ROSEMARY FRI *HEAD WOMEN'S TENNIS COACH*

Rosemary Fri serves as the coordinator of the UNC tennis programs and has coached the women's team since 1963 ... the year of its inception. During her tenure, the UNC women have compiled an impressive list of accomplishments, including two fourth-place showings at the NCAA Division II Championships (1983, 1992). The women's team has also notched 18 top-20 rankings and won 16 conference or regional championships. Fri has coached two singles national champions, one singles runner-up, three doubles national champions, one

doubles runner-up, and 15 All-Americans.

In 2001, the UNC women's team won its 11th consecutive North Central Conference title and its 12th conference championship in the past 13 years. The Bears have qualified for the NCAA Division II Team Championships 10 of the past 11 years. Over the years, Fri has been recognized often for her accomplishments. In 1981 and 1992 she received the Wilson Coach of the Year Award. In 1992 the Colorado Sportswomen also honored Fri as Coach of the Year. She was named the 1994 Division II Midwest Regional Coach of the Year and has been recognized by the North Central Conference on several occasions. Fri was one of eight inducted into the first class of the UNC Athletic Hall of Fame in 1994. Her 1983 women's tennis squad was inducted into the UNC Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 2001. On Feb. 21, 2003, Fri was inducted into the Colorado Tennis Hall of Fame.



JONATHAN CASPER *HEAD MEN'S TENNIS COACH*

An active member of the Colorado tennis community for over 19 years, Jonathan Casper enters his fourth year as head coach of the UNC men's tennis team.

Last season Casper led the Bears back into the NCAA regional tournament for the second time in as many years and reached the regional final before falling to Metro State. In 2001, he coached the Bears to their second consecutive North Central Conference title and first berth into the NCAA tournament.

Casper was a three-year varsity letterwinner for Pomona/Pitzer Colleges located in Southern California, where he participated on the varsity team that finished in the top-ten in the nation in each of his three years.

As a junior player in Colorado, Casper was consistently ranked in the top 15 in the Intermountain Region and top ten in Colorado. He attended Kent Denver High School where he played on the varsity team for four years. While attending Kent, Casper won four regional championships and finished third in the state his senior year. Prior to moving to Greeley, Casper served as the Junior Program Coordinator and Assistant Professional at The Ranch Country Club in Westminster, Colorado for four years. Casper was also head coach at Broomfield High School, which he led to two consecutive regional championships and three consecutive top-ten state rankings.



BRENDA VLASAK *ASSISTANT COACH*

Brenda Vlasak is in her first season as an assistant coach for the UNC tennis teams. Vlasak grew up in Colorado and as a junior was ranked No. 2 nationally in girls' 14 and under. She played No. 1 singles at Tyler Junior College for two years as she helped her squad win a pair of NJCAA titles. She then transferred to Arkansas where she played No. 2 singles and No. 1 doubles. Vlasak is working on a master's degree in sport administration at UNC.

Women's Preview/Roster 3

Women's Squad Looks To Advance To The NCAA Tournament In Final Year Of Division II Tennis

The University of Northern Colorado women's tennis team will look to repeat its performance from a year ago which included yet another North Central Conference crown (UNC's 11th straight league title) and a berth into the NCAA national tournament. This will be UNC's final season of Division II tennis as the Bears will move to Division I next season.

Head coach Rosemary Fri returns four starters from a year ago plus a returnee from two years ago to give her five experienced starters in the lineup. UNC finished 15-10 in duals last season and won the North Central regional tournament with a 5-4 victory over Northwest Missouri State. The Bears then lost to Oauchita Baptist in the first round of the national tournament in Kansas City, Mo.

Leading the returnees is junior No. 1 seed Jan Ikeda. Ikeda tallied a 15-14 record last spring and will play at the top spot for the third straight year. Ikeda is ranked No. 5 in the North Central region singles' rankings. Ikeda and doubles partner Jodie Sato give the Bears one of the top pair of teammates in the North Central region. Ikeda and Sato posted a doubles mark of 20-8 last season. The Bears' duo is ranked No. 4 in the North Central region in doubles.

Sato, who will serve as the team's captain, returns for her senior season and will hold down the No. 2 singles position. Sato was 19-7 in 2002. Sato is ranked No. 8 in the North Central region in doubles.

UNC will need to replace No. 3 player Lori Eslinger, who graduated last spring. Eslinger was a four-time North Central Conference singles champion and claimed the doubles' crown three times. Junior Shannon Lauridson will look to take Eslinger's spot at the No. 3 singles slot. Lauridson was 15-11 last season while playing at both the No. 4 and No. 5 singles positions.

Amber Alley returns for her junior season and will likely hold down the No. 4 singles position. Alley finished last season with a singles mark of 12-14.

Fri looks for a solid return by Taneisha Pechek. Pechek suffered a shoulder injury two years ago and sat out last season after undergoing shoulder surgery. If Pechek stays healthy it gives Fri another experienced performer lower in the lineup.

Sophomore Julia McPherson saw very limited action as a freshman but has provided a solid effort in the fall season. Fri expects McPherson to be a solid contributor at the No. 5 singles' slot. Newcomers to the lineup could also include Erin Cable and Heidi Frisch.

The UNC women's tennis schedule is again loaded with plenty of talent this spring. The Bears will travel to Topeka, Kan., to take on Washburn, Truman State and Northwest Missouri State -- all of which are tennis powers in the Mid-American Intercollegiate Conference. UNC will also travel to Pomona, Calif., to take part in the Xenia Tournament for the second consecutive year.

Men's Tennis Looks to Win NCC Tournament; Improve on Last Year's Regional Berth

The goal of the men's tennis season is to once again capture the NCC championship after taking second last year. This year's team looks to be a top regional competitor and once again qualify for the national tournament. Fourth-year head coach, Jonathan Casper, will have a senior-led group with some young guns that will be vying for playing time. Last year was highlighted by a berth in the North Central Regional Championship after upsetting Northwest Missouri State in the regional semi-finals. The team made it to the NCAA round of 32 with the upset and was later beaten by Metro State 5-2 in the championship. This year, the Bears look to build on last year's success while also capturing the NCC championship. The Bears have started the 2002-2003 season of well with wins over CU-Colorado Springs, Colorado Christian, and Mesa State. Their only loss of the fall was to Metro State.

A year ago, the Bears posted a 15-10 overall record and finished second at the North Central Conference Championships. The Bears return 5 out of 6 starters from last year's squad led by seniors Jim Flanigan (Thornton, Colo.) and Brian Bishop (Colorado Springs, Colo.). Flanigan compiled a 12-13 record at No. 2 singles and a 12-3 record at No. 2 doubles. Flanigan placed second at the NCC Championships and first in doubles. Last season, Bishop finished with a 13-14 mark at No. 3 singles and a 13-2 mark at No. 3 doubles. Bishop won the NCC title at No. 3 doubles with Adam Benshoof and placed second in singles. Coach Casper expects both players to continue their strong doubles play while also getting some consistent wins at their singles positions.

The Bears have three other seniors that will be returning. Matt Bong (Greeley, Colo.) who posted a 14-5 record at No. 5 singles in 2001-2 and won some pressure matches for the Bears. Bong teamed with Flanigan at No. 2 doubles last year at they will play No. 1 doubles in 2002-2003. Chris Humphrey (Topeka, Kan.) was 6-11 at No. 4 singles at played No. 1 doubles with Reed last season. Adam Benshoof (Highlands Ranch, Colo.) posted a 13-7 singles record and a 13-2 doubles record with teammate Bishop at No. 3 doubles. It is obvious by this year's squad that experience is not an issue and that the Bears will use this experience to win close matches.

Among the returnees to the Bears is sophomore Jeff Hall (Wheat Ridge, Colo.). Hall has an impressive all-round game and will be a valuable player that has the potential to play high in the lineup. Sophomore Chris Manichanh (Greeley, Colo.) posted a 3-0 singles record in limited play last season. New to the Bears are Pete Weyhrich (Englewood, Colo.) and Chris M (N.M.). Pete posted a 2-0 record at No. 6 singles and No. 3 doubles in the fall. Chris posted a 2-3 record at No. 2 singles and a 3-1 record at No. 3 doubles in the fall.

The Bears' schedule will give them a chance to play the elite in Division II tennis this year. Along with matches against Colorado teams, the Bears will participate in the Broncho Invitational where 9 of the 12 invited teams are currently ranked in the top 30 in the nation. The Bears will also play top regional teams in Washburn and Northwest Missouri State in Topeka, Kan.

12 North Central Conference

The North Central Conference is widely acclaimed as one of the nation's finest athletic conferences. Over the past eight years, NCC member institutions won NCAA Division II national championships in football, wrestling, basketball, softball, cross country and volleyball.

Under the leadership of Commissioner Michael Marcil, the NCC is made up of nine schools in five states. In addition to UNC, the league includes Nebraska-Omaha, Augustana (Sioux Falls, S.D.), North Dakota (Grand Forks, N.D.), North Dakota State (Fargo, N.D.), South Dakota (Vermillion, S.D.), South Dakota State (Brookings, S.D.), St. Cloud State (St. Cloud, Minn.) and Minnesota State (Mankato, Minn.).

Northern Colorado joined the North Central Conference in 1979 when the league accepted the Bears for membership beginning with the 1980 season. The Bears compete in seven men's sports, including football, basketball, wrestling, track and field, baseball, tennis and golf. The UNC women compete in nine sports, including volleyball, cross country, basketball, swimming, track and field, tennis, golf, soccer and softball.

The University of Northern Colorado

Now in its second century of service to the state, region and nation, the University of Northern Colorado has grown from its beginning as the State Normal School to a maturing, multipurpose university. Its primary mission is to provide quality instruction while developing focused research and public service roles.

UNC maintains its historic role as a teacher education leader while offering more than 2,000 courses in nearly 100 degree programs through its Graduate School and five undergraduate colleges: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Health and Human Sciences and Performing and Visual Arts. The Graduate School offers 18 doctoral, two specialist and 31 master's degree programs.



History

Construction on UNC began on April 1, 1888, with the signing of the law that created the first State Normal School. The cornerstone of the first building was laid on June 13, 1890, and classes began on October 6, 1890, with 96 students and four faculty.

The school has seen several name changes since its inception as the State Normal School in 1889. Prior to becoming the University of Northern Colorado in 1970, the institution had previously been known as Colorado State Teachers College (1911-35), Colorado State College of Education (1935-57) and Colorado State College (1957-70).

UNC Today

As UNC enters the new millennium, it enrolls more than 11,000 students from 49 states and 40 different countries. Since 1916, it has been fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, as well as more than 20 other special agencies that have reviewed specific areas, including: American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, American Chemical Society, American Psychological Association, American Speech-Language Association, Colorado State Board of Nursing, Council on Education for Public Health,

National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education and the American Dietetic Association.

UNC has been classified by the Carnegie Commission as one of only 29 public Doctorate Level I universities nationally, and UNC's teacher education programs have consistently ranked the institution among the top 10 in the U.S. for the past 60 years. In addition, UNC has had six graduate programs (education leadership and policy studies, jazz studies, rehabilitation counseling, special education, audiology and speech-language pathology) named to the 1998 edition of *U.S. News and World Report's Guide to Best Graduate Programs*. The school has twice been named to "America's Guide to the 100 Best College Buys" list of best education bargains in the United States.
