Wyoming Has Defeated the Last Six Consecutive Top 25 Teams in The

Arena-Auditorium: Wyoming has enjoyed a great deal of success at home against nationally-ranked teams over the past five seasons. In fact, **UW has posted a 6-0 record at home against the last six nationally-ranked opponents to play in the Double A.**

The last nationally-ranked team to defeat UW in the Dome of Doom was the Cincinnati Bearcats on Dec. 17, 1994, in a game that saw LaZelle Durden hit three free throws with no time left on the clock for a one-point victory (81-80). Cincinnati was ranked No. 17 in the nation at the time.

Notes From This Week in Cowboy Basketball:

•Wyoming evened its road record at 1-1 for the 2000-01 season with a 78-61 win at Cal State Fullerton on Saturday, Dec. 9.

•The Cowboys suffered their first loss of the season at Cal State Northridge on Thursday, Dec. 7 by a score of 71-74.

•Sophomore guard Marcus Bailey has scored a career high 25 points in back-to-back games last week -- versus Montana State and Cal State Northridge.

•Wyoming extended its home winning streak to eight games with its win Friday, Dec. 1 over Creighton, 78-74. The home winning streak dates back to Jan. 29, 2000.

•At home, Wyoming has defeated 15 consecutive non-conference opponents in Laramie in the Steve McClain era and holds a 15-1 (.938) record vs. non-conference opponents at home under coach McClain.

•Wyoming is now 27-3 (.900) at home against all opponents in the Steve McClain era.

•Steve McClain has posted a 26-9 (.743) record versus non-conference opponents while at Wyoming.

•Junior point guard Chris McMillian moved into a tie for No. 5 on the Wyoming career assist list when he handed out three assists in a 78-61 victory over Cal State Fullerton on Dec. 9, 2000. McMillian now has 273 assists for his career, and is tied with former Cowboy Maurice Alexander (1991-92).

•McMillian also moved into a tie for No. 6 on the Wyoming career steal list on Dec. 9 when he made two steals against Fullerton. He now has 104 steals for his career, and is tied with former Cowboy Jeron Roberts (1995-98).

•Chris McMillian started his 65th consecutive game this past Saturday in the win at Cal State Fullerton. McMillian has started every game of his college career.

•Juniors Josh Davis and Chris McMillian have now started 43 consecutive games together, dating back to Feb. 16, 1999, of their freshman season against Texas Pan-American.

•Josh Davis, Chris McMillian and Marcus Bailey have now started 32 consecutive games together, dating back to Dec. 4, 1999, against Nevada.

•The Wyoming Cowboys have enjoyed a very balanced attack through their first six games of the season. Wyoming has had eight different players score in double figures (Marcus Bailey, Paris Corner, Josh Davis, Brett McFall, Chris McMillian, Ronell Mingo, Uche Nsonwu-Amadi and Ugo Udezue).

McMillian Stretches Streak of Consecutive Starts to 65 Games -- Every Game of His Career:

Junior guard Chris McMillian has started every game of his career. McMillian's streak currently sits at 65 consecutive games.

McMillian is also the iron man of the Cowboys, leading UW in minutes played at 32.0 minutes per game.

Starting Balance: Entering this week, Wyoming has enjoyed amazing balance from its starters. The leading scorer is sophomore Marcus Bailey at 17.5 points per game down to junior Ugo Udezue at 6.3 points per game. Three starters are averaging in double figures -- Bailey (17.5 ppg), Josh Davis (12.7) and Uche Nsonwu-Amadi (10.0).

There's No Place Like Home: Once again this season, the Wyoming Cowboys have posted an outstanding home record. **Wyoming has begun the 2000-01 season with a perfect 3-0 record at home.**

Wyoming ended the 1999-2000 season with a 12-1 (.923) home record, 6-1 (.857) in Mountain West home games. That ranked as the second best home record in the Mountain West Conference. Only Utah, at 17-0, 7-0 in the MWC, had a better home winning percentage among MWC teams. UNLV also posted a 6-1 MWC home record to match Wyoming's conference mark.

How Good Are the Cowboys at Home the Past Few Years? How good are the Wyoming Cowboys at home? **During the Steve McClain era, Wyoming has posted a 27-3 (.900) home record overall and a 12-2 (.857) home record in conference games.**

In the history of the Arena-Auditorium, Wyoming holds a **199-63 (.760) home record since the Double A opened in the last game of the 1981-82 season. In conference home games, UW is 101-45 (.692).**

Cowboys Have Built Eight-Game Home Winning Streak: The Wyoming Cowboys have built an eight-game home winning streak in the Arena-Auditorium, dating back to Jan. 29, 2000.

Wyoming ended the 1999-2000 season with a five-game winning streak. Wyoming defeated San Diego State, UNLV, Air Force, BYU and Utah in its last five home games of the '99-2000 season.

The Cowboys have begun the 2000-01 season with three home victories to stretch their home winning streak to eight games.

Steve McClain One of the Top Coaches in Wyoming History Through His First Two Seasons:

University of Wyoming head basketball coach Steve McClain posted an impressive record through his first two seasons as the Cowboys' head coach.

Mountain West Conference media members named him the MWC Coach of the Year for the 1999-2000 season. McClain concluded his second season at UW having won 62.7 percent of his games with a record of 37-22. **He currently holds a 42-23 (.646)** record in his third year at Wyoming.

In the 95 seasons of Wyoming Basketball, 31 Cowboy squads have won 17 or more games. Only two coaches in the history of Wyoming Basketball have won more than 17 games in each of their first two seasons as head coach -- Willard Witte (1930-31 and 1931-32) and **Steve McClain (1998-99 and 1999-2000)**.

Wyoming's Josh Davis Participates in USA Basketball Men's National Team Trials:

University of Wyoming sophomore Josh Davis participated in the USA Basketball National Team Trials, May 26-28, 2000, in Colorado Springs, Colo., at the Olympic Training Center. He was one of only 30 players in the nation, aged 20 or younger, who was invited to participate.

From the trials, the World Championship for Young Men Qualification Team was selected by USA Basketball's Collegiate Committee. The head coach of the team was Jim Boeheim from Syracuse University. The team competed in the COPABA World Championship for Young Men Qualification Tournament that included teams from North, South and Central America.

"This is a great opportunity," said Davis, upon being notified of his selection. "I'm honored to be invited to participate, and hopefully I can make the team and represent Wyoming and the U.S. in Brazil this summer. I'm looking forward to the challenge."

Davis was not selected to the final squad, but did have an opportunity to showcase his skills against the top young players in the nation.

"This was great experience for Josh," said UW head basketball coach Steve McClain. "Anytime you get invited to compete with the top players in the country, it is a great challenge to see where you stack up against those players. I think it was an excellent learning opportunity for Josh, as well. It provided him a chance to play at a very high level of competition, and gave him a chance to grow as a basketball player and develop his game. In addition to Josh's personal development, this was also great exposure for our program."

After the team trials were completed on May 28, those selected to the team reunited on July 15-22 for a week-long training camp. On July 23, the team departed for Sao Paulo, Brazil, where the tournament was held July 26-30.

The USA World Championship for Young Men Qualifying Team is one of several teams fielded by USA Basketball, including the 2000 USA Olympic Team and the 2000 USA Hoop Summit Team.

Davis was named a First Team All-Mountain West Conference honoree last season by conference coaches. The junior from Salem, Ore., led Wyoming in scoring (14.3 points per game) and rebounding (8.7 rebounds per game) for the 1999-2000 season.

The Mountain West Conference Heads Into Its Second

Season: A year ago, the University of Wyoming joined some old rivals to form the Mountain West Conference. Wyoming reunited with Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, New Mexico, UNLV, San Diego State and Utah to form the new league.

The 2000-01 season promises to be an outstanding one for Mountain West Conference Basketball with a number of teams receiving votes in the national polls.

The 2000-01 MWC season will culminated with the 2001 Mountain West Conference Tournament to be held at the Thomas and Mack Center in Las Vegas, Nev., March 8-10, 2001.

Wyoming has had eight different individuals on its 11-man roster score in double figures this season. Marcus Bailey, Paris Corner, Josh Davis, Brett McFall, Chris McMillian, Ronell Mingo, Uche Nsonwu-Amadi and Ugo Udezue have all scored in double figures in a game this season. At least three Cowboys have scored in double digits in five of six of Wyoming's games this season.

Balance has been a trademark of Steve McClain's program at Wyoming. In the 1999-2000 season, 12 different Cowboys on the 14-man roster scored in double figures during the season. Five of those players return this year: Marcus Bailey, Josh Davis, Brett McFall, Chris McMillian and Ugo Udezue. Davis was Wyoming's leading scorer a year ago, while McMillian, McFall and Bailey ranked fourth, fifth and sixth respectively. Ugo Udezue missed all but five games last year due to injury, but he was the Cowboys' leading scorer in the 1998-99 season.

Wyoming had at least three individuals score in double figures in 29 of 31 games during the 1999-2000 season.

Balance was a key to the Cowboys' successful season in 1998-99, as well. Of Wyoming's 12-man roster for the 1998-99 campaign, 10 different individuals had double-figure scoring games.

Thirty-Point Pokes: Only one current Cowboy has scored 30 or more points in a single game during his career -- that Cowboy is junior **Ugo Udezue**. Udezue scored 30 or more points five times during his sophomore season of 1998-99. His career high is 36 versus Colorado on Dec. 9, 1998.

Udezue missed the 1999-2000 season due to knee surgery. He was granted a medical hardship by the NCAA, and is currently a redshirt junior.

**Steve McClain, Head Basketball Coach
University of Wyoming**

In his third season as head coach of the University of Wyoming, Steve McClain has fans around the state of Wyoming and media members across the country talking about the Wyoming Cowboys.

McClain earned **Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year honors from MWC media members for the 1999-2000 season**. During his first two seasons, his Cowboys defeated two Top 25 ranked opponents, and earned a berth in the 1999 National Invitation Tournament.

Heading into the 2000-01 season, ESPN Magazine's preseason issue listed McClain as a member of **Dick Vitale's All-SportsCenter Team -- the five "Coaches Who Need Some PT on TV for more PR."** Mountain West Conference media selected McClain's 2000-01 Cowboy squad to finish second in the Mountain West Conference Preseason poll, and both ESPN Magazine and The Sporting News Preseason College Basketball issues selected the Cowboys as an NCAA Tournament team.

His 37 wins in his first two seasons rank No. 2 in Wyoming school history for the most wins by a head basketball coach in his first two seasons at UW. He also has posted one of the best home records in school history with a **27-3 (.900) record in the Arena-Auditorium**.

Add to those accomplishments the excitement that McClain's up-tempo style has brought to the Cowboys, and you have one of the most exciting teams in the country. A year ago, the Cowboys averaged 82.8 points per game to rank No. 5 in the nation in scoring average. In Coach McClain's first season at UW, the 1998-99 season, the Cowboys averaged 81.6 points per game to rank No. 10 among all NCAA Division I teams.

McClain's first season was highlighted by Wyoming's appearance in the 1999 National Invitation Tournament (NIT), where UW advanced to the NIT Second Round. McClain guided Wyoming to an 81-77 victory over USC in the First Round of the NIT in Laramie, marking the Cowboys' first postseason win since the 1990-91 season. Wyoming posted an 18-10 record, 7-7 in the Western Athletic Conference.

In the 1999-2000 season, McClain led a veteran team into the newly-formed Mountain West Conference. Wyoming earned a 19-12 record for the 1999-2000 campaign, and improved its conference record to 8-6. Along the way, UW defeated Utah and UNLV in Laramie, and swept the season series with New Mexico. The Mountain West Conference was one of the elite basketball conferences in the nation in its first year of existence with Wyoming, Air Force, Brigham Young, Colorado State, UNLV, New Mexico, San Diego State and Utah continuing their longtime rivalries.

Prior to accepting the head-coaching position at Wyoming, McClain served as an assistant coach at Texas Christian University for four seasons. While at TCU, McClain helped lead the Horned Frogs from obscurity to a Top 25 ranking and an NCAA Tournament appearance in 1998.

McClain, 38 (Aug. 15, 1962), was an original member of Billy Tubbs' staff at TCU. The year prior to the Tubbs' staff taking over in Fort Worth, TCU posted a record of 7-20. Two years later, the Horned Frogs posted a 22-13 record, advanced to the Championship Game of the 1997 Western Athletic Conference Tournament and played their way into the Second Round of the National Invitation Tournament. In 1998, TCU joined the elite programs in the country, posting a 27-6 record and leading the nation in scoring at 97.2 points per game. The Horned Frogs earned an NCAA Tournament bid in '98, and ended the season ranked No. 15 in the final Associated Press poll. TCU also became the first team in Western Athletic Conference history to go undefeated in league play, posting a 14-0 record in '98 on way to winning the WAC Pacific Division title.

Not only did McClain enjoy success as an assistant coach, but he brought to Wyoming an outstanding record as a head coach. In 1994 as the head coach at Hutchinson Community College, he won the National Junior College Championship in only his third season, and was named the National Junior College Coach of the Year.

On April 22, 1998, Steve McClain became the 19th head basketball coach in the history of the University of Wyoming.

At the junior-college level, McClain compiled a 91-16 (.850) record in three seasons, and his teams were known as high-scoring squads. His 1994 National Championship team averaged 90 points per game on way to a 35-4 (.897) record. In 1992-93, the Hutch Dragons compiled a 29-5 (.853) record, averaged 92.6 points and ended the season ranked No. 11 in the NJCAA. His first season as head coach, 1991-92, Hutchinson posted a 27-7 (.794) record.

Prior to becoming head coach at Hutchinson, McClain served as an assistant coach there for five seasons, helping guide the Dragons to the 1988 NJCAA National Championship. Before coaching at Hutchinson, he was also an assistant coach at: Independence Community College in Independence, Kan.; Sioux Empire Junior College in Iowa; and his alma mater Chadron State College in Chadron, Neb.

A native of Orient, Iowa, McClain is a 1984 graduate of Chadron State College. He is married to the former Kim Van Asselt of Hutchinson, Kan.

Return of the "Dome of Doom"

Back in the days of Fennis Dembo and Eric Leckner (1984-85 through 1987-88), Wyoming's Arena-Auditorium earned the nickname the "Dome of Doom." The Arena-Auditorium is one of the most beautiful basketball arenas in the country with a capacity of 15,000.

The last three seasons the Wyoming Cowboys have stirred up visions of the days when Wyoming opponents dreaded playing in the Double A.

Over the past three seasons, the Cowboys boast a home record of 27-3 (.900) overall in the Arena-Auditorium and a 12-2 (.857) record in conference home games.

For the **1999-2000 season**, Wyoming posted a **12-1 (.923)** record at home and a **6-1 (.857) record in conference home games.**

The Arena-Auditorium opened on Feb. 20, 1982, when Wyoming defeated Air Force 59-29. Currently the Cowboys record in the Double A stands at **199-63 (.760)**. In conference games, Wyoming is **101-45 (.692)** in conference regular-season home games.

Wyoming Head Basketball Coach Steve McClain Announces Two Early Signees, Donta Richardson and Jason Straight:

University of Wyoming head basketball coach Steve McClain announced that two student-athletes have signed national letters-of-intent with the Cowboys. **Donta Richardson** of Sheridan College in Sheridan, Wyo., and **Jason Straight** of Dunbar High School in Chicago, Ill., have both signed with Wyoming.

Donta Richardson (Pronounced: DAWN-tay), at 6-2 and 170-pounds, can play either the point-guard, shooting-guard or small-forward positions. He earned First Team All-Conference and First Team All-Region XIV honors at Sheridan College as a freshman in 1999-2000. Richardson averaged 22.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 7.0 assists during his freshman season, while leading Sheridan to a 30-2 record and a No. 7 national ranking in the final National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) poll. Early in the 2000-01 season, he is averaging 25.0 points, 4.0 rebounds, 7.0 assists and 5.0 steals per game. Sheridan is currently ranked No. 10 in the nation. He is coached by Brian Marso at Sheridan College. Richardson was also recruited by Auburn, Colorado State, UNC-Charlotte and Utah State.

Jason Straight is a 5-11, 165-pound point guard from Dunbar High School in Chicago, Ill. He enters his senior season having earned First Team All-State honors as a junior by both the Associated Press and the Chicago Tribune. Straight was also a First Team All-City, First Team All-Area and First Team All-Conference selection for the 1999-2000 season, while averaging 27.0 points, 8.0 rebounds and 8.0 assists per game. His junior season of 1999-2000, Dunbar High posted a 20-8 record, captured a conference championship and advanced to the third round of the City Championship. As a sophomore in the 1998-99 season, Straight's Dunbar squad went 20-5, tied for the conference title and made it to the Sweet 16 of the State Championship. Along the way, that 1998-99 team defeated the No. 8 ranked high school team in the country, Simon-Gratz High School of Philadelphia, Pa., and gave eventual Illinois State Champion St. Joseph's their only loss of the season. Dunbar High has lost only two conference games over the past two seasons. Straight is coached by Fate Mickel at Dunbar High, and by Stan White with the Illinois Gold AAU team. Straight was also recruited by Boston College, Marquette, New Mexico State and St. Louis.
