en route to a 30-10 victory over the Tigers. Memphis gave up 30 points to the UAB Blazers, but edged them with a 25-yard field goal with just seconds remaining on the clock for the 33-30 C-USA victory. And most recently, the Tigers jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter and ultimately defeated USM, 36-30.

STEELE IS IN GOOD COMPANY

With his 178 yards rushing versus Southern Miss, Curtis Steele made a huge jump from 18th to ninth in the Memphis record books for single season yardage. A week later, Steele became the fourth Tiger in school history to log 1,000 yards

in a single season when he rolled off 123 yards at SMU. Steele left the SMU game early in the third quarter with a hamstring injury he suffered just prior to halftime.

Heading into the bowl game, Steele now totals 1,175 yards and ranks fourth in the Memphis record book in single-season yardage. He made the jump ahead of Gerard Arnold (1,059 yds in 1998) with his 135-yard effort in the season finale versus Tulane.

All-American tailback DeAngelo Williams holds the top three single-season spots for his yardage in 2003 (1,430), 2004 (1,948) and 2005 (1,964).



CALHOUN RANKS THIRD IN RECEIVING YARDS

Junior receiver Duke Calhoun is second all-time at Memphis with 138 career catches and holds the No. 3 spot in the record book with 2,019 career yards. It would take 10 receptions and 105 yards in the bowl game for Calhoun to close out his junior year with the school record in both categories.

Calhoun had been on pace to garner the record this season before Memphis lost the services of three quarterbacks in two games and was forced to rely more on the ground game. In fact, over the last five games of the season, Memphis is averaging just 147 passing yards and just 13 completions a game.

The school record for receptions is 147 by Damien Dodson (1996-99). The U of M record for receiving yards is 2,123 by Earnest Gray (1975-78). He is followed by Damien Dodson, who is only the second Tiger to amass 2,000 career yards receiving with 2,096 from 1996-99.

TRUE FRESHMEN TIGERS

Seven true freshmen have seen action so far this season, including Clay Lee, John Michael Bryant, Frank Trotter, Dasmine Cathey, Vinny Zaccario, Brandon Ross and Tyler Bass.

Trotter is the first true freshman to start on either side of the ball this season as he started the East Carolina, Southern Miss and SMU games for injured senior Clinton McDonald.

Zaccario, a walk-on kicker from Tampa, Fla., was called upon just minutes before kickoff versus Arkansas State with an injury to Matt Reagan. Zaccario came through with three field goals and two PATs in the 29-17 win. He also hit the game-winning 25-yard field goal with :02 remaining on the clock at UAB.

Ross, who was expected to redshirt this season, was called to duty for the UAB game

because Charlie Jones was sidelined with an ankle injury. In his first game as a Tiger, Ross totaled 46 yards on six carries. He has seen increased action and logged his first 100-yard game with 111 yards rushing on 22 carries versus SMU.

And in a strange turn of events, quarterback Tyler Bass was thrown into action when Memphis lost two QBs in the first quarter at East Carolina. Bass came in during the fourth quarter as a replacement for junior Brett Toney who managed just 65 yards on 11 completions. Bass made two runs before tossing an interception on his first pass attempt. He completed one pass in three attempts in his limited action. Bass threw his first touchdown pass and also rushed for a score against Southern Miss before leaving the game in the third quarter with a knee injury. In the USM game, Bass was 9-of-10 for 107 yards and a TD. An MRI the following Monday showed a torn ACL, which has sidelined him the remainder of the season.

SINGLETON TIES TD RECORD

With his 18-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter against SMU, Carlos Singleton tied the school record for career touchdowns with 19. The previous record holder was Tavares Gideon, who totaled 19 TD receptions in two seasons (2002 & 2004).

Singleton enters the bowl game leading the receiving corps with 50 receptions for 759 yards and five TDs.

GRIFFIN SETTLING IN AS ALL-PURPOSE THREAT

Junior college transfer D.A. Griffin made his first punt return against Arkansas State and has now registered at least one return in the last eight straight games. Griffin had one return for 20 yards versus ASU, and logged a then season-high five returns for 26 yards against Louisville. Griffin upped his total against USM with four punt returns for 46 yards with a long return of 30. Most recently, Griffin tallied 34 yards on four returns versus Tulane.

Griffin logged his first kick return yardage at ECU. In that contest, he made four returns for 95 yards, with a long return of 28 yards. He had a kick return of 17 yards versus USM before busting off 89 yards on five returns against UCF. **Versus the Knights, Griffin handled all returns (10 total) and logged 127 yards. His long return was a 33 yarder on a UCF kickoff in the third quarter. A week later against Tulane, he again handle all six returns and logged 75 yards on two kickoff returns. He had a long of 50 yards, which is a game-high this season.**

20-YARD RUNS IN 2008

In all of last season, the Tigers only logged two total runs of 20 or more yards. Through 12 games of 2008, Memphis has tallied 15 runs of 20 or more yards, and eight of those are by RB Curtis Steele. Steele has three runs over 30 yards, including a team-high 46-yard rush in the ASU game. In five of the last eight games, Steele boasts at least one run of 20-plus yards.

In addition, the Tigers have scored from the run in 10 of 12 games this season, and have recorded at least one run over 15 yards in all 12 games.

One week after the UCF Knights, which entered the game as the second-best rush defense in the conference, held the Tigers to just 122 yards on 37 carries, Memphis ran all day long against Tulane. The Tigers tallied 379 yards on 66 carries, and logged six touchdowns off the ground attack. Memphis had five runs of 20 or more yards versus the Green Wave.

LONGSTREET MAKING DEFENSIVE STRIDES

Sophomore linebacker Jeremy Longstreet has started eight of the last nine games at linebacker, and has logged at least five tackles in all but one of the games in that series. Against SMU, Longstreet's streak of starts was snapped, but the Tigers utilized six and seven DBs through much of game. In fact, veteran middle linebacker Winston Bowens didn't play a single snap in the defense in that contest.

Longstreet led the team and totaled double digit stops versus Nicholls State (12) and Louisville (13). He also had eight tackles against both UAB and ECU, and tied for the team-lead in stops with nine versus UCF. In six of the seven games, he started on the outside, but against ECU he started in the middle for Bowens, who had been struggling with pain in his knee.

Heading into the bowl game, Longstreet ranks second in tackles with 75, including 36 solo stops. For the year, he also totals three QB hurries, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

HALL SCORES THREE WAYS VS CARDS

Arkelon Hall became the first Memphis player since Danny Wimprine in 2002 to pass, catch and rush for a touchdown in the same game. Hall scored his second rushing touchdown of the season, and only the third given up by Louisville in five games, in the first quarter on a one-yard run to give the Tigers a 7-0 lead. He then caught a 1-yd pass from Maurice Jones after a handoff in the second quarter for a touchdown. Hall threw two touchdown passes in the third quarter on seven-yard and 10-yard receptions with the second TD tying the game at 28-28 with less than two minutes left in the third quarter.

Hall threw for 350 yards for the third time this season completing a career-high 33 passes on 55 attempts. The Cardinals came into the game ranked ninth in the nation in total defense and had held their opponents to an average 181.25 yards passing. His 33 completions ranks fourth all-time at Memphis as do his 55 pass attempts. The junior transfer from the College of the Sequoias is only the fourth different Tiger quarterback to throw for 350 or more yards in a game.

According to a survey conducted by Rice SID Chuck Pool, only two other FBS players have logged the trifecta this season --- James Casey of Rice and Joe Ganz of Nebraska.

WILLIAMS HITS 1,000-YARD MILESTONE

The Tigers have four receivers on the 2008 squad who total over 1,000 receiving yards for their careers with Earnest Williams hitting the milestone versus Louisville.

Williams logged his 1,000th yard on his first catch of the third quarter (a 7-yard gain), which was also his 94th career reception. He is the 24th Tiger to tally 1,000 yards receiving in school history.

Heading into the bowl game, Williams ranks 19th all-time in receiving yards with 1,061. He

CHARLIE JONES IS SCORING THREAT

Prior to the ankle injury he suffered late in the Arkansas State game, senior running back Charlie Jones had rushed for multiple touchdowns in three games (Rice, Nicholls State, ASU).

Jones missed three games (UAB, Louisville, ECU) with a high ankle sprain, and returned to the field versus USM for mostly special teams action. He did not have a carry versus the Golden Eagles and was poised for a return to the backfield for the SMU game before he reaggravated his ankle when someone rolled up on the back of his ankle on a special teams play. He played against UCF and had just five yards on two carries as well as a 12-yard reception. The senior back looked like he had returned to his early form against Tulane as he rolled off 45 yards on eight carries.

Jones is tied with Earnest Williams and Steven Black for third on the team in scoring with 36 points, and has accounted for six of Memphis' 24 rushing touchdowns this season. He was one of Memphis' biggest red-zone threats before his injury, with all of his touchdown runs under 20 yards, and four of them under 10 yards.

The Tiger run game has been effective in scoring this season, which is evident in the number of TDs Memphis has scored from the run in 12 games (24). In 12 games in 2006, the Tigers tallied 12 rushing TDs and in 13 games in 2007, Memphis totaled 13 rushing TDs.

WEST RANKED THIRD IN WINS

With the 45-6 win over Tulane, head coach Tommy West totals 47 wins in eight seasons at the U of M. That 47th win has West third all-time at the U of M, surpassing Zach Curlin, who was 43-60-14 in 13 years (from 1924-36). Billy J. Murphy holds the all-time lead in wins with his 91-44-1 record in 14 years (1958-71). Murphy captured his 47th

win in the sixth game of his seventh season (1964). Murphy is followed in wins by Ralph Hatley who went 59-43-5 in 11 years at the helm of the U of M program (1947-57). Hatley picked up his 47th win in the third game of his ninth season (1955).

WEST VS NEWBIES

With the season opening loss to Ole Miss and the wins over Southern Miss and SMU, Memphis head coach Tommy West is now 10-3 against opposing coaches in their first year at their respective programs, since taking over the Tigers in 2001. OFFENSE PRODUCING YARDAGE

In the first seven consecutive games of the '08 season, Memphis tallied over 400 yards of total offense, and in two games this year the Tigers amassed over 500 yards.

In the season opening loss at Ole Miss, Memphis totaled 453 yards on 84 plays. A week later, the squad logged 76 plays and totaled 523 yards of total offense versus Rice. In the third game versus Marshall, Memphis tallied 462 yards on 83 plays. The Tigers logged a season-high 85 plays for 449 yards against Nicholls State. The streak continued with the win over Arkansas State in which the Tigers tallied 453 yards of offense on 70 plays, including a then season-high 264 rushing yards. The streak remained intact with the win over UAB in which the Tigers logged 436 yards on 66 plays. The UAB game was the first game this season that Memphis had less offensive yardage than its opponent (436 to UAB's 455). The Tigers made it seven straight with 481 yards on a season-high 86 plays in the loss to Louisville.

The streak came to a halt in the East Carolina game on the road in which Memphis lost two QBs in the first quarter and managed just 82 yards passing for the game. The Tigers registered a season-low 57 plays for just 184 yards against the Pirates.

Despite rotating a true freshman (Tyler Bass) and a junior walk-on (Brett Toney) at QB versus Southern Miss, the Tiger offense racked up big yardage over the Golden Eagles, amassing 516 yards on 79 plays. A week later, the run game (306 yds) was the key factor in Memphis totaling 436 yards in the win over SMU.

The Tigers met UCF, one of the best defenses in C-USA, on Nov. 22 and was held to below 400 yards for only the second time this season. Memphis managed just 122 yards rushing and 183 yards passing for a total of 305 yards.

In the final regular season game, the running game was firing on all cylinders and the Tigers rumbled for 379 yards rushing en route to a total offensive output of 488 yards.

With an average of 432.2 yards of total offense per game, Memphis ranks 22nd nationally in that

category. This seems to be the year of big offensive numbers for Conference USA, as Houston leads the nation in yards per game with 575.1, and Tulsa ranks second with 565.1 yards per contest.

TIGERS CONVERTING ON 3RD DOWN

Through 12 games in 2008, Memphis has converted 86 of 181 third-down attempts, which ranks the Tigers 16th nationally with a success rate of 48.0 percent. Memphis' 86 first downs were achieved through 37 runs and 49 pass completions.

The Tigers also rank in the top 15 in first downs (10th) and time of possession (3rd).

TIGER O-LINE TAKES A HIT

The Tiger offensive line was hit hard early by injuries this season. Left guards Michael Denning and Terrence Echols missed the first two games after both suffered sprained MCLs during camp. Echols returned to the field for the Marshall game, and Denning saw some action in the line during the Nicholls State contest. Brent Todd was also hobbled by a foot injury, and played through it for the first two games. He did not make the trip to Marshall after reinjuring his foot, and missed the Nicholls State and ASU games. He was back on the field versus UAB. Lionel Henderson has also been sidelined this season with a foot injury. Junior college transfer Colton Jenkins tore ligaments in his knee in practice following the Nicholls State game and was forced to miss the rest of the season. He will likely use this season as a redshirt year.

The Tiger o-line will be one of the groups most hit by graduation this year. Four of the five starters are seniors (Philip Beliles, Brandon Pearce, Cody Stubblefield and Denning), as are backups Echols and Todd.

"BIG GUYS" MAKE WAY FOR BIG OFFENSE

In the last three straight seasons, the Tiger offensive line has ranked in the top 10 nationally in least sacks allowed.

This season's starting line is led by senior right tackle Brandon Pearce and center Philip Beliles. The line has been hit with injuries to seniors Terrence Echols, Michael Denning and Brent Todd, and it may have caught up to the group in the Marshall loss. The Tiger o-line allowed three sacks in the Marshall contest, marking the first time since a 35-14 loss to Tulsa in 2006 that Memphis has given up three sacks in a single game. **Through 12 games this season, the Tigers have given way to 16 sacks and currently rank tied for 23rd nationally.**

A BIT ABOUT BASS

True freshman quarterback Tyler Bass was thrown into action against East Carolina after the Tigers lost two quarterbacks in the first quarter.

Bass is not in the 2008 edition of the Memphis Football media guide because he joined the squad after the book was sent to print.

Bass, 6-3, 220, enrolled in classes at the U of M in mid-July. He originally signed in February 2008 with Maryland and later requested, and was granted,

a release by the school. He joined the Tigers on the field for the first fall practice on August 4.

A native of Atlanta, Ga., Bass played at Stockbridge High School where he was a two-year starter at quarterback. He threw for over 2,400 yards and 28 touchdowns in his final two seasons at SHS. He was a dual threat who also rushed for 606 yards and 11 touchdowns on 81 carries as a senior. In 2007, he was ranked 73rd nationally among quarterbacks by Scout.com, and was tabbed 57th nationally as an athlete by Scouts, Inc.

Bass came in on Memphis' second series against Southern Miss and helped the Tigers gain a 14-0 lead early in the first quarter with his 11-yard TD run. He left the game in the third quarter with a knee injury, but before leaving managed to complete 9 of 10 pass attempts for 107 yards and one TD. He also had 51 yards rushing and one score on 10 carries.

Bass missed the remainder of the season with a torn ACL. He is expected to miss spring practice and could return to the field next fall.

VINNY WHO?

Few people knew who true freshman walk-on kicker Vinny Zaccario (Zuh-CARE-eo) was prior to the Arkansas State game, but after that win was a different story. Zaccario, a native of Tampa, Fla., who joined the Tigers in camp in August, was informed that he would kick for the U of M about 10 minutes prior to the kickoff versus ASU. He replaced veteran kicker Matt Reagan, who suffered from a hip flexor.

Zaccario came out on the field for the first time after Memphis scored its first touchdown with 12:04 remaining in the first quarter. He booted the PAT and then handled the kickoff. Zaccario scored a season-high 11 points in the contest after hitting two PATs and three field goals from 20, 37 and 40 yards out. He had his second PAT attempt blocked.

VINNY WHO? - PART II

"Vinny...Vinny.." was the chant in the locker room after Zaccario booted the game-winning 25-yard field goal with :02 remaining on the clock at UAB.

Zaccario also hit a 34 yarder in the Memphis 33-30 victory and was 3-for-3 on PATs. He is the first Memphis kicker to start his collegiate career with a perfect 5-for-5 on field goal attempts since Ryan White went 16-for-16 as a freshman in 1998. He was named the C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week following the UAB game.

Zaccario had his streak of perfect FGs snapped when he had his 47-yard attempt blocked and returned for a TD by Louisville. A week later versus East Carolina, Zaccario missed a 40-yard attempt and made a 20 yarder.

Matt Reagan was back on the field kicking field goals and PATs versus USM, but Zaccario continued to handle kickoffs until the UCF-game.

"UN"LUCKY NUMBER 7?

If there is anyone on the Tigers' squad that has seen his share of adversity, it is senior QB Will Hudgens, who ironically enough wears the number 7.

Hudgens, a local standout, came to Memphis in 2004. He sat out that season while rehabilitating a torn ACL in his left knee that he suffered in a dunk contest his senior year. In 2005, Hudgens was listed at backup QB, but was pressed into action in the season opener versus Ole Miss when starter Patrick Byrne broke his leg on Memphis' first drive. Hudgens started the next two games against Chattanooga and Tulsa, but suffered a broken right leg and ligament damage in the Tulsa meeting. He had surgery and missed the rest of the season.

In 2006, Hudgens was poised to make a return to the field. He came in off the bench in the season opener against Ole Miss and in the second game versus Chattanooga. He completed one pass for eight yards against Chattanooga before suffering another broken leg, which was officially ruled a non-displaced tibial fracture. He was able to practice with the team the week of the Marshall game, but did not see game action the remainder of the season. He joined the Tiger baseball team in the spring and had a productive season on the mound for the squad.

In 2007, Hudgens played in 13 games and was truly a utility player for the Tigers, working as a backup QB, a fullback and deep snapper. Hudgens started versus Marshall for Martin Hankins, who was injured, and led the squad to a win with 346 yards on 30-of-45 passing and two touchdowns. Hudgens played baseball for the Tigers again in the spring and was eventually drafted by the Cincinnati Reds. He spent the summer playing in Montana, and was granted the opportunity to return to school to compete in 2008 with the Tiger football team.

And, eight games into the 2008 season, Hudgens was sidelined again with a right knee injury he suffered against East Carolina after he came in for Arkelon Hall, who fractured his thumb. Hudgens was tackled on a three-yard run and did not return to the field. MRI tests showed that Hudgens tore his ACL and MCL, and he recently had surgery to repair the damage.

PEARCE WAS A SEMIFINALIST FOR THE DRADDY TROPHY

Senior OL Brandon Pearce is the fourth Tiger football player in as many years to be named a semifinalist for the 2008 Draddy Trophy as announced by The National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame (NFF). Pearce joins former Tigers Stephen Gostkowski (2005), Rusty Clayton (2006) and Jake Kasser (2007), who were all named semifinalists for the prestigious academic award in their respective senior seasons. Pearce graduated in May 2008 with a degree in English literature and is currently working on his master's degree in the same discipline while completing his final year of eligibility. He tallied a 3.53 grade point average as an undergraduate, and has been listed

on the U of M Dean's List four semesters. Pearce was not selected as one of the 15 finalists for the award, but he was picked recently as a first-team CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree, and landed on the C-USA All-Academic Team.

TIGER GRADS

By the start of the 2008 season, six Tigers had already earned their bachelor's degrees from the University of Memphis. The group of graduates include: Brandon Patterson, Michael Denning, Antonio McCoy, Corey Mills, Brandon Pearce and Philip Beliles. Patterson was Memphis' first football Academic All-American since 1992 when he was selected to the ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America second team in 2007. In addition, Charlie Jones graduated from the Univ. of Miami in May and is working on his master's in physical education at Memphis.

Prior to the bowl game, defensive lineman Freddie Barnett and receiver Carlton Robinzine will add their names to the list of football graduates. Barnett will earn his bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies with a concentration in sport management and African-American studies, and Robinzine will receive his degree in marketing management.

BELILES ON RIMINGTON LIST

Senior Philip Beliles was one of four C-USA centers listed on the Rimington Trophy 2008 Preseason Watch List. Beliles took over the center position in 2007 and started all 13 games for the Tigers. He worked 92 percent of the team's offensive plays and was instrumental in Memphis ranking 13th nationally in passing and 23rd in total offense. Beliles, a Memphis native who prepped at Christian Brothers High School, was part of a Tiger offensive line that ranked 10th nationally and led Conference USA for the fourth-straight year in sack denial, allowing only 14 in 13 games.

Beliles has started all 12 games this season and the Tigers have produced over 400 yards of total offense in 10 of the 12 contests. Beliles has snapped to four different QBs this season as Memphis lost three signal callers in two straight games. In addition, Beliles has snapped to several running backs and receivers this season as Memphis has had to be creative to generate offense. **The Tiger offensive line has also been key in Memphis having a 100-yard rusher in six of the last nine games, including two versus SMU (Steele, 123; Ross 111).**

HUDGENS HAS MAJOR TALENT

Senior Will Hudgens missed last spring of football practice while pitching for the Tiger baseball team. Hudgens was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds in the 23rd round of the 2008 MLB First-Year Player Draft. He spent the summer throwing for the Billings (Mont.) Mustangs. He was 3-0 with the Mustangs, before leaving early to be with the Tigers for fall camp.

Hudgens came in off the sidelines in the first seven games and threw three touchdown passes and rushed for one score. He also had come in as a punter in the pooch punt situation, and averaged 47.6 yards on his seven kicks. Four of his punts have fallen inside the opponent's 10-yard line.

Hudgens came in on Memphis' first drive against East Carolina for Arkelon Hall, who suffered a fracture in his thumb on the first play of the game. Hudgens took six snaps (one on a punt) and left the game with a knee injury. An MRI revealed that Hudgens had torn both his MCL and ACL, and will miss the remainder of the season.

In an interview just prior to the Tulane game,

Hudgens said that he has no regrets about returning to play football, despite the fact that the Reds had informed him after the draft that he could play football, but if he was injured, the contract would be void.

JONES HITS GOAL OF RETURNING TO THE FIELD AFTER CANCER FIGHT

Junior fullback Stacy Jones is an inspiring example of overcoming adversity. He found out in February 2007 that he had a cancerous tumor in his neck and would have to begin treatment. The cancer diagnosis also carried with it a 20-percent survival rate. He was expected to have to undergo treatment until about January 2008. In May, he had 98 percent of the shrinking tumor removed and continued chemotherapy. In August 2007, he received news that he was cancer-free.

A candidate for the FWAA Courage Award last season, Jones reached his personal goal of being back in pads in the spring. He has continued to practice with the team this fall, and has been working with the special teams unit.

MCDONALD & PEARCE ON LOMBARDI LIST

Senior defensive lineman Clinton McDonald and senior offensive lineman Brandon Pearce were both on this season's Lombardi Award watch list. The 39th annual Rotary Lombardi Award, presented by Wachovia, honors the top lineman in the Football Bowl Subdivision. Down lineman on either side of the ball, including tight ends, and linebackers who line up within five yards of the ball are eligible for consideration.

McDonald, a native of Jacksonville, Ark., started all 13 games last season on the defensive front, and played in 43 straight games before missing the East Carolina game with an ankle sprain. He played a couple of downs against USM and did not dress versus SMU. In 10 games in 2008, McDonald totals 35 tackles, a forced fumble and leads the team in sacks with seven for minus 55 yards. He tied a school record with four sacks for minus 32 yards versus Arkansas

State, and still ranks No. 1 nationally for sacks in a game this season.

Pearce, a native Memphian, was named to the All-C-USA Preseason team by league coaches this summer. He was part of an offensive line that led C-USA in fewest sacks allowed in '07 with 14 for the fourth-straight year and ranked 10th nationally, while also paving the way for a Tiger offense that ranked 13th nationally in passing offense and 23rd in total offense. Pearce, who has played in 48 games, has started the last 45 consecutive contests. The Tiger offense has rolled up over 400 yards in 10 of the 12 games this season, and the O-line has been key in Memphis having a 100-yard rusher in six of the last nine games, including two versus SMU (Steele, 123; Ross 111).

REAGAN OPENED '08 ON LOU GROZA LIST

Junior kicker Matt Reagan was again on the preseason Lou Groza Award Watch List. The 30 kickers on the list were chosen based on statistics from the 2007 season and 2008 preseason expectations. Reagan, of Knoxville, Tenn., was twice named the Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Week in 2007. He led the Tigers in scoring with 80 points, and averaged 6.2 points per game. For the year, he hit 15 of his 22 field goal attempts and converted 35 of his 38 PATs. He finished the season ranked fourth in C-USA in field goals made per game and ninth in scoring by kickers.

In just three seasons in a Tiger uniform, Reagan ranks fifth all-time in scoring with 194 points.

In his eight games played in 2008, Reagan is 29-of-30 on PATs and 8-of-11 on field goals. He booted a career-high 44-yard field goal, despite a high snap, in the loss at Marshall. In that game, he also hit from 22 and 25 yards out to mark the third time in his career that he has made three or more FGs in a game. Reagan had his 32-yard attempt against Nicholls State blocked and returned for a touchdown.

Reagan missed four games with a hip flexor, and made a return to the field versus USM. He booted a 43-yard field goal against the Golden Eagles, but snapped a series of 27 consecutive PATs when one of his attempts in the second quarter hit off the upright. Reagan handled PATs and FGs in the USM game, but Vinny Zaccario was still utilized for kickoffs. In the 31-26 win over SMU, Reagan tallied seven points (4 PAT, 1 FG).

TRAGIC ANNIVERSARY

December 12, 2008 will mark the 25th anniversary of one of the most tragic events in Tiger football history. On that date in 1983, head coach Rex Dockery, offensive coordinator Chris Faros, defensive back Charles Greenhill and Highland Hundred member Glenn Jones all were killed in small plane crash. The group was headed to Lawrenceburg, Tenn., for an all-star banquet.

GRIFFIN EARNS A SCHOLARSHIP

Senior Tyler Griffin was presented a scholarship on Aug. 4. The former walkon from Nashville, Tenn., played in 11 games in 2007 primarily as a member of the Tiger special teams unit. He has played in seven games during the 2008 season.

"HEIGHT"ENED EXPECTATIONS

Tiger receivers hold another distinction besides being stacked with talent. The group also stands out in a crowd as some of the tallest of the skill position players. Creating the most havoc for op-

posing DBs is Carlos Singleton who stands at 6-8. Add an extra couple of feet for his outstretched arms and you can clearly understand how he hauled in 11 TD passes and three two-point conversions last season. LaBradford Jackson stands at 6-5, while Maurice Jones, Duke Calhoun and JUCO transfer Steven Joachim all come in at 6-4. Steven Black, Carlos Robinzine and incoming freshman Marcus Rucker are all listed at 6-3.

According to a survey sent out by Mark Cohen at TCU, Singleton ties two other players nationally for the tallest wideout. Josh Chichester of Louisville (who the Tigers faced this year) and Wes Lyons of West Virginia are also 6-8. All of the other players listed between 6-8 and 6-10 are offensive or defensive linemen. The tallest listed in the survey is Army offensive tackle Alejandro Villanueva at 6-10.

TARGET PRACTICE

There has been no shortage of targets for Tiger QBs to pass to again this season, but as of late, there is a shortage of QBs with Memphis losing two signal callers versus ECU, and another one a week later against Southern Miss. The receiving corps is one of the deepest and most talented groups on the squad with such veterans as seniors Maurice Jones, Steven Black, Earnest Williams and Carlos Robinzine and juniors Duke Calhoun and Carlos Singleton.

Through 12 games this season, five receivers total at least 200 yards receiving, and five have hauled in touchdown receptions, including Williams who leads the way with six TD receptions. Williams hauled in two TD catches versus UAB for the first game in his career that he has tallied multiple TD receptions. Calhoun scored his first touchdown of the season off a 10-yard pass by Arkelon Hall versus Nicholls State; and Steven Black scored his first TD on a five-yard pass from Hall in the UAB win.

Singleton leads the way in receptions (50) and yards (759) and is second in scores with five TD catches. Jones totals 490 yards on 33 catches, and Calhoun is also over 400 yards with 448 on 34 receptions.

The Tigers also have a receiving threat in senior tight end Brett Russell, who totals 12 catches for 73 yards so far this season.

Brian Hall and Cam Baker both had their first career receptions in the Louisville game. Hall hauled in a 42-yard reception and ended the game with two catches for 51 yards, while Baker caught a six-yard pass in the loss. Hall tore his PCL in his knee in the UL game, and has not returned to the field while continuing to rehab his knee.

GROWING THE GROUND GAME

The Tigers opened the 2008 campaign with only one running back who had logged a carry in a Tiger uniform. Junior T.J. Pitts played a reserve role the last two seasons and was second on the team in 2007 with 481 yards and one touchdown on 106 carries. He left the New Orleans Bowl with a broken ankle and was unable to practice with the team in the spring. Pitts did not practice during fall camp, and has not played any games this season while continuing to gain stability in his ankle.

Curtis Steele, who transferred from Northwest Mississippi CC and redshirted last fall, currently leads the squad with 1,175 yards on 206 carries, and logged his first 100-yard game against Nicholls State. In that meeting, he totaled 109 yards on 20 attempts. He returned one week later to bust off a career-high 203 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries versus Arkansas State. Steele made it three in a row with his 101-yard effort versus UAB. Steele was instrumental in Memphis beating Southern Miss



as he totaled 178 yards on 29 carries and scored twice from the run for the first time this season. Steele was named the C-USA Offensive Player of the Week following the USM victory. Steele logged his fifth 100-yard game with 123 yards on 19 carries at SMU; and closed out the regular season with 135 yards on 23 carries versus Tulane.

Early on, Steele was splitting time with University of Miami transfer Charlie Jones before Jones suffered a high ankle sprain against ASU. He graduated from Miami in May and is working on his graduate studies in physical education at Memphis. With the Hurricanes, he played in 28 games and totaled 713 yards and 10 touchdowns on 190 carries.

Jones scored two touchdowns against Rice, Nicholls State and Arkansas State, and totals 254 yards on 51 carries. He missed three games with his injury and returned to the field in the Southern Miss win. He did not log a carry in that meeting, but did see action on special teams. He reinjured his ankle on a special teams play at SMU, but returned to the field and had two carries against UCF. A week later against Tulane, he fought for 45 yards on eight carries.

With the injury to Jones, true freshman running back Brandon Ross found himself No. 2 on the depth chart. Ross, who was expected to red-shirt this season, saw his first game action versus UAB. In seven games this season, he totals 285 yards on 51 carries. He also caught a 10-yard pass in the Louisville game. Ross rolled off 111 yards on 22 carries and scored his first career TD in the win over SMU. He and Steele became the first 100-yard rushing duo since 2005.

DEFENSE UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

Tommy West brought back a familiar face to the Tiger defense when Tim Walton was hired as the defensive coordinator in January. Walton was the defensive backs coach at Memphis when West was the DC in 2000 and stayed along in the same capacity in 2001 when West took over as head coach. The 14-year coaching veteran left Memphis for Syracuse in 2002, and coached DBs at LSU during their BCS Championship run in 2003. Walton spent four years (2004-07) at Miami and was promoted to defensive coordinator for the Hurricanes in 2007.

Another new face on the field this year was Lytrel Pollard, who joined the squad from C-USA rival Southern Miss to coach Tiger corners. A standout linebacker for the Golden Eagles from 1994-97, Pollard spent the previous nine seasons working with the USM defense.

TOP LINEBACKERS BACK IN THE LINEUP

The position that was hardest hit last season by injuries was linebacker. The Tiger defense lost the services of starters Greg Jackson and Winston Bowens early on and had to keep altering the lineup. The only linebacker to start all 13 games was senior Jake Kasser. Jackson returned in 2008 as a junior after missing all but two games in '07. He injured his knee against Jacksonville State, and then was joined on the sidelines by Bowens following the Rice meeting in which he injured his knee as well.

Bowens started the first seven games of the season, but played sparingly versus ECU because of a knee injury. Heading into the bowl game, Bowens ranks fifth on the team in tackles with 50, including 5.5 TFL for minus 18 yards. He did not see defensive action in the win over SMU, but that was due primarily to Memphis utilizing six and seven DBs for much of the game.

Jackson started the first two games, but

missed three games for a violation of team rules. He returned to the field for the UAB contest, and tallied five tackles against the Blazers. He was back in the starting lineup versus Louisville and tallied four tackles and a QB hurry. Jackson led the Tigers in tackles in the loss at ECU with 11 stops, including 2.5 TFL for minus four yards. He has started the last six straight games and ranks sixth behind Bowens in tackles with 46 stops. Jackson leads the team in TFL with 9.5 for minus 37 yards. He logged his first career interception in the fourth quarter against Tulane and made a 20-yard return. The Tigers scored on their next drive as a result of the miscue.

GRANDBERRY HOLDS RETURN RECORD

Michael Grandberry started returning kickoffs full time in 2006, and through 46 career games (30 of which include at least one KO return), holds the school record with 2,371 yards on 110 returns. He also holds the Tiger record for 100-yard KO return games with nine after logging a 121-yard effort against Rice. Grandberry is the only Tiger in school history to hit the 2,000-yard milestone for kickoff returns.

Grandberry has not returned a kick in the last two game against UCF and Tulane.

CALHOUN BY THE QUARTER

Receiver Duke Calhoun is poised to be a premier receiver for the Tigers and has already shown that he can be a go-to guy. The quarter-by-quarter breakdown includes games in 2006, 2007 and 2008.

FOUR TIGERS WITH 80 CAREER CATCHES

Four current Tigers have registered 80 or more receptions in their careers and all four rank in the Top 15 in school history in that category. Duke Calhoun has tallied 2,019 yards on 138 receptions and Carlos Singleton boasts 1,826 yards on 123 receptions. He is followed by Earnest Williams who has registered 104 receptions for 1,061 yards. Maurice Jones totals 95 receptions for 1,356 yards.

While Calhoun ranks third all-time in receiving yards, Singleton, Jones and Williams are now all ranked in the Tiger Top 20. Singleton is 4th while Jones is 11th and Williams is 19th.

WHERE'S WEAVER???

One Tiger defender had been involved in his own version of "Where's Waldo" this season. Defensive lineman-turned-linebacker-turned safety Josh Weaver has been all over the map since stepping on the field as a true freshman in 2006. Weaver made 12 starts on the defensive line last season as a sophomore, and was set to make the transition to linebacker in the spring before a shoulder surgery for a torn labrum sidelined him for the spring session. He was cleared to practice during the last week of fall camp and on his first day back was shifted to safety.

Weaver appeared to settle in at safety, having even changed his number from 90 to 9. He played in the secondary in the first two games and started at linebacker against Marshall, Nicholls State, UAB and ECU. Through 12 games, Weaver totals 23 tackles and has primarily played linebacker this season.

Weaver came up with a huge interception in the fourth quarter of Memphis' win over Southern Miss. With the Tigers up 29-24, UM quarterback

Brett Toney was picked off in the endzone and USM got the ball back with just over two minutes remaining in the game. On 3rd-and-7, Weaver picked off Austin Davis at the USM 38 and made a 16-yard return. His return set up the Tigers on the USM 22 and Curtis Steele scored on the next play and put the Tigers up 36-24 with just over a minute left. That score proved to be critical as USM used the remaining 1:19 to drive 78 yards down the field for a TD, but Memphis won, 36-30.

KICKING IT

Prior to his injury, which sidelined the junior kicker four games, Matt Reagan had been making his way up the charts for the Tigers. He returned to the field for PATs and FGs against Southern Miss, and now leads the team in scoring this season with 53 points (29 PAT, 8 FG). He currently ranks fifth all-time at Memphis in scoring by a kicker with 194 total points. He is 29-of-30 on PATs in 2008, and hit 27 consecutive before his third attempt in the USM game bounced off the upright. He ranks fourth in career PATs made (89) and fourth in PATs attempted (94).

Currently 8-of-11 on field goals this season, Reagan had a 32-yard attempt blocked and returned for a TD by Nicholls State. He logged a career-high 44-yard make a week earlier versus Marshall and capped his second 40-yard make of the season with a 43 yarder vs USM. Reagan ranks tied for fifth in the record book in FGs made with 35 and his success rate of 70.0 percent is good for fifth all-time.

WEST SECOND IN WINS AT MEMPHIS

Since Tommy West took over the Memphis program in 2001, the Tigers have made positive strides, and those can be seen in the numbers. West is the third-winningest coach in Memphis history with 47 wins.

West, who is only the fourth coach at Memphis to coach at least eight seasons (entered eighth year in 2008), has the second-most wins of any Tiger coach in his first eight seasons with the win over Tulane. The following chart shows the winningest Memphis coaches in their first eight years:

2008 GAME HIGHLIGHTS

STEELE TAKES OVER AT NO. 4

On his third carry of the Tulane game, Curtis Steele moved up to No. 4 in single-season yardage. He came into the game with 1,040 yards and needed just 20 yards to surpass Gerard Arnold, who rushed for 1,059 yards during the 1998 season. Steele took the direct snap on the game's first play for the Tigers and rushed for six yards. He tallied seven yards and 14 yards on his next two carries to take over the No. 4 spot. He is behind DeAngelo Williams, who holds the top 3 spots with his yardage in 2003, 2004 and 2005.



TIGERS SCORE SIX TIMES FROM THE RUN

Memphis scored six rushing touchdowns in the Tulane game, which ties for third all-time in the program's history. The U of M record is seven rushing touchdowns against North Texas State in 1971 and The Citadel in 1962. The last time the Tigers have had six rushing touchdowns came in 1972 against Wichita State and Tulsa.

JONES RUSHES FOR SCORE VS WAVE

Receiver Maurice Jones took the direct snap and rushed 13 yards for a touchdown to put Memphis up 7-0 with 8:51 remaining in the first quarter against Tulane. Jones was originally called down at the 1, but upon review, the play was reversed and deemed a touchdown. It was Jones' first career rushing touchdown and a career-best run for the senior. Jones became the eight different Tiger to rush for a TD this season.

PATTERSON AND BROWN TEAM UP FOR TURNOVER

Senior Brandon Patterson scooped up a Tulane fumble on the Wave's third drive of the game for his second fumble recovery of the season. The fumble was caused by Jada Brown. The Tigers scored as a result of the turnover to go up, 14-0.

GRANDBERRY AND JACKSON GET PICKS

Michael Grandberry picked off Tulane's Kevin Moore with 2:24 left in the first quarter for his second interception of the season. The Tigers scored off that turnover on the first play of the second quarter.

Later in the fourth quarter, Greg Jackson recorded his first career interception and returned it 20 yards to the 50 yard line. The Tigers went on to score on the ensuing drive.

Against Tulane, the Tigers scored on each of the three drives following the fumble recovery and two interceptions.

BLACK HAS CAREER DAY VS TULANE

Early in the second quarter against Tulane, receiver Steven Black took the direct snap and rolled off 36 yards into the end zone for the second straight game he has scored from the run. The TD put Memphis up 21-0 with 14:54 remaining in the second quarter. Black had scored the week before against UCF on a three-yard run. The 36 yards was a career-long run for the senior.

Black rushed for his second touchdown of the game when he took the snap and rushed two yards for a score to give Memphis the 28-0 advantage with 2:50 remaining in the second quarter. It was Black's first multiple-TD game of his career. He then scored for the third time, again on the direct snap, off a one-yard run with just under a minute remaining in the third quarter. He is the first Tiger to rush for three TDs since Joseph Doss did so against UTEP in 2006.

TIGERS GO UP 28-0 AT HALF VS WAVE

Memphis scored 28 points in the first half against Tulane, marking the most points by the Tigers this season in any half. The Tigers also held the Green Wave scoreless, marking the first time that Memphis had shut out its opponent in the first half since October 22, 2005, versus East Carolina. Memphis was leading 17-0, and won that game 27-24.

BLOCK THAT KICK

Greg Terrell blocked a 21-yard field goal attempt

by Tulane's Ross Thevenot with 6:13 remaining in the second quarter. It was the first blocked field goal for the Tigers this season. Memphis' last FG block was against Ole Miss last season. Terrell was the Tiger who blocked that attempt in '07.

RUSHING FOR 200+ IN A HALF

The Tigers rushed for 207 yards on 30 carries in the first half against Tulane, marking the first time since versus Akron in the 2005 Motor City Bowl that Memphis had rushed for 200-plus yards in a half. In that post-season game, the Tigers rushed for 252 in the second half.

STEELE LOGS SIXTH 100-YARD GAME

Curtis Steele rushed for 135 yards on 23 carries against Tulane for his sixth 100-yard rushing game of the season. He is tied for fourth all-time in 100-yard rushing games in a single season with Gerard Arnold who tallied six in 1998. Steele is also tied for fourth in career 100-yard games with Paul Gowen and Larry Porter.

JONES EXTENDS RECEIVING STREAK

Maurice Jones tallied four receptions for 49 yards in the Tulane contest to extend his receiving streak to 17 games. He holds the second-longest active receiving streak on the team. He is behind Duke Calhoun who extended his streak to 36 games with a catch late in the third quarter.

BACK IN THE LINEUP

Junior Arkelon Hall started the UCF game at quarterback. He had missed the previous two games with a broken thumb he suffered in the first drive of the East Carolina game (Oct. 18). Also making starts against the Knights were running back Curtis Steele and defensive lineman Clinton McDonald, who were both questionable for the game. Steele left the SMU game late with a hamstring injury, and McDonald had missed three games with an ankle sprain.

EARLY MISCUES PROVE COSTLY

The Tigers spotted UCF two touchdowns early in the first quarter and that proved to be costly in the 28-21 loss to the Knights. On Memphis' second series of the game, QB Arkelon Hall set up for the pooch punt, but the ball didn't get high enough off the ground and hit a UCF defender in the facemask. Hall recovered the ball at the Memphis 30 and UCF scored four plays later. On the drive following that score, Memphis was on their own 37 on 2nd-and-7 when Hall fumbled the exchange to Charlie Jones and UCF's Derrick Hallman scooped up the ball and raced 26 yards for a TD to give the Knights a 14-0 advantage with 6:50 remaining in the first quarter.

CALHOUN HAULS IN 54-YARD TD

Duke Calhoun hauled in a 54-yard touchdown pass from Arkelon Hall with 5:40 remaining in the first quarter against UCF. It was a career-long pass for Hall and a season-high catch for Calhoun. Hall previously tossed a 53-yard pass to Maurice Jones versus Marshall. This was Hall's 11th passing TD this season; and Calhoun's second TD reception this year.

STEELE SCORES IN LAST FIVE STRAIGHT

Curtis Steele rushed two yards for a touchdown with 4:52 remaining in the third quarter against UCF to cut the deficit to 28-14. It was Steele's sixth rushing touchdown of the season. With his rushing TD versus Tulane, Steele has now scored in the last five straight games, and leads the way in scoring (by a non-kicker) with 42 points.

UCF DEFENSE LIMITS TIGER OFFENSE

The UCF Knights, ranked second in C-USA in total defense, held Memphis to 305 yards of offense, marking only the second time this season, the Tigers logged less than 400 yards of total offense. The Tigers logged just 184 yards in the loss to East Carolina - a game that Memphis lost two quarterbacks in the first quarter.

BLACK RUSHES FOR SCORE VS UCF

Steven Black rushed three yards for a touchdown off a direct snap to cut the deficit to seven points (28-21) with 8:24 remaining in the UCF game. It was Black's first career rushing touchdown and his third touchdown of the season.

Black returned a week later against Tulane and became the first Tiger to rush for three TDs since 2006. He scored from runs of 1, 2 and 36 yards.

JACKSON LOGS FUMBLE RECOVERY

Linebacker Greg Jackson gave the Tigers a chance to at least take the UCF Knights to overtime when he logged his first career fumble recovery with 2:21 left in the game. Jackson's recovery came immediately following an interception thrown by Arkelon Hall, which was picked off and returned 42 yards by Joe Burnett to the Memphis 21.

Down 28-21 with just over two minutes remaining in the game, Jackson recovered the fumble at the Memphis 21. Hall pushed the Tigers across midfield, but tossed four straight incompletions as the Tigers turned the ball over on downs at the UCF 44.

Against the Knights, Jackson also totaled 2.5 sacks for minus 22 yards.

DEFENSE LIMITS UCF KNIGHTS

The Memphis defense allowed only 194 yards of total offense to UCF, which marks the second lowest total of the season. The Tigers allowed just 164 yards of offense to Nicholls State in a 31-10 victory on September 20.

The Tiger defense limited UCF to 42 yards and one touchdown in the second half, but spotting the Knights 14 points in the first quarter proved costly in the 28-21 loss. The Tigers made 11 tackles for loss in the game for a total of 41 yards and had three sacks for a loss of 24 yards. Four U of M defenders had multiple TFL in the contest.

TIGERS SILENCE UCF'S BURNETT

UCF's Joe Burnett came into the game ranked second nationally in kickoff returns and ninth in punt returns. In fact, he is the only player in the nation to rank in the top 10 in both categories. The Tiger coaching staff put in a plan to not give Burnett the chance to burn the Tigers as he has other opponents with his five career special teams TDs. The plan was executed well as Burnett had zero punt return yards and just 61 yards on three kickoff returns. In fact, of Brent Sutherland's six punts, four were dropped inside the 20, and only one was returned for 14 yards.

JONES STARTED AT QB VERSUS SMU

Senior receiver Maurice Jones technically started the SMU game at quarterback. Brett Toney lined up at receiver for the first play and Jones' first play as signal caller was a hand off to Curtis Steele for a 35-yard gain. Jones took a few snaps at QB in the game, but did not attempt any passes.

A similar situation occurred against Tulane as Arkelon Hall was in the game, but lined up on the far side as a receiver. Running back Curtis Steele took the direct snap on the first play of the game and rushed for six yards.



TIGERS OPEN WITH 14 POINTS...AGAIN

For the second straight game, the Tigers opened with the first 14 points of the contest with rushing TDs by Curtis Steele and Brandon Ross against SMU. The Tigers put the first points on the board with a two-yard run by Curtis Steele with 8:31 remaining in the first quarter. It was Steele's fifth rushing TD of the season, and he has scored from the run in the last five straight games.

Brandon Ross then scored his first touchdown of the season on a 10-yard run to give Memphis a 14-0 advantage with 2:22 remaining in the first quarter. Ross is the sixth Tiger this season to score from the run.

In the previous game against Southern Miss, Memphis scored the first TD off a 14-yard pass from Brett Toney to Carlos Singleton with 11:52 left in the first quarter. The Tigers took the 14-0 advantage with 8:08 remaining in the first with an 11-yard run by Tyler Bass.

STEELE HAS BIG DAY VS MUSTANGS

Curtis Steele logged his 100th yard in the SMU game on an eight-yard carry in the second quarter with just over three minutes left. He finished the game with 123 yards on 19 carries for his fifth game over 100 yards this season; and the fifth in seven games. Steele became the fourth Tiger in school history to amass 1,000 yards in a single season on his first rush of the second half for a four-yard gain. He is the first to do so since DeAngelo Williams in 2005. Williams logged three straight 1000-yard seasons (2003-05); Gerard Arnold logged 1,059 yards in 1998; and Dave Casinelli tallied 1,016 yards in 1963.

Steele left the SMU game in the third quarter with a hamstring injury.

BLACK SCORES VS SMU WITH FAMILY ON THE SIDELINES

Steven Black caught a four-yard touchdown pass from Brett Toney to put Memphis up 21-13 with 6:51 remaining in the third quarter against SMU. It was the second TD reception of season for Black, and the third of his career. The TD pass was the second of his career for Toney. Black's cousin, Dallas Cowboys receiver Terrell Owens, was in attendance on the Memphis sidelines for the game.

ROSS HITS 100 FOR FIRST TIME

True freshman Brandon Ross tallied a career-high 22 carries for 111 yards in the win over SMU. It was his first career 100-yard rushing game. His previous best in yardage was 46 yards versus UAB. His previous high carries were six versus both UAB and East Carolina.

TWO BACKS HIT CENTURY MARK FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2005

Curtis Steele tallied 19 carries for 123 yards and Brandon Ross had 22 carries for 111 yards as Memphis had two 100-yard rushers in a single game for the first time since 2005 when DeAngelo Williams (198) and Maurice Avery (105) did so against Houston.

As a team, the Tigers amassed 306 yards rushing in the SMU victory to mark the second straight game over 200 yards. Memphis also rushed for more than 200 yards in consecutive games against Nicholls State and Arkansas State earlier in the year.

The 306 yards rushing is the most since Memphis had 351 against Akron in the 2005 Motor City Bowl. The Tigers set a new season-high with 379 yards rushing against Tulane.

TONY TOSSES MULTIPLE TDs

Against SMU, Brett Toney threw a four-yard

touchdown pass to Steven Black in the third quarter and tossed an 18-yard TD pass to Carlos Singleton in the fourth quarter for his first career game of multiple TDs. He totals three TD passes for the season.

DEFENSE LIMITS MUSTANG GROUND GAME

The Memphis defense held SMU to 38 yards rushing on 16 carries. In fact, the Mustangs had rushed for minus six yards on 10 carries through the first three quarters. This was the lowest rushing total for a Memphis opponent since the Tigers held UTEP to five yards in 2006.

SMU had 29 yards on losses from the run, with 23 of the yards coming on an errant snap over the QB's head.

STEELE NAMED PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Running back Curtis Steele became the third Tiger named a C-USA Player of the Week when he earned the honor following the Southern Miss game. Steele rushed for a career-high two touchdowns with 178 yards on 29 carries in a 36-30 victory over USM. Both of his touchdowns came in the fourth quarter to help secure the Tigers' six-point lead, including an eventual game-winning touchdown carry for 22 yards with 1:24 left in the game. Steele amassed 237 all-purpose yards in the contest, which ranks tied for 12th all-time at Memphis and is the most since the DeAngelo Williams era ended in 2005.

The Franklin, Tenn., native also amassed 59 yards receiving on a hook-and-ladder play in the first quarter that led to a Memphis touchdown and a 14-0 lead for the Tigers to start the game.

TONY MAKES FIRST START UNDER CENTER

Junior Brett Toney started at quarterback against Southern Miss, marking the first start of his career. Toney has lettered the last two seasons as a holder for the special teams unit. He was called to action against East Carolina when Arkelon Hall (thumb) and Will Hudgens (knee) were both injured in the first quarter. Toney threw his first career touchdown pass when he reached Carlos Singleton on a 14-yard fade pass into the corner of the endzone with 11:52 remaining in the first quarter. Toney and true freshman Tyler Bass rotated series most of the evening before Bass left due to injury, and Toney finished the game having completed 8 of 16 pass attempts for 125 yards.

In the three games that Toney worked as the Tigers' primary signal caller (vs. ECU, USM and SMU), he completed 28 of 50 pass attempts for 320 yards and three TDs.

REAGAN BACK IN ACTION VERSUS USM

Kicker Matt Reagan was back in action for the first time in four games when he kicked the PAT following Memphis' first touchdown in the USM game. Reagan had missed the UAB, Louisville and East Carolina games with a hip flexor. Vinny Zaccario was still utilized for kickoffs in the game.

Reagan booted a 43-yard field goal with 58 seconds remaining in the third quarter to give Memphis the 23-17 advantage. It was Reagan's second make over 40 yards this season as he hit a career-high 44 yarder against Marshall. He also had a string of 25 consecutive PATs made coming into the USM game. He hit two early in the game before his third attempt bounced off the upright, snapping his streak at 27.

Reagan scored seven points off four PATs and a 24-yard field goal in the 31-26 win over SMU.

BASS SHOWS PROMISE BEFORE INJURY

True freshman Tyler Bass came in at quarterback on Memphis' second offensive series against USM. He was in on a big "Hook-and-Ladder" play where he completed a pass to receiver Earnest Williams, who then pitched the ball to running back Curtis Steele who ran 59 yards to the USM 11. Officially on the game stats, Williams is credited with a catch for minus four yards, and Steele is credited with 0 receptions for 59 yards. On the next play, Bass rushed the endzone for his first career touchdown with 8:08 remaining in the first quarter.

Bass then tossed his first touchdown pass when he reached Carlos Singleton with a three-yard strike with 2:48 remaining in the second quarter.

Bass left the game late in the third quarter with a knee injury (ACL) following a six-yard run. He finished the game having completed 9 of 10 pass attempts for 107 yards and one touchdown. He also had 10 rush attempts for 51 yards and one score.

SINGLETON HAS MULTIPLE TD CATCHES

Against USM, junior receiver Carlos Singleton caught a 14-yard TD pass from Brett Toney in the first quarter and a three-yard TD pass from Tyler Bass for the first game this season that Singleton has caught multiple TD passes, and the fourth career game he has done so.

RUN GAME POWERS WIN OVER USM

For the sixth time this season, the Tigers have rushed for more than 150 yards with 285 yards on 51 carries versus Southern Miss. Many players helped power the rushing game as Memphis had eight different players with rushing attempts. Curtis Steele led the way with 178 yards and two touchdowns on 29 carries.

One game later versus SMU, the Tigers' ground attack accounted for 306 yards on 55 total carries. Steele and true freshman Brandon Ross teamed up for 234 yards and two scores.

The squad surpassed the 300-yard mark again in the last game of the season with 379 yards on 66 carries versus Tulane.

STEELE OVER 100 FOR FOURTH TIME

Curtis Steele logged his fourth career game with 100 yards rushing with 178 yards on 29 carries in the USM contest. His 178 yards was the second-highest rushing total of his career. He scored his third touchdown this season off a 10-yard run with 10:42 remaining in the game after receiving the direct snap. He attempted a pass for the two-point conversion and was picked off for Memphis to lead, 29-24. He then logged his fourth touchdown of the season on a 22-yard run with 1:24 remaining in the fourth quarter. The multiple touchdown game was the first of his career.

Steele hit the 100-yard mark again with 123 yards on 19 carries before leaving the SMU game early with a pulled hamstring. He closed out the regular season with his sixth 100-yard effort with 135 yards on 23 carries against Tulane.

WEAVER COMES UP WITH KEY INTERCEPTION

Linebacker Josh Weaver came up with a huge interception in the fourth quarter of Memphis' win over Southern Miss. With the Tigers up 29-24, UM quarterback Brett Toney was picked off in the endzone and USM got the ball back with just over two minutes remaining in the game. On 3rd-and-7, Weaver picked off Austin Davis at the USM 38 and made a 16-yard return. His return set up the Tigers on the USM 22 and Curtis Steele scored on the next play and put the Tigers up 36-24 with just



over a minute left. That score proved to be critical as USM used the remaining 1:19 to drive 78 yards down the field for a TD, but Memphis won, 36-30.

TROTTER STARTS VERSUS EAST CAROLINA

True freshman defensive lineman Frank Trotter got his first start on the line against ECU. He replaced senior Clinton McDonald who suffered an ankle sprain in the Louisville game. Trotter is the first true freshman to start on either side of the ball this season. He started three-straight games before McDonald rejoined the line in the UCF contest.

Junior Greg Terrell also started for the first time this season in the defensive front versus ECU. He replaced Corey Mills who was struggling with a groin injury. Terrell has started 21 career games for the Tigers.

STARR SNAGS FUMBLE RECOVERY

Alton Starr registered his first career fumble recovery when he scooped up the muffed punt return by ECU's J.J. Millbrook. The recovery gave Memphis prime field position on the ECU 7 and resulted in a touchdown on Memphis' next drive.

STEELE SCORES SECOND TD

Junior running back Curtis Steele scored his second career rushing touchdown when he made a four-yard run late in the first quarter to give Memphis a 7-0 advantage over ECU despite losing two quarterbacks in the first quarter.

Steele is now up to a team-high seven TDs after scoring two versus USM and one against SMU, UCF and Tulane.

GRIFFIN AND LAWSON TEAM UP ON ECU

Junior D.A. Griffin registered his first fumble recovery in the second quarter against East Carolina when Lester Lawson knocked the ball loose from Norman Whitley's hands on a rush attempt. The Tigers recovered the ball at the ECU 18. Memphis missed the 40-yard field goal attempt on the ensuing drive.

SINGLETON'S STREAK SNAPPED

Carlos Singleton entered the East Carolina game with a 28-game active receiving streak, which continues to rank second all-time behind Duke Calhoun. His streak was snapped in the ECU game that saw the services of four different Tiger QBs.

DEFENSE COMES TOGETHER VERSUS LOUISVILLE

While a quick glance at the score may lead people to believe the Tiger defense must have been no match for Louisville, which came into the game ranked 25th nationally in total offense and averaging well over 400 yards, that certainly was not the case.

The Cardinal offense only managed 14 points, all in the second quarter, off passes of 23 and 43 yards. The Tiger defense also only gave up three third down conversions in UL's 13 tries. For the game, Louisville was held to 13 first downs, 166 yards rushing and 133 yards passing. In fact, the Tigers held UL quarterback Hunter Cantwell to under 25 yards passing in all but the second quarter when he was 6-of-10 for 98 yards and two TDs.

The Cardinals did; however, take advantage of Memphis' miscues and scored 21 points off two special teams plays and a fumble recovery. Early in the second quarter, Trent Guy made a 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, and then with time expiring at the end of the second, UL blocked a 47-yard field goal attempt and Brandon Heath retrieved

the ball and made the 60-yard return for a score. With 12 minutes remaining in the game, Louisville sealed the win with a 21-yard fumble recovery for a TD by Johnny Patrick.

TIGERS HURT BY SPECIAL TEAMS PLAY

While the Tiger defense held Louisville to just two touchdowns, the U of M special teams unit gave up two touchdowns in the 35-28 loss -- one off a kickoff return and one off a blocked field goal. The last time that the Tigers' special teams unit allowed two touchdowns in a single game was in 1988 when Ole Miss blocked two punts and scored on both.

Following Maurice Jones' touchdown pass to Arkelon Hall in the second quarter, Louisville took the ensuing kickoff 95 yards for a touchdown to quickly knot the score, 14-14. It was the first time since versus USF in 2003 that Memphis had given up a kickoff return for a score. USF made a 96-yard return for the touchdown in that game.

At the end of the second quarter, Louisville blocked Vinny Zaccario's 47-yard field goal attempt and made a 60-yard return for a touchdown. This is the second time this season that Memphis has had a FG blocked and returned for a touchdown. The last time was on a 32-yard attempt by Matt Reagan in the Nicholls State contest. The last time that Memphis had two field goal attempts blocked in a single season was in 1997, and neither of those was returned.

11 TIGERS CATCH PASSES VS CARDS

For the first time since the 2006 season, 11 different players caught passes against Louisville, including quarterback Arkelon Hall who hauled in a one-yard touchdown pass from Maurice Jones. In addition, three Tigers, Brian Hall, Brandon Ross and Cam Baker, had their first career receptions in the contest. Carlton Robinzine led the way with six receptions, while Carlos Singleton, Earnest Williams and Duke Calhoun all logged five catches.

In 2006 versus Chattanooga, 12 different Tigers logged at least one reception.

FIRST FUMBLE FOR A TIGER BACK

Running back Curtis Steele fumbled the ball on 2nd-and-8 from the Louisville 28, marking the first fumble this season for a Memphis back. Memphis had only turned the ball over on fumble once this season and that was by QB Arkelon Hall. Up until this point, Tiger running backs had carried the ball 159 times and had not lost the ball on a fumble. The turnover did not prove to be costly as Louisville QB Hunter Cantwell tossed an interception on the very next play. Memphis entered the Louisville game tied for second nationally in fumbles lost with just one.

Through 12 games, Memphis backs still have only given up one fumble. For the year, Memphis has lost five fumbles with three by QB Arkelon Hall and one by QB Brett Toney.

LAMAR GETS PICK VERSUS CARDS

Cornerback Deante' Lamar came up with a big turnover for the Tigers when he came up with an interception immediately following a Memphis fumble in the first quarter. Lamar picked off Hunter Cantwell at the Louisville 27 and made a four-yard return. The Tigers scored as a result of the turnover to go up 7-0 with just over five minutes remaining in the first.

JONES TOSSES FIRST TD

Maurice Jones tossed his first touchdown pass of the year when he took the lateral from Arkelon

Hall and then threw the one-yard touchdown pass to Hall in the corner of the end zone to give Memphis a 14-7 lead over Louisville with 7:50 remaining in the second quarter. It was Jones' third career completion; his first of the season. He is 3-of-6 passing during his four-year career. Jones also had three receptions for 24 yards in the game.

BRIAN HALL NETS FIRST RECEPTION

Junior Brian Hall logged a 42-yard reception at the start of the third quarter versus Louisville. The reception was the first of his career, and led to a Tiger touchdown two plays later. Hall finished the game with two catches for 51 yards. He has missed the last five games with a sprained PCL that he suffered in the Louisville game.

WILLIAMS TAKE LEAD IN TD CATCHES

Earnest Williams caught a seven-yard touchdown pass against Louisville to pull Memphis within seven, 28-21, with 12:59 remaining in the third quarter. It was Williams' 14th career touchdown reception; his sixth this season. Williams currently leads the Tiger receivers in touchdown receptions with six, and is tied for second on the team lead in TD scoring with Charlie Jones and Steven Black with 36 points.

BAKER HAULS IN FIRST RECEPTION

Redshirt freshman Cam Baker caught his first pass this season when he hauled in the six-yard offering from Arkelon Hall in the third quarter against Louisville. Baker, a native of Osceola, Ark., has played in seven games this season. He logged his second career catch in the UCF game for a 10-yard gain.

HALL FUMBLE PROVES COSTLY IN LOSS TO CARDINALS

QB Arkelon Hall fumbled the ball after being sacked at the Memphis 21 and Louisville's Johnny Patrick made the 21-yard return for the touchdown to put Louisville up 35-28 with 12 minutes remaining in the game. The last team to return a fumble for a TD against Memphis was Arkansas State in 2004. The two fumbles lost in the Louisville game were the first multiple fumble contest for the Tigers since the U of M lost two fumbles against Tulsa in 2005.

STARR LEADS DEFENSE VS CARDS

Alton Starr logged a career best 14 tackles against Louisville with nine solo stops in a start at strong safety. He led the defense in holding Louisville to 299 total yards offense, marking the second time this season the Tiger defense has held its opponent to under 300 yards. Two of Starr's tackles came on third down with one resulting in a punt and the other in a missed field goal. Eleven of his 14 tackles held Louisville to under 10 yards and four were gains of three yards or less.

Starr has made 67 tackles in the last eight games. He leads the team in total tackles with 86, and has logged eight or more stops in five of the last eight games.

ONARHEIM START VERSUS UAB

Sophomore Deven Onarheim made his first start of the season; the second of his career, when the Tigers opened the UAB game with two tight ends. His last start was in the 2007 regular season finale versus SMU. Onarheim also made a start in the Nov. 8 game against SMU.

WILLIAMS SCORES TWICE VS BLAZERS

Earnest Williams caught his fourth touchdown pass of the season on a 30-yard toss from Arkelon Hall with 14:28 remaining in the second quarter versus



UAB. The 30-yard reception was a season high for Williams. He scored his second touchdown of the night on a 20-yard pass from Arkelon Hall with 8:31 remaining in the second quarter. It was the first time in his career that he has registered two touchdown receptions in a single game. Williams had scored two TDs in a game before, logging a TD reception and a TD run versus Tulane last season. Williams finished the game with a season-high 66 yards on four catches. He currently leads Memphis receivers in TD catches with six after hauling in a seven-yard TD strike versus Louisville.

NO REDSHIRT FOR ROSS

True freshman running back Brandon Ross saw his first game action in the UAB contest. His first carry was for eight yards in the second quarter. Ross, who was originally expected to redshirt this season, was in for senior Charlie Jones who sprained his ankle versus Arkansas State. Ross is from Tuskegee, Ala., and prepped at Auburn HS. He finished the game with six carries for 46 yards.

Ross tallied three carries for 28 yards and also had a 10-yard reception versus Louisville, and a week later totaled 30 yards on six runs versus ECU. Ross was one of eight Tigers to register a carry against Southern Miss, tallying 11 yards on two runs.

He became the first true freshman since DeAngelo Williams in 2002 to roll off 100 yards rushing with his 111 yards on 22 carries against SMU.

In his seven games on the field, Ross totals 285 yards on just 51 carries for an average of 5.6 yards per carry.

NOT THAT HALL...

Most passes this season have come from Arkelon Hall, but in the UAB game, another Hall completed a pass. Junior receiver Brian Hall completed his first pass on the year after hitting Carlos Singleton for a 35-yard gain to the UAB 3. The Tigers scored on the drive for their first lead of the game.

One game later, Brian Hall registered his first career pass reception - a 42 yarder - against Louisville.

SINGLETON HITS 100 AGAIN

Carlos Singleton registered five catches for 123 yards and a score in the UAB game for the fourth game of his career over the century mark. It was his second game this season over 100 yards as he logged 11 receptions for 158 yards versus Marshall. Singleton is now ranked fourth all-time at Memphis in career receiving yards with 1,826 yards. He surpassed Ryan Scott and Isaac Bruce during the UAB game.

Singleton also caught his first touchdown pass of the season; his 15th career TD reception, on a 15-yard pass from Arkelon Hall to give Memphis the 27-23 advantage with 4:15 remaining in the third quarter. Singleton led the Tigers in touchdown receptions last season with 11.

Singleton added his second TD of the season with a 10-yard score in the Louisville loss, and totaled two TD receptions versus Southern Miss. His 18-yard TD catch against SMU put him in a tie for the school record with former Tiger Tavares Gideon for career TD receptions with 19.

BLACK SCORES FIRST TD OF THE SEASON

Steven Black scored his first touchdown of the season against UAB when he took the five-yard

pass from Arkelon Hall to the endzone to give Memphis their first lead of the game, 20-16, with 31 seconds remaining in the second quarter. Black totals three receiving TDs and 740 yards on 74 career catches.

Black tallied his first career rushing TD against UCF on a three-yard scamper in the fourth quarter. He had a stellar showing in the Tulane game a week later, rushing for three scores off runs of 1, 2 and 36 yards. He is the first Tiger since Joe Doss in 2006 to rush for three TDs in a single game.

HALL TOSSES FOUR TDS VS BLAZERS

Arkelon Hall tossed a career-high four touchdown passes in the 33-30 win over UAB. His previous career best was three TD passes earlier this season versus Rice. Hall completed 18 of 28 passes for 209 yards and four touchdowns. He is only the fifth Tiger QB in school history to log four touchdown passes in a single game, which ranks second all-time. The record is five touchdown passes by Danny Wimprine versus Murray State (2002).

TIGERS SCORE 20

The Tigers scored 20 points in the second quarter versus UAB for the most points scored in a quarter this season. The last time Memphis scored 20 or more points in a single quarter was in the third quarter versus SMU last season when the Tigers tallied 21 points.

BLOCK THAT KICK

Curtis Echols got his hand on UAB punter Swayze Waters' punt in the third quarter for Memphis' first block of an opponent's punt since last season when Tony Bell blocked a Jacksonville State attempt. Waters was credited with a 22-yard punt on the play. Memphis scored a touchdown on the ensuing drive.

STEELE HITS CENTURY MARK AGAIN

Curtis Steele rushed for over 100 yards for the third-straight game as he logged 101 yards on 14 attempts versus UAB. He tallied 203 yards versus Arkansas State, and 109 yards against Nicholls State. Steele had a long run of 28 yards in the UAB meeting.

His streak was snapped versus Louisville. While Louisville entered the game only allowing its opponents about 70 yards rushing a game, Steele tallied 80 yards on 16 carries versus the Cards.

Steele was back in the century club again versus Southern Miss as he rolled off 178 yards on 29 carries. That was also his first career game of multiple TDs as he had scoring runs of 10 yards and 22 yards in the 36-30 win over the Golden Eagles. One game later, he tallied 123 yards on 19 runs at SMU. He closed out the regular season with 135 yards and a TD on 23 carries against Tulane. He enters the bowl game with six 100-yard games this season, which ranks tied for fourth in a single season with Gerard Arnold (1998).

BROWN LOGS FIRST SACK

Defensive lineman Jada Brown logged his first sack of the season; the third of his career, when he dropped UAB's Joe Webb for a loss of 10 yards in the third quarter. UAB was forced to punt three plays later.

Brown also had a sack for a nine-yard loss in the East Carolina game.

TERRELL GETS FUMBLE RECOVERY

Defensive lineman Greg Terrell registered his first career fumble recovery when he landed on the ball that popped out when UAB's Joe Webb was hit by Greg Jackson. The play immediately followed a Memphis interception that was thrown by receiver Carlos Singleton. It was Jackson's third career forced fumble. The turnover resulted in a field goal by the Tigers.

ZACCARIO COMES THROUGH WITH GAME-WINNING FIELD GOAL

In just his second game in a Tiger uniform, true freshman kicker Vinny Zaccario booted the game-winning 25-yard field goal with just two seconds remaining on the clock as Memphis defeated UAB, 33-30, in Birmingham. It was Zaccario's second FG of the game, as he also hit a 34-yard field goal with 11 minutes remaining in the game for the 30-23 Memphis lead. Zaccario, a walk-on from Tampa, Fla., started his first career game against Arkansas State for Matt Reagan who suffered from a hip flexor injury.

Zaccario is the first Memphis kicker to start his collegiate career with a perfect 5-for-5 on field goal attempts since Ryan White went 16-for-16 as a freshman in 1998. His string of perfect FGs was snapped when he had a 47-yard attempt blocked and returned for a TD by Louisville.

ZACCARIO IS C-USA PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Few knew who true freshman kicker Vinny Zaccario was five weeks into the season, but the Tampa, Fla., native made quite an impact on the Tiger football team in just his first two games in the Blue and Gray. Zaccario was named the C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week following the UAB win.

Zaccario kicked the game-winning 25-yard field goal to give Memphis a 33-30 victory over UAB with just two seconds remaining on the clock. The victory was Memphis' first in Birmingham since 1999. Zaccario finished the game with nine points after going 2-for-2 on field goals and 3-for-3 in PATs.

TURNER TALLIES RECOVERY

Defensive lineman Steven Turner recorded his second fumble recovery this season when he scooped up the ball off UAB's Joe Webb's fumble late in the second quarter. It was Turner's third career fumble recovery. The play was reviewed and the ruling on the field stood.

SACK ATTACK

One clever Tiger billboard that was erected in town prior to the start of the season promoted "Sacks In the City." The Tigers are living up to that billing, having logged four or more sacks in two straight games. Memphis tallied six versus ASU and four against UAB.

The Tiger defense did not log a sack against Louisville, marking just the second game of the season without at least one sack.

Through 12 games, Memphis has logged 20 total sacks for minus 144 yards. Clinton McDonald leads the way with seven. He is followed by Greg Jackson who totals three sacks this year.

MCDONALD EARNS C-USA HONORS

Senior defensive lineman Clinton McDonald was named the Conference USA Defensive Player of the Week following the ASU game. McDonald, who was listed on the Lombardi Award watch list this season, tied a Memphis single game record



with four sacks for a loss of 32 yards. His four sacks against ASU also ranks tied for the highest single game total in NCAA FBS this season.

McDonald tied for the team lead with a season-high nine tackles and one quarterback hurry, while seven of his nine tackles were for no yardage or a loss of yards against the Red Wolves. He helped the defense limit ASU to 352 total offensive yards, marking ASU's first game this season below 400 total yards.

McDonald is the 18th Tiger defender named a C-USA player of the week since the league started making such a distinction in 1995.

STEELE GIVES TIGER GROUND GAME HUGE BOOST VERSUS ASU

Curtis Steele rushed for 203 yards on 22 carries in the 29-17 win over Arkansas State for his second consecutive game over 100 yards. He tallied 109 yards on 20 carries the previous weekend versus Nicholls State. Steele reached his 100th yard on a 46-yard carry in the third quarter, which was the longest run from scrimmage since DeAngelo Williams had a 67-yard run versus Akron in 2005. This is also the first time since the 2005 season that a Tiger back has rushed for back-to-back 100-yard games. Williams had 10 consecutive century games in 2005.

In addition, Steele's 203 yards rushing is the most since DeAngelo Williams rushed for 238 yards in his final collegiate game against Akron in 2005 at the Motor City Bowl. Steele averaged 9.2 yards per carry in the game.

Steele made it three in a row when he rolled off 101 yards on 14 carries versus UAB.

JONES SCORES IN CONSECUTIVE DRIVES

Senior running back Charlie Jones scored in his third game this season when he rolled off a three yard run with 12:04 left in the first quarter versus Arkansas State. Jones scored again on Memphis' second drive of the game off a seven-yard run with 6:04 remaining in the first quarter. Jones also scored twice versus Rice and Nicholls State. Jones finished the game with eight carries for 44 yards and two touchdowns.

With Jones scoring multiple rushing touchdowns in three games so far this season, this marks the first time since 2005 that a Tiger has rushed for multiple TDs in multiple games. In 2005, DeAngelo Williams rushed for multiple scores in seven games.

Jones missed the UAB, Louisville and ECU games with a high ankle sprain.

SACK THAT QUARTERBACK

Memphis had six sacks in the Arkansas State game, marking the most by the Tigers since making seven sacks in 2003 against East Carolina. Clinton McDonald led the team with a career-best four sacks for minus 32 yards. He finished with nine tackles and a quarterback hurry. The four sacks are the most by a Tiger defensive player since James Logan had four sacks against Arkansas State in 1994. The four sacks ties the school record, which was set by Marlon Brown versus Louisville in 1987, and tied later in 1994 by Logan.

BLACK COMPLETES SECOND PASS

Receiver Steven Black completed his second pass of the season when he took the lateral from Arkelon Hall versus ASU and tossed the 15-yard pass to Hall in the first quarter. Black had previously completed a four-yard pass to Hall versus Ole Miss.

GRIFFIN MAKING PLAYS ON DEFENSE

D.A. Griffin forced his first career fumble in the fourth quarter against Arkansas State. The fumble was recovered by Brandon Patterson for his second career fumble recovery and first of the season. Griffin tied Clinton McDonald for the team lead in tackles with nine and also was credited with a QB hurry.

TIGER GROUND GAME DOMINATES ASU

For the second-straight game, Memphis rushed for more than 200 yards as a team. The Tigers rushed for 243 yards on 41 attempts versus Arkansas State. A week earlier against Nicholls State, the U of M had 276 yards on 54 attempts. The last time Memphis has rushed for over 200 yards in back-to-back games came at the end of the 2005 season when the Tigers did so in the final three games of the year against Southern Miss, Marshall and Akron.

The U of M had back-to-back 200-yard rushing games later in the season versus USM (285) and SMU (306).

STEELE SCORES FIRST TD

Curtis Steele rushed for his first touchdown as a Tiger on a two-yard run with 2:12 remaining in the fourth quarter against ASU. It was the third rushing touchdown in the game for Memphis, marking the first time the U of M had three or more rushing touchdowns in a single game since 2006 against UTEP when the Tigers scored five times from the run.

The Arkansas State game also marked the first contest that Memphis had not managed a passing TD since the 2007 meeting versus UAB. In that 25-9 Tiger win over the Blazers, Memphis tallied two rushing TDs and four FGs.

The Tigers also failed to toss a TD pass against East Carolina after losing two QBs in the first quarter, and also in the last game versus Tulane in which the U of M attempted just 12 total passes.

LONGSTREET MAKES FIRST START

Sophomore linebacker Jeremy Longstreet made his first career start in the Nicholls State game. He finished the game with a team and career high 12 tackles, including six solo stops, as well as a forced fumble and a recovery. Longstreet stopped the Colonels on third down twice, including a tackle on third and goal at the Memphis 7 in the second quarter that forced the Colonels to kick a field goal. Nine of his tackles came in the first half of the contest.

Longstreet is second on the team in tackles with 75. He had a career-high 13 versus Louisville and eight stops against ECU. He logged five stops against USM and nine versus UCF, marking the eighth time this year that he has tallied at least five tackles.

TIGERS GET EARLY JUMP ON COLONELS

Matt Reagan booted a 24-yard field goal against Nicholls State for the first points of the game with 4:38 remaining in the first quarter. It was the first game this season that Memphis has scored first.

Through 12 games, Memphis has been on the scoreboard first in seven games, including against Nicholls (W), Arkansas State (W), Louisville (L), East Carolina (L), Southern Miss (W), SMU (W) and Tulane (W).

TIGER DEFENSE SILENCES COLONELS

Memphis held Nicholls State to 47 yards passing (2-of-5), marking the first time the Tigers have held

a team to under 50 yards passing since limiting Army to 16 yards on Nov. 13, 1999.

In addition, the Memphis defense held Nicholls State to 164 total yards of offense. The last time the Tigers held a team to under 200 yards of total offense was the 154 yards by Marshall in 2005. The Colonels only managed 38 plays in the game and were 0-of-9 on third down conversions.

The Colonels only managed eight first downs to Memphis' 31 first downs. The last time the Tigers held an opponent to single digit first downs was in 2003 against South Florida as the Bulls totaled eight first downs but managed the 21-16 win which included a touchdown off a kickoff return and a score off a fumble recovery.

STEELE LEADS GROUND ATTACK

Curtis Steele registered a then career-high 109 yards on 20 carries in the Nicholls State contest. His previous high was the 83 yards he totaled on 15 attempts versus Ole Miss. Steele was the first Memphis player to rush for over 100 yards this season. The last Tiger to pass the century mark was T.J. Pitts with 110 yards against SMU in 2007.

Against the Colonels, Steele registered four runs of 10 yards or more and totaled nine first downs. He converted on three third downs, including a 3rd-and-7 in the second quarter that led to a Memphis field goal attempt. He also rushed for 42 of the Tigers' 92 yards on six attempts in the team's opening field goal drive, rolling off three first downs in the drive.

Steele upped his career high considerably with a 203-yard rushing effort versus Arkansas State. He is the first Tiger back to rush for over 200 yards and to total 100-plus yards in consecutive games since DeAngelo Williams in 2005. He hit the century mark for the third-straight time with 101 yards on 14 carries versus UAB. Steele totals six career 100-yard games with his last effort being a 135-yard performance versus Tulane.

COLONELS COME UP WITH SPECIAL TEAMS SCORE

Matt Reagan's field goal attempt from 32 yards out in the second quarter was blocked and returned 70 yards for a touchdown by Nicholls State. The last time that Memphis had a field goal blocked, resulting in a touchdown was against Cincinnati in 2003 off a 76-yard return. That touchdown on special teams by Nicholls was their only TD of the game. The Memphis defense managed to hold the Colonels to just a 19-yard FG in the second quarter.

Memphis had a second blocked field goal returned for a score three weeks later when Louisville got a hand on a 47-yard attempt by Vinny Zaccario and scooped the ball up for a TD at the end of the second quarter.

TIGER GROUND GAME WAS ROLLING VS NSU

The Tigers rushed for 110 yards in the first quarter of the Nicholls State game, marking the first time since the UAB game last season that Memphis had rushed for 100 or more yards in a quarter. The Tigers ended the first half with 153 yards rushing, marking the first time since that same UAB game that Memphis has rushed for 150 yards in a half.

As a team, the Tigers rolled off 276 yards on 54 carries, losing just three yards on the night. Curtis Steele led the way with 109 yards on 20 attempts, while Charlie Jones logged 57 yards and two touchdowns on 11 carries.

Memphis only rushed for more than 200 yards twice in 2007 -- vs. UAB (43-265) and Rice (51-247).



The Tigers came back a week later to roll off 243 yards against Arkansas State, and logged a third game over 200 yards with 285 yards on 51 carries against Southern Miss. Memphis had a big ground game against SMU when the Tigers logged 306 yards on 55 carries. It was the first time since the last game of the 2005 season (vs Akron) that Memphis had rushed for more than 300 yards. The Tigers logged a season-high 379 yards on 66 carries versus Tulane.

ONARHEIM GETS IN ON THE ACTION

Sophomore tight end Deven Onarheim now totals four career receptions after logging two catches for 12 yards against Nicholls State and one reception for seven yards against Tulane. Onarheim's only other career catch prior to 2008 was a 10-yard gain in the New Orleans Bowl last season.

TIGERS FORCE THREE FUMBLES

The Tigers forced Nicholls State to turn the ball over three times on fumbles, two of which were on their kick off returns. The Colonels' first fumble was late in the second quarter when a muffed handoff resulted in Steven Turner picking up the loose ball at the Memphis 36.

In back-to-back kick off returns in the fourth quarter, Nicholls turned the ball over. With Memphis up 24-10 with 4:12 remaining in the game, Matt Reagan booted the kick and Malcolm Jones was credited with jarring the ball loose from Lardarius Webb. The ball was recovered at the Nicholls 41 by Jeremy Rockette. The Tigers scored on their next drive to go up 31-10 with 3:29 remaining in the game.

On the next Tiger kickoff, Dasmine Cathey forced Corey Buchanan to lose the ball, but that fumble was recovered by the Colonels as Kyle Hughes made a four-yard return. He was then hit by Jeremy Longstreet who then recovered the fumble he forced. The Tigers didn't score on that miscue, turning the ball over on downs with under a minute left to play.

The three fumbles recovered are the most since Memphis recovered three against UCF in 2007.

GRIFFIN HAS FIRST START IN SECOND-ARY

Junior D.A. Griffin got his first start in the third game of the season versus Marshall. He started at cornerback ahead of senior Michael Grandberry. Griffin, from Millbrook, Ga., transferred to Memphis from Itawamba CC. He finished the Marshall contest with a team-leading nine tackles, including 1.5 stops for a loss of three yards. Griffin has started the last 10 straight games and is fourth on the team with 58 tackles.

Junior Josh Weaver made his first start versus Marshall at linebacker for Greg Jackson. Weaver had previously started 13 games in the defensive line for the Tigers, but this was his first start at linebacker. He totaled four tackles in the loss to the Herd.

HOLD ON TO THE BALL

Quarterback Arkelon Hall fumbled the ball off a six-yard run in the first quarter against Marshall and Memphis lost the ball at the Herd's 8-yard line. It was the first time that the Tigers had turned the ball over on a fumble in eight games. The last fumble lost for the Tigers was last season against Tulane on October 27. The Tigers tied for third nationally in fumbles lost with just three last year.

Hall logged his second lost fumble when he was sacked by Louisville and lost control of the ball. UL's Johnny Patrick made the 21-yard re-

turn for a score in the fourth quarter as Memphis lost the contest, 35-28. The junior quarterback fumbled for the third time this season against UCF, and that fumble was also returned for a score.

REAGAN BOOTS 44 YARDER VS HERD

Despite a high snap, junior kicker Matt Reagan hit a career-high 44-yard field goal with just over five minutes remaining in the second quarter at Marshall. Reagan's previous best was 42 yards during his freshman season ('06) against UTEP. He hit a 22 yarder in the third quarter and connected on a 25-yard kick with just over eight minutes remaining in the game for his 10th career game of multiple field goals made. It is the first game this season that he has booted multiple field goals, and marked only the third time in his career that he has connected on three or more field goals in a single contest.

With his 43-yard FG against Southern Miss and his miss from 40 yards out versus UCF, Reagan is now 5-of-12 from 40-plus yards for his career.

SINGLETON LOGS CAREER HIGH CATCHES

Carlos Singleton recorded a career high with his 11 receptions for 158 yards in the loss at Marshall. His previous best was eight receptions, which he did twice last season versus Ole Miss and SMU. The 158 yards receiving marked his third career 100-yard game, as he previously totaled 127 yards versus SMU and 100 versus East Carolina in 2007.

Singleton's 11 receptions in the game ranks third all-time at Memphis. Maurice Avery holds the record with 13 against UAB in 2003. The 158 yards ranks eighth all-time in a single game at Memphis.

MAKE IT FIVE STRAIGHT FOR E-WILL

Earnest Williams logged his fifth straight game with a receiving touchdown when he hauled in the four-yard touchdown pass from Will Hudgens versus Marshall to give Memphis its first lead of the game (13-10) with just over five minutes remaining in the third quarter. The touchdown pass was the third of the year and the 11th of his career for Hudgens. This was the second time this year that the pair has matched up for a score.

Williams had his streak snapped when he was held scoreless by Nicholls State. The Tigers went to a more run-oriented scheme in that game, rushing 54 times and only totaling 16 pass completions.

HALL COMPLETES 50-YARD PASS

Arkelon Hall connected with Maurice Jones on a 53-yard pass in the fourth quarter against Marshall, marking his first career pass over 50 yards. The 53-yard reception was a season high for Jones and marked his ninth career reception over 40 yards. Hall finished the night with 364 yards on 28-of-51 passing, marking the second-straight game he had gone over the 300-yard passing mark. The 51 attempts tied for fifth in a single-game at Memphis, tying Danny Wimprine against USF in 2003.

Hall tossed the second 50 yarder of his short career when he connected with Duke Calhoun on a 54-yard TD strike against UCF.

COSTLY PICK LEADS TO LOSS

While it appeared that Memphis and Rice would see extended action in overtime, an interception thrown by Arkelon Hall and picked off by Chris Jammer at the Rice 31 sealed a 42-35 win for Rice with just 11 seconds remaining in the game.

Jammer made a 69-yard return for the score. The last time Memphis had a pick returned for a touchdown was last season against Southern Miss when USM's Brandon Sumrall made an 82-yard TD return in the fourth quarter in a Memphis win over the Golden Eagles in Hattiesburg.

On the other hand, the last time that Memphis has returned an interception for a touchdown was during the 2003 season. Against Louisville on Nov. 15, 2003, Eric Taylor made a 52-yard return for a score.

HALL TOSSES FIRST TD

Junior quarterback Arkelon Hall tossed his first touchdown pass as a Tiger when he reached Maurice Jones on a 45-yard completion to give Memphis the 7-3 lead with just under 10 minutes remaining in the second quarter versus Rice. The 45-yard completion was a season long for both Hall and Jones before the duo teamed up for a 53-yard completion one week later against Marshall. In the 11th game of the season, Hall set a new career best with a 54-yard TD pass to Duke Calhoun against UCF.

JONES HAS CAREER DAY VERSUS RICE

Senior receiver Maurice Jones had his best game as a Tiger despite a heart-breaking loss to Rice. Jones led Memphis with nine receptions for 173 yards and two touchdowns, all of which were career marks. The 173 yards ranks third all-time at Memphis in a single game. He is just behind Ryan Roskelly, who ranks second with his 174 yards against Tulsa in 1994. The record at Memphis is held by Bob Sherlag who tallied 186 yards versus Mississippi State in 1965.

Against Rice, Jones averaged 19.2 yards per reception and scored on receptions of 45 and 39 yards. This was Jones' second career 100-yard receiving game. His other such game was last season versus Tulane when he totaled 117 yards on four receptions.

Jones, who missed the Nicholls game with an injury, has a 17-game active receiving streak entering the postseason after registering catches versus Arkansas State, UAB, Louisville, ECU, USM, SMU, UCF and Tulane.

JONES MAKES LEAP IN RECORD BOOK

With his 173 yards receiving against Rice, Maurice Jones made a large leap from 26th to 18th in the Memphis record book for total yards receiving with 1,100. He became the 23rd Tiger in school history to amass over 1,000 career receiving yards.

Heading into the bowl game, Jones ranks 11th all-time with 1,356 yards. He needs 17 yards in his final career game to enter the Top 10.

This season, four current Tiger receivers rank in the top 15 in career receptions (Calhoun, Singleton, Jones, Williams) and in the top 20 in receiving yards.

FORMER MIAMI BACK SCORES TWICE

Charlie Jones scored his first rushing TD as a Tiger when he rolled off a 15-yard run with 3:11 remaining in the third quarter against Rice. He scored again on the first play of the fourth quarter on a one-yard run. The last time a Memphis player rushed for two touchdowns in a single game was Joe Doss against UTEP in 2006.

Jones scored off runs of 11 and 2 yards versus Nicholls State and again rushed for multiple TDs a week later against ASU with runs of 3 and 7 yards in back-to-back Tiger drives in the first quarter.

Jones missed the UAB, Louisville and ECU



games with an injury and is tied for second on the team in TD scoring with 36 points. Jones, who transferred from Miami and was immediately eligible this season, now totals 16 career touchdowns (10 at Miami).

LAWSON RECORDS FIRST SACK

Redshirt freshman Lester Lawson was credited with his first career sack when he dropped Rice's Chase Clement for a 14-yard loss on 3rd-and-11 from the Rice 32 in the second quarter. The Owls were forced to punt on the next play. Lawson made his first career start the previous week against Ole Miss.

Lawson picked up his second sack of the season when he dropped Tulane's Scott Elliott for minus two yards in the fourth quarter.

PATTERSON HAS TIGERS' FIRST PICK

Senior safety Brandon Patterson picked off Rice's Chase Clement with 41 seconds remaining in the second quarter and made a 16-yard return. It was Patterson's ninth career interception, and the Tigers' first interception of the season. Memphis failed to score off the turnover, instead throwing an interception in the endzone to end the second quarter.

WASHINGTON GETS FIRST CARRY

Junior college transfer RB Brandon Washington had his first carry in a Tiger uniform when he went into the game in the second quarter versus Rice. He gained nine yards on his first carry and ended the game with nine yards on two carries. A native of Baker, La., Washington played two seasons at Los Medanos College and joined the Tigers during fall camp.

Washington came in a week later against Marshall and had back-to-back runs of three yards. He totaled a career high 10 carries for 53 yards versus Nicholls State, but struggled to gain yardage versus ASU (5-(-7)).

Washington did not play in three straight games (UAB, UL, ECU) but was utilized on a tricky play against Southern Miss in which he logged 12 yards on one carry. With a hamstring injury to Curtis Steele in the SMU game, Washington saw increased action and totaled 51 yards on five carries. He had his best game of the year so far versus Tulane, rolling off 77 yards on nine carries. For the year, Washington totals 204 yards on 35 carries.

HALL COMPLETES 11 STRAIGHT BEFORE PICK

Arkelon Hall completed 11 straight passes before tossing the interception in the endzone in the last seconds of the second quarter against Rice. In the first half, Hall was 17-of-22 for 192 yards and two touchdowns. He finished the game having completed 29 of 38 pass attempts for 373 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions. The 29 completions ranks 10th all-time at Memphis in a single game.

GRANDBERRY HAS FIRST INTERCEPTION

Senior corner Michael Grandberry registered his first career interception when he picked off Rice's Chase Clement at the Memphis 30 late in the third quarter. Memphis scored a touchdown on its next drive as a result of the turnover. Grandberry led the team with nine tackles, including eight solo stops and two pass breakups. He also logged his ninth career 100-yard kick return game after

totaling 125 yards on six returns.

The two interceptions by Grandberry and Patterson marked the first time since the SMU game at the end of the 2007 season that Memphis had come up with two interceptions in a single game.

HALL PASSES FOR 159 YARDS IN DEBUT

Arkelon Hall completed 15 of 27 passes for 159 yards in his D-I collegiate debut against Ole Miss on Aug. 30. Hall, who transferred to Memphis this past January from College of the Sequoias, also rushed for 38 yards on seven carries. He had a long pass of 42 yards to Carlos Singleton in the game.

Hall suffered from cramping during the third quarter and was replaced by senior Will Hudgens, who had come into the game several times on fourth down for punting and to gain crucial yardage. Hall re-entered the game late in the fourth quarter.

HUDGENS' PLAY LEADS TO THREE TDS

Senior quarterback Will Hudgens is a utility player in the Tiger lineup. While he did not start in the season opener versus Ole Miss, he did see significant playing time. He first entered the game on Memphis' first series in a 4th-and-7 situation for a pooch punt that was downed at the 3. He came back in on the next Memphis series with the Tigers in the redzone on 1st-and-10 from the Rebel 11. He rushed for 6 and 2 yards on his first two offensive plays and then completed a three-yard pass for a TD to Earnest Williams.

Hudgens saw significant time in the third quarter when Hall was hobbled by cramping, and on the first play of the fourth quarter, he tossed a 43-yard strike for a score to Maurice Jones. Hall came back into the game with nine minutes left in the game, and Hudgens was called upon on 4th-and-goal from the 1. He delivered the 1-yard scoring run with 3:28 left in the game. Hudgens finished the game with 102 yards and two TDs on 8 of 15 passing. He also rushed for 27 yards on nine carries. The three TDs responsible for was a career high for Hudgens.

TWO PICKS LEADS TO OLE MISS SCORES

For the first time in four games, the Tigers tossed two interceptions when they were picked off (both times were in the second quarter) by Ole Miss. The Tigers were just outside of the redzone, when Will Hudgens attempted a pass on first down and was picked off in the endzone. Ole Miss' Kendrick Lewis made a 33-yard return and the Rebels ultimately scored a field goal off the miscue to take a 24-7 lead. On Memphis' very next series, Arkelon Hall was intercepted at the Memphis 34 and Dustin Mouzon made a 1-yard return. The Rebels took the 27-7 lead with a 47-yard field goal with 22 seconds remaining in the first half.

The Tigers also tossed two interceptions in the loss to Rice one game later.

SEVERAL TIGERS HAVE FIRST STARTS IN SEASON OPENER

Five Tigers had their first career starts in the season opener with Ole Miss, including redshirt freshman Lester Lawson (OLB) and junior Deante' Lamar (CB) on defense, and junior Arkelon Hall (QB), senior Cody Stubblefield (LT), junior Curtis Steele (RB) on offense.

TIGER QBs CONTRIBUTE TO GROUND GAME

Coach Tommy West has said many times that

the Tigers need to be able to run the ball to take pressure off the passing game. He has also touted QB Arkelon Hall for his running ability and he and Will Hudgens delivered against Ole Miss. Hall and Hudgens combined for 65 yards rushing on 16 carries (4.1 yd avg.) in the season opener, marking the first time since Nov. 26, 2005 that Memphis got 50 or more yards rushing from one or more signal callers in a single game. On that date versus Marshall, receiver-turned-QB Maurice Avery rushed for 93 yards on 19 carries, but he only completed one pass in that game for minus three yards. In the previous game versus Southern Miss (Nov. 19, 2005), Avery showed a balanced attack with 64 yards rushing and 157 yards passing.

In the second game of the season versus Rice, Hall and Hudgens combined for 62 yards on 13 carries. The Tigers rushed for over 150 yards in the first two games of the season before Marshall held the U of M to under 100 yards.

SINGLETON LOGS LONG CATCH

Junior Carlos Singleton hauled in a 42-yard reception in the first quarter against Ole Miss to mark his fifth consecutive game with a reception of 40 or more yards. Singleton finished the game with six catches for a team high 89 yards. His streak of long receptions was snapped against Rice when his long of that game was 13 yards.

E-WILL HAULS IN FIRST TIGER TD

Senior Earnest Williams was on the receiving end of the Tigers' first touchdown of the season when he hauled in the three-yard pass from Will Hudgens in the first quarter against Ole Miss. It was Williams' ninth career TD reception, and marked the third straight game he caught a touchdown pass dating back to the 2007 regular-season finale versus SMU. Williams upped his streak to four straight games with a TD reception when he scored on a 10-yard catch against Rice, and extended the streak to five games with a four-yard grab versus Marshall.

REAGAN STARTS YEAR WITH A FG

Junior kicker Matt Reagan booted a 39-yard field goal to end the second quarter in the season opener versus Ole Miss. It was his ninth make over 30 yards.

The Ole Miss game marked the first time that Reagan has made a field goal in the first game of a season. In 2006, he did not have an attempt until the third game; and in 2007, he was 0-of-1 in all three games versus Ole Miss, Jacksonville St. and UCF.

JONES HAULS IN 43-YARD TD

Maurice Jones caught a 43-yard touchdown pass from Will Hudgens at the start of the fourth quarter against Ole Miss. The 43-yard TD catch by Jones marked the fifth TD reception of his career. He also caught a 45-yard touchdown pass against Rice and a 53-yard completion versus Marshall, and now totals nine career catches of more than 40 yards.

The 43-yard pass was Hudgens' longest pass since 2005 (vs. Chattanooga). It was also the third time in his career that he has tossed two touchdown passes in a single game. The last time he did it was versus Marshall in 2007. Hudgens came in for Hall who left the game in the third series of the third quarter.



STEELE JUST SHORT OF 100 IN DEBUT

Curtis Steele has been with the Tigers for a full year, but he took his first snap in a D-I game in the season opener. Steele, who transferred from Northwest Mississippi Junior College, redshirted with the Tigers last season. Against Ole Miss, he totaled 83 yards on 15 carries for a team-high 5.5 yards per carry. He busted off a long run of 25 yards in the fourth quarter to lead the Tigers just shy of the redzone. Memphis ultimately scored a touchdown later in the drive.

Last season, Tiger backs only accounted for seven total runs over 20 yards, and it wasn't until the seventh game of the season (vs Rice) that a Tiger back posted a 20-yard run.

ANY DAY OF THE WEEK

The Tigers played back-to-back non-Saturday games, defeating UAB on Thursday, Oct. 2, and losing to Louisville on Friday, Oct. 10. The last time that Memphis played consecutive non-Saturday games was during the 2007 season. The Tigers played Arkansas State on a Thursday, Sept. 27, after having the game rescheduled because of weather. Memphis played just five days later on Tuesday, Oct. 2 versus Marshall in the game televised by ESPN.

The Tigers now have an all-time record of 72-86-15 since the program's inception in 1912 for games played on days other than Saturday. The most popular day for the squad has been Friday, which accounts for 115 of the 172 non-Saturday contests. The list below details Memphis' record by day:

THREE OPENING LOSSES FIRST SINCE '98

With the 0-3 start, the Tigers opened with three straight losses for the first time since 1998. That year, Memphis opened with an 0-5 record before stunning then-Conference USA foe Cincinnati, 41-23, at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

Memphis snapped this year's losing streak with a 31-10 win over Nicholls State. The Tigers opened last season with a 1-3 record, which included the win over Jacksonville State and losses to ASU, Ole Miss and UCF, and rebounded to close out the regular season with victories in six of the final eight games.

With the losses to Rice and Marshall to open the 2008 season, the Tigers were also 0-2 to start Conference USA action for only the fourth time (1997, 2003, 2006, 2008) since the league began play in 1996. The Tigers snapped the losing streak with the 33-30 victory over UAB in Birmingham on Oct. 2.

The Tigers entered the Louisville game on a three-game winning streak and with a .500 record (3-3). The U of M was also 3-3 through the first six games in 2003 and 2005 --- both years Memphis received bowl invitations.

TIGERS PICKED UP FIRST-EVER OT WIN OVER SMU IN 2007

Last season, the Tigers and SMU Mustangs went three overtimes in the 2007 regular-season finale for the second 3OT game in Tiger history (the other was versus Houston in 2000). The 55-52 win over SMU was Memphis' first overtime victory in five games. All five of the Tigers' extended games have been against C-USA opponents and all have

occurred at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium. The following shows Memphis' record in OT:
