Wyoming Has Defeated the Last Six Consecutive Top 25 Teams in The

Arena-Auditorium: Wyoming has enjoyed a great deal of success at home against nationally-ranked teams over the past five seasons. In fact, **UW has posted a 6-0 record at home against the last six nationally-ranked opponents to play in the Double A.**

The last nationally-ranked team to defeat UW in the Dome of Doom was the Cincinnati Bearcats on Dec. 17, 1994, in a game that saw LaZelle Durden hit three free throws with no time left on the clock for a one-point victory (81-80). Cincinnati was ranked No. 17 in the nation at the time.

Cowboys 12-4 Record Establishes the Best Start in McClain Era:

Wyoming's 12-4 record this season is the best start by a Steve McClain team at Wyoming. In McClain's first season (1998-99), Wyoming started out 11-5. Last season (1999-2000), the Cowboys were also 11-5 through 16 games.

McClain's '98-'99 squad lost its 17th game of the season to go to 11-6. A year ago, Wyoming also lost its 17th game for an 11-6 start.

Notes From Last Week in Cowboy Basketball:

- Wyoming has now won 12 consecutive home games.
- UW has now won seven consecutive conference home games.

- The Cowboys are a perfect 7-0 in Saturday games this season, and are a perfect 9-0 in weekend games this season (Friday, Saturday and Sunday games).

- For the third consecutive game, Wyoming trailed at halftime, but came back to win. The Pokes trailed by seven (29-36) at CSU and by one (37-38) vs. Utah and by 14 (34-48) vs. BYU. Those are the only three games this season that UW has won trailing at half. UW is now 3-4 for the season when trailing at halftime.

- Wyoming has now defeated BYU in Laramie four consecutive times. The last time BYU won in Laramie was Feb. 10, 1996, by a score of 84-75.

- During the Steve McClain era, Wyoming is 31-3 (.912) in home games, and 14-2 (.875) in conference home games.

- Wyoming's crowd of 10,008 vs. BYU this past Monday followed a crowd of 13,313 vs. Utah last Saturday. That marked the first time Wyoming had back-to-back crowds of over 10,000 since the 1994-95 season.

- Uche Nsonwu-Amadi scored a career high 21 points against BYU. His previous career high was 16 points on four different occasions this season.

- Josh Davis recorded his fifth double-double of the season and 21st of his career with 18 points and 15 rebounds against BYU.

- The Cowboys 12-4 start is the best by a Steve McClain team.

- Wyoming enters this Saturday's Air Force game with a 1-1 Mountain West Conference road record, winning at Colorado State (70-69 in overtime) and losing at Utah (71-83).

McMillian Stretches Streak of Consecutive Starts to 75 Games -- Every Game of His Career:

Junior guard Chris McMillian has started every game of his career. McMillian's streak currently sits at 75 consecutive games. McMillian is also the iron man of the Cowboys, he ranks No. 2 for UW in minutes played at 30.5 minutes per game. (Marcus Bailey leads in minutes played at 30.9 minutes per game.)

There's No Place Like Home: Once again this season, the Wyoming Cowboys have posted an outstanding home record. **Wyoming has begun the 2000-01 season with a perfect 7-0 record at home, 2-0 in MWC home games.**

Wyoming ended the 1999-2000 season with a 12-1 (.923) home record, 6-1 (.857) in Mountain West home games. That ranked as the second best home record in the Mountain West Conference. Only Utah, at 17-0, 7-0 in the MWC, had a better home winning percentage among MWC teams. UNLV also posted a 6-1 MWC home record to match Wyoming's conference mark.

How Good Are the Cowboys at Home the Past Few Years? How good are the Wyoming Cowboys at home? **During the Steve McClain era, Wyoming has posted a 31-3 (.912) home record overall and a 14-2 (.875) home record in conference games.**

In the history of the Arena-Auditorium, Wyoming holds a **203-63 (.763) home record since the Double A opened in the last game of the 1981-82 season. In conference home games, UW is 103-45 (.696).**

Steve McClain One of the Top Coaches in Wyoming History Through His First Two Seasons:

University of Wyoming head basketball coach Steve McClain posted an impressive record through his first two seasons as the Cowboys' head coach.

Mountain West Conference media members named him the MWC Coach of the Year for the 1999-2000 season. McClain concluded his second season at UW having won 62.7 percent of his games with a record of 37-22. **He currently holds a 49-26 (.653) record in his third year at Wyoming.**

In the 95 seasons of Wyoming Basketball, 31 Cowboy squads have won 17 or more games. Only two coaches in the history of Wyoming Basketball have won more than 17 games in each of their first two seasons as head coach -- Willard Witte (1930-31 and 1931-32) and **Steve McClain (1998-99 and 1999-2000)**.

Wyoming's Josh Davis Participates in USA Basketball Men's National

Team Trials: University of Wyoming sophomore Josh Davis participated in the USA Basketball National Team Trials, May 26-28, 2000, in Colorado Springs, Colo., at the Olympic Training Center. He was one of only 30 players in the nation, aged 20 or younger, who was invited to participate.

From the trials, the World Championship for Young Men Qualification Team was selected by USA Basketball's Collegiate Committee. The head coach of the team was Jim Boeheim from Syracuse University. The team competed in the COPABA World Championship for Young Men Qualification Tournament that included teams from North, South and Central America.

"This is a great opportunity," said Davis, upon being notified of his selection. "I'm honored to be invited to participate, and hopefully I can make the team and represent Wyoming and the U.S. in Brazil this summer. I'm looking forward to the challenge."

Davis was not selected to the final squad, but did have an opportunity to showcase his skills against the top young players in the nation.

"This was great experience for Josh," said UW head basketball coach Steve McClain. "Anytime you get invited to compete with the top players in the country, it is a great challenge to see where you stack up against those players. I think it was an excellent learning opportunity for Josh, as well. It provided him a chance to play at a very high level of competition, and gave him a chance to grow as a basketball player and develop his game. In addition to Josh's personal development, this was also great exposure for our program."

After the team trials were completed on May 28, those selected to the team reunited on July 15-22 for a week-long training camp. On July 23, the team departed for Sao Paulo, Brazil, where the tournament was held July 26-30.

The USA World Championship for Young Men Qualifying Team is one of several teams fielded by USA Basketball, including the 2000 USA Olympic Team and the 2000 USA Hoop Summit Team.

Davis was named a First Team All-Mountain West Conference honoree last season by conference coaches. The junior from Salem, Ore., led Wyoming in scoring (14.3 points per game) and rebounding (8.7 rebounds per game) for the 1999-2000 season.

The Mountain West Conference Heads Into Its Second

Season: A year ago, the University of Wyoming joined some old rivals to form the Mountain West Conference. Wyoming reunited with Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, New Mexico, UNLV, San Diego State and Utah to form the new league.

The 2000-01 season promises to be an outstanding one for Mountain West Conference Basketball with a number of teams receiving votes in the national polls.

The 2000-01 MWC season will culminated with the 2001 Mountain West Conference Tournament to be held at the Thomas and Mack Center in Las Vegas, Nev., March 8-10, 2001.

McClain earned **Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year honors from MWC media members for the 1999-2000 season**. During his first two seasons, his Cowboys defeated two Top 25 ranked opponents, and earned a berth in the 1999 National Invitation Tournament.

Heading into the 2000-01 season, ESPN Magazine's preseason issue listed McClain as a member of **Dick Vitale's All-SportsCenter Team -- the five "Coaches Who Need Some PT on TV for more PR."** Mountain West Conference media selected McClain's 2000-01 Cowboy squad to finish second in the Mountain West Conference Preseason poll, and both ESPN Magazine and The Sporting News Preseason College Basketball issues selected the Cowboys as an NCAA Tournament team.

His 37 wins in his first two seasons rank No. 2 in Wyoming school history for the most wins by a head basketball coach in his first two seasons at UW. He also has posted one of the best home records in school history with a **31-3 (.912) record in the Arena-Auditorium**.

Add to those accomplishments the excitement that McClain's up-tempo style has brought to the Cowboys, and you have one of the most exciting teams in the country. A year ago, the Cowboys averaged 82.8 points per game to rank No. 5 in the nation in scoring average. In Coach McClain's first season at UW, the 1998-99 season, the Cowboys averaged 81.6 points per game to rank No. 10 among all NCAA Division I teams.

McClain's first season was highlighted by Wyoming's appearance in the 1999 National Invitation Tournament (NIT), where UW advanced to the NIT Second Round. McClain guided Wyoming to an 81-77 victory over USC in the First Round of the NIT in Laramie, marking the Cowboys' first postseason win since the 1990-91 season. Wyoming posted an 18-10 record, 7-7 in the Western Athletic Conference.

In the 1999-2000 season, McClain led a veteran team into the newly-formed Mountain West Conference. Wyoming earned a 19-12 record for the 1999-2000 campaign, and improved its conference record to 8-6. Along the way, UW defeated Utah and UNLV in Laramie, and swept the season series with New Mexico. The Mountain West Conference was one of the elite basketball conferences in the nation in its first year of existence with Wyoming, Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State and Utah continuing their longtime rivalries.

Prior to accepting the head-coaching position at Wyoming, McClain served as an assistant coach at Texas Christian University for four seasons. While at TCU, McClain helped lead the Horned Frogs from obscurity to a Top 25 ranking and an NCAA Tournament appearance in 1998.

McClain, 38 (Aug. 15, 1962), was an original member of Billy Tubbs' staff at TCU. The year prior to the Tubbs' staff taking over in Fort Worth, TCU posted a record of 7-20. Two years later, the Horned Frogs posted a 22-13 record, advanced to the Championship Game of the 1997 Western Athletic Conference Tournament and played their way into the Second Round of the National Invitation Tournament. In 1998, TCU joined the elite programs in the country, posting a 27-6 record and leading the nation in scoring at 97.2 points per game. The Horned Frogs earned an NCAA Tournament bid in '98, and ended the season ranked No. 15 in the final Associated Press poll. TCU also became the first team in Western Athletic Conference history to go undefeated in league play, posting a 14-0 record in '98 on way to winning the WAC Pacific Division title.

Not only did McClain enjoy success as an assistant coach, but he brought to Wyoming an outstanding record as a head coach. In 1994 as the head coach at Hutchinson Community College, he won the National Junior College Championship in only his third season, and was named the National Junior College Coach of the Year.

On April 22, 1998, Steve McClain became the 19th head basketball coach in the history of the University of Wyoming.

At the junior-college level, McClain compiled a 91-16 (.850) record in three seasons, and his teams were known as high-scoring squads. His 1994 National Championship team averaged 90 points per game on way to a 35-4 (.897) record. In 1992-93, the Hutch Dragons compiled a 29-5 (.853) record, averaged 92.6 points and ended the season ranked No. 11 in the NJCAA. His first season as head coach, 1991-92, Hutchinson posted a 27-7 (.794) record.

Prior to becoming head coach at Hutchinson, McClain served as an assistant coach there for five seasons, helping guide the Dragons to the 1988 NJCAA National Championship. Before coaching at Hutchinson, he was also an assistant coach at: Independence Community College in Independence, Kan.; Sioux Empire Junior College in Iowa; and his alma mater Chadron State College in Chadron, Neb.

A native of Orient, Iowa, McClain is a 1984 graduate of Chadron State College. He is married to the former Kim Van Asselt of Hutchinson, Kan.

Return of the "Dome of Doom"

Back in the days of Fennis Dembo and Eric Leckner (1984-85 through 1987-88), Wyoming's Arena-Auditorium earned the nickname the "Dome of Doom." The Arena-Auditorium is one of the most beautiful basketball arenas in the country with a capacity of 15,000.

The last three seasons the Wyoming Cowboys have stirred up visions of the days when Wyoming opponents dreaded playing in the Double A.

Over the past three seasons, the Cowboys boast a home record of 31-3 (.912) overall in the Arena-Auditorium and a 14-2 (.875) record in conference home games.

For the **2000-01 season**, Wyoming has posted a **7-0 (1.000)** record at home and a **2-0 (1.000) record in conference home games.**

The Arena-Auditorium opened on Feb. 20, 1982, when Wyoming defeated Air Force 59-29. Currently the Cowboys record in the Double A stands at **203-63 (.763)**. In conference games, Wyoming is **103-45 (.696)** in conference regular-season home games.

In only his second season at the collegiate level, Wyoming sophomore **Marcus Bailey** is making quite a name for himself. Bailey was named **Mountain West Conference Player of the Week** after scoring a **career high 33 points in a 78-77 overtime win over Utah on Saturday, Jan. 20, 2001**. It was Bailey's first 30-point game of his career and was the **seventh time in 16 games this season that he has scored 20 or more points**. His previous career scoring high was accomplished early this season when he scored 25 points against both Montana State and Cal State Northridge. **He also earned MWC Player of the Week honors on Dec. 4.**

Bailey leads the Cowboys in the scoring (17.7 points per game) and minutes played (30.9 minutes per game). He has been the leading scorer for the Cowboys in nine of 16 games this season. He has scored in double figures in 13 of 16 games.
