Texas State University-San Marcos was founded in 1899 as Southwest Texas State Normal School to prepare teachers for the public schools of Texas. Its doors opened in 1903 with 303 students and 17 faculty members. In its first century, Texas State has grown into a major doctoral-granting institution, nationally recognized in many areas with 26,827 students, 1000 faculty and more than 100,000 graduates.

Below are just 25 of many "Points of Pride" for the university which has been hailed by *Money* magazine as one of the best values in higher education.

## ACADEMICS & FACULTY

- ★ Still honoring its founding as a teachers college, Texas State University certifies more teachers than any other school in Texas. It has been recognized by the Association of Teacher Educators as one of the top three teacher education programs in the country and is headquarters for the National Center for School Improvement, the Texas School Safety Center and other education initiatives to meet the challenges of public education today.
- ★ The Geography Department has been ranked the largest and one of the best programs in the nation for many years by the Association of American Geographers.
- ★ The university's first Ph.D.s (two in geography) were awarded in May 2000. The Coordinating Board praised the university for the manner in which it sought its doctoral programs — building on already successful undergraduate and graduate programs — and fast-tracked a third geography Ph.D. based on the outstanding success of the first two. Texas State now has three Ph.D. programs in geography (environmental geography, geographic education and geographic information science), two in education (school improvement and adult, professional and community education) and a sixth in aquatic resources.
- ★ Annual external grant expenditures, which totaled less than \$2 million in the late '80s, were \$20.6 million in FY02.
- ★ A faculty biochemist has received the largest competitive grant in Texas State history, \$6.3 million from the National Cancer Institute for cancer research.
- ★ Faculty members in geography, communication studies, business, mathematics and mass communication have been recognized as the best in the nation in their fields. Twelve faculty have been honored as Piper Professors, an annual recognition

of the top college faculty in the state.

- ★ The Texas State MathWorks Summer Program received one of five Texas Higher Education Star Awards for exemplary programs to close the educational gaps that challenge the state. Its creator was one of 10 individuals in the nation honored by President Bush for remarkable results in increasing the participation of minorities, women and persons with disabilities in science, math and engineering.
- ★ The physics program was one of five in the nation cited by the American Physical Society for innovation in preparing students for good jobs; others were MIT, LSU, Rutgers and Morehead State.
- ★ The technology curriculum is designed to produce a qualified workforce for the high-tech industry, with programs in manufacturing engineering and semiconductor manufacturing. The new Mitte Complex, which opened in fall 2003, includes a state-of-the-art microchip fabrication facility.
- ★ The creative writing program in the College of Liberal Arts is quickly earning a national reputation. It was cited by Associated Writing Programs as "a dynamic program, one that will establish Texas State as a regional—and very likely national—center for the literary arts." National Book Award winner Tim O'Brien holds the Mitte Chair in Creative Writing for 2003-04.
- ★ The sound recording technology program, housed at Texas State's unique Fire Station Studio, is the only degree program of its kind in the Southwest.
- ★ The stuttering therapy program is the only one of its kind in Texas and the first in the nation.

## STUDENTS

- ★ Texas State's admissions standards are among the highest in the state for public institutions. Today almost all incoming freshmen graduated in the top half of their high school class, compared with three-quarters of them in the late '80s; more than half are from the top quarter of their classes, compared with 35% in the late '80s.
- ★ Texas State is the third most popular choice of colleges for Texas students who apply electronically (about half of students apply on-line).
- ★ The retention rate of freshmen is now 77%, up from 57% in the late '80s.

- ★ The student body is 26% ethnic minority. Texas State continues to be among the top 20 producers of Hispanic undergraduate degrees in the country.
- ★ Student teams in debate, advertising and free enterprise routinely compete nationally and place in the top five; the Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) team won the international competition in 2000 vying against over 700 teams from 15 countries; the American Advertising Federation student team placed third in nationals from a field of over 250 universities in 2003.
- ★ Student Matthew Tiffée beat out hundreds of other students to win one of two positions on the 2004 U.S. Debate Team.

ing program in intramural and club sports, which are open to all students. Students are offered leadership opportunities in more than 200 social, professional, political and religious organizations.

#### GENERAL

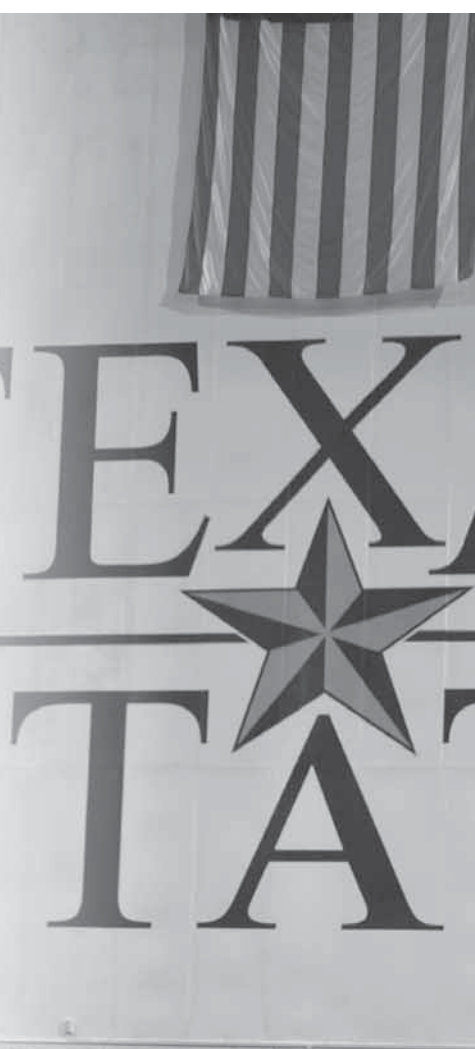
- ★ The National Endowment for the Humanities has designated Texas State the nation's study center for the Southwest, one of eight such regional centers. Others are at Temple, Tulane, Ohio, Nebraska, California-Davis, Wisconsin, and the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities.
- ★ Texas State is the lead institution in the Round Rock Higher Education Center serving North Austin and Williamson County that opened in 1998. Enrollment is more than 1,600, and a permanent facility will be completed by 2005.

- ★ The university's first capital campaign concluded in 1999, raising a total of \$74.6 million on a goal of \$60 million. Annual private gifts now total \$15 million, compared to about a half million dollars in 1988. In that time the endowment has increased from \$15 million to \$55 million.



- ★ Texas State students in jazz, marching and concert band, symphony, choirs, instrumental ensembles, mariachis and steel drum band maintain schedules of performances across the state and the world; the jazz program has been featured for years at the Montreux (Switzerland) Jazz Festival.
- ★ Students in communications design continue to sweep competitions in Houston, San Antonio and Dallas, building the Art and Design Department's reputation as Texas' leading "graphic arts" program.
- ★ Bobcats compete in 16 intercollegiate sports in NCAA Division I (Division 1-AA in football), where 360 students are scholarship athletes, in addition to a wide-rang-

- ★ Katherine Anne Porter's childhood home in Kyle was bought and restored by Preservation Associates Inc. and a group of local Kyle citizens, mainly with the generous help of the Burdine Johnson Foundation, to be used as a writer's residence and a site for lectures and seminars by Texas State's MFA program in creative writing. In June 2002, First Lady Laura Bush dedicated the home as a National Literary Landmark, the second such designation in Texas.
- ★ Aquarena Center is an environmental learning center situated along the head waters of the San Marcos River and provides the community an opportunity to discover a natural wonder created by the Edwards Aquifer, a major water source for Central Texas.

**Dr. Denise M. Trauth**

President

College of Mount St. Joseph, 1971

Beginning her fourth year as Texas State University-San Marcos' president is Dr. Denise M. Trauth. Trauth became the university's ninth president in June, 2002.

During her tenure, the university has changed its name and celebrated its first 100 years of classroom instruction (the first classes were held in September 1903 in Old Main). A sixth Ph.D. (aquatic resources) was approved and began instruction in 2003, a second engineering program was approved and began in 2004 and other engineering and doctoral programs are in various stages of approval.

The university also established a multi-year plan to increase the size of the faculty and bring average faculty salaries up to a more competitive level and hired its first provost. Trauth led the process leading to Legislative approval and funding for a \$27 million building in Round Rock, and secured the Avery family's gift of 101 acres of land for Texas State University-San Marcos' Round Rock Higher Education Center campus. The Avery Building on this new campus opens for classes this fall.

Under Trauth's leadership, Texas State received the largest gift in its history, a \$20 million endowment from Emmett and Miriam McCoy of San Marcos to support the McCoy College of Business Administration that now bears their name.

Also under Trauth's leadership, Texas State has developed a new university mission statement, new shared values, new university goals and completed University Plan to guide the univer-

sity's academic development through 2009.

This past May, the Texas State University System Board of Regents approved a Campus Master Plan designed to guide the university's development of facilities through the year 2015.

Besides the Round Rock building, other new facilities that have opened in the last three years include the Mitte Complex, San Marcos and San Jacinto residence halls, the Student Health Center, Bobcat Village, the End Zone Complex and the addition to Strahan Coliseum. Construction currently on campus includes McCoy Hall, the new home for the McCoy College of Business Administration.

In addition to her on-campus responsibilities, Trauth serves as President of the Austin Area Research Organization, better known as AARO, a non-profit organization composed of 75 business and community leaders in the five-

county Austin region. She serves as a member of the Board of Directors of Austin Vision 2010 and the Austin Lyric Opera.

Trauth is a Commissioner of the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the recognized regional accrediting body in the 11 U.S. Southern states, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities.

Trauth came to Texas State from the University of North Carolina Charlotte, where she served as provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. Prior to being named provost and vice chancellor, she served as dean of the UNC Charlotte Graduate School and as a professor of communication studies.

As provost at UNC Charlotte, she led the university's successful push to be reclassified as a Carnegie Doctoral/Research Intensive institution.

Trauth also oversaw the formation of the College of Information Technology and the College of Health and Human Services at UNCC.

Before joining the UNC Charlotte staff, Dr. Trauth was a faculty member and administrator at Bowling Green State University for 16 years. She joined the faculty there as an assistant professor of speech communication and became assistant director of the School of Speech Communication a year later. She became chair of Bowling Green's Department of Telecommunications and later served as associate dean of the university's Graduate College.

Trauth also served on the faculty of the University of Tulsa from 1974 to 1977.

She holds a bachelor's degree in English literature from the College of Mount St. Joseph in Ohio, a master's degree in journalism from Ohio State University and a Ph.D. in mass communication from the University of Iowa. She is married to Dr. John Huffman, professor emeritus at Bowling Green State University and UNC Charlotte. They have two grown daughters.

## Dr. Larry Teis

Director of Athletics

TCU, 1988

When Texas State University initiated its search for a new director of athletics in February 2004, the search went no further than its new athletic administration building. Citing his leadership skills, experience and values as elements that made him the right fit for the position, Texas State President Dr. Denise M. Trauth named Dr. Larry Teis the Bobcats' eighth director of athletics in March 2004.

A member of Texas State's athletic administration since 1998, Teis resides in the President's Council and reports directly to President Trauth.

In his previous role as Associate Athletics Director for External Affairs, Teis had oversight of several key areas, including game management, marketing, promotions, facilities and ticket sales. He was also responsible for the administration of men's and women's golf, baseball and volleyball as well as the Strutters. From 1998-2002,

Teis also oversaw the Bobcat Athletic Foundation.

During Teis' first year and a half heading the department, Texas State University has captured back-to-back Southland Conference Commissioner's Cups. The trophy is annually awarded to the league institution with the highest combined total of men's and women's all-sports points. Texas State has also now won the Southland Conference Women's All-Sports Trophy for five straight years.

Other key accomplishments during Teis' first 18 months include: the restructuring and hiring of key senior administrative staff; involvement in all phases of the Bobcat Legacy athletic facility campaign, which to date has resulted in over \$19-million in athletic facility improvements; escalating Bobcat Athletic Foundation

gifts that have nearly tripled in a three-year span; the restructuring of the athletic academic center, and the completion and implementation of the department's five-year strategic plan.

A native of Fort Worth, Teis came to Texas State after spending four years as the Director of Athletic Marketing at TCU. In that position, he developed the marketing plan for all sports at TCU, including facility signage, season ticket campaigns, game day operations, and corporate sponsorships.

Prior to his tenure at TCU, Teis was the Assistant Director of the University of New Mexico's Lobo Club for three years, working in all aspects of the athletic department's annual fund drive.

A featured speaker this past summer at the NACDA national convention, Teis also has served on several key Southland Conference committees. Locally, Teis is an active member of the community, including serving as vice-president on the board of directors of the San Marcos Convention and Visitors Bureau.

Teis holds a bachelor's degree in marketing from TCU, a master's in sports administration from St. Thomas University of Miami, Fla., and a doctorate in health, physical education and recreation with an emphasis in sports administration from the University of New Mexico.

Teis resides in San Marcos with his wife, Jana, and two daughters, Taylor (12) and Shelby (eight).

## Dr. Paul Gowens

Faculty Representative

Baylor, 1965

**D**r. Paul Gowens, professor of economics and chair of the Athletic Advisory Council, is in his fifth year as Texas State University's NCAA Faculty Athletics Representative.

In addition to teaching at the university level for 30 years, Gowens served as dean of Texas State's College of Business Administration from 1984-1999 and as chair of the Department of Finance and Economics from 1980-1984.

He has also served as assistant dean and director of graduate business programs at Texas A&M University at Commerce, Director of the Center for Economic Education at West Texas A&M University, and head basketball coach at Corpus Christi's Flour Bluff High School.

Gowens also spent 15 months in 1987-88 as provost of the ITM/TIEC cooperative education program in Malaysia.

Gowens has served as president of the Texas Council of Collegiate Education in Business, president of the Southwestern Society of Economists, and as a member of the board of directors of the Texas Council on Economic Education. His teaching and research have focused on applying economic theory to business decision-making.

As Texas State's Faculty Representative, Gowens chaired the NCAA Athletic Certification Self-Study Committee which led to the certification of Texas State's athletics program.

Gowens received his bachelor's degree in mathematics and economics in 1965 and his master's in education in 1968 from Baylor University. His Ph.D. in economics was conferred by the University of Mississippi in 1973.

He is married to the former Pat Stinson. They have two children, Ryan and Geoff.



## Don Coryell

Associate Athletics Director/External Operations

Lamar, 1998

**D**on Coryell begins his second year on the Texas State University athletic department staff. Coryell was named the Associate Athletics Director for External Operations in 2004 after working the past four seasons at his alma mater, Lamar University.

At Texas State, Coryell is responsible for the athletic department's marketing and promotional campaigns, ticket operations, sponsorships and community relations. He is also the athletic department administrator for Texas State's soccer program as well as men's and women's golf programs.

Coryell, a former standout basketball player at Lamar, began his athletic administration career as a marketing specialist for the

Cardinals. He was named Assistant Athletic Director for Development at Lamar in 2001.

The Beaumont native was responsible for all external affairs of the department, including fund-raising, marketing, promotions, sponsorships and community relations.

Additionally, he served as executive director of the Cardinal Club, the booster group for Lamar Athletics. He successfully headed the Cardinal Club Membership Drive that exceeded its goal of raising \$100,000.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Coryell spent one season playing professional basketball in Ireland for the Rullman Flyers. He was a member of the all-star team and headed clinics for students from ages 5-18 at over 40 campuses.

A 1998 graduate of Lamar with a bachelor's degree in corporate communication, Coryell was named the team's most valuable player following his senior season. He played two years at Lamar after transferring from Angelina Junior College where he was a 1996 Academic All-American.



## Tim McMurray

Associate Athletics Director/

Development and Communications

Lamar, 1992

**T**im McMurray is in his sixth year at Texas State University and his second as Associate Athletics Director for Development and Communications.

In his current role, McMurray oversees the Bobcat Athletic Foundation (executive director), media relations, Strutters and is directly responsible for athletic major gifts. He is also responsible for the administration of the Bobcat baseball and softball programs.

In his previous role as Assistant Athletics Director for Development, McMurray helped generate agreements that have resulted in several major capital gifts. The gifts were given as part of the Bobcat Legacy Campaign, which has resulted in over \$19 million of athletic facility renovations and construction in the last four years. Accompanying this project is a brick paver and locker naming campaign adjacent to athletic facilities.

Additionally, Bobcat Athletic Foundation dollars raised has grown by 65 percent over the last two years and new members have grown by over 50 percent.

In addition to the Bobcat Stadium End Zone Complex, facility enhancement projects undertaken by the department and university include: a new athletic administration building, basketball and volleyball wing renovations, soccer complex enhancements, re-surfacing the track and a renovation of the Olympic sports wing. Phase I of the baseball and softball complex renovations began this summer.

McMurray came to Texas State in fall of 2000 from Lamar where he was an Assistant Athletic Director for Development. He handled all external affairs of the department, including fund-raising, marketing and promotions, sponsorships and community affairs. At Lamar, annual giving tripled over a two-year window and corporate sponsorship dollars more than doubled.

After four years in the Lamar Sports Information Office, McMurray made the transition to external affairs. He is a 1992 graduate of Lamar.

Additionally, he is a 2000 graduate of the NACDA Sports Management Institute.

McMurray and his wife, Vickie, reside in Kyle.



## Tracy Shoemake

Associate Athletics Director/Internal Operations

Texas, 1990

**T**racy Shoemake begins her second year as Texas State University's Associate Athletics Director for Internal Operations. Additionally, Shoemake serves as the Senior Women's Administrator.

Shoemake oversees the internal operations of the athletic department, including academics, compliance, student-athlete development, the athletic training program, strength and conditioning, video and equipment. She is also responsible for the administration of Texas State's track and field, cross country and women's tennis programs.

Shoemake joined the Texas State staff from the America East Conference. She had served as the Assistant Commissioner for Compliance since 1997 but had also handled numerous additional duties. She was the conference administrator for various America East Conference championships including men's basketball.

While with the conference, she coordinated all facets of NCAA governance structure and legislative process for the league membership. She both interpreted NCAA rules and regulations for the league's schools and enforced conference policies and processed NCAA secondary violations.

A native of New Braunfels, Shoemake handled compliance for two years at Northeastern University prior to joining the America East Conference staff. At Northeastern, she also served as the administrator for various sports programs.

From 1991 to 1995, Shoemake worked at the University of Houston, the first three years in athletic academic counseling and the last in compliance.

She is currently the chair of the NCAA Division I Legislative Review Interpretations Committee and this year begins a term on the NCAA Division I Volleyball Committee. She formerly served on the NCAA Division I Academics, Eligibility and Compliance Cabinet.

A 1990 graduate of the University of Texas with a bachelor's degree in liberal arts, Shoemake earned her master's in sports administration from Houston in 1993.



## Debra Boughton

Assistant Athletics Director/Business Manager

Trinity, 1997

**D**ebra Boughton is in her fourth year as an administrator with the Texas State University athletic department. This past spring she was elevated to the position of Assistant Athletics Director.

Boughton is responsible for a broad range of administrative ser-

vices in the areas of budgets, business and personnel management. She is the department liaison to the University comptroller, accounting, budget and personnel departments.

During her tenure at Texas State, the Austin native has successfully transitioned the department to NACDA's (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) insurance program for improved student-athlete healthcare. Additionally, she provided successful oversight of the department's first charter bus contract in an effort to streamline and improve team transportation.

Boughton came to Texas State from Ohio University where she completed a master's in sports administration while working in the school's athletic department. She also worked for two years on the Experienced Audit Staff of Arthur Anderson's Assurance and Business Advisory Division.

Boughton earned a bachelor's in accounting in 1997 from Trinity University in San Antonio, while lettering four years on the women's soccer team. She was a four-time, all-conference selection and received Player of the Year honors as a senior. She served as a Graduate Research Assistant with the Trinity University Director of Accounting while earning her first master's degree in 1998.

The former Debra Hutcheson was married this past April to Dale Boughton.



## Karen Chisum

Assistant Athletics Director

Texas State, 1972

**K**aren Chisum begins her 26<sup>th</sup> season as the Head Volleyball Coach of the defending Southland Conference champion Bobcats. Additionally, she begins her second year as an Assistant Athletics Director at Texas State University.

Under Chisum's leadership, Texas State has won the SLC regular-season title four times and captured three league tournament titles.

Chisum, a Texas State alumnus, has compiled a 599-376-3 record and currently ranks ninth among active Division I coaches in victories. In 2003, she became one of only 14 active coaches to hit the 550 mark and with her first win in 2005 will eclipse the 600-win plateau.

The 2004 season marked the fourth appearance for Chisum in the NCAA Tournament as her 'Cats battled through the Southland Conference Tournament, upending regular-season co-champion Stephen F. Austin in the semifinals and Texas-Arlington in the championship match to receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Since Texas State joined the Southland Conference in 1987, Chisum has guided the Bobcats to a top-three finish in the final regular-season standings in all but five seasons. For four consecutive years in the late 1980s and early '90s, the 'Cats played in the championship match of the Southland Conference Tournament.

Chisum has coached more than 42 all-conference performers. Fourteen Bobcats have earned first-team All-SLC honors during Chisum's tenure at Texas State.



**Chris Elrod**

Assistant Athletics Director/AAC Director

Texas, 1995

Beginning his first year as Texas State University's Assistant Director of Athletics for Academics and Director of Academic Student Services is Chris Elrod. In his new position, Elrod is responsible for coordinating academic programs and the academic progress of the university's 400 student-athletes.

Elrod joins the Texas State University staff from the University of Alabama where he was the Academic Program Advisor for the Crimson Tide football team. He has also served as an academic counselor in the athletic department at the University of Texas.

While at Alabama, Elrod was responsible for designing and implementing a comprehensive academic support program for the Crimson Tide's football student-athletes. Among his responsibilities was monitoring student-athletes' academic progress, creating a graduation progression plan and counseling student-athletes in regards to course selection. He also planned, scheduled and supervised a study table program for Alabama student-athletes.

Prior to joining the Alabama staff in 2004, Elrod was the Academic Counselor for Football at Texas for three years. He counseled student-athletes regarding academic performance and progress. During his tenure, Elrod also oversaw the reorganization and staffing of Texas football's study table.

Elrod served as a graduate assistant in the University of Texas' Department of Kinesiology and Health while completing work toward a master's degree and also worked as an academic intern in Texas' athletic department for a year before being elevated to a fulltime position in 2001.

In addition to his experience in collegiate athletics, Elrod has worked as a history and physical education teacher at the middle school level in both the Granbury and Athens Independent School Districts in Texas.

In addition to his master's degree, Elrod also holds a bachelor's degree from Texas in kinesiology and is currently pursuing a doctorate degree in Higher Education Administration from UT.

Elrod and his wife Sandra have two children, Austin (three) and Allison, who was born in October of this year.



**Scott Lazenby**

Assistant Athletics Director/Compliance

Texas A&M, 1994

Scott Lazenby is in his fifth year at Texas State University directing the program's athletic compliance department. Earlier this year he was elevated to the position of Assistant Athletics Director.

In his role, Lazenby monitors the department's compliance with all NCAA and Southland Conference rules and regulations, and is a resource to coaches, student-athletes, boosters and those affected or interested in the rules.

Lazenby, who earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in sports management from Texas A&M, came to Texas State from College Station.

Lazenby worked as a Compliance Assistant at Texas A&M for one year, processing game reports, practice sheets, eligibility reports, participation reports and squad lists. In addition, he assisted the Education Coordinator with rules interpretations and overall compliance education for athletic staff, alumni and students. He also assisted the Monitoring Coordinator with daily responsibilities.

Prior to his work in the compliance office, Lazenby worked for two years in the academic offices of the department of athletics at Texas A&M.

Lazenby worked for two years as a Youth Activities Manager for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines, and for three years as a Program Director at the Cypress Creek YMCA in Houston.

Lazenby is married to the former Holly Horton of Chatham, Ontario and they have a son, Hunter (three) and a daughter, Lillie, who was born this past August.

## STRAHAN COLISEUM

Press row for Texas State University basketball games is located on the north side of the Strahan Coliseum court, across from the team benches. The media entrance to the arena is from the southeast corner of the coliseum. The southeast entrance is also used for Will Call pick up of credentials. Parking is located just off the southeast corner of the facility for media with proper credentials.

## MEDIA & PHOTO CREDENTIALS

Credentials for Texas State home games are issued for working media only and must be requested through the media relations office, preferably in advance.

Only photographers on assignment from an accredited media agency will be issued credentials. Photographers are required to abide by the guidelines set forth by the NCAA on shooting limitations from the sidelines. Those not complying with the guidelines may be removed.

## MEDIA SERVICES

Pregame packets including notes, statistics and programs will be available in the media room prior to tip-off. Timeout, halftime and final statistics, plus a running play-by-play and post-game notes will be provided.

Final statistics will be faxed via Texas State's broadcast system following the conclusion of every game.

## TELEPHONES

A limited number of telephone lines are available for use on press row. There will be one courtesy line available for visiting teams' "official" radio station. Stations are writers wishing to have another line installed should make their own arrangements through Texas State Telcom Services at (512) 245-2525.

## POST GAME INTERVIEWS

Following home games, Texas State head coach Dennis Nutt will return to the floor for a post-game radio interview. He will remain on the floor to handle any further media questions. Players will also be available after a cooling off period following each game. The Texas State locker room will not be open to the media prior to or after games.
