TAR HEELS WIN ACC REGULAR SEASON TITLE, ADVANCE TO NCAA ELITE EIGHT IN 2010-11

◆ North Carolina (29-8, 14-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) won the ACC regular season championship and advanced to the NCAA Tournament East Regional final in 2010-11, winning 22 of its last 26 games along the way.

◆ The Tar Heels lost 76-69 to Kentucky in the East Regional final in Newark, N.J., falling just short of their fourth Final Four appearance in seven seasons.

◆ Carolina finished No. 7 in the final Associated Press poll and No. 8 in the final ESPN/USA Today coaches poll for the 2010-11 season.



BARNES, ZELLER SHARE TEAM MVP HONORS

◆ Junior forward **Tyler Zeller** was named co-Most Valuable Player and won the team's top defensive award and freshman forward **Harrison Barnes** also was named co-MVP at the University of North Carolina men's basketball team's annual awards ceremony held on April 14.

◆ Zeller also was named a captain, received the Athletic Director's Burgess McSwain Scholar-Athlete Award and won the Mary Frances Andrews Award for the highest field goal percentage and the Martha Jordan Award for the highest free throw percentage.

◆ Zeller averaged 15.7 points and 7.2 rebounds and was named Carolina's top defensive player based on coaches' grades in a team-high 11 games (no other player won the award more than four times). The Washington, Ind., native shot 54.7 percent from the floor and 76.3 percent from the free throw line.

◆ Barnes averaged 15.7 points and 5.8 rebounds and led the Tar Heels with 67 three-point field goals. He made the go-ahead or game-winning baskets in seven different contests and was UNC's top scorer in 11 of the last 17 ACC games.

◆ Graduate student **Justin Knox** and junior forward **Justin Watts** joined Zeller as the team's permanent captains. Watts also won the Foy Roberson Award, given to the player who contributes the most behind the scenes and in practice.

◆ Sophomore forward **John Henson** won the Jimmie Dempsey Award, given to the team's most improved player. Henson averaged 11.7 points and 10.1 rebounds and led the ACC with 118 blocked shots as a sophomore – he averaged 5.7 points and 4.4 rebounds and blocked 60 shots as a freshman. Henson also won the Oscar Vatz Award as the team's top rebounder.

◆ Point guard **Kendall Marshall** won the John Lotz Award for most assists (230) and the Butch Bennett Award, which is given to the freshman who best exemplifies determination, sportsmanship and sacrifice for the good of the team.

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◆ Knox and senior walk-ons **Daniel Bolick**, **Van Hatchell** and **D.J. Johnston** were honored.

CAROLINA IN THE ELITE EIGHT

◆ Carolina's win over Marquette in the Sweet 16 sent UNC to the regional finals for the 25th time and the fifth time in eight seasons under head coach **Roy Williams**.

◆ Carolina has advanced to at least the NCAA Tournament regional finals five times in the last seven seasons. No other school in the nation has more than three Elite Eight appearances in that span. Since 2005, UNC has won two national titles (2005, 2009), advanced to one other Final Four (2008) and reached regional championship games two other times (2007, 2011).

◆ The Tar Heels have reached the regional finals four times in the last five years. Carolina also played in four regional finals in a five-year span from 1981-85 (Elite Eight appearances in 1981, 1982, 1983 and 1985).

◆ UNC is 18-7 in its 25 NCAA Tournament regional finals and has won nine of its last 11 regional finals (losing only in 1992 and 2011 since 1988).

◆ UNC's 25 regional final appearances rank second in NCAA history behind Kentucky's 32. UCLA is third with 22.

◆ Carolina has won 18 of its last 20 games in NCAA Tournament regional play (including 2-0 marks in 1993, 1995, 1997, 1998, 2000, 2005, 2008 and 2009 and 1-1 marks in 2007 and 2011).

◆ **Roy Williams** is 7-3 in NCAA Tournament Elite Eight games as a head coach (4-1 at Kansas and 3-2 at Carolina). The Jayhawks beat Arkansas in 1991 and Indiana in 1993, lost to Syracuse in 1996, beat Oregon in 2002 and beat Arizona in 2003. At UNC, Williams-led teams in the Elite Eight beat Wisconsin in 2005, Louisville in 2008 and Oklahoma in 2009. The Williams-coached Tar Heels lost to Georgetown in 2007 and Kentucky in 2011 in the Elite Eight.

SWEET 16 SUCCESS

◆ Carolina has won 10 consecutive games in the regional semifinals, last losing in the Sweet 16 in 1992 to Ohio State in Lexington, Ky. UNC's 10 straight Sweet 16 wins have come in 2011, 2009, 2008, 2007, 2005, 2000, 1998, 1997, 1995 and 1993.

◆ UNC has an all-time record of 24-7 in NCAA Tournament regional semifinal games, including an 18-6 mark since 1975 (when NCAA Sweet 16 records begin).

◆ The NCAA third-round win over Washington in Charlotte sent Carolina to its 24th Sweet 16 appearance and its 31st NCAA Tournament regional semifinal berth.

◆ Carolina has advanced to the Sweet 16 an NCAA-record 24 times. Kentucky and Duke are tied for second with 22. NCAA Sweet 16 records began in 1975, the first year a team had to win at least one game to reach the regional semifinals.

◆ **Roy Williams** has taken 14 teams to the Sweet 16 in 21 NCAA Tournament appearances as a head coach, including 2005, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011 at Carolina.

ROY WILLIAMS IN NCAA PLAY

◆ Carolina is 24-5 (.828) in NCAA Tournament games under head coach **Roy Williams**. That is the best winning percentage in NCAA history by a coach at one school (minimum 25 NCAA Tournament games). Williams' 34-14 mark (.708) at Kansas is the 11th-best figure and Dean Smith's 65-27 record (.706) at UNC is 12th-highest.

◆ Williams has 58 all-time NCAA Tournament wins, second among all active coaches and third all-time (Mike Krzyzewski has 79 and **Dean Smith** had 65 at UNC).

◆ Williams' Tournament winning percentage of 75.3 (58-19) ranks second among active coaches.

◆ **Williams** made his 21st NCAA Tournament appearance in the last 22 years in 2011. He took 20 teams in a row to the Tournament prior to missing the NCAA field in 2010. The first 14 of Williams' 21 NCAA appearances were at Kansas and the last seven have been at Carolina.

◆ Williams' 20 straight NCAA appearances (1990-2009) was the second-longest streak in NCAA history, trailing only the 23 in a row by Carolina's **Dean Smith** (1975-97).

◆ Williams has coached in 77 NCAA Tournament games, tied as the third-most all-time behind only Mike Krzyzewski (102) and **Dean Smith** (92).

UNC TIED FOR MOST NCAA TOURNAMENT WINS IN HISTORY

◆ UNC is 105-40 in its 145 NCAA Tournament games. That is tied with Kentucky for the most wins in NCAA Tournament history.

CAROLINA'S

NCAA TOURNAMENT HISTORY

◆ In 2011, Carolina played in the NCAA Tournament for the 42nd time, tied for second in NCAA history for most appearances by a program. Kentucky's 51 appearances rank No. 1, followed by Carolina and UCLA's 42.

◆ UNC has reached 18 Final Fours, including at least one in seven consecutive decades between the 1940s and the 2000s. The 18 Final Four appearances are the most in NCAA history.

◆ Carolina has appeared in 145 NCAA Tournament games. Only Kentucky (151) has played in more.

◆ Carolina has a 105-40 NCAA Tournament record. That is the most wins, second-most games and third-highest winning percentage (72.4) in NCAA Tournament history.

◆ The Tar Heels have won at least one game in 27 of their last 28 NCAA Tournament appearances (Carolina lost in the first round in 1999 to Weber State).

TAR HEELS FALL TO KENTUCKY

◆ Carolina fell behind early and saw its season come to an end with a 76-69 loss to Kentucky in the final of the 2011 NCAA Tournament East Regional in Newark, N.J., on March 27.

◆ UNC trailed by as many as eight points in the first half and 11 early in the second half, then clawed back and tied the game at 67-all with 3:18 left in the second half.

◆ Kentucky outscored Carolina 9-2 the rest of the way, holding the Tar Heels scoreless in the final 1:52 of the game.

◆ After **Tyler Zeller's** two free throws tied the game at 67 with 3:18 to go, Brandon Knight scored six of Kentucky's final nine points to ice the win. Zeller's tipin made the score 70-69 UK with 1:52 left, then Deandre Liggins hit a three-pointer for a 73-69 Wildcat lead. Knight hit three free throws in the final 19 seconds.

◆ Zeller led Carolina with 21 points, nine rebounds and four blocks. **Harrison Barnes** had 18 points and six rebounds on 7 of 19 shooting (2 of 9 from three-point range).

◆ **Dexter Strickland** had 11 points, four rebounds, two assists and three steals. **Kendall Marshall** was 2 for 10 from the floor but had seven points, eight assists and four steals.

◆ **John Henson** was limited by foul trouble and saw his streak of double-digit rebounding games end at 15. He fouled out of a game for the first time in his career and finished with four points, nine rebounds and no blocked shots in 23 minutes.

◆ UNC outscored Kentucky 40-24 in the paint and 19-9 in points off turnovers, but UK hit 12 of 22 three-point tries (54.5 percent) to Carolina's 3 of 16 (18.8 percent).

TAR HEELS ROUT MARQUETTE

◆ Carolina went on a 19-0 run in the first and eventually led by as many as 33 points on its way to an 81-63 win over 11th-seeded Marquette in the East Regional semifinal on March 25 in Newark, N.J.

◆ Carolina committed a season-low seven turnovers versus Marquette (previous low was eight at Virginia and at home vs. Wake Forest).

◆ UNC's seven turnovers marked the second consecutive game in which it has had fewer than 10 turnovers (nine vs. Washington). It was the eighth time in Carolina's last 16 NCAA Tournament games to that point that the Tar Heels had committed fewer than 10 turnovers (dating back to 2007 regional semifinal vs. USC).

◆ Carolina allowed only 15 points in the first half, the second-fewest points scored by an opponent in UNC's NCAA Tournament history. Pittsburgh scored eight points in the first half of the 1941 East Regional semifinal.

◆ Marquette shot 20.0 percent (6 for 30) from the floor in the first half, the second-lowest percentage in a half allowed by a UNC defense in NCAA Tournament history. Radford shot 16.7 percent in the second half in the 2009 East first round game in Greensboro, N.C.

◆ The 15 points were the fewest allowed in a half all season by Carolina (previous low was 19 at Virginia in the second half). The 20.0 percent field goal shooting was the lowest by a UNC opponent in any half all season (previous was .233 in the first half by NC State on Jan. 29).

◆ **Tyler Zeller** had 27 points, 12 rebounds, a career-high four assists and three steals (tying his career high) in 27 minutes against Marquette. He also had a career-high seven offensive rebounds.

◆ **John Henson** finished with 14 points, 12 rebounds and five blocked shots. It was Henson's 18th double-double of the season, including nine in a row, the longest streak by a Tar Heel since **Billy Cunningham** had 10 in a row in 1965. It was Henson's 15th consecutive game with 10 or more rebounds, the longest streak by a Tar Heel since Cunningham had 40 in a row

TAR HEEL NOTES & TRENDS

◆ The Tar Heels are 16-3 in NCAA Tournament play in their last four appearances (2007-08-09-11), advancing to the Elite Eight in 2007, the Final Four in 2008, winning the championship in 2009 and reaching the Elite Eight in 2011.

◆ **Harrison Barnes** scored 562 points in the 2010-11 season, the fourth-most points by a UNC freshman in a season. **Joseph Forte** (600) holds the school record, followed by **Rashad McCants** (594) and **Tyler Hansbrough** (587).

◆ **Kendall Marshall** finished the season with 230 assists, third-most by a UNC freshman. **Raymond Felton** had 236 in 2003 and **Ed Cota** had 234 in 1997 as the top two assist totals by freshmen in Carolina history. Marshall had 91 assists in his last 10 games, an average of 9.1 per contest. Eight of those 10 games were against teams that participated in the 2011 NCAA Tournament.

◆ UNC was 17-3 with **Marshall** in the starting lineup.

◆ The 2011 Tar Heels won eight games by three points or less, the most such victories in school history (surpassing the 1976 and 1936 teams, which won seven such games). UNC won 11 games by five points or fewer in 2011.

◆ The Tar Heels went 19-0 when its opponents shot under 40 percent on the season, 25-3 when they out-rebounded their opponents, 20-2 when they forced more turnovers than their opponents and 15-0 when they scored 80 or more points.

◆ UNC was 21-2 on the season when leading at halftime.

◆ Carolina's 40.5 percent defensive field goal percentage was the second-best of the **Roy Williams** era, trailing only the 40.1 percent posted by the 2004-05 national champions.

◆ **John Henson** averaged a double-double (11.7 ppg and 10.1 rpg) and joined **Sean May** (as a junior) and **Tyler Hansbrough** (as a junior) as the only Tar Heels to average a double-double since 2000.

◆ **Kendall Marshall** led the ACC and was ninth nationally in assists per game at 6.2. The only other

Carolina freshman to lead the ACC in assists was **Ed Cota**, who averaged 6.8 assists per game during the 1996-97 season. Marshall had 230 points and 230 assists in 2010-11.

◆ The Tar Heels blocked 204 shots in 37 games, an average of 5.51 per contest and is one of only seven UNC teams to average 5.00 or more blocks per game for a full season.

◆ **John Henson** blocked 118 blocks on the season and is one of only two UNC players with 100 blocks in a season (Brendan Haywood had 120 in 2000-01). Henson ended the season fourth in UNC history with 178 career blocks. He had more blocks than any sophomore in UNC history.

◆ **Brendan Haywood** (2001) was the only Tar Heel to lead the ACC in blocked shots prior to **Henson** in 2010-11.

◆ **Harrison Barnes** scored 17 or more points 16 times on the season, and the Tar Heels went 15-1 in those games (losing only to Kentucky in the NCAA Tournament).

◆ **Kendall Marshall** played at least 35 minutes in 12 of the final 16 games. No other freshman point guard in the Williams era has played at least 35 minutes in any regulation game (**Ty Lawson** logged more than 35 in two overtime games during his freshman season). Overall, the last Carolina freshman point guard to play more minutes than Marshall in a regulation game was **Raymond Felton**, who played 39 minutes against Georgetown on March 26, 2003.

◆ The Tar Heels have averaged under 80 points per game just three times in eight seasons under **Roy Williams** (79.4 ppg in 2005-06, 74.5 in 2009-10 and 77.5 in 2010-11).

◆ **Tyler Zeller** had 13 double-figure scoring games in the first two years of his Carolina career. He had 32 double-figure scoring games in 2010-11.

◆ Carolina's men's and women's basketball teams were both in the NCAA Tournament in 2011, marking the 20th time both teams have made the NCAA field in the same season. That's the most in NCAA history, followed by Connecticut and Duke at 17.

from 1962-64.

◆ Henson blocked five shots, the 11th time on the season he had blocked five or more in a game.

◆ **Harrison Barnes** scored 20 points and became the first Tar Heel freshman to score 20 or more points in his first three NCAA Tournament games. The only other Tar Heel to do so in his first three NCAA Tournament games (regardless of class) was senior **Lennie Rosenbluth**, who did it in his first five NCAA games in 1957.

◆ **Kendall Marshall** had seven assists.

**TAR HEELS TOP WASHINGTON TO
REACH SWEET 16**

◆ Carolina made some clutch defensive plays down the stretch and **Dexter Strickland** hit both ends of a one-and-one with five seconds left to overcome an 11-point, first-half deficit and defeat seventh-seeded Washington 86-83 on March 20 in the NCAA East Regional third round in Charlotte.

◆ There were 11 ties and 12 lead changes in the game.

◆ Carolina is now 29-1 in NCAA Tournament games played in North Carolina and have

won 25 such games in a row. UNC is 11-0 in NCAA Tournament games played in Charlotte.

◆ Freshman point guard **Kendall Marshall** had 13 points and 14 assists. The 14 assists are the most ever by a Tar Heel in an NCAA Tournament game. The previous mark was Kenny Smith's 12 against Notre Dame in the 1987 East Regional semifinal in Charlotte. The 14 assists tie the most by any ACC player in an NCAA Tournament game (John Crotty of Virginia had 14 vs. Middle Tennessee State in the second round on March 18, 1989).

◆ It was Marshall's second double-double of the season and the fifth time in the last eight games he's had 10 or more assists. Marshall's point/assist double-double was the first in an NCAA Tournament game since **Ed Cota** had 20 points and 10 assists in a loss to Weber State in 1999.

◆ There have been 13 NCAA Tournament games in which a UNC player has had 10 or more assists. Marshall has two of those games in his first two Tournament games. Cota did so four times.

◆ The 86-83 win over Washington (three-point margin) was the closest win in an NCAA Tournament game for the Tar Heels since they beat Villanova 67-66 in the 2005 East Regional semifinal in Syracuse, N.Y.

◆ Sophomore **John Henson** posted his eighth consecutive double-double with 10 points, 10 rebounds, four blocked shots and two steals. The last Tar Heel to have eight straight double-doubles was **Sean May** in 2005. Henson now has 14 consecutive double-figure rebounding games, the longest stretch by a Tar Heel since **Billy Cunningham** had 40 in a row from 1962-64.

◆ Henson is the first Tar Heel to score at least 25 points, grab at least 10 rebounds and block at least five shots in an NCAA Tournament game.

◆ **Tyler Zeller** led Carolina in scoring with 23 points. It was his seventh 20-point game of the season and second in a row. He had 55 points in the two games last weekend, leading Carolina in scoring in both games (he had a career-high 32 against Long Island in the second round). The Washington game was the 13th time Zeller has led UNC in scoring this season, tying **Harrison Barnes** for the team lead.

◆ Barnes scored 22 points against Washington, his seventh 20-point game of the season and the third time in the last four postseason games he has scored 20 or more. Barnes is averaging 22.1 points over the last eight games. UNC is 14-0 when Barnes scores at least 17 points.

◆ **Dexter Strickland** had 13 points, six rebounds and no turnovers, hitting both ends of a one-and-one free throw opportunity with 5.4 seconds to play. Strickland also helped contain Washington guard Isaiah Thomas to 5 of 15 shooting from the floor. Strickland's 13 points were his highest scoring output in eight games since he had 13 at NC State on Feb. 23. It was his 10th time scoring in double figures this year, and the Tar Heels are now 9-1 in those games. It was just the fourth time since the start of ACC play in January that Strickland scored in double figures.

◆ The Washington game was the second time this season and the first time since Jan. 2 against Saint Francis that all five Tar Heel starters scored in double figures.

◆ UNC committed only nine turnovers against Washington and are 5-0 this season when committing fewer than 10 turnovers.

TAR HEELS OTRUN LIU, 102-87

◆ **Tyler Zeller** (32 points, nine rebounds), **John Henson** (28 points, 11 rebounds, six blocked shots) and **Harrison Barnes** (24 points and 16 rebounds) led Carolina to the win by combining for 84 of UNC's 102 points.

◆ Zeller (32) and Henson (28) both set career scoring highs. It was the first time two Tar Heels scored 25 or more points in an NCAA Tournament game since the 1972 Final Four, when **Robert McAdoo** (30) and **Dennis Wuycick** (27) accomplished that against Louisville in the third-place game.

◆ Zeller's 32 points equal the sixth-most by a Tar Heel in an NCAA Tournament game and the most since **Tyler Hansbrough** had 33 versus Michigan State in the 2007 East second round in Winston-Salem. It was the 12th 30-point game by a Tar Heel in 142 NCAA Tournament games.

◆ Zeller was 14 for 19 from the free throw line. The 19 attempts tie the UNC record in an NCAA Tournament game. **Tommy Kearns** also attempted 19 versus Syracuse in the 1957 East Regional final. Zeller's 14 free throws made tie for the second-most by a Tar Heel in NCAA Tournament play. Hansbrough made 14 versus Georgetown in the 2007 East final and Kearns made 14 against Syracuse in 1957.

◆ Henson also had 11 rebounds and six blocked shots. It was his seventh consecutive double-double, 13th consecutive game with 10 or more rebounds and the six blocks tie the UNC record for an NCAA Tournament game (**Warren Martin** had six vs. Middle Tennessee State in 1985 and **Rasheed Wallace** had six vs. Georgetown in 1995). Henson has 109 blocks this season (second-most in school history) and 169 for his career (tying **Eric Montross** for fifth all-time by a Tar Heel). Henson's 13 straight double figure rebound games are the most since **Billy Cunningham** had 40 in a row in 1962-64.

◆ UNC blocked 10 shots as a team, tying its season high (done previously against Lipscomb and Saint Francis). The 10 blocks tied the second-most in UNC's NCAA Tournament history and the most since blocking 10 versus George Mason in 2006.

◆ Barnes had 24 points and a career-high 16 rebounds. It was his third double-double of the season. His 16 rebounds are the most by a Tar Heel in NCAA Tournament play since **Sean May** had 17 versus Iowa State in the 2005 East second round.

◆ Carolina scored 102 points, the 11th 100-point game in UNC's NCAA Tournament history and the most since scoring 108 versus Arkansas in the 2009 second round. It was the fourth 100-point game for Carolina this season.

◆ Zeller (32), Henson (28) and Barnes (24) combined for 84 points, the most by any three players this season for UNC in a game. The previous high was 72 versus Clemson in the ACC Tournament semifinals (Barnes had 40, Henson had 18 and Zeller 14).

◆ Henson and Barnes both had double-doubles. The last time two Tar Heels had double-doubles in the same NCAA Tournament game

was against Villanova in the 2005 East semifinal, when May and **Raymond Felton** did so.

◆ **Kendall Marshall** had 10 assists, the fourth time in seven games he'd tallied 10 or more assists. It was the most assists by a Tar Heel in an NCAA Tournament game since Ed Cota had 10 against Stanford in the 2000 second round.

◆ Long Island's 87 points are the most by an opponent in an NCAA Tournament game against UNC since Georgetown had 96 in overtime in the 2007 East Regional final and the most in a regulation game by an opponent since Texas Tech beat Carolina 92-73 in the 1996 East second round.

CAROLINA VS. THE 2011 NCAA FIELD

◆ Carolina played 17 games in 2010-11 against 10 teams that were part of the 2011 NCAA Tournament field of 68 — No. 1 seed Duke (three times), No. 4 seeds Texas and Kentucky (twice), No. 5 seed Vanderbilt, No. 7 seed Washington, No. 9 seed Illinois, No. 10 seed Florida State (twice), No. 12 seed Clemson (three times), No. 15 seed Long Island and No. 16 seed UNC Asheville.

◆ The Tar Heels went 11-6 on the season versus teams in the 2011 NCAA Tournament (see chart).

21 STRAIGHT NCAA TOURNAMENT APPEARANCES WITH A WIN FOR WILLIAMS

◆ With the March 18 win over Long Island, each of the last 21 **Roy Williams**-coached teams to earn NCAA Tournament bids have won their first NCAA Tournament game.

◆ In 2009, Williams set an NCAA record by winning at least one NCAA Tournament game for the 20th year in a row, a streak that ended in 2010. Williams's 20 consecutive years with at least one NCAA Tournament victory is

an NCAA record. Former UNC coach **Dean Smith** is second with 17.

CAROLINA IN THE EARLY ROUNDS

◆ Carolina has won at least one game in each of its last nine NCAA Tournament appearances, winning its first NCAA Tournament game in each of the last nine years since a first-round loss to Weber State in 1999.

◆ That loss to Weber State in 1999 marked the only time in its last 27 NCAA Tournament appearances that Carolina has failed to win at least one Tournament game (since a second-round loss to Texas A&M after a first-round bye in 1980).

ZELLER IMPRESSIVE IN NAAs

◆ **Tyler Zeller** scored 103 points in Carolina's four NCAA Tournament games in 2011. That is the fourth-most points in four consecutive NCAA Tournament games by a Tar Heel in history and the most since **Charles Scott** scored 105 points in four straight games in 1969.

◆ The only other Tar Heel to score more points in four consecutive NCAA games is **Lennie Rosenbluth**, who scored 122 points in the first, second, third and fourth games and 113 points in the second, third, fourth and fifth games in 1957.

◆ Zeller's 103 points are the second-most in a four-game NCAA Tournament run by a Tar Heel, trailing only Scott's 105 points in 1969.

◆ The last time a Tar Heel scored 20 or more points in four consecutive NCAA Tournament games was **Donald Williams** (22 vs. Arkansas, 20 vs. Cincinnati, 25 vs. Kansas and 25 vs. Michigan) in 1993.

◆ Zeller averaged 25.8 points and 8.8 rebounds in four NCAA Tournament games in 2011.

HOT NCAA START FOR BARNES

◆ Freshman **Harrison Barnes** scored 20 or more points in his first three NCAA Tournament games, becoming the first freshman in Carolina history to do so. Barnes scored 24, 22 and 20 points in UNC's first three NCAA games (22.0 per game) before scoring 18 in the East Regional final versus Kentucky.

◆ The only other Tar Heel to score 20 or more in his first three NCAA Tournament games (regardless of class) was senior **Lennie Rosenbluth**, who did it in his first five NCAA games in 1957.

◆ Barnes had 24 points against Long Island, tying the school record for the most by a freshman in his first NCAA game (**Tyler Hansbrough** also had 24, against Murray State in 2006).

HENSON'S REBOUNDING

◆ **John Henson** grabbed 10 or more rebounds 21 times during the 2010-11 season, including 15 of the last 16 games of the season (15 games in a row prior to the season-ending loss to Kentucky).

◆ Henson tied for the fourth-most double-

figure rebound games in a season by a Tar Heel (**Billy Cunningham** had 22 in 1964 and 21 in 1963 and **Antawn Jamison** had 21 in 1998).

◆ Henson finished the season with 374 rebounds, the fifth-most in a season by a Tar Heel.

OFFENSE THRIVED UNDER MARSHALL

◆ In 20 games started by freshman point guard **Kendall Marshall**, Carolina posted a 17-3 record.

◆ Despite starting just 20 games, Marshall led the ACC and was ninth in the nation in assists (6.2 per game) and was second in the ACC (and 22nd nationally) in assist/turnover ratio (2.5). Marshall led all freshmen in the nation in assists per game in 2010-11.

◆ In ACC games only, Marshall averaged 6.8 assists per contest, the highest figure in the conference by a wide margin (Duke's Nolan Smith was second at 4.9 apg in ACC contests).

◆ UNC shot 35.4 percent from the floor in its first three ACC games, but made 45.0 percent from the floor in the 20 contests after Marshall took over as the starting point guard.

◆ Carolina averaged 77.8 points per game in its final 20 games after averaging 61.3 ppg in its first three ACC contests.

TAR HEELS NO. 7 IN FINAL AP POLL

◆ Carolina finished No. 7 in the final Associated Press national poll, released on March 14 (prior to the 2011 NCAA Tournament).

◆ That marks the 33rd time that UNC has been ranked in the Top 10 of the final AP poll and the sixth time under head coach **Roy Williams**. Williams has 15 Top-10 AP finishes in 23 years as a head coach.

◆ Carolina has Top-10 final rankings under Williams in 2005 (2nd), 2006 (10th), 2007 (4th), 2008 (1st), 2009 (2nd) and 2011 (7th).

◆ This season's rebound from unranked at midseason in the AP poll to the Sweet 16 marks just the fourth time in the history of the AP poll that Carolina has achieved that feat. The other three occasions were the 1982-83 season, the 1989-90 campaign, and the 1999-00 season.

TAR HEELS IN TOP 10 IN BOTH NATIONAL POLLS

◆ UNC was ranked No. 7 in the final Associated Press poll, released on March 14.

◆ The Tar Heels were ranked No. 8 in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll, released after the NCAA Tournament on April 5.

◆ Carolina returned to the national rankings on Jan. 31 at No. 23 in the AP poll, marking the first time the Tar Heels had been nationally ranked since the week of Nov. 22 (nine unranked weeks).

BARNES, MARSHALL NAMED FRESHMAN ALL-AMERICA

◆ UNC freshmen **Harrison Barnes** (first team) and **Kendall Marshall** (second team) both earned Freshman All-America honors from the US Basketball Writers Association, the US-BWA announced on March 15. No other ACC players made either team.

◆ Marshall also earned first-team Freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

◆ The only other season in which two Tar Heels both earned freshman All-America honors was 1993-94, when **Jerry Stackhouse** earned first-team honors from Basketball Weekly and **Rasheed Wallace** grabbed fourth-team honors.

COMEBACK WINS AT ACC TOURNAMENT

◆ Carolina came back from double-digit deficits in its ACC Tournament victories over Miami and Clemson on March 11 and 12 in Greensboro.

◆ The win over Clemson in the semifinals was the second consecutive day UNC overcame a double-digit, second-half deficit to advance in the ACC Tournament.

◆ In the quarterfinals, **Tyler Zeller** took a pass from **Kendall Marshall** and hit a layup as the buzzer sounded to cap a 19-point comeback in less than 10 minutes and beat Miami, 61-59 (marking the biggest ACC Tournament comeback win in UNC history).

◆ In the semifinal win over Clemson, the Tar Heels came back from 14 points down in the first half, 10 at halftime and seven in the last four minutes of regulation to force overtime.

◆ With halftime deficits of nine (quarterfinal) and 10 points (semifinal) overcome, UNC is the first team to overcome halftime deficits of nine or more points more than once in the same ACC Tournament.

25 WINS

◆ Carolina's win over Miami in the ACC Tournament quarterfinals gave it the 32nd 25-win season in program history. UNC finished 29-8 on the year.

◆ The Tar Heels have won 25 or more games in a season 32 times in 101 seasons, including four in the last five years (2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011) and five in the previous seven seasons under head coach **Roy Williams** (2005, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2011).

◆ **Williams**-coached teams have won 25 or

◆ Zeller is the eighth Tar Heel to earn first-team Academic All-America honors and the first since **Eric Montross** in 1994.

◆ Other Tar Heels to win first-team Academic All-America honors include Hall of Famer **Billy Cunningham** in 1965, **Charles Scott** in 1970, **Steve Previs** and **Dennis Wuycik** in 1972, **Tommy LaGarde** in 1976, **Steve Hale** in 1986 and **Montross** in 1994.

◆ Zeller hails from Washington, Ind., and majors in business administration.

◆ “I am thrilled for Tyler because he puts as much effort toward his academics as he does basketball, and he’s typically one of the first players on the court and last ones to leave,” says head coach **Roy Williams**. “It really is a big deal to be an Academic All-America – it’s a credit to truly what every student-athlete’s first priority should be. We had several recipients at Kansas, including our current assistant Jerod Haase, and ‘Z’ is our first here at Carolina. I couldn’t be prouder or happier than I am for him.”

◆ Zeller was named Academic All-District 3 on Feb. 3, earning the honor for a second consecutive season.

◆ A business administration major with a focus in finance, Zeller was named to the 2010-11 Naismith Preseason Watch List. He was one of 20 collegiate players chosen to train against the U.S. Select Team in Las Vegas in August 2010.

◆ A 7-0 forward from Washington, Ind., Zeller serves as team captain and also represents his squad as a member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Council. He has earned spots on both the Atlantic Coast Conference Academic Honor Roll and the Dean’s List.

ZELLER WINS SKIP PROSSER AWARD

◆ UNC junior forward **Tyler Zeller** was named the recipient of the 2011 “Skip” Prosser Award, emblematic of the top scholar-athlete in men’s basketball, ACC Commissioner John Swofford announced on Friday March 11.

◆ Wake Forest head basketball coach George Edward “Skip” Prosser passed away on July 26, 2007. Prosser compiled a 291-146 career record in 14 seasons as a head coach, including a 126-68 mark in his six years with the Demon Deacons. The 2003 ACC Coach of the Year, Prosser won 20-plus games and led Wake Forest to the NCAA Tournament in each of his first four seasons in Winston-Salem and brought the school its first outright ACC regular season title in 2003. Every Wake Forest senior he coached graduated, and the Deacons placed nine players on the annual All-ACC Academic Basketball Team during his tenure.

◆ In order to be nominated for the award, a student-athlete must be an upperclassman with a grade-point average of 3.0 or better – both in his career and in the previous two semesters. Sixty percent of the award is based on academic achievement and 40 percent on athletic accomplishments.

◆ In addition to being a three-time honoree on the All-ACC Academic Basketball team and a two-time member of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, Zeller was named UNC’s 2010-11 Athletic Director Scholar-Athlete of the Year for Men’s Basketball. The business administration major from Washington, Ind., is also a 2011 Capital One Academic All-America and was a Capital One Academic All-District First Team selection. Zeller has earned Dean’s List honors three times at UNC and is a Student-Athlete Advisory Committee representative.

◆ A second-team All-ACC selection this season, Zeller played integral part in the sixth-ranked Tar Heels’ finish atop the ACC regular-season standings.

◆ “Tyler is so deserving of this award because it recognizes his exceptional talent and dedication both in the classroom and as a basketball player,” Carolina head coach **Roy Williams** said. “He is gifted, but he excels because of the work he puts into both areas. He is our leading scorer, yet he is often one of the last players to leave the court after practice. He is obviously a smart young man, but he spends additional time studying.

“We are certainly proud to have him represent the University of North Carolina and college basketball and I am particularly proud to have him win the award named for Skip Prosser, a

ZELLER NAMED TO ACADEMIC ALL-ACC TEAM FOR THIRD TIME

◆ Carolina’s **Tyler Zeller**, a three-time honoree, headlined the 2011 All-ACC Academic Men’s Basketball Team, as announced on March 9 by Commissioner John Swofford. Zeller is one of two three-time members of the team.

◆ To be eligible for consideration, a student-athlete must have earned a 3.00 grade point average for the previous semester and maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during his academic career.

HENSON NAMED TO ACC COACHES’ ALL-DEFENSIVE TEAM

◆ Sophomore **John Henson** was one of five ACC players named to the 16th Annual Fan’s Guide Coaches’ All-Defensive Team for 2011, joining Florida State’s Chris Singleton, Duke’s Nolan Smith, Georgia Tech’s Iman Shumpert and Clemson’s Demontez Stitt.

◆ Henson was named on 11 of 12 coaches’ ballots. Singleton was the only unanimous selection with 12 of 12 votes.

◆ Henson is UNC’s sixth player named to the team and first since **Marcus Ginyard** in 2008.

◆ UNC’s **Tyler Zeller** was the seventh-leading vote-getter, receiving four votes.

TOUGH ACC ROAD

◆ North Carolina posted a 14-2 ACC record in 2010-11 despite playing a challenging conference schedule in this era of the unbalanced ACC slate.

◆ Of the four ACC teams that received byes in the ACC Tournament, Carolina was the only squad to play a home-and-home series against each of the other three teams (going 5-1 in those games).

◆ UNC finished first in the standings and played each of the next four finishers twice, going 7-1 against the top five seeds in the ACC Tournament:

- vs. No. 2 seed Duke: 1-1
- vs. No. 3 seed Florida State: 2-0
- vs. No. 4 seed Clemson: 2-0
- vs. No. 5 seed Boston College: 2-0

UNPRECEDENTED ACC IMPROVEMENT

◆ Carolina went 14-2 in the 2010-11 ACC regular season after going 5-11 in conference play last year to tie for ninth place in the final league standings.

◆ Prior to this season, no team in ACC history ever finished first outright in the regular season after finishing lower than sixth in the standings the year before. The previous biggest climb from one year to the title was Clemson, which finished sixth in 1988-89 and first in 1989-90.

◆ UNC is the first team to win the outright ACC regular season championship but not have a player named first-team All-ACC.

◆ Carolina’s success this season has come despite the unexpected loss of five players since the 2009-10 season ended who otherwise would have been contributors to the 2010-11 Tar Heels and a season-ending injury to freshman **Reggie Bullock** in late February.

◆ Since the end of last season in the NIT title game, forward **Ed Davis** entered the 2010 NBA Draft with two years of eligibility remaining and was a lottery pick (13th overall). Forwards **Travis** and **David Wear** transferred last May after their freshman seasons. Senior wing **Will Graves**, the team’s leading returning scorer, was dismissed from the team for violating team rules in October. Junior guard **Larry Drew II**, the team’s most experienced player after Graves’ dismissal, left the team last month when he announced his transfer on Feb. 4. Bullock suffered a knee injury on Feb. 27 against Maryland and will not return to action this season.

◆ In ACC history, no other team has won 14 or more games while improving its win total by as many as nine games from the previous season. The previous best was UNC under Williams (eight to 14 wins from 2004 to 2005).

◆ No other time since the league went to a 16-game schedule has a team won five or fewer ACC games, then won 11 or more ACC games in the following season.

FIFTH ACC REGULAR-SEASON TITLE IN SEVEN YEARS

◆ When North Carolina (14-2) beat Duke (13-3) on March 5, it clinched the outright 2010-11 ACC regular season championship, doing so for the fourth time in the last seven years under **Roy Williams** (2005, 2008, 2009 and 2011).

◆ Including a tie atop the ACC standings with Virginia in 2007, Carolina has won or tied for the ACC regular season title in five of the last seven years under Williams.

◆ The 2010-11 season marks the 28th time in 58 ACC seasons Carolina won at least a share of the conference regular-season title. UNC has won 18 outright regular-season crowns and has tied for the title 10 times.

◆ Carolina’s 28 regular-season titles are nine more than Duke’s 19 and five more than the other 10 ACC teams combined.

◆ Williams is one of four coaches in ACC history to win five regular season titles, joining **Dean Smith** (17 in 36 seasons), Mike Kryzewski (12 in 31) and **Frank McGuire** (six in 24).

◆ Williams’ four outright ACC regular season championships are tied for fourth in conference history behind Smith (12) and Kryzewski (10). Duke’s Vic Bubas also had four.

◆ Williams-coached teams at Kansas and UNC have captured conference regular season championships in 14 of his 23 seasons as a head coach.

14 ACC WINS

◆ Carolina finished with a 14-2 record in Atlantic Coast Conference play in 2010-11, tying the school record for ACC wins in a season.

◆ Carolina has won 14 ACC games on seven occasions — 1956-57 (14-0), 1983-84 (14-0), 1986-87 (14-0), 1992-93 (14-2), 2004-05 (14-2), 2007-08 (14-2) and 2010-11 (14-2).

◆ Carolina now has won 14 or more ACC games three times in eight seasons under head coach **Roy Williams** (2004-05, 2007-08, 2010-11).

◆ The Feb. 19 victory over Boston College gave UNC its 35th 10-win ACC season and its sixth in the last seven years under head coach **Roy Williams**.

◆ No other ACC school has as many 10-win ACC seasons as Carolina. Duke is second with 29.

FOUR TAR HEELS EARN ALL-ACC HONORS

◆ Four Tar Heel players grabbed spots on the three All-ACC teams for 2010-11 with **Harrison Barnes**, **John Henson** and **Tyler Zeller** earning second-team honors and **Kendall Marshall** on the third team.

◆ Carolina is the first team in ACC history to win the outright conference regular season championship but not have a player earn first-team All-ACC accolades.

◆ This is the first time four Tar Heels earned All-ACC honors since 2005, when **Raymond Felton** and **Sean May** were on the first team and **Rashad McCants** and **Jawad Williams** were on the third team.

◆ The Tar Heels in 2011 are the eighth team to place four players among the ACC's top 15 players (first-, second- and third-team All-ACC) since the ACC began naming a third team in the 1989-90 season. Three of the previous seven teams with four All-ACC players won NCAA championships (UNC 2005, Maryland 2002 and Duke 1992) and the other four all advanced to the NCAA Final Four (Duke 2004, Duke 1999, UNC 1998 and UNC 1997). Duke set a conference record with five players on the three All-ACC teams in 1999.

◆ Marshall is the first freshman point guard to make an All-ACC team since Georgia Tech's Javaris Crittenton was on the third team in 2007. Marshall is the first UNC freshman point guard to earn All-ACC honors since **Raymond Felton** was third team in 2003.

◆ Carolina becomes the fourth ACC team to place three players on the All-ACC second team, joining Florida State (1993), Maryland (1975) and Duke (1964, and the Blue Devils also had a first-team selection that year).

WILLIAMS NAMED ACC COACH OF THE YEAR

◆ Carolina's **Roy Williams** was named the ACC Coach of the Year for 2010-11, earning the award for the second time (2005-06, 2010-11).

◆ Williams received 52 of 75 votes. Clemson's Brad Brownell (8), Boston College's Steve Donahue (6), FSU's Leonard Hamilton (4) and Duke's Mike Krzyzewski (3) also received multiple votes.

◆ UNC this season won 14 ACC games and the conference regular season championship. The Tar Heels were picked third by ACSMA in the preseason poll with 41 of 62 voters selecting UNC to finish third or lower in the standings.

◆ UNC became the first school in ACC history to win the regular-season championship outright after finishing seventh or lower in the standings the previous season.

◆ The Tar Heels entered the NCAA Tournament ranked No. 7 in the Associated Press poll despite starting two freshmen, two sophomores and a junior who missed 10 or more games in each of his first two seasons due to injury.

◆ Carolina won the ACC regular season title despite losing 13 players in the last two seasons, including four players after 2009-10 and another in February who could have been members of the team this season.

◆ The Tar Heels won the 2010-11 ACC regular season despite finishing conference play ranked last in the league in three-point field goal percentage and ninth in free throw percentage.

◆ Four Carolina coaches have won the ACC Coach of the Year award 12 times. **Dean Smith** was ACC Coach of the Year eight times (1967, 1968, 1971, 1976, 1977, 1979, 1988, 1993) and Williams has won it twice (2006, 2011). **Frank McGuire** (1957) and **Bill Guthridge** (1998) each won the award once.

◆ Williams has won conference coach of the year honors nine times in 23 years as a head coach. He won Big 8/Big 12 Coach of the Year honors seven times.

BARNES NAMED ACC ROOKIE OF THE YEAR

◆ Carolina freshman **Harrison Barnes** has been named ACC Rookie of the Year for 2010-11 after also being the leading vote-getter and a unanimous choice to the All-Freshman Team.

◆ Barnes is the ninth Tar Heel to win ACC Rookie of the Year honors and the fourth to play for head coach **Roy Williams**. Previous UNC recipients include **Sam Perkins** (1981), **Michael Jordan** (1982), **J.R. Reid** (1987), **Ed Cota** (1997), **Joseph Forte** (2000), **Marvin Williams** (2005), **Tyler Hansbrough** (2006) and **Brandan Wright** (2007).

◆ Barnes averaged a team-leading 15.9 points per game in ACC play. He hit game-winning or go-ahead baskets in wins over Clemson (twice), Virginia Tech, Miami and Florida State. He hit a three-pointer with 6.6 seconds to play in UNC's 74-71 win at Miami and a three-pointer with 3.1 seconds to play in UNC's 72-70 win at Florida State. Barnes was the ACC's Rookie of

the Week three times.

◆ Barnes received 64 of 74 votes. Tar Heel point guard **Kendall Marshall** was second with seven votes.

HENSON NAMED ACC & NATIONAL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR

◆ Forward **John Henson** was named the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year, the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association announced on March 8. Henson is the first Tar Heel to win the award, which was first given out in 2005.

◆ Henson also was named the National Defensive Player of the Year on March 7 by FoxSports.com and Yahoo! Sports.

◆ Henson received 49 of 74 votes. Florida State's Chris Singleton (16) and Georgia Tech's Iman Shumpert (2) also received multiple votes.

◆ Henson also was the leading vote-getter for the All-ACC Defensive Team for 2010-11, the.

◆ He is the fifth Tar Heel named to the All-ACC Defensive Team, joining **Brendan Haywood** (2001), **Jackie Manuel** (2004, 2005), **Marcus Ginyard** (2008) and **Danny Green** (2009).

BARNES, MARSHALL NAMED TO ALL-ACC FRESHMAN TEAM

◆ **Kendall Marshall** and **Harrison Barnes** are the 16th and 17th Tar Heels to earn first-team All-ACC Freshman Team honors.

◆ Barnes was the leading vote-getter on the freshman team and was a unanimous choice by all 75 voters.

◆ This year marks the fifth time that two Tar Heels made the all-freshman team (also in 1994, 2003, 2006 and 2007). Collectively, the rookies on those previous four teams went to a combined 12 Final Fours—but none during their freshman campaigns.

PERFECT AT HOME

◆ Carolina went 15-0 at home in the 2010-11 season, posting a perfect home record for the 14th time since ACC play began in 1953-54.

◆ UNC's last undefeated home season came in 2004-05 on the way to the '05 NCAA championship. That squad went 15-0 in the Smith Center.

◆ Carolina has now played in the Smith Center for 25 full seasons. Two of the four undefeated home records during that span have come during **Roy Williams's** eight-year head coaching stint.

◆ Fourteen UNC teams have gone undefeated at home since the start of ACC play in 1953-54 and just five of those teams have played since 1980 — 2010-11 (15-0), 2004-05 (15-0), 1993-93 (12-0), 1986-87 (13-0), 1983-84 (9-0).

◆ Carolina also had undefeated home seasons four times in the 1970s, twice in the 1960s and three times in the 1950s.

TAR HEELS POST ANOTHER 20-WIN SEASON

◆ With its Feb. 19 victory over Boston College, North Carolina clinched the 53rd 20-win season in the program's 101-year history.

◆ The Tar Heels enter this weekend's NCAA Tournament East Regional semifinal with a record of 28-7.

◆ This season marks Carolina's seventh consecutive 20-win season under head coach **Roy Williams**, who has missed the 20-win plateau just once in eight seasons at UNC (winning 19 games in 2003-04).

◆ UNC has posted 38 20-win campaigns in the last 41 years (every season since 1970-71 except 2001-02, 2002-03 and 2003-04).

◆ Carolina won at least 20 games for an NCAA-record 31 consecutive seasons from 1970-71 to 2000-01. In that span, the Tar Heels won at least 25 games 21 times and at least 30 games three times.

20 WINS AGAIN FOR WILLIAMS

◆ The victory over Boston College on Feb. 19 was Carolina's 20th this season and gave UNC head coach **Roy Williams** 20-win seasons in 21 of his 23 seasons as a head coach.

◆ His teams won 19 contests in each of the two other years. He has won 20 games or more in each of the last seven seasons at Carolina.

ANOTHER WINNING ACC ROAD RECORD

◆ Carolina's win at Florida State on March 2 improved UNC to 6-2 on the road in Atlantic Coast Conference play this season, the Tar Heels' 34th winning road ACC record in 58 ACC seasons.

◆ It is also the 45th time in 58 ACC seasons UNC has gone at least .500 on the road in conference action.

◆ The Tar Heels reversed their ACC road win total from last season, when they went 2-6 (winning at NC State and Wake Forest).

◆ Carolina has an above-.500 ACC road record in five of **Roy Williams'** eight seasons as the head coach in Chapel Hill and has been at least .500 in six of Williams' eight seasons.

◆ Williams is 41-23 on the road in ACC play as the UNC head coach.

◆ Under Williams, UNC went 6-2 on the road in the ACC in 2005, 7-1 in 2006, 8-0 in 2008, 6-2 in 2009 and 6-2 in 2011.

BULLOCK MISSED FINAL NINE GAMES WITH KNEE INJURY

◆ Freshman forward **Reggie Bullock** missed the final nine games of the season due to an injury he suffered during the Maryland game on Feb. 27, coach **Roy Williams** announced on March 1.

◆ Bullock tore the lateral meniscus in his left knee. He underwent arthroscopic surgery on March 7.

◆ At the time of his injury, he was sixth on the team in scoring at 6.1 points per game and third in three-pointers with 29. The Kinston,

N.C., native scored in double figures seven times, including 18 points against Clemson on January 18th and 16 at Boston College on February 1st. He was named the ACC Rookie of the Week following his performance in the 75-65 win over Clemson.

◆ "I am just heart-broken for Reggie," says Williams. "He had surgery on the same knee last year and that has bothered him at various times throughout the season. There's no doubt that is why he has struggled somewhat with his shot over the last few weeks, but at the same time he's played really well defensively, helped us on the boards and often gave us a nice spark off the bench. He's had a great attitude all year. Plus, he's gone through so much with the loss of his grandmother in January, whom he was so very close to. Every person on this team will support Reggie and help him get ready for next year."

OVER 300 SMITH CENTER WINS

◆ The Tar Heels have a 307-56 record in their 26th season at the Smith Center, beginning play in the arena on Jan. 18, 1986, with a win over Duke. Carolina entered the season with a 292-56 record (.842) in the building and went 15-0 at home in 2010-11 for the 14th undefeated home schedule since the formation of the ACC in 1953-54.

◆ The Tar Heels have played more games (363) at the Smith Center than at any other arena. UNC played 249 games at Woollen Gym from 1938-65. It has played 190 games at Carmichael Auditorium/Arena, from 1966-86 but also including one win in last year's NIT.

◆ Carolina's win over Maryland on Feb. 27 came in the 200th ACC game in Smith Center history. The Tar Heels are 157-44 (.781) in the arena against ACC teams.

MORE THAN 2,000 WINS

◆ Carolina ended the 2010-11 season with 2,033 all-time wins in 101 seasons.

◆ Kentucky leads all NCAA Division I schools with 2,052 all-time wins in 108 seasons. Kansas is second with 2,038 wins in 113 seasons. Carolina is third with 2,033 victories.

◆ The Tar Heels became the second program in NCAA history to win 2,000 games by beating Miami on March 2, 2010.

NO SCHOLARSHIP SENIORS FOR TAR HEELS

◆ Carolina's 2010-11 roster did not include a scholarship senior and was the first Tar Heel team since 2003-04 without one.

◆ The 2003-04 squad, **Roy Williams'** first as the UNC head coach, included senior walk-ons **Phillip McLamb**, **Jonathan Miller** and **Damien Price** but no scholarship seniors.

◆ The 2010-11 Tar Heels featured graduate student (and scholarship player) **Justin Knox**, but he is in his first year in the program after enrolling at UNC in August. Knox graduated from the University of Alabama in three years and was able to play immediately at UNC after enrolling in its graduate program in sports ad-

◆ Carolina boasts a trio of walkon seniors on its 2010-11 roster in guard **Daniel Bolick** and forwards **D.J. Johnston** and **Van Hatchell**.

HAIRSTON, McADOO SIGN LETTERS OF INTENT

◆ **P.J. Hairston**, a 6-4 wing from Greensboro, N.C., and **James McAdoo**, a 6-8 forward from Norfolk, Va., signed National Letters of Intent to attend the University of North Carolina and play men's basketball.

◆ Hairston played for Coach David Price at Dudley High School in Greensboro for three years. He is currently attending Hargrave Military Academy in Chatham, Va., where he will play for Coach Kevin Keatts. He averaged 25.4 points and 8.1 rebounds at Dudley last year.

◆ McAdoo attends Norfolk Christian and plays for Coach Michael Allen. He averaged 22.5 points and 9.9 rebounds last year and led Norfolk Christian to a state championship. He was the Gatorade Player of the Year in Virginia and led the United States U-17 team to a gold medal in the 2010 FIBA U-17 World Championships in Germany.

11 TAR HEELS ON NBA ROSTERS

◆ Eleven former North Carolina players currently are on NBA rosters for 2010-11, not including two other Tar Heels who had been on rosters before being released. **Jawad Williams** was released by Cleveland in early January after spending most of the first half of the season and last season with the Cavaliers. **Jerry Stackhouse** spent the first month of the season with the Miami Heat.

◆ Carolina's 12 NBA players on opening day rosters tied for fourth nationally among NCAA schools, trailing only UCLA (14), Duke (13) and Kentucky (13). Kansas also had 12.

◆ Carolina has produced 40 first-round picks in its history, more than any school in the ACC.

◆ UNC's 29 first-round picks since 1980 are the most in the nation.

◆ Head coach **Roy Williams** has coached 20 NBA first-round draft picks.
