# HEAD COACH CRAIG DAWSON

FIFTH YEAR AT NAVY • U.S. NAVAL ACADEMY '73

Craig Dawson was able to fulfill a lifelong dream in March of 2000 when the 1973 graduate of the Naval Academy was handed over the reins to direct the Navy squash program.

Having gone to school here with second-to-none facilities, it is a true honor to come back and be the coach, said Dawson.

In his inaugural season as head coach of the Navy squash program, Dawson led the Midshipmen to a 17-7 record and a 12th-place finish at the NISRA Team Championship. Meanwhile, he helped tutor this year's team captain Andy McCann to a top-50 individual ranking by season's end.

In season two, he paved the way for the Mids to finish a step higher at the NISRA Team Championship with an 11th-place finish. A week later, Dawson brought three Midshipmen to the NISRA Individual Championship where Andy McCann, David Haile and Edson Greenwood all played exceptionally well.

Navy not only tacked on two more wins to its victory total (19-7) during the 2001-02 campaign, it was given the 2001-02 Team Sportsmanship Coaches Award at the NISRA Championship Banquet. The Midshipmen were recognized by the member schools of NISRA who voted to award Navy this prestigious honor. It's the second time in the last four years in which Navy has received the honor, as it was awarded

the same recognition in 1998.

Last season, the Mids produced a 15-9 record and finished the year ranked No. 16. Seniors Edson Greenwood and David Haile were among the country's top 60, as Greenwood ranked No. 47 and Haile was 58th. Meanwhile, fellow senior Kinleong Ho was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship by his home country of Singapore.

While playing both tennis and squash for Navy, Dawson was an All-America squash player and an All-East singles and doubles player. Additionally, he was the captain of both teams during his senior season.



## ASSISTANT COACHES

### TED BERGER ASSISTANT COACH THIRD YEAR

After serving as a volunteer coach with the Navy varsity squash program for better than 20 years, Ted Berger joined the Navy squash staff in 2002-03 as a full-time assistant coach.

During his 20-year (1972-1992) tour in Annapolis, Berger worked alongside three standout coaches in Art Potter (1972-73 through 1976-77), Bobby Bayliss (1977-78 through 1980-81) and Dave Brown (1981-82 through 1997-98). Craig Dawson is now Berger's fourth coach in which he has worked with at Navy. Berger and Dawson have a unique relationship. When Berger came on board as a volunteer in 1972, Dawson was a senior and captain of the squash team.

Berger renewed his Navy squash relationship in 2000 when he volunteered to coach the junior varsity squash squad shortly after Dawson was named the head coach.

Berger earned his bachelor's degree from Buffalo.

Berger resides in Annapolis and is the father of four children and proud grandfather of nine grandkids.



### CAPT. PHIL RYAN, USN (RET.) ASSISTANT COACH EMERITUS U.S. NAVAL ACADEMY '50 21ST YEAR

Capt. Phil Ryan, USN (Ret.) has been associated with the Navy squash program for 20 years, and for the second-consecutive year he will serve as assistant coach emeritus. Ryan was twice the Deputy Commandant for the Naval Academy and was commanding officer of the USS Saratoga. While a Midshipman at the Naval Academy, he was an All-America and team captain in lacrosse and football. In 1950, he was awarded the Thompson Trophy and played in the East-West Shrine Game.

Capt. Ryan is responsible for the development of the squash players and heads the junior varsity squash program at the Academy.

Capt. Ryan and his wife, Beth, reside in Annapolis. They have three children and three grandchildren.

# OUTLOOK

Expectations are high for the 2004-05 edition of the Navy squash team. Fifth-year head coach Craig Dawson has deemed this as the year Navy will establish itself back among the squash community's elite. The Mids produced an 18-12 record a year ago and a 15th-place finish at the CSA Team Championship. Navy lost just two players from its ladder, Mason Berry who posted a 20-9 record splitting his time between the No. 3 and 4 spots, and David Hicks played a strong role at No. 9 with a 17-9 record as a senior. Meanwhile, the Midshipmen have two sophomores making the step from junior varsity and varsity and several freshmen who will vie for a starting position.

Dawson has employed a few changes in training technique this season to help bolster Navy's game. Additionally, Navy will use a digital camera system in practice sessions to help the Midshipmen fine-tune their game. While the Naval Academy's Physical Readiness Test (PRT) consisting of a 1 1/2 mile run, pushups and situps are all instrumental in squash conditioning, the Midshipmen will also participate in yoga to enhance flexibility, concentration and breathing.

Navy's ladder to start the year hinges on the annual Barb Tournament in October which will determine the Mids' starting lineup. Last year, **Gavin Morrison** claimed the coveted tournament title and held the No. 1 position the entire season. Elected team captain for the 2004-05 campaign, Morrison will look to cap off a successful career by continuing on where he left off last season. Morrison turned in a 13-15 record, playing all but one match at the top of the ladder. Last spring, he defeated Ankur Gupta of Denison in the first round of the CSA Individual Championship, gaining valuable experience. In addition, for the second year in a row, he trained in England over the summer to help hone his skills as Navy's top player.

Giving Morrison a run for his money will be junior **Scott Hackman** who produced a 13-13 record playing the No. 2 spot. Hackman won five-straight matches near the end of the season which included a 3-0 sweep over Hobart's Prateek Patni, one of only two wins by Navy over the Statesmen.

Senior **Mike Brennan** turned in a 16-13 mark a year ago playing No. 3, 4 and 5. With the graduation of Berry, Brennan has the opportunity to move up the ladder and occupy the No. 3 position full-time. With a 48-29 career record, Brennan has the ability to open the season strong and set the tone for the year as he did last year, winning eight of his first-nine matches.

Junior **Dhruv Parashar** also got off to a quick start a year ago, claiming victories in seven of his first eight matches en route to a 15-13 record overall. He, too, played multiple spots on the ladder last season, spending most of his time at No. 6, but will likely move up the ladder based upon his experience and skill.

Another experience junior returning to the courts this winter is Annapolis native, **Patrick Kruse**. Last year, Kruse made the jump from a JV player to varsity status and stood up strong to the test, producing a 15-9 record. He recorded a pair of key victories at the CSA Team Championship, defeating Eric Toan of Bowdoin, 3-0, and edging out Jake van Roden of Franklin & Marshall in a five-game match.

Maybe an even bigger surprise than Kruse's play was that of **Luke Koran**. The senior came out of nowhere to become an instrumental part of Navy's success last season. He won six of his first seven matches, but bettered that mark when he won 10 in a row leading up to the CSA Team Championship. He won a critical match against Franklin & Marshall at the championship, defeating Evan Burton at the No. 9 spot in five games. He also captured landmark wins over his Trinity and Yale opponents, recording Navy's lone win in each of those matches.

**Mike Rogers** has been riddled with nagging injuries, but in his senior season, he looks to contribute for the Mids. He has produced a 29-16 record during his career, playing up and down the ladder. He opened last season by winning eight of his first-nine matches, that included a 3-2 come-from-behind victory over Denison's Grant Picarillo. Rogers is a positive influence upon his teammates and a hard worker who Dawson is looking forward to contributing this season.

Senior **Kent McLaughlin** and sophomores **Phil Jenkins** and **Tom Kiernan** all saw limited action with the varsity team last year, but will challenge Navy's returning corps for a spot on the ladder. McLaughlin saw the most action a year ago, producing a flawless 5-0 record, while Kiernan was also unbeaten at 4-0. Jenkins won the only varsity match he played, a 3-0 triumph over Utah's Preston Hayes.

Navy's freshman class is one of the best in recent memory with four players making a charge at the upperclassmen. Hailing from West Hartford, Conn., **Tucker George** could push Morrison and Hackman for the top-two spots on the ladder. One of the Mids' top recruits, Dawson compares him to former Navy captain and Barb Trophy winner Andy McCann.

**Jeff Sawin** comes from a solid athletic bloodline and will perform as a two-sport athlete at the Academy, as he is also a member of the Mids' golf team. Sawin's older brother is a varsity golfer at Princeton. Dawson says that Sawin reminds him of former team captain Edson Greenwood who finished the 2001-02 campaign ranked No. 43 in the country.

Rookies **Brian Hamilton** and William Eucker will also make a run at some playing time this season. Hamilton was the top player at the Westminster School in Connecticut last season, while Eucker has been described as a perfectionist who won't rest until he improves.

This group of freshmen represents the best recruiting class Navy squash has had in some time, said Dawson. Each one of these young men have played at the highest level of high school squash and national junior tournaments. Their match experience will give them the ability to adjust immediately to college team squash and make a contribution to the Navy varsity team.

From top to bottom, the 2004-05 squash team is perhaps the most experienced and talented group Navy has put on the court in several years.

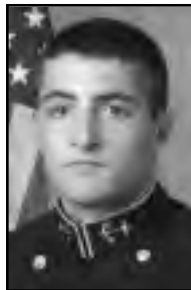

host to future CSA Individual Championships.

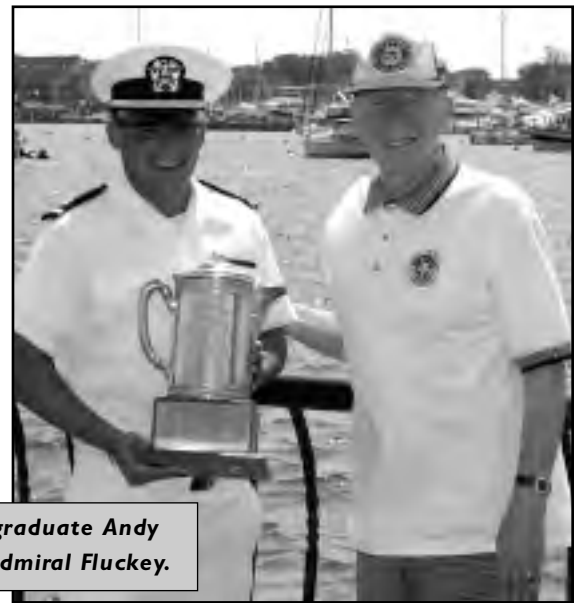
In his fifth year as the head of the Navy squash program, Craig Dawson is excited about the premier event which welcomes back all of the alumni.

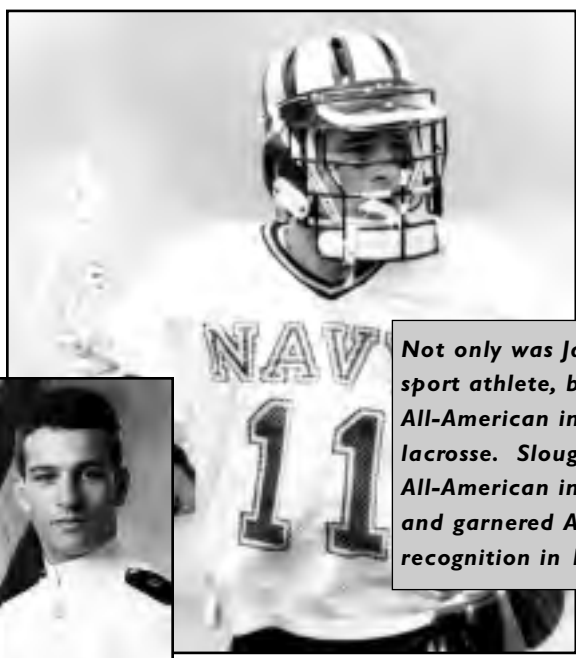

# SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD

First awarded in 1981, the NISRA Coaches Award is presented annually to that team which has best exemplified the ideals of sportsmanship in squash.

Navy, who has won the award more than any other school in the league, has received the award six times 1985, '87, '96, '98, '02 and last season. Yale has been the recipient of the award the second-most times, four.

Recipients of the award for the third time in the last seven years, the Midshipmen have been recognized by the Association's coaches in two of the last three years. One of those member coaches who nominated Navy for this prestigious award was Pennsylvania head coach Craig Thorpe-Clark.

In particular, Navy had quite a few new players this season and Coach Dawson instilled the same values as in some of the past teams, said Thorpe-Clark. Those values are synonymous with Navy teams. Regardless of their talent level in any given season, they play hard and do their very best to win.

It's easy to be gracious when you're winning, but it's not always easy to have that same attitude when you are on the other side. I've always found Navy's players to handle themselves the same, win or lose. That's a hallmark of Navy.

Not only is the award based upon a team's attitude and gamesmanship, a unique facet of the game of squash is how the game is officiated. College squash is the only intercollegiate sport where the players serve as the referees. Often a player is required to make a call against a teammate. In a sport where everyone is expected to play by the rules, Navy is considered to be one of the most ethical and fair teams.

Across the board, the Navy players are prepared to call a match properly and fairly, pointed out Thorpe-Clark.

While Thorpe-Clark praised the Midshipmen, he added his respect for Navy's fourth-year coach Craig Dawson.

Coach Dawson should be commended in the job he has done at Navy, remarked Thorpe-Clark. He is extremely professional with the opposing players and coaches. I have been a coach for nine years in the United States and I have a great deal of respect for Craig as a friend and mentor.

# UNITED STATES NAVAL ACADEMY

Secretary of the Navy George Bancroft laid the foundation for the Naval Academy when, in 1845, he established the Naval School at Fort Severn in Annapolis. Commander Franklin Buchanan served as the first Superintendent. His faculty consisted of four officers and three civilian professors. There were 50 students. Initially, the academic and professional instruction required five years—the first and last at Annapolis, with the intervening three at sea.

In 1850, the Naval School became the United States Naval Academy. The following year, the Academy adopted its current course of instruction which includes four consecutive years at Annapolis, with at-sea training provided during the summers.

The Naval Academy moved to Newport, R.I., during the Civil War. In 1865, it was re-established at Annapolis under the leadership of Vice Admiral David Dixon Porter. During these early years, the Academy was one of the few institutions of higher learning offering a sophisticated undergraduate course in technical education.

The late 19th century saw immense changes in naval technology with the conversion from sail-powered, wooden ships to steam-powered vessels of steel, which also resulted in rapid developments in naval weaponry and tactics. With the Spanish-American War in 1898, the United States became a world naval power, and early Naval Academy graduates like George Dewey and Alfred Thayer Mahan made significant contributions to our national heritage.

The new century saw the nation's undergraduate naval college grow in size and academic prowess. The Class of 1895 had produced 41 graduates. By World War I, there were nearly 200 graduates each year, along with 2,500 reserve officers who received their training at the Academy.

With the entry of the United States into World War I, courses were shortened to three years, a program which remained in effect until 1921.

Between the two world wars, the curriculum and training equipment were modernized to keep pace with rapid advances in the naval profession and American education. In 1930, the Association of American Universities accredited the Naval Academy, and in 1933, an act of Congress authorized the Naval Academy to confer the degree of bachelor of science on graduates, beginning with the Class of 1931. Congress authorized award of the degree to all living graduates in 1939. The Middle Atlantic States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools first accredited the Academy in 1947.

During World War II, summer sessions were instituted and the course was again shortened to three years. As during World War I, reserve officers, along with reserve midshipmen, also trained at the Academy.

In 1963, the Academy initiated the Trident Scholar Program, under which a number of exceptional students are permitted to pursue independent research during the first class (senior) year.

The 1964-65 academic year saw the civilian positions of academic dean and dean of admissions established and far-reaching changes made to the curriculum. The number of required core courses was reduced and, for the first time, each midshipman was allowed to pursue academic areas of individual interest for minor or major. Additional changes, introduced in the 1969-70 academic year, now require every midshipman to complete a major.

In 1975, President Gerald R. Ford signed legislation authorizing admission of women to the service academies. The first women midshipmen entered the Academy in July 1976 and graduated with the Class of 1980.

# NAVAL ACADEMY TRADITIONS

## ANCHORS AWEIGH

"Anchors Aweigh" was written by Lt. Charles Zimmermann, Musical Director of the Naval Academy in 1906, with the lyrics provided by Alfred H. Miles of the Class of 1906, as a fight song for the 1907 graduating class instead of the usual class march Zimmermann had composed for previous classes. The song made its debut at the 1906 Army-Navy football game, and when the Midshipmen won the game, the song became traditional at this game. It gained national exposure in the 1920s and 1930s when it was heard on the radio and was in a number of popular movies. In 1997 a one-hour documentary on the history of Navy football, titled "Anchors Aweigh for Honor and Glory", was produced by NFL Films. The film was deemed a success by both critics and fans alike.

## ANNAPOLIS

The capital of Maryland, Annapolis is the home of the Naval Academy. Annapolis is located 30 miles east of Washington, D.C. and 25 miles south of Baltimore.

## BANCROFT HALL

Named after former Secretary of the Navy George Bancroft, the Hall is home for the entire Brigade of Midshipmen. It contains 1,873 midshipmen rooms, nearly five miles of corridors and about 33 acres of floor space, making it one of the largest single dormitories in the world. All of the basic facilities midshipmen need for daily living, and many for recreation, are found in the Hall.

## BAND

The Navy's oldest continuing musical organization, the Naval Academy Band was formed in 1852 with 13 musicians. Now numbering 63 members, the band includes the wind ensembles, rock band, big band, woodwind and brass quintets, tuba and trombone quartets and the percussion ensemble. The band provides musical support to the Brigade of Midshipmen in parades and performances, and entertains members of the Academy family and civilian community throughout the year.

## BILL THE GOAT

The first recorded use of a goat mascot for Navy athletic teams was in 1893 when an animal named El Cid (The Chief) was turned over to the Brigade by young officers of the USS New York. El Cid helped Navy to a 6-4 triumph over Army that year. Two cats, a dog, and a carrier pigeon have also enjoyed brief reigns as the Navy mascot, but goats have served without interruption since 1904.

Bill XXX is the 33rd goat mascot for the Academy and the 29th to carry the name Bill. He is taken care of by 15 goathandlers made up of five midshipmen from the first, second and third classes. The goathandlers undergo rigorous training prior to handling Bill on the field.

## CO-ED

For many years, the Naval Academy was a male-only institution. But that changed when women were admitted in 1976. Today, 15 percent of the 4,000-member Brigade are women.

## SCHOOL COLORS

Navy adopted Navy Blue and Gold as its colors back in 1892. At that time, each class at the Naval Academy had class colors. The Class of 1890 first used Navy Blue and Gold. In 1892, the minutes from the Naval Academy Auxiliary Athletic Association meeting reported, "The Committee reported favorable results of a conference with Naval Cadets as to the probability of adoption of Navy Blue and Gold as Academy colors."

## NICKNAME

Navy's sports teams are referred to as the Midshipmen or Mids. The term "Middie" is inappropriate.

# NAVAL ACADEMY FACTS

## GO NAVY AND START THE ADVENTURE OF A LIFETIME.

At the United States Naval Academy, our students are challenged morally, mentally and physically like never before in their lives. Students come here because they yearn for a challenge and want to be part of something larger than themselves.

The Naval Academy is the undergraduate college of the Navy and Marine Corps. It is a four-year honor, integrity and leadership laboratory that uses a total-immersion program to blend academics, professional training, leadership experience, physical education, competitive sports and extracurricular activities.

We hire every one of our graduates. Upon graduation from USNA, a midshipman receives a commission as an Ensign in the United States Navy or as a 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps, along with a Bachelor of Science (BS) degree in one of 19 different academic majors. From there, they are sent to high-tech 21st century assignments in aviation, submarines, warships or other exciting operational fields.

The Naval Academy midshipmen are given responsibility and leadership opportunities commensurate with their status within the Brigade. First class midshipmen, or seniors, run the day-to-day operation of the 4,000 men and women that constitute the Brigade of Midshipmen.

The 2004 edition of U.S. News and World Report's "America's Best Colleges" ranks the engineering program at the Naval Academy fourth in the nation, the Aerospace Engineering program fourth in the nation, the Civil Engineering program 11th in the nation, the Electrical Engineering program fifth in the nation and the Mechanical Engineering program ninth in the nation.

A third of the Brigade are varsity athletes and represent the Naval Academy in 30 NCAA Division I sports while carrying 18-21 credit hours of highly-technical engineering, science and math core curriculum.

Approximately 25 percent of Flag Officers in the Navy and general officers in the Marine Corps were varsity athletes at USNA.

Eighty-five percent of Navy's NCAA Division I varsity athletes graduate in four years. The most recent national collegiate varsity athlete graduation rate is 62 percent in six years.

Midshipmen can choose from 21 men's and nine women's varsity sports in which to participate.

Rear Admiral Alan B. Shepard, the first American in space, was a member of the heavyweight crew team. Air Force General William Anders played soccer at the USNA before going on to be an astronaut. Admiral Stansfield Turner, former director of the Central Intelligence Agency, was a lineman on the football team. Admiral Arleigh Burke, a wrestler at the Academy, went on to be the Chief of Naval Operations. Rear Admiral Richard Byrd, a captain on the gymnastics team, was a famous polar explorer and World War II hero. Fleet Admiral Bull Halsey was also a football star at the Naval Academy. Other heroes on the athletic field include: 1960 Heisman Trophy winner Joe Bellino; 1963 Heisman Trophy winner, and NFL Hall of Famer Roger Staubach; David Robinson, who was the 1987 Collegiate Player of the Year, the 1995 NBA Player of the Year and won Olympic Gold Medals in 1992 and 1996 and Commander Willie McCool, a captain on the cross country team, who was an astronaut on the space shuttle Columbia's final voyage.
