A QUICK LOOK AT THE 2003 NCAA REGIONAL AT STANFORD

Stanford will be hosting Richmond, UC Riverside and Illinois-Chicago in an NCAA Regional running this Friday-Sunday, May 30 - June 1 ... Stanford is serving as a Regional host for the eighth straight year and the 12th time in school history ... The Cardinal is the top seed in the Regional, as well as the No. 6 national seed in the 64-team field for the 2002 NCAA Division I Baseball Championships ... Stanford begins a quest to extend its school record string of College World Series appearances to five, where the Cardinal has at least reached a bracket final each year and twice finished as runners-up (2000, '01) during its recent four-year run ... Stanford (41-15) is making its 24th NCAA Tournament appearance after winning its first outright Pac-10 title since 1999 (the Cardinal shared the conference crown in 2000) ... Richmond (46-13) is seeded second after winning its first Atlantic-10 Conference title and fourth conference championship in school history ... UC Riverside (40-15) is making its first NCAA Tournament appearance, receiving an at-large bid after finishing third in the Big West Conference ... Chicago-Illinois (39-16) is also in the NCAA Tournament for the first time after winning both the Horizon League regular season and tournament titles.

2003 NCAA DIVISION I BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP INFORMATION

Stanford is one of 16 Regional hosts and the No. 6 national seed for the 2003 NCAA Division I Baseball Championship. The first weekend of play May 30 - June 1 features 16 four-team Regionals with the winners advancing to eight NCAA Super Regionals to be held June 6-9. The winner of the 2002 NCAA Regional at Stanford will face the winner of the Regional being hosted by Long Beach State with Minnesota, Washington and Pepperdine also in the field. Super Regional sites will be announced on Monday, June 2. The winners of the eight Super Regionals, all to be televised by ESPN/ESPN2 for the first time, advance to the 57th College World Series to be held June 13-23 at Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Nebraska. The CWS championship format has changed this year with the two bracket winners playing a best-of-three series for the national title.

STANFORD BASEBALL HISTORY VERSUS 2003 NCAA REGIONAL FIELD

Stanford has not played against any of the teams in this year's 2003 NCAA Regional field this season. In fact, the Cardinal has never suited up versus either Richmond or Illinois-Chicago. The Cardinal is 3-0 against UC Riverside in the Mark Marquess era (1977-2003).

STANFORD BASEBALL NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HISTORY QUICK NOTES

Stanford will be making its 24th appearance in the NCAA Tournament and its 21st showing in an NCAA Regional ... The Cardinal will be hosting a Regional for the 12th time overall and the eighth straight year ... Stanford has won 14 Regionals overall, including 10 of the 12 and four straight Regionals played at Sunken Diamond ... Stanford swept through its 2002 Regional in three straight games with a win over Cal State Fullerton (3-2, 13 inn.) in the opener before a pair of victories over Long Beach State on the second day winners' bracket game (5-4) and Sunday in the first championship game (8-4) ... Stanford needed a second championship game in each of its previous two Regional victories (2000, '01) after suffering losses earlier in the Regional ... Stanford won four straight Regional elimination games during 2000 and 2001 but were not forced to play any Regional elimination games in 2002 ... Stanford last lost a Regional at Sunken Diamond in 1998 when the Cardinal dropped two-of-three games and was eliminated by Long Beach State in Game 5 of the event ... Stanford has an all-time record of 58-21 (.734) in Regional action ... Stanford has reached the College World Series 14 times, including a school record four consecutive years ... Stanford won CWS titles in 1987 and 1988, while finishing as the runner-up in 2000 and 2001 ... Stanford also made bracket finals in the other two years (1999, 2002) during its current string of four consecutive appearances in Omaha ... Stanford has an all-time postseason record of 103-51 (.669).

STANFORD BASEBALL 2002 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS REVIEW

Stanford reached a bracket final at the College World Series before falling, 6-5, to eventual national champion Texas. Stanford won its first game in Omaha over Notre Dame, 4-3, before suffering an 8-7 loss to Texas in its second contest. The Cardinal came back to Notre Dame again, 5-3, and eliminate the Irish before being eliminated in the bracket final by the Longhorns. Stanford reached the College World Series by winning five consecutive games in Regional and Super Regional action. The postseason started with a classic as the Cardinal outlasted Cal State Fullerton, 3-2 in 13 innings, in the Regional opener. Stanford then had a 5-4 win over Long Beach State to advance to the Regional championship game and beat the 49ers again, 8-4, after they had won an elimination game to reach the championship contest. In the Super Regional, the Cardinal swept a pair of games over USC (4-2, 5-3). Sam Fuld earned All-CWS honors for the second straight year, become the first Stanford player to do so. Jeremy Guthrie was named the Most Outstanding Player at the NCAA Regional, while Chris Carter, Scott Dragicevich, Ryan Garko, Chris O'Riordan and Andy Topham were named All-Regional.

POSTSEASON PLAYER POTPOURRI

Jonny Ash led all Stanford regulars with a .410 batting average in the 2001 postseason ... Chris Carter hit .375 with three homers in 2002 postseason action ... Ryan Garko has a career batting average of .426 (12-26) at the College World Series ... Ryan McCally has a 1.15 ERA in 15.2 postseason innings and 11 appearances.

STANFORD BASEBALL QUICK TEAM NOTES

Stanford finished the season by winning 13 of its final 14 games ... Stanford won its first outright Pac-10 title since 1999 (Stanford shared the Pac-10 crown with Arizona State and UCLA in 2000) by finishing with an 18-6 conference record after winning eight of its last nine conference games and posting an 11-1 road record in Pac-10 play ... Stanford has won 19 conference championships (17 Pac-10, includes Southern Division and shared titles) in school history and has finished either first or second in the conference 21 times in the last 23 years ... Stanford has secured its school-record ninth consecutive 40-win season ... Stanford has been among the nation's top five teams in all four major national polls for each of the last two weeks and is currently ranked No. 3 by *Collegiate Baseball*, No. 4 by *Baseball America* and the NCBWA, and No. 5 by *Sports Weekly/ESPN* polls released May 19 ... Stanford finished the season by winning 12 of its last 13 series ... Stanford is hitting .318 (#3 Pac-10) as a team, which would rank tied for third on the school's all-time single-season list ... Stanford's pitching staff is second in the Pac-10 with a 4.05 ERA and has the league's lowest opponents' batting average (.247) ... Stanford won its final 14 regular season road games (3/23 - 5/11) to end the regular season with a 17-5 road mark ... Stanford is 24-10 at home and finished 23-9 in regular season non-conference games ... Stanford is looking to extend its school record of consecutive appearances at the College World Series to five.

STANFORD BASEBALL QUICK INDIVIDUAL NOTES

Ryan Garko, the Pac-10 Co-Player of the Year and a Johnny Bench Award national semifinalist, is the team's leader in batting average (.406), homers (15), RBI (78), hits (86), total bases (150), slugging percentage (.708), multiple-hit games (27), multiple-RBI games (23), sacrifice flies (6) and extra-base hits (34) ... Garko is attempting to become just the sixth Stanford player ever and the first Stanford player to hit .400 or better since David McCarty hit .420 in 1991 ... Garko has hit safely in 28 of his last 33 games (.487, 58-119) and hit 10 homers with a league-high 39 RBI and a .433 (39-90) batting average in 24 Pac-10 games ... Carlos Quentin, who was named one of five finalists for the USA Baseball Golden Spikes Award on May 6 and one of 12 semifinalists for the Rotary Smith Award on May 16, leads the team in doubles (23), walks (33), hit-by-pitches (12) and on-base percentage (.485) ... Quentin also ranks second on the team in batting average (.384), RBI (50), hits (83), stolen bases (10) and extra-base hits (32) ... Quentin has hit safely in 40 of his last 43 games (.408, 71-174) ... Quentin and Garko have both made recent movements on Stanford's all-time single-season lists ... Quentin's 23 doubles puts him in a third place tie, while Garko's 78 RBI has tied for ninth place ... Sam Fuld has also been swinging a hot bat of late and has a current 14-game hit streak (5/3 - 5/25, .385, 25-65) ... Fuld ranks fifth on Stanford's all-time batting average list with a .355 career mark, while also ranking among Stanford's all-time leaders in hits (273, #9), doubles (49, #10T) and triples (15, #4T) ... Pac-10 Pitcher of the Year John Hudgins (9-3, 3.14) recorded his 20th career victory in his most recent start versus Cal Poly (5/23) and leads the conference in innings pitched (123.1), strikeouts (110), starts (17) and complete games (5) ... Mark Romanczuk (10-0, 3.70) became the first Pac-10 pitcher to reach the 10-win mark with a victory in his final regular season start versus Cal Poly (5/24) ... Matt Manship is tied for second in the conference with eight saves.

LAST WEEK'S GAME REVIEWS

at Stanford 9, Cal Poly 4 (May 23, 2003)

Stanford picked up a 9-4 victory over Cal Poly in the opener of a non-conference series played before a season-high crowd of 4017 that was treated to fireworks after the game. John Hudgins picked up his ninth victory of the season and the 20th of his career, limiting the Mustangs to one unearned run and three hits over the first 6.0 innings.

Brian Hall (3-5, 2B, SB) had three hits to pace Stanford's 13-hit attack. Donny Lucy (2-3, 2 RBI), Ryan Garko (2-4, 2B, RBI) and Jed Lowrie (2-4, 2B, RBI) had a pair of hits each for the Cardinal with Lucy tying a career-high by scoring three runs. Jonny Ash added a pair of RBI on a sacrifice fly and the team's first successful suicide squeeze of the season in the sixth inning.

Hudgins' 6.0 innings of work marked the 15th time in his Pac-10 high 17 starts this season that he has lasted at least 6.0 innings.

Cal Poly starter Josh Kougl (1-9) took the loss, allowing seven runs (five earned) and 10 hits over the first 6.0 innings.

Scott Anderson was 3-for-4 with a double and an RBI for the Mustangs, while Billy Saul (2-4, RBI) also had a pair of hits and Cory Taillon drove in two runs.

Garko struck out twice in the contest, going down swinging in the third and seventh innings, to break a streak of 81 consecutive official at bats and 23 games without a strikeout.

at Stanford 12, Cal Poly 0 (May 24, 2003)

Stanford extended its string of 40-win seasons to nine in a row with a 12-0 shutout victory over Cal Poly. Mark Romanczuk (10-0) became the first Pac-10 pitcher to win 10 games this season, while Matt Manship record his eighth save to secure Stanford's fourth shutout of the season. Ryan Garko (4-4, HR, 3 RBI) continued his phenomenal season by setting a new single-season career-high with his 15th homer. Garko also tied a career-high with four hits and drove in three runs. Tobin Swope and John Hester also hit their first career home runs.

Danny Putnam (3-5, 2 2B, 2 RBI) added three hits with a pair of doubles and two RBI for the Cardinal. Brian Hall (2-3, RBI) also had a pair of hits, while Jed Lowrie tied a career-high with three RBI.

Romanczuk struck out eight batters while allowing just four hits and one walk over the first 6.0 innings before Manship limited the Mustangs to two hits with two strikeouts over the final 3.0 innings.

Kyle Wilson (2-4) was the only Cal Poly player with more than one hit. Wilson also had 16 putouts defensively at first base.

Mustang starter Garrett Olson (5-3) took the loss, allowing six runs and seven hits over the first 3.2 innings.

at Stanford 8, Cal Poly 4 (May 25, 2003)

Stanford completed a three-game sweep of Cal Poly and finished its 2003 regular season with an 8-4 victory over the Mustangs on Senior/Fan Appreciation Day at Sunken Diamond, winning for the 13th time in its final 14 regular season home games.

Stanford's Chris Carter (2-3, 2B, HR, 2 RBI) had the game's only homer and two RBI, while Sam Fuld (2-4) extended his hit streak to 14 games and Ryan Garko (2-3) also had a pair of hits. Jonny Ash and Donny Lucy added two RBI each.

Stanford starter Tim Cunningham (3-3) was awarded the victory due to a predetermined pitching rotation, scattering two hits and one run with a pair of strikeouts in the first 3.0 innings. Cunningham's victory improved his career record to 24-8, leaving him just one win shy of Stanford's top 10 list in victories. Jonny Dyer and Kodiak Quick both pitched 2.0 scoreless innings of relief.

Mustang starter Andrew McDaniel (4-6) suffered the loss after failing to make it out of the bottom of the first inning, allowing four runs, three hits and a pair of walks while recording just two outs.

Cal Poly did not have a player with more than one hit.

NOTEBOOK

STANFORD WINS OUTRIGHT PAC-10 TITLE

Stanford took two-of-three games from UCLA in its final conference series of the season (5/16 - 5/18) to clinch the outright Pac-10 title for the first time since 1999 (Stanford shared the Pac-10 crown with Arizona State and UCLA in 2000) and wrap up the Pac-10's automatic berth to the NCAA Division I Baseball Championship. Stanford, which finished with an 18-6 league mark, has now won 19 conference championships in school history, including 17 Pac-10 crowns (includes Southern Division and shared titles). Stanford had finished second in the conference behind two-time defending league champion USC in 2001 and 2002 and has been among the top two in the conference standings (includes Pac-10 Southern Division) for 10 straight seasons and 21 times in the last 23 years.

STANFORD HEADS INTO POSTSEASON WITH 13 WINS IN LAST 14 GAMES

Stanford will head into the NCAA Regional this Friday-Sunday with 13 wins in its last 14 games. The Cardinal has also won 12 of its last 13 series, as well as 46 of its past 53. Stanford had posted a season-long nine-game win streak and had won seven straight Pac-10 games (both 5/3 - 5/16) before UCLA stopped the Cardinal, 9-5 in 12 innings, on May 17. Stanford had also won 15 straight Pac-10 home series, as well as eight consecutive overall and eight in a row in Pac-10 play before Arizona won two-of-three at Sunken Diamond (4/25 - 4/27).

STANFORD WINS FINAL 14 REGULAR SEASON ROAD GAMES

Stanford finished its regular season road schedule by winning its final 14 road games, punctuating the streak with a three-game sweep at California (5/9 - 5/11). Stanford, which last lost a road game at Arizona State on March 22 (7-6, 11 inn.), started the streak with victories in the final two games of its series versus the Sun Devils (3/23 - 3/24) and continued the run with a series sweep at Washington State (4/4 - 4/7), as well as victories at Santa Clara (4/8) and Sacramento State (4/22) before sweeping USC (5/3 - 5/4), winning at San Jose State (5/6) and sweeping at California (5/9 - 5/11). Stanford won 11 of its 12 Pac-10 road games in 2003, sweeping its final three conference road series, and was 17-5 in 22 road games overall.

APRIL SHOWERS BRING MAY FLOWERS

For the third consecutive season, the Cardinal struggled in the second half of April before playing well in May. In the last three years, Stanford posted a combined record of just 11-12 in the second half of April before going 37-8 in May. This year, the team finished posted a record of 3-5 in April after the tax deadline and is 13-1 in its first 14 games of May.

STANFORD MAKES SCHOOL HISTORY WITH ALL-PAC-10 HONORS

Ryan Garko, John Hudgins and head coach Mark Marquess made school history when the trio won Pac-10 Co-Player, Pitcher and Coach of the Year honors, marking the first time Stanford has won all three honors in the same season. Sam Fuld and Carlos Quentin were also selected All-Pac-10 for the third consecutive year, while Danny Putnam and Mark Romanczuk were named for the first time. Matt Manship and Tobin Swope were honorable mention choices.

RYAN GARKO HAVING A MONSTER SEASON

Ryan Garko, the Co-Pac-10 Player of the Year and one of 10 national semifinalists for the 2003 Johnny Bench Award given annually to the nation's top catcher, is having a monster season. Garko leads the team in batting average (.406, #3 Pac-10), homers (15, #5T Pac-10), RBI (78, #2 Pac-10, #7 NCAA), hits (86, #3 Pac-10), total bases (150, #3T Pac-10), slugging percentage (.708, #2T Pac-10), multiple-hit games (27), multiple-RBI games (23), sacrifice flies (6) and extra-base hits (34). Garko also ranks second on the club in on-base percentage (.468), hit-by-pitches (9) and putouts (339, #9 Pac-10). Garko's 78 RBI rank him fifth on Stanford's all-time single-season list, while he needs two more homers to enter the school's single-season list. He has more homers (15) than strikeouts (13) and went 81 official at bats between strikeouts at Washington State (4/5) and in his second at bat versus Cal Poly (5/23). With just 13 strikeouts in 212 official at bats he averages just one strikeout every 16.3 official at bats. He has hit safely in 28 of his last 33 games (3/24 - 5/26) with a team-high .487 batting average (58-119), 13 doubles, 11 homers, 53 RBI during the stretch. Garko hit 10 homers and drove in a league-best 39 runs in 24 Pac-10 games (23 starts). Garko also reached a career milestone when he became the first player on this year's team to play in his 200th career game versus UCLA (5/16). Garko is attempting to become just the sixth Stanford player ever and the first Stanford player to hit .400 or better since David McCarty hit .420 in 1991.

CARLOS QUENTIN A CANDIDATE FOR NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR AWARDS

Carlos Quentin has been named one of five finalists for the prestigious 2003 Golden Spikes Award and one of 12 semifinalists for the Rotary Smith Award. Quentin becomes the 10th finalist from Stanford in the 26-year history of the Golden Spikes Award honoring the top amateur baseball player in the country. This year's winner will be announced on various regional cable networks on Tuesday, July 15, the same day as the 2003 Major League Baseball All-Star Game. The Rotary Smith Award will be announced on June 26. Quentin, who has earned his third consecutive All-Pac-10 selection in 2003, leads the Cardinal in doubles (23, #3T Pac-10), walks (33, #7 Pac-10), hit-by-pitches (12, #3 Pac-10), on-base percentage (.485, #5 Pac-10). His 23 doubles rank tied for third on Stanford's all-time single-season list. Quentin also ranks second on the team in batting average (.384, #6 Pac-10), RBI (50), runs scored (58, #7T Pac-10), total bases (132, #9T Pac-10), stolen bases (10), extra-base hits (32), as well as tied for second in multiple-RBI games (11), and third in homers (8) and multiple-hit games (22). Quentin has hit safely in 40 of his last 43 games (2/22, Game 1 - 5/26), going 71-for-174 (.408) with 21 doubles, one triple, eight homers, 47 RBI and eight stolen bases during the stretch. He began the stretch with a two-month career-high 26-game hit streak (2/22, Game 1 - 4/22, .495, 51-103, 18 2B, 1 3B, 5 HR, 30 RBI, 7 SB).

PAC-10 PITCHER OF THE YEAR JOHN HUDGINS LEADS PAC-10 IN FOUR CATEGORIES

John Hudgins (9-3, 3.14) leads the Pac-10 four categories -- innings pitched (123.1), strikeouts (110), complete games (5) and starts (17). He has four complete games in his last eight outings and has lasted at least 6.0 innings 15 of his 17 starts and has also gone 7.0 or more innings 10 times. His complete games have been versus California (3/7), at Washington State (4/4), versus Oregon State (4/17), versus Arizona (4/25) and versus UCLA (5/17). Hudgins has struck out 10 or more batters in a game four times this season and is the only Stanford pitcher to accomplish the feat. He struck out a career-high 11 in 8.0 scoreless two-hit innings in a 9-1 win over Sacramento State (4/11). He also carried a no-hitter into the eighth inning in a 4-1 win versus Fresno State (2/14) and earned Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week honors (2/11) after holding Florida State (2/7) to just one run and six hits with 10 strikeouts over the first 9.0 innings of a game Stanford eventually won, 2-1 in 12 innings. An economics major, he has been named to the Verizon Academic All-District VIII Baseball Team for the first time in his career with a 3.29 cumulative GPA.

MARK ROMANCZUK BECOMES FIRST PAC-10 PITCHER TO 10 WINS

Mark Romanczuk, an All-Pac-10 selection, became the first Pac-10 to win 10 games and has a perfect 10-0 record with a 3.45 ERA. Romanczuk has been named the Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week three times (4/1, 4/21, 5/5) this season. Romanczuk has recorded a 3.45 ERA and added two saves with 69 strikeouts (#6 Pac-10) in 88.2 innings (#7 Pac-10) and has two complete games. He also leads the conference in opponents' batting average (.224). Romanczuk received Stanford's first invitation to the 2003 USA National Baseball Trials -- to be held in Tucson, Arizona from June 21-27.

MATT MANSHIP TIED FOR SECOND IN THE PAC-10 WITH EIGHT SAVES

Matt Manship (2-4, 3.20, 8 SV, 50.2 IP, 43 SO) is tied for second in the Pac-10 with eight saves, which also ranks Manship tied for sixth on Stanford's single-season save list. He picked up his most recent save with 3.0 scoreless innings of work versus Cal Poly as he and fellow freshman Mark Romanczuk combined to shutout the Mustangs. His previous two saves came in a three-game series at California, recording the final out in a 9-8 win in the series opener (5/9) and pitching a scoreless ninth inning in a 6-4 victory in the second game of the series (5/10). Manship has made 19 of his 20 appearances out of the bullpen and also picked up a victory in his only start of the season at USC (5/4 - Game 2) with a career-high 7.2 innings of work. Manship has been named honorable mention All-Pac-10.

SAM FULD ON CAREER TRIPLES, BATTING AVERAGE, HITS AND DOUBLES LISTS

Sam Fuld is among Stanford's all-time leaders in triples (15, #4T), batting average (.355, #5), hits (273, #9) and doubles (49, #10T). Fuld currently has a 14-game hit streak (5/3 - 5/26, .400, 24-60, 3 2B, 3 3B, 8 RBI) that is one shy of his career-high set earlier this season and has boosted his season average 27 points to its current .331, the highest it has been since at .335 on April 18. Fuld leads the club this season in triples (9, #2 Pac-10), runs scored (68, #4 Pac-10) and at bats (248, #2 Pac-10). Fuld's nine triples this season are second on Stanford's all-time single-season list and just shy of the 50-year old record of 10 set by Jack Shepard in 1953. Fuld has been named All-Pac-10 for the third consecutive season.

DANNY PUTNAM PLAYING STRONG SUPPORTING ROLE

Danny Putnam earned All-Pac-10 honors after having been one of Stanford's offensive leaders all season. Putnam currently ranks second on the club in home runs (11) and tied for second in slugging percentage (.611), as well as third in batting average (.356), RBI (45) and on-base percentage (.433). Putnam has homered twice in a game three times this season, most recently with a pair of long balls in Stanford's 9-8 win in 10 innings over UCLA (5/18).

HALL HOT WITH EIGHT-GAME HIT STREAK, SIX STRAIGHT MULTIPLE-HIT GAMES

Brian Hall has equaled a career-high with his current eight-game hit streak (5/6 - 5/24, 18-37, .486, 4 2B, 3 3B, 2 SB, 6 RBI) and also has six straight multiple-hit games, raising his average 39 points from a season-low of .270 to its current .309.

DONNY LUCY EXCELS AS PINCH-HITTER

Donny Lucy has been Stanford's top pinch-hitter this season. Lucy is hitting an amazing .778 (7-9) when called on in a pinch-hitting role this season.

CARDINAL EXTENDS 40-WIN SEASON STRING TO NINE

Stanford has extended its school record string of consecutive 40-win seasons to nine with its current 41-15 record. The last time Stanford didn't win 40 games was when the club finished 27-28 in 1993. Stanford has also assured itself of another winning season in 2003. The Cardinal has now been above .500 in 38 of the last 39 and 55 of the last 57 campaigns.

SUN SHINES ON THE CARDINAL

Stanford has a remarkably different record in day and night games this year. Stanford has a 28-6 record during day games and is just 12-9 under the lights.

GETTING ON THE SCOREBOARD EARLY

Stanford has scored first in 40 of its 56 games this season, winning 35 of those contests. The Cardinal is just 6-10 in the 16 games in which its opponent has scored first.

STANFORD PLAYERS IN PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL

Stanford has had 61 former players reach the Major Leagues, most recently with the debuts of Jody Gerut (OF, Cleveland Indians) and Jason Young (RHP, Colorado Rockies) in 2003. Eight former Stanford players have put on a Major League Baseball uniform during the 2003 campaign. In addition to Gerut and Young, former Stanford players Jeff Austin (RHP, Cincinnati Reds), Jeffrey Hammonds (OF, Milwaukee Brewers), Rick Helling (RHP, Baltimore Orioles), Jason Middlebrook (RHP, New York Mets), Mike Mussina (RHP, New York Yankees) and Justin Wayne (RHP, Florida Marlins). Bob Boone (Manager, Cincinnati Reds) and Ruben Amaro, Jr. (Assistant GM, Philadelphia Phillies) are also currently involved with Major League Baseball in 2002. A total of 26 former players have participated in professional baseball this season.

CARDINAL, WHITE AND BLUE

Stanford emerged on top of a recent USA National Team player study by produced 20 Team USA players that have played in 28 seasons over the last 18 years, more than any other collegiate program in the nation in both categories. Stanford is also tops in the nation with at least one player on the Team USA roster for 16 consecutive years. Four current Stanford players have participated with Team USA -- Tim Cunningham (2001), Sam Fuld (2001, '02), Ryan Garko (2001, '02), Carlos Quentin (2001, '02). Current freshman left-handed pitcher Mark Romanczuk has been invited to the 2003 USA National Team Trials. Also, with the selection of Quentin as one of five finalists for the 2003 Golden Spikes Award, Stanford equaled Miami for the most finalists in the history of the award with 10. No Stanford player has ever won the honor.

OFFENSIVE REPORT

Stanford's current season batting average stands at .318 (#3 Pac-10), which would rank tied for third on Stanford's all-time list for a single-season. Pac-10 Co-Player of the Year Ryan Garko and Carlos Quentin are both having huge seasons. Garko leads the team in batting average (.406, #3 Pac-10), homers (15, #5T Pac-10), RBI (78, #2 Pac-10, #7 NCAA), hits (86, #3 Pac-10), total bases (150, #3T Pac-10), slugging percentage (.708, #2T Pac-10), multiple-hit games (27), multiple-RBI games (23), sacrifice flies (6) and extra-base hits (34). Garko also ranks second on the club in on-base percentage (.468), hit-by-pitches (9) and putouts (339, #9 Pac-10). Garko's 78 RBI rank him fifth on Stanford's all-time single-season list, while he needs two more homers to enter the school's single-season list. Quentin leads the Cardinal in doubles (23, #3T Pac-10), walks (33, #7 Pac-10), hit-by-pitches (12, #3 Pac-10), on-base percentage (.485, #5 Pac-10). His 23 doubles rank tied for third on Stanford's all-time single-season list. PITCHING REPORT

Stanford's ERA currently sits at 4.05 (#2 Pac-10) and the Cardinal has held its opponents to a Pac-10 low .247 batting average. Pac-10 Pitcher of the Year John Hudgins (9-3, 3.14) is the conference's leader in four categories -- innings pitched (123.1), strikeouts (110), strikeouts, starts (17) and complete games (5). Hudgins also has the team's lowest ERA (#3 Pac-10) among regulars. Mark Romanczuk (10-0, 3.45, 2 SV, 88.2 IP, 69 SO) shares the Pac-10 as the only Pac-10 pitcher to win 10 games during the regular season and paces the Pac-10 in opponents' batting average (.224). Romanczuk also has two complete games and has been named the Pac-10 Pitcher of the Week three times (4/1, 4/20, 5/5). Tim Cunningham (3-3, 5.49, 39.1 IP, 20 SO) has returned as the team's Sunday starter in each of its last three series. Ryan McCally (5-2, 5.35, 2 SV, 74.0 IP, 43 SO) spent most of the season as a starter and ranks third on the club with 11 starts (including one complete game) but has been used primarily out of the bullpen recently. Matt Manship (2-4, 3.20, 8 SV, 50.2 IP, 43 SO) leads the club, is tied for second in the Pac-10 and ranks tied for sixth on Stanford's single-season list with eight saves. Manship also picked up a win in his first and only collegiate start at USC (5/4). David O'Hagan (6-1, 5.88, 3 SV, 41.1 IP, 37 SO) has won six games out of the bullpen and also saved three games. Kodiak Quick (2-0, 4.41, 3 SV, 34.2 IP, 33 SO) and Jonny Dyer (2-1, 3.79, 19.0 IP, 11 SO) have both won a pair of games with Quick also recording three saves. Drew Ehrlich (1-0, 4.19, 19.1 IP, 18 SO) and Mark Jecmen (1-0, 4.32, 8.1 IP, 7 SO) have the team's other two wins. Stanford has already posted 18 saves, second in the conference and just five short of the school record of 23 set in 2001.

DEFENSIVE REPORT

Stanford has a .971 fielding percentage (#3 Pac-10) and has been errorless 19 times this season, including two in a row and three of its last four. John Mayberry, Jr. leads the club and ranks fourth in the Pac-10 with 437 putouts, while Tobin Swope is the second in the Pac-10 with a team-high 172 assists. Mayberry's 16 putouts at Washington State (4/5), as well as eight assists by Swope at USC (5/4 - Game 2) are single-game team highs. Stanford has turned a season-high three double plays twice versus Nevada (2/17) and at USC (5/3).

STANFORD IN TOP FIVE OF ALL FOUR MAJOR NATIONAL POLLS FOR SECOND CONSECUTIVE WEEK

Stanford is in the top five of all four major national polls for the consecutive week. Stanford moved up one notch to No. 4 in the latest *Baseball America* poll released May 27, its highest ranking since the Cardinal was also ranked No. 4 on April 21. Stanford held its position in the other three major national polls, staying at No. 3 in *Collegiate Baseball*, No. 4 in the NCBWA poll and No. 5 in *Sports Weekly/ESPN*. Florida State held on to its No. 1 position in two of the four polls (*Baseball America* and *Sports Weekly/ESPN*), while Rice moved into the top spot in the *Collegiate Baseball* and NCBWA polls. Florida State had been the nation's unanimous No. 1 team for the previous three weeks. Stanford began the 2003 season ranked as high as No. 3 in the preseason *Baseball America* poll and has been in the publication's top 10 all season. Stanford has been ranked No. 1 at one point during each of the past six years (1997-2002) prior to this season but has not been in the top spot yet this year. Stanford's poll history includes a run as "king of the polls" in 1998 when the team held the top spot in the *Baseball America* poll for the entire regular season (a record 14 consecutive weeks). Stanford has already played 18 games against teams ranked in *Baseball America's* top 25 at the time of their game and 12 versus teams currently ranked in the top six (No. 1 Florida State, No. 3 Cal State Fullerton, No. 5 Arizona State, No. 6 Texas). Stanford has played 24 games against teams ranked among *Baseball America's* top 25 at some point this season.

The Cardinal won NCAA titles in 1987 and 1988 before returning to the CWS championship game in 2000 and 2001 ... Stanford has made a school record four straight College World Series appearances in the last four seasons and has been to the CWS 14 times since making its first appearance in 1953 ... Stanford has assured itself of its 38th winning season in its last 39 campaigns this year and has been above .500 for 55 of the last 57 seasons ... Stanford has also reached the 40-win mark in nine consecutive campaigns (1995-2003) and recently recorded three straight 50-win seasons for the first time in school history (1999-2001) ... Stanford has won 19 conference titles (17 Pac-10) after winning its first Pac-10 title since 2000 this season and will be making its 24th NCAA appearance in 2003 ... Stanford has boasted 41 All-Americans who have earned a total of 51 All-American honors ... Stanford has garnered three NCAA Players of the Year in Jeff Austin (1998), David McCarty (1991) and Steve Dunning (1970) ... Stanford has had 100 All-Conference players earn a total of 133 All-Conference honors ... Stanford has had 61 major league players and 13 first round draft picks in the last 16 years ... Eight former Stanford players (Jeff Austin - Cincinnati Reds; Jody Gerut - Cleveland Indians; Jeffrey Hammonds - Milwaukee Brewers; Rick Helling - Baltimore Orioles; Jason Middlebrook - New York Mets; Mike Mussina - New York Yankees; Justin Wayne - Florida Marlins; Jason Young - Colorado Rockies) have seen Major League Baseball action in 2003.

STANFORD COACHING STAFF

STANFORD HEAD COACH MARK MARQUESS

One of the nation's premier collegiate coaches, Mark Marquess is in his 27th season at the helm of Stanford Baseball in 2003 with an overall record of 1134-548-5 (.673) and a 462-294 (.611) mark in Pac-10 action. The 1969 Stanford graduate has led the Cardinal to two CWS titles and a pair of runner-up showings, 12 College World Series appearances, 12 NCAA Regional titles and four NCAA Super Regional championships. The Cardinal also just won its 11th Pac-10 championship (includes Southern Division and shared titles) and qualified for the NCAA Tournament for the 21st time in 27 years under Marquess in 2003. Marquess began the 2003 season ranked 10th in victories and 16th in winning percentage among active Division I baseball coaches. Marquess moved into sole possession of 20th place on the all-time victory list with his 1101st career victory at Texas (2/22/03 - Game 1). Recent milestone victories were his 1100th career win versus Nevada (2/17/03) and his 1000th against Florida State (2/9/01). He has been named NCAA Coach of the Year three times and has received Pac-10 or Pac-10 Southern Division Coach of the Year honors on nine occasions, most recently with his selection in 2003. The Cardinal has assured itself of its 26th winning campaign in 27 seasons under his leadership this year and has finished either first or second in the prestigious Pacific-10 (formerly Pac-10 Southern Division) 20 times in the last 22 years. Stanford has had 104 professional baseball draft picks in the past 18 seasons, including 13 first round selections in the last 16 years. A member of the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame, Marquess was the head coach of the 1988 United States Olympic baseball team that captured the gold medal. Marquess was also an accomplished football and baseball standout on The Farm and is a member of the Stanford Athletic Hall of Fame. He is one of only six collegiate baseball head coaches to have both played and coached in the College World Series. Marquess was the starting first baseman and a First Team All-American on Stanford's 1967 CWS squad and played four seasons of minor league baseball with the Chicago White Sox organization.

COMMENTS FROM MARK MARQUESS

(On winning the regular season Pac-10 title)

"It's quite an accomplishment for us, especially the way we did it by winning eight of our last nine games, including six of those on the road. I was very impressed with the way we played. It wasn't just one phase of the game, we played well in all phases. To win the Pac-10 title with an 18-6 record and to go 11-1 on the road is impressive."

(On the NCAA Regional field playing at Stanford)

"This will be a good NCAA Regional field. Every team still playing at this time of the year is playing well."

(On Stanford's No. 6 national seeding)

"I'm happy to have earned a national seed because it means if we are able to win the Regional, we would have the opportunity to host a Super Regional."

(On All-American candidates Ryan Garko, Carlos Quentin and John Hudgins)

"Ryan Garko and Carlos Quentin are both having their best seasons yet. If you're going to have a good season as a team, your older players are usually going to have their best years and that's what has happened here. John Hudgins has taken over the Friday starter role and done a great job for us."

(On Stanford's Pac-10 selections)

"I'm really happy for our players that earned All-Pac-10 honors. Ryan Garko and John Hudgins were deserving of the top honors they got, because we're not where we are right now without those two players. For Carlos Quentin and Sam Fuld to both be named All-Pac-10 for the third consecutive year tells you what type of players those two guys are, and I'm very happy that Danny Putnam and Mark Romanczuk were recognized for what they did for us this season."

STANFORD COACHING STAFF

Dean Stotz is in his 27th campaign with Stanford Baseball and his fourth season as associate head coach after he was promoted to the position prior to the 2000 campaign. Stotz served for 23 years as an assistant. Stotz currently coaches third base while also handling various offensive and defensive aspects of the game. Tom Kunis is in his fourth season as Stanford's pitching coach, while Dave Nakama is in his fourth year overall as a Stanford assistant coach.
