ROSEMARY FRI *HEAD WOMEN'S TENNIS COACH*

Rosemary Fri serves as the coordinator of the UNC tennis programs and has coached the women's team since 1963 ... the year of its inception. During her tenure, the UNC women have compiled an impressive list of accomplishments, including two fourth-place showings at the NCAA Division II Championships (1983, 1992). The women's team has also notched 18 top-20 rankings and won 16 conference or regional championships. Fri has coached two singles national champions, one singles runner-up, three doubles national champions, one

doubles runner-up, and 15 All-Americans.

In 2001, the UNC women's team won its 11th consecutive North Central Conference title and its 12th conference championship in 13 years. The Bears have qualified for the NCAA Division II Team Championships 12 out of 13 years. Over the years, Fri has been recognized often for her accomplishments. In 1981 and 1992 she received the Wilson Coach of the Year Award. In 1992, the Colorado Sportswomen also honored Fri as Coach of the Year. She was named the 1994 Division II Midwest Regional Coach of the Year and has been recognized by the North Central Conference on several occasions. Fri was one of eight inducted into the first class of the UNC Athletic Hall of Fame in 1994. Her 1983 women's tennis squad was inducted into the UNC Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 2001. On Feb. 21, 2003, Fri was inducted into the Colorado Tennis Hall of Fame.



JONATHAN CASPER *HEAD MEN'S TENNIS COACH*

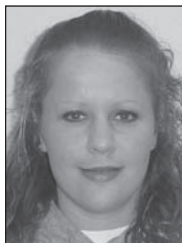
Jonathan Casper enters his fifth year as head coach of the UNC men's tennis team.

Last season, Casper led the Bears into the NCAA regional tournament for the third time in as many years. In 2001, he coached the Bears to their second consecutive North Central Conference title and first berth into the NCAA tournament.

Casper was a three-year varsity letterwinner for Pomona/Pitzer Colleges located in Southern California, where he participated on the varsity team that finished in the top-10 in the nation in each of his three years.

He attended Kent Denver High School where he played on the varsity team for four years. While attending Kent, Casper won four regional championships and finished third in the state his senior year. Prior to moving to Greeley, Casper served as the junior program coordinator and assistant professional at The Ranch Country Club in Westminster, Colo. for four years. Casper was also head coach at Broomfield High School, which he led to two consecutive regional championships and three consecutive top-10 state rankings.

Casper earned his master's degree from UNC in sport administration in 2001. He is currently completing his doctoral degree at UNC.



BRENDA VLASAK *ASSISTANT COACH*

Brenda Vlasak is in her second season as an assistant coach for the UNC tennis teams. Vlasak grew up in Colorado and as a junior was ranked No. 2 nationally in girl's 14 and under. She played No. 1 singles at Tyler Junior College for two years as she helped her squad win a pair of NJCAA titles. She then transferred to Arkansas where she played No. 2 singles and No. 1 doubles. Vlasak is working on a master's degree in sport administration at UNC.

Women's Squad Prepares for First Season of Division I

The University of Northern Colorado women's tennis team will begin its new challenge of Division I tennis after leaving the Division II ranks and its dominance of the North Central Conference. UNC won 11 of the last 12 league crowns and reached the NCAA Tournament each of the past five seasons.

Legendary head coach Rosemary Fri will return four starters to this year's squad and will mix a pair of newcomers into the starting lineup.

Headlining the group of returnees is senior Jan Ikeda. Ikeda put herself on the national map this past fall when she won the ITA North Central Regional. The Wailuku, Hawaii, native advanced to the national ITA tournament where she placed 7th in the nation in singles. Ikeda enters the spring season ranked No. 22 in the nation in singles and No. 25 in doubles with teammate Meredith Krystofik.

"Jan is poised to have a fantastic senior season," Fri said. "She is serving as our captain this season and she is showing the leadership we need from her in the No. 1 position. She really had a great fall by winning the ITA regional tournament and fared well at the national tournament as well."

Senior Shannon Lauridson, who tallied a 17-8 mark in 2002-03, will move to the No. 4 singles spot this season to strengthen the Bears' lineup. Junior Julia McPherson will return to the lineup and likely fill out the No. 5 singles spot in Fri's lineup. The No. 6 singles' position will be a toss up between a pair of seniors in Taneisha Pechek and Amber Alley. Pechek has fought injuries the past two seasons but looks to be fully recovered. Alley played most of last season at the No. 5 singles spot and tallied a mark of 12-13.

Krystofik, a freshman from Frisco, Texas, will likely fit into the No. 2 singles role and replace Jodie Sato, who graduated in 2003. Freshman Renee Nuccio, a native of Littleton, Colo., will be placed into the No. 3 singles spot to begin the spring.

The Bears' schedule is filled with a mixture of Division I and lower division opponents. UNC will open the season Jan. 30 in Colorado Springs against Division I foe Eastern Washington. UNC will continue with its Division I schedule on Jan. 31 at Air Force. UNC will also play Iowa State (March 14) and Colorado State (March 30). UNC will close the season April 16-17 at the Division I Independent Tournament in Corpus Christi, Texas.

UNC Men's Tennis Looks Forward to Division I Status

This will be a season of new looks for the University of Northern Colorado men's tennis program. The men's squad returns only one starter from the top-six singles positions and will be making its venture into the Division I tennis ranks after a stellar run near the top of the Division II ranks.

In the Bears' final season of Division II tennis, UNC went 11-10 in duals and qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the third straight season. UNC also finished second in their swan song at the North Central Conference championships.

The influx of new talent begins at the No. 1 singles position with newcomer Casey Ross. Ross is a freshman out of Littleton, Colo. He spent his final two seasons of high school at the John Newcombe Tennis Academy in New Braunfels, Texas.

"Casey has been a full-time tennis player for most of his prep career and should step right in for us at No. 1 singles and doubles," head coach Jonathan Casper said. "He still needs to get stronger and put in more work on his net game."

The Bears' only returnee among the top-six singles players is sophomore Jeff Hall. Hall played most of last season at No. 6 singles and compiled a singles' record of 9-6.

"Jeff is our most experienced returnee," Casper said. "He is the most athletic player on our team and he makes tennis look very easy."

Sophomore Peter Weyrich will look to hold down the No. 3 singles spot and saw limited action (4-0) last season for the Bears' in a reserve role. Sophomore Chris Bminihan will look to fill the No. 4 singles' slot after a 2-3 record in limited action as a freshman.

Freshman Morgan Surfes from Tustin, Calif., will be pegged into the No. 5 singles position and junior Mikael Olson will likely hold down the No. 6 singles' slot.

"Morgan has a huge serve and good ground strokes," Casper said. "He will be a nice addition to the lineup and will help since we lost so many starters to graduation."

Casper said this will be a good year to make the leap to Division I tennis.

"This will be a year to learn and play good competitive teams and not worry about records and making the NCAA tournament. Some of our guys are going to struggle as they move up in the singles' positioning but in the long run it will pay off."

The Bears will play plenty of Division I competition in the first-year of the four-year transition to Division I. UNC will open the season at Colorado on Feb. 7. The Bears will play Division I matches against Air Force (Feb. 21), Missouri-Kansas City (March 7), Northern Arizona (March 14) and will close the season at Denver on April 13.

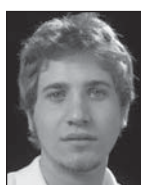

UNC BEARS

ON THE ROAD TO DIVISION I

The University of Northern Colorado's Board of Trustees voted unanimously to approve a move to Division I in intercollegiate athletics on May 10, 2002.

UNC then petitioned the NCAA for transition to move from Division II to Division I and received clearance this fall. All UNC sports will compete at the Division I level, while UNC football will compete at the I-AA level.

A big factor in the board's approval of the Bears' move to Division I came after the university was able to secure 70 more athletic scholarships. The drive to land those scholarships came from former University President Hank Brown and many faithful UNC supporters.

Fallis said the board's vote was a major step forward for the university and the athletic department.

"The Board of Trustees' decision is a clear signal that Athletics is an integral part of the University's strategic plan," Fallis said. "After weighing all the factors, this certainly is the right time for UNC to make the move to Division I. The landscape of intercollegiate athletics continues to change and this decision ensures that UNC will continue to be at the forefront of that change. While the transition will be smooth in many areas, I'm sure we will have some bumps along the way. I think it's important to keep the end goal in mind and that Division I is where UNC belongs."

Now in its second century of service to the state, region and nation, the University of Northern Colorado has grown from its beginning as the State Normal School to a maturing, multipurpose university. History

Construction on UNC began on April 1, 1888, with the signing of the law that created the first State Normal School. The cornerstone of the first building was laid on June 13, 1890, and classes began on Oct. 6, 1890, with 96 students and four faculty.

The school has seen several name changes since its inception as the State Normal School in 1889. Prior to becoming the University of Northern Colorado in 1970, the institution had previously been known as Colorado State Teachers College (1911-35), Colorado State College of Education (1935-57) and Colorado State College (1957-70).

As UNC enters the new millennium, it enrolls more than 11,000 students from 49 states and 40 different countries. Since 1916, it has been fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, as well as more than 20 other special agencies that have reviewed specific areas, including: American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, American Chemical Society, American Psychological Association, American Speech-Language Association, Colorado State Board of Nursing, Council on Education for Public Health, National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education and the American Dietetic Association.
